France Means to Keep Her Grip on the Ruhr, Says General Degoutte

That Is French Commander's Reply to German Chancellor—Further Occupation Is Reported—Talk of a Protest From Britain.

(Canadian Press.) Dusseldorf, March 9.—France will not release her present hold on the Ruhr. This was the reply of General Degoutte, the French commander, made in a statement last night to the newspapermen in answer to Chancellor Cuno's address before the Reichstag on Monday.

TO INQUIRE INTO THE CANADIAN FUEL SITUATION

(By Canadian Press.) Ottawa, Mar. 9.—On the motion of Senator McLennan, a special committee composed of Senators McLennan, Lal, Hardy, Dever and Webster, was appointed by the Senate yesterday to inquire into Canada's fuel supply.

During discussion of the public works estimates there was criticism on the score that when an appropriation was made last year for \$12,000 for a wharf at Grandines, Que., the minister had failed to advise the House that the amount to be eventually expended on this construction was \$180,000.

Maritime Province Votes.

The vote for harbors and rivers in Nova Scotia, aggregating \$294,100, was discussed and eventually passed.

The Prince Edward Island vote for harbors and rivers, totalling \$33,700, was met with no opposition, but there was some criticism of the New Brunswick estimates, which totalled \$65,600. R. B. Hanson, K.C., Conservative, York-Sunshine, thought that the fishermen of Grand Manan Island were entitled to some consideration, and complained that counties of South Cape Breton and Victoria, N. S., appeared to receive the lion's share of the money.

THE SPIDER'S WEB.

A mouthpiece of the New Brunswick Power Company has settled all our troubles for us. It has shown how the foolish people of St. John may be saved from themselves. They are on the verge of committing a supreme folly, but salvation is offered them. They have only to enter into negotiations with the New Brunswick Power Company, hand over to it the Musquash current, and all will be well.

But is this a new gospel? Have we not heard something like it before? Have we not also been told that even if the Power Company got the Musquash current the price of light and power could not be greatly reduced? We do know that there is legislation which would permit the company to earn dividends on watered stock, and if it had control of Musquash and thereby got the city into its clutches—what would the rates be?

No doubt the citizens are grateful for the assurance that they are foolish persons who cannot be trusted to conduct their own affairs; and also to learn that the only way to get power at reasonable cost is to put themselves once more in the grasp of the monopoly which by its own present showing has been charging them exorbitant prices for years.

All this talk about a very great burden of debt and increased taxation is not the product of a disordered mind but the calculated propaganda of a group of profit-seekers who care more for the hundreds of thousands of dollars they want for watered stock than they do for the industrial and commercial welfare of St. John. They are dangerous. The City Council should beware alike of their published propaganda and their secret whisperings. Their aim is utterly selfish. They do not care a fig about debt or taxation only to the extent that those bogeys may be used to serve their turn.

What is needed at City Hall at this moment is a bold leadership that will call every bluff and get on with the work of establishing a civic distribution system. Hydro belongs to the people. They will not turn their backs upon their own interests when the current from Musquash is offered them. The City Council should assert that it is going after the market, that it proposes to get it, and that competition can only injure those who try to prevent the people from taking full advantage of the boon of power at cost, the price of which will not be governed by the exigencies of a corporation seeking dividends on watered stock. This is the really big question before the City Council. Will it rise to the height of its duty and opportunity? The citizens are asking that question. The answer cannot be delayed.

SPEECH FROM THRONE.

The Speech from the Throne in the Provincial Legislature does not forecast much legislation, but it is very satisfactory in that it tells the people that the Government lived within its income last year, the only burden being the Valley Railway debt.

