PINK LADY IS A BIG HIT AT OPERA HOUSE

A Very Big Production, Delightful in Scenic Effect, Singing, Dancing, Costuming and Comedy

It has long been a fact accepted without question that St. John theatre-goers take more to musical comedy than to any other class of the more elevated sort of amusement, that is "elevated," in the sense of production, not price, and last night when "The Pink Lady" bowed, smiled sang and danced to a local audience for the first time, was no exception to the rule.

The Opera House, where the performance was given under the direction of John C. Fisher and B. D. Stevens, held a large gathering who were immensely delighted with the merits of the piece and the playing and greatly pleased with the various numbers offered. Certain calls were frequent, and the comments heard between acts and at the close were decidedly laudatory.

In the garden of "Le Joli Concou," the big production opened in the last act disclosed the ball room of the Nymphs and Satyrs, in Paris, for it was one of the most gorgeous scenes ever seen on the local stage. The costumes of the whole cast were of a high standard, both those of the men and women in the company being up to the very limit in fashion, and the gowns worn by the principals were particularly admired.

All the members of the company seemed most capably cast. The title part was enacted with pleasing success by Miss Olga DeBaugh, who won her way to the hearts of the audience by her mastery of the role, her singing and dancing and her attractive appearance. She made a particularly fine impression in the last act in her singing of "Beautiful Lady," and her violin playing and waltzing simultaneously. This is the big song success of the show and many a one went homeward warbling or lilted its tune to the strains.

Miss Alice Moffatt, as Angel, in her singing of this piece added to her honors already scored with "When Love Goes a Straying" and other songs. She has a very pleasing voice and made a most favorable impression in her singing and acting. Her part in "Hide and Seek" with Mr. McElherrin was especially well done.

Plenty of Comedy

There was comedy galore throughout the three acts of the production. It was not one man comedy, but a whole bundle of laughs one right on top of the other, furnished by different members of the cast. The leading comedy role was that of Dondidier, taken by James McElherrin, whose every appearance was a signal for renewed outbursts. His work was at no time overdone, but just sufficient to keep his audience laughing and his facial expression was helpful in his purpose. His solo, "I Like It," won several encores, while his "Donny Did, Donny Didn't," was humorous in the extreme. He seemed to bring over with mirth.

One of the prettier song pieces was the "Girl by the Saskatchewan," in which Jack Mundy introduced himself most cleverly. He sang well, and his pantomime added much to the piece, while his comedy work added many laughs to the already lengthy list. Mr. Worthley furnished comedy also as a detective and handled his solo, "Big as a Gannet," in the first act, in a manner which won much applause, while he showed himself a dancer of no mean ability.

Miss Harvey caused much laughter as Madame Dondidier. Mr. Deery took advantage of all opportunities presented in his part, and Miss Carter also did nicely. Mortimer Meyer, as the hungry man, and later as a violinist, furnished both comedy and music well.

"The Pink Lady" will long be remembered by admirers of musical comedy in this city. It or "she" was a pronounced success last night, and the class of entertainment offered is worthy of the well-filled houses for the balance of the week, because St. John is not often visited by so large a company of talented artists, so well staged a production, or a musical comedy of such renown as this which has had lengthy runs in the larger cities of the states and the old country.

AGED ITALIAN PLAYS RARE OLD VIOLIN AT NICKEL

The Ricci Trio Make Splendid Impression at Keith's Popular Picture House

Valencia, Spain, Aug. 11--Forty-nine persons were seriously hurt today at Candia, a town in the province of Valencia near the Mediterranean, as the result of a panic which occurred in a crowded moving picture theatre. A slight outbreak of fire caused the audience to rush blindly towards the exits, and of those hurt in the tremendous crush, fourteen are believed tonight to be dying.

The discomforting hairy growths on lip or cheek vanish following the application of a paste made by mixing enough powdered delatone and water to cover the objectionable hairs. The paste is rubbed off after 2 or 3 minutes and with it comes every trace of hair. The skin should then be washed to remove the remaining delatone and it will be firm and free from spot or blemish. THE CROPS The Ottawa bulletin on field crops and live stock in Canada for the month ended June 30, reported the estimated area of crops as follows:

LORD HALDANE TO SPEND ONLY FIVE DAYS IN AMERICA
London, Aug. 12.—The Lord Chancellor, Lord Haldane, will sail for New York on the S.S. Lusitania on August 23 to attend the American Bar Association's meeting in Montreal. He was overwhelmed with invitations both from the United States and Canada as soon as he announced that he would visit America, but he has declined all with one exception.

