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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society.

- I. The designation of the Society shall be **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorized Version.
- II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.
- III. Each subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a Member.
- IV. Each subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a Member for life.
- V. Each subscriber of Twenty-five Guineas annually shall be a Governor.
- VI. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.
- VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.
- VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds shall be a Member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.
- IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six

of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XII. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the general meeting, and at meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating Honorary Members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

Adopted

I. That limits its operations be fully and of the Apocrypha;

II. That pecuniary aid Apocrypha; in conformity whatever.

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in
1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

Nova Scotia Bible Society

- I. This Society shall be called THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz: to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of Scriptures *gratis* to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.
- III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
- IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.
- V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.
- VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.

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SEVENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

HELD IN

GRAFTON ST. CHURCH,

On Tuesday, 15th January, 1889.

THE Seventy-fifth Anniversary of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society was held on the 15th January, in Grafton Street Methodist Church. The Hon. S. L. SHANNON in the chair. A fair attendance of ladies and gentlemen being present. The meeting was opened by the Rev. Mr. Strothard reading a portion of Scripture, and prayer, and the President addressed the meeting, noticing the progress of Bible circulation during the past forty years, during which time he had been actively connected with the Auxiliary.

Mr. Farquhar, the Secretary, read the report, and Rev. Dr. Hole, in an address, moved the first resolution;

“That the report read be printed, with the usual appendices, under the direction of the Committee.”

Which was seconded by the Rev. D. M. Gordon, and carried unanimously.

The following resolution, moved by Rev. Lathern, and seconded by Mr. Mackelvie, was adopted

"That this meeting begs to thank the ladies' associations and branches throughout the provinces for their valuable assistance to this auxiliary during the past years, and trusts that they will continue to aid in the circulation of God's word, and hopes that the friends in the city will emulate the efforts of the branches in the country."

To the resolution lengthy and interesting speeches were made by Rev. Dr. Lathern and Bishop Courtney dealing with the history, progress and benefits of the Society, and the manner in which its work is carried out.

It was moved and seconded that the officers of the past year be re-elected, with power to add to the number, and make such alterations as may be necessary.

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REPORT.

THE Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society beg to present the Annual Report. Its details will be brief, and the language of the past year's report applies to this. "Very little new in the history of the Auxiliary during the past year," yet the constitution of the Society and duty demands that we meet, as in days gone by, to recount the works that we have attempted, to encourage each other, and if for nothing else to pass resolutions of thankfulness for the past, commending the action of the several branches, and ask of their encouragement for the future.

In the past year, as in almost every former one, we have to mourn the loss of honoured members of our committee and officers of the Auxiliary. Thos. A. Brown, one of our active brethren, has been removed from among us, but reference to him will be made more fully when we come to notice the local affairs of the Auxiliary.

Meantime, as usual, the Committee would refer, for a bird's eye view of the Parent Society's operations throughout the world, to the Society's eighty-fourth Report, or the abstract of the same.

Now that the books of the history of the year have been opened—the despatches from the seat and fortresses of spiritual war—received—what is the message which they bring? A message—whether good or ill—surely to

be received with reverent sympathy, for it is of a work consecrated by the sufferings and the prayers of many men, and in far distant fields, to whom, in their higher ideal, life and all its labour has been Christ, and to whom death in His service will be gain.

Of the work only, in the first instance, may we ask, for this is to ask whether it has been victory or defeat. Not to possess, nor to live long, but to work are we sent; and with us it is well when it is well with the work He has given us to do, and the suffering he allows us to share. Afterwards may we ask of the workers, and of the means by which the work is to be carried on.

Of the work we may, perhaps, first, try to judge by the *ISSUES* of copies at home and abroad. And during the year just closed these have been the largest the Society has ever known. The total number of Bibles, Testaments, and Portions* has been Four millions two hundred and six thousand (4,206,032). This is an increase beyond the issues of last year of more than Two hundred and seventy-three thousand copies (273,354). Of the total issues Two million two hundred and ninety-three thousand copies (2,293,393) were sent from London: over One million nine hundred and twelve thousand (1,912,639) from the Depôts abroad.

Another and a not less interesting—perhaps a more valuable—source of evidence, is the judgment of Agents and Auxiliaries—the statements of men in the press and actuality of the work itself, with its various aspects before their eyes. Not all of these reports have been received, though comparatively few are wanting. But there is among the returns already laid before the Committee a unanimity of belief—a consensus of opinion—all the more valuable because undesigned. And, on the whole, it is the unanimity of reports which all tell of victory. The victory sometimes of hard positions only not lost—sometimes of attacks sustained with narrowed but unyielding front—sometimes of gradual advance while foes or friends have slept—sometimes of successful assault and advance along the whole line—sometimes of designed retreat that

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another may occupy the place—sometimes of a victory without colours or trumpets or the victory-song—but of victory still. From every quarter of the field—from the populous North, from the East, ‘mother of Empires,’ from the new worlds of the tropical South and of the West, there is indeed audible a various but harmonious voice : ‘ *The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad, Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own Blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God and His Father, to Him be glory.*’

The details of *FINANCE* may be adduced here, less for its own sake than as an allied source of evidence. The gross total is Two hundred and fifty thousand three hundred pounds (250,382*l.* 10*s.* 5*d.*). The expenditure of the year was a little under Two hundred and twenty-five thousand pounds (224,823*l.* 9*s.* 9*d.*). Thus not only is the deficit of Ten thousand pounds (10,021*l.* 17*s.* 2*d.*) announced last year extinguished, but a balance of some Fifteen thousand pounds is in hand towards another year's expenditure. This is, so far, most satisfactory. But it is no reason for relaxing effort. Let the fact never be forgotten or overlooked, that two-fifths of the gross receipts just mentioned are not *new income*, but only a portion of the *old* returned in the place of volumes of Scripture sent forth to a value of at least double the amount. Of the gross receipts of the year 147,834*l.* 5*s.* 5*d.* represent the total fresh income during the year from all Christendom to supply the world, so far as this Society is enabled to do it, with the living oracles of the one God and Father of all. Moreover, above two-thirds of this new income comes from those who have gone. The surplus of the year is simply owing to Legacies, which have been the highest in the Society's history, and much above the average. The gifts are valuable, though the givers are departed ; and particularly in their stimulus and example to the living ; for it is in the regular contributions from year to year—and specially from our own country—that the Committee anxiously desire to see advance instead of decline.