The people of the Province will read with great satisfaction that a system of road patrol is to be established. Now that we have so great a mileage of good roads it is imperative that they be given the prompt repairs which traffic makes necessary. To let them run down would be the worst kind of economy. It is also satisfactory to note that the Government anticipates further federal aid, of which New Brunswick has so wisely availed itself for several years, and that thereby the mileage of good roads may be still further increased.

be sought in that connection at this session. It is perfectly clear, in view of the resolutions adopted by Boards of Trade and other bodies in Fredericton, Woodstock, Hartland, Grand Falls, Edmundston and Campbellton, that the subject will be pressed upon the Government, and the expiry of the International Paper Company's lease on May 1st will call for some action. Hydro, therefore, will undoubtedly be a subject of discussion before the session closes. No mistake can be made if the hydro policy already adopted is carried forward vigorously, and Grand Falls is the key to the whole provincial situation.

The Speech makes no reference to prohibition or any legislation affecting it. The Premier has expressed himself as unwilling to interfere with export business so long as none of the liquor leaks out for local consumption. It will no doubt be the aim of the prohibition delegation which is to appear before the Government to convince the members not only that the Province should take no revenue from this source but that it is impossible to prevent a leakage in the interests of boot-leggers so long as the traffic is boot-legal.

Toronto Globe.—Toronto is not the only city in which the street railway fare problem is under consideration. The seven-cent fare is still more common than any other, but statistics presented recently by President Emmons of the American Electric Railway Association indicate that the tendency is again downward, and that in thirteen cities a five-cent fare, reduced from a higher figure, is now in force. There are also seven other cities in which the fare is five cents, with an additional charge for transfers, and fourteen cities in which a five-cent fare is charged within the limits and an additional five cents in the zone beyond the city boundaries.

"Get together" is a favorite slogan of the New Brunswick Power Company. It wants to delay the distribution of hydro, or gobble it up, or sell out to the city at an outrageous price. It is perfectly willing to "get together" to secure either of these results. Although the whip of scorpions is concealed from view by these artful negotiators the citizens would do well to adopt as their slogan—"To your tents, oh Israel."

PROHIBITION IN STATE OF MAINE. Two Bills for More Severe Penalties are Introduced in Legislature.

Two bills providing heavy penalties for violation of the prohibition law are before the Maine Legislature. The Senate Tuesday Senator Cram introduced an act to amend the revised statutes with reference to the sale of intoxicating liquors.

The act provides that no person shall knowingly transport into the State, or from place to place therein, any intoxicating liquor or any person in possession of a permit conferred by the national prohibition act, or any person so transporting intoxicating liquor to exhibit such permit when requested to do so by any duly qualified officer, shall be deemed to be prima facie evidence that no such permit exists.

The penalty for violation is fixed at a fine of not less than \$20 nor more than \$500 and costs and in addition thereto imprisonment for not less than three months nor more than six months in jail, and in default of payment of the fine or costs and in addition thereto imprisonment for six months additional in jail.

The penalty for a second conviction is fixed at a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000 and costs and in addition thereto imprisonment for not less than six months nor more than one year and in default of payment of the fine or costs and in addition thereto imprisonment for one year additional in jail.

Good Results From Insulin But Supply So Far Is Small

Good Effects With Children are Reported

All Ages Benefit—Two Concrete Examples of Good Derived—Patients Feel Improved in Every Way—Dosage Varies in Different Cases.

(Toronto Telegram.)

While results from the administration of insulin to diabetic sufferers has been exceptionally encouraging, the great obstacle at the present time lies in the fact that there cannot be sufficient of the insulin extract prepared to meet even the local demands of Toronto. Until the manufacture has been undertaken in large quantities by manufacturing chemists there is little use in holding out hopes of treatment by diabetes for immediate relief.

Up to the present there have been over fifty cases of diabetes treated by the Toronto experimenters. Some have been taking the treatment continuously for several months. Although the most striking results have been seen in children and young adults, all patients have benefited by the treatment. Dr. F. G. Banting, Dr. A. A. Fletcher, Dr. W. R. Campbell, Prof. J. J. R. MacLeod and their associates is, however, very reassuring.

