





Unofficial News Last Night Was That German Right Was Broken | Sale of

While the French and British official announcements indicate satisfaction with the situation along the battle front in France, and confidence in the outcome, an unofficial report from Paris declares that the German right has been broken and is being pursued by the allies. This report also declares that the Germans have been surrounded in the Somme department and that Peronne has been re-

The official press bureau at London, while making no objection to the publication of these reports, declines to take any responsibility for the correctness of them.

The announcements issued late at night by both French and British officials declared that there had been no change in the situation, which they had previously reported as favoring the allied army to some degree.

A narrative from Field Marshal Sir John French's headquarters, issued at London by the official press bureau, gives the reason for the long-drawn-out battle, which has now lasted eighteen days. "The extent of the country covered," it says, "is so great as to render slow any efforts to manoeuvre and march around the flank in order to escape the costly expedient of a frontal attack against heavily fortified positions.'

This refers to the fiercely contested operations of the allies' left in an endeavor to outflank the German right wing under General Von Kluck. In these operations French and British, heavily reinforced, have been engaged for several days, and the encounters at times are reported to have been unprecedented.

In the far east there are signs of much activity on the part of the Japanese who are engaged in a movement, both by land and sea, against the German concessions of Kiao-Chow, in Shan Tung province, China. The Japanese have occupied the heights outside of Tsing Tau, the capital, overlooking the German's main line of defence.

Chinese troops have blown up the railroad bridge at Tayu-Ho, six miles west of Wei-Hsien, which has also been occupied by the Japanese, and are thus apparently opposing Japanese military operations in Shan Tung province.

The meagre reports of the Russian campaign against Austria and Germany, indicate a period of comparative calm, while the great armies of these nations are getting into position for offensive and

A British cruiser squadron, in command of Rear Admiral Sir Christopher Craddock, who recently commanded the British warships in Mexican waters, has arrived at Punta Arenas, Straits of Magellan, and is believed to be on its way to the Pacific.

The Italian government has issued a warning to Italians, who have taken or intend to take service in the army of any country now at war, that this is a breach of neutrality, and is punishable by im-

Late despatches declare that the Germans have begun their attack on the first line of the Antwerp defences; that they have reoccupied Malines, occupied Moll, an important railway junction, and are bombarding Lierre, a few miles from Antwerp, where many houses have been destroyed.

HEAVY FIGHTING ON ALLIED LEFT.

London, Sept. 29, 11.37 p. m.—The official press bureau issued tonight the following regarding the operations in Northern France: 'There is practically no change in the situation. The allied left have had some heavy fighting, but they are well holding their own.'



LEAVING FOR HOME

New York, Sept. 30.—The Belgian commission appointed to place before President Wilson alleged instances of German atrocities in Belgium, will sail home today on the White Star liner Adriatic.

Great Strides Made. Mr. Allen shows that despite many Mr. Allen shows that despite many obstacles great strides have been made in American dye stuff manufacturing in the last five years. Foreign influence, he says, is not wholly responsible for the present famine in dye stuffs. He insists that our textile mills not only have never properly supported the American manufacturers of dyes, but that the textile men injure American efforts in that they have Germans in charge of the dyeling in most of the large American mills. who frequently refuse even to test samples of American dyes left by sales-


