

Work That Affects Hearing

"Climatic and occupational influence in diseases of the ear" was the subject of a paper by Dr. Clarence Blake of Boston, Mass., in the otology section. 

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



The discomforting hairy growths on lip or check vanish following the application of a paste made by mixing enough powdered delatone and water to cover the objectionable hairs. The paste is rubbed off after 2 or 8 minutes and with it comes every trace of hair. The skin should then be washed to remove the remaining delatone and it will be firm and free from spot or blemish. No pain attends this method and rarely is more than one application necessary.

Rubbing pyroxin on eyebrows makes them come in thick and glossy, and short eyelashes will grow long and curly if a little pyroxin be applied at lashroots with thumb and forefinger. Be careful and don't get any pyroxin where no hair is wanted.



The discussion was inaugurated by a letter received from W. M. Jarvis, which follows:

His Worship the Mayor, St. John:

Dear Sir:—I enclose a cutting from the Daily Telegraph this morning with reference to a fire which occurred on North Market street last night. The companies I represent are not interested in any way, but it seems to me that when a public statement is made that a fire is originated from a mass of rubbish in a cellar there should be some investigation, and as you are aware it is the duty of the police magistrate to institute an enquiry into the cause of the origin of the fire when his attention is drawn to the subject by proper authority.

I cannot, of course, vouch for the correctness of the statement in the newspaper, although such statements are usually accurate. I may say, however, that in my experience fully seventy-five per cent. of the fires that occur proceed from carelessness in one form or another, and, if this can be checked, a reduction in the fire loss and a consequent reduction in the fire loss and a consequent reduction in the rate for fire insurance must ensue. Indeed to my mind the criminality of anyone who, by neglecting to keep his cellar or any part of his premises in such order as to prevent the occurrence of fires under ordinary circumstances, is only less in degree than that of an incendiary.

Apparently the acreage in alfalfa in the province has declined from 140 acres last year to 100 acres this year, and this would appear to show that the agitation in favor of more widespread interest in this most valuable crop is well timed. 

NO SERIOUS DIFFICULTY WITH MONEY MARKET IN FALL, SAYS BANK PRESIDENT

Toronto, Aug. 12—"I don't expect there'll be any serious difficulty with the money market this fall," said President Wilkie of the Imperial Bank. "The emergency currency authorized by the old bank act, coupled with the reserve circulation which is further provided for in the amended bank act does away entirely, I think, with any danger of a currency famine in Canada this autumn. "But there won't be easy money, by any means," he continued, "and I personally wouldn't want to see it just yet. That is one of the troubles with Canada. Money has been too easily obtained and too easily spent. After having had difficulty in getting money, perhaps we won't be so free with our spendings for a while.

REFORM WAVE IN DRESS

Woman's Club, Indorsed by Mrs. Ed-win Gould, Demands More Modesty

win Gould, Demands More Modesty

Chicago, Aug. 12—With the endorsment of Mrs. Edwin Gould as a starter, the Chicago Woman's club is preparing to inaugurate a nation wide movement for dress reform, which will include the practical feature of appealing directly to manufacturers and modistes with a view to having them discourage the prevailing style of tight and slit skirts, which have largely eliminated petticoats as part of a woman's wearing apparel. Mrs. Gould, who is here on her way home from a western trip, said:

"I expect to see a revulsion among women themselves against the immodestly slit and the overtight skirt. The dress reform that seems to be due will, I think, carry the women of the country back to normal and conservative modes. I expect to see a return of the reasonably wide skirt, which is now considered out of date. Most of the women of my acquaintance agree with me that it is time to revert to the old lines in dress, with such modifications as good taste may dictate."

Members of women's clubs in St. Paul purpose making appeals to manufacturers, pattern makers, designers and modistes to bring about a modification of current styles. War is to be made particularly on the tight skirt, the slit skirt, the absence of petticoats and the excessively low cut evening gowns.

Chicago women, who believe more in protecting morals than in adhering rigidly to the dress demands of the day, stand ready to advance the movement started in St. Paul.

"I believe that the immodesty in dress is due to carrying to extremes a certain style or mode," said Mrs. George Bass.