On the first or second day if sufficient treatment is given the urine becomes sugar free. These patients become conscious of increasing strength before the end of the first week. From a state which may be one of discouragement or of profound mental depression they become cheerful and interested. Hunger is replaced by appetite; the thirst is lessened. Patients find they are less irritable and state that they begin to sleep well. The expression improves; the skin becomes less harsh and dry; even the hair becomes softer; the patient loses that appearance which characterizes the diabetic.

In ten days a very considerable amount of physical vigor is restored. Some patients are able to return to work after a month of treatment. The patient's weight frequently increases, and this can readily be brought about by supplying food in excess of the caloric requirements and increased amounts of insulin.

Gain in Three Months. The success attending the treatment can be seen in a brief outline. One is that of a patient, aged sixteen, whose diabetes had been diagnosed during the last three months of his life. He gained thirty-five pounds in less than four months.

Mild infections are few and far between. Even the pain of chronic pyorrhoea was relieved by treatment. It occurred when injections were stopped because relief was not obtained. For several months simple catarrhal infections are no longer of serious import. Probably the condition towards the alleviation of which most attention has been directed in the therapy of diabetes is glycosuria, or sugar in the urine. While this symptom is most cases it is regarded of not more than secondary importance, it is nevertheless one in which the success of the use of insulin may be conclusively demonstrated.

And that was the last word she could get out of him upon the subject.

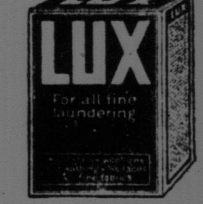

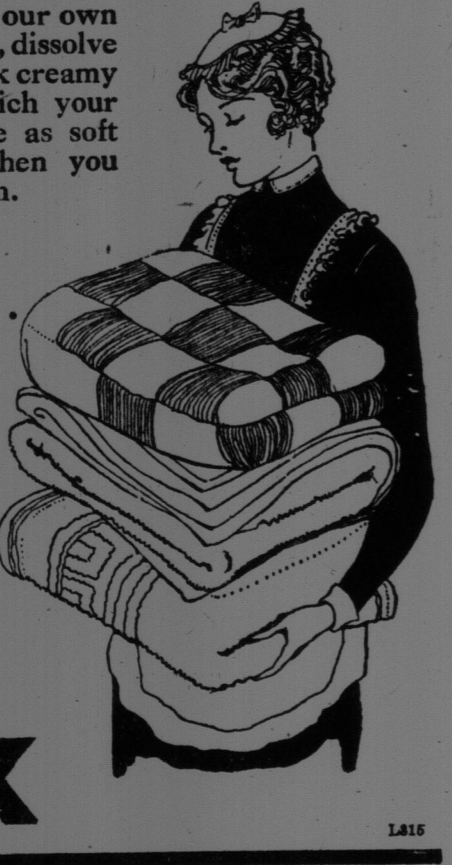

DIET OF MICROBES IS HIS PREDICTION

Dr. Steinmetz Says Human Race will be Saved by Bacteria

Cross-bred for Protein—"Biological Engineers" to Produce "Energy Crops" and Abridge Many of Nature's Processes.

New York, March 8.—The future of the human race rests with the "biological engineer," according to Dr. Charles P. Steinmetz, chief consulting engineer of the General Electric Company, who spoke here on "Inventions of the Future," at a dinner of the Advisory Council of the Federal Engineers Development Corporation at the Engineers' Club.

used for food. Only a very small part of that is protein. It takes a whole year or season to grow, and even then we may not use it directly. We feed it to cattle, but its production of animal protein is very small. The amount of protein which we get when the animal is slaughtered is very small compared to that which is consumed by the animal."
Wheat and other grains are foods which man accidentally hit upon in paleolithic times, according to the speaker, and no systematic effort has ever been made to find a more economical grain or to develop one. But no grain, however efficient, he said, would begin to produce energy so economical as that of cultivating the bacteria which furnish the grain with nitrogen.