The day after he arrives in New York he will go up the Hudson in the late J. Pierpont Morgan's yacht *Consair* and inspect the cadets at West Point. A special train will take the Lord Chancellor and his party to Montreal, where he will arrive Sunday morning, August 31. His address to the Bar Association will deal with the part the lawyer plays in international affairs. The day after his speech he will return to New York, and he will sail for home on the Lusitania. His visit to America will therefore last only five days.

NO SERIOUS DIFFICULTY WITH MONEY MARKET IN FALL, SAYS BANK PRESIDENT
Toronto, Aug. 12.—"I don't expect there'll be any serious difficulty with the money market this fall," said President Wilkie of the Imperial Bank. "The emergency currency authorized by the old bank act, coupled with the reserve circulation which is available for use in the amended bank act does away entirely, I think, with any danger of a currency famine in Canada this autumn."

"But there won't be any money, by any means," he continued, "and I personally wouldn't want to see it just restored in Europe and on this continent, and as soon as it is completely restored, there will be no doubt sufficient capital being forthcoming for legitimate enterprise."

REFORM WAVE IN DRESS STARTED IN CHICAGO
Chicago, Aug. 12.—With the endorsement of Mrs. Edwin Gould as a starter, the Chicago Women's club is preparing to inaugurate a nation wide movement for dress reform, which will include the practical feature of appealing directly to manufacturers and modistes with a view to having them discourage the prevailing style of tight and slit skirts, which have largely eliminated petticoats as part of a woman's wearing apparel. Mrs. Gould, who is here on her way home from a western tour, said:

"I expect to see a revolution among women themselves against the immorally slit and the overtight skirt. The dress reform that seems to be due will, I think, carry the women of the country back to normal and conservative modes. I expect to see a return of the reasonably wide skirt, which is now considered out of date. Most of the women of my acquaintance agree with me that it is time to revert to the old lines in dress, with such modifications as good taste may dictate."

Members of women's clubs in St. Paul purpose making appeals to the factors, pattern makers, designers and modistes to bring about a modification of current styles. War is to be made particularly on the tight skirt, the slit skirt, the absence of petticoats and the excessively low cut evening gowns.

"I believe that the immodesty in dress is due to carrying to extremes a certain style or mode," said Mrs. George Bass, president of the Chicago Women's club. "I have no doubt that if the Federation of Women's clubs started to agitate a dress reform that would be both modest and becoming to the wearers we could make the movement nationwide."

BODY OF MATTHEW CRANE IS PICKED UP IN THE HARBOR

Probably Fell Off Wharf at Low Tide and Was Killed

ADRIET IN EARLY MORN

Seen by Messrs. Leonard's Men and Brought to Wharf—He Belonged to Grand Bay and Had Been Employed at Coal Handling

As Kenneth Outhouse, a fisherman in Leonard Bros.' employ was walking along the wharf about seven o'clock this morning he noticed a dark object floating about in the water just inside the C. P. R. trestle. He thought nothing of it at the time until his attention was attracted later by two white objects a little above the water and glistening in the sunshine. He called to Guilford Hayes, who was also on the wharf at the time, and together they investigated and they were startled to find that it was the body of a man. Although several fishermen and laborers had been on the wharf for some time previous to that, no one had thought it was anything more than a log that had drifted up to within about twenty feet from the wharf.

The body was placed in a boat and Coroner Berryman was notified. John Leary, who was in the crowd which had collected by that time was able to identify the body as that of Matthew Crane of Grand Bay, who had come to the city lately and was employed about the coal sheds.

It is believed that the unfortunate man was seen by Charles McCarthy at the corner of Union and Spruce streets about nine o'clock last evening. It is supposed that he walked towards Rev's Point after that and that he fell over one of the wharves at low tide and was killed in the fall, otherwise the body would not have floated so soon. But there were no marks or bruises to be seen.

The deceased was a brother of John Crane of Grand Bay, who was at one time on the local police force. He was about forty years of age and single.

Coroner Berryman ordered the body to be removed to the morgue. He said this afternoon he did not think an inquest would be necessary.