But, whatever may be the financial fluctuations of the years, there is one constant personal deficit ; and each

recurring anniversary recalls painfully some forms and faces which working field and Council Board can see more for ever. The *OBITUARY* list may this year be considered light, but every tribute paid to death is serious and if Heaven be enriched Earth is less wealthy than before. Since last May the Society has lost four Vice-Presidents—Bishop Rowley Hill, of Sodor and Man, Bishop Ryan formerly of Mauritius, Sir William McArthur, K.C.M.G. and the Rev. Dr. Lewis Edwards, Principal of the College at Bala. At a ripe age Mr. James Cadbury, one of the Society's Honorary Life Governors, has died; and after twenty years of suffering the Rev. Philip Kent, formerly one of the District Secretaries. Gone they all are to that world to us unseen, but, as they now know it, the world of truth, where Christ lives whom they served, and to which we also, with hearts of hope and undelaying footsteps, are steadfastly approaching.

The survey of the field begins with *FRANCE*, and Christian expectation quickens as the record of the year is opened. Her genius, her tragic history, the undoubted dawning of a better day, the incalculable possibilities of the future—all give a unique interest to her name. Perhaps, everything considered, what she most needs, for the development of a higher life, is rest. And, in the Society's work, the year has been one of quietness. But it has been the quietness of advancing growth. The normal work has enlarged. In the sales of colporteurs and depots there has been an increase of eleven thousand copies. One of the most interesting events of the year has been the history of the version of Lasserre. An accomplished French *litterateur* practically discovered the Four Gospels, and, fascinated by their charm, translated them into the literary language of Hugo and Chateaubriand. The Archbishop of Paris gave his *imprimatur* to the new book, and the Pope his blessing. Twenty-five editions were needed to satisfy inquisitive and delighted readers. Then suddenly, as if from alarm at a state of things so unexpected, the work was pilloried in the Index, and hurried from circulation. But it is not without significance that in the various sub-depots of the Bible Society Twenty thousand New Testaments were sold instead of Ten thousand the year before.

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To gain a truer idea of the real state of affairs in France, M. Monod asks us to withdraw a little from the picture which contemporary events are slowly painting, and look at it from a distance. At the beginning of the century he reminds us there were in the country some hundred and fifty Evangelical churches; there are now more than six hundred. Eighty years ago these were scattered over forty-three departments; they are now found in seventy-nine, 'And if we can estimate the missionary work that is being done, the stations of our Evangelical Societies, and the churches that are independent of the State, we find that Protestantism is now represented and the Gospel preached in eighty-five departments, and in the three departments of Algeria.'

Results like these have been largely gained by such unostentatious labours as the journals of M. Monod's sixty-two colporteurs illustrate. In every part of France, from the bocages of Normandy to the thoroughfares of Marseilles, and from the eastern frontiers to the sea-shores and harbours of the west, these devoted men urge their efforts. 'No pastors,' M. Monod adds, 'no evangelist, could do such work as theirs.' And if—constantly opposed by scepticism and superstition—it is gradual, and if many another difficulty make it trying, these are but reasons for supporting it all the more earnestly. Only let such work advance, and the spiritual life of the nation be developed, and the possibility of the future will become an actuality—of all modern actualities surely one of the most splendid—the brilliant Gallic race shall be restored to the kingdom it has so long forsaken, and become our most ardent ally—as it is already our nearest neighbour—in the evangelisation of the world.

Crossing the north-east frontier into *BELGIUM* the prospects of Christian work could hardly be expected to improve. With its large lapsed population and its public-houses, its socialism and its popery, its depressed trade and its materialistic temper, Belgium seems by no means a promising field. In point of fact the year's account is a distinctly hopeful one. The circulation of the Scriptures is higher by three thousand copies than in the preceding year, and though the Belgians read little except newspaper

novels, they seem to have a growing interest in the Bible. Altogether the year, though quiet and uneventful, has been one of distinct advance.

Across a geographical line from Belgium lies a different land. The level meadows, the sleeping waters of the canals, the trim antique towns, the barrier dykes—these—clothed as they all are with memories of the Reformation thought and learning—rise before the mind with the name of *HOLLAND*. The old universities are quiet enough now, and English and Scottish students no longer gather to their class-rooms as in the day of Drusus and Boerhaave; but if orthodox scholasticism has passed away, the life it sought to formulate survives and is energetic still. The Netherlands are busied with the modern problems of religion in contact with political life and laborious in the various ministries of philanthropy. Of all this the policy of the Society in Holland is a recognition, for it aims at a friendly withdrawal in favour of its daughter in the Gospel, the Bible Society of the Netherlands, and the extension of native organization. Mr. Grelinger, with a reluctance expressive of the joy he has had in his work, is advancing the Society's views. But though he has endeavored to promote the Netherlands association rather than his own, the issues of the British and Foreign Society have again exceeded those of the previous year by a thousand copies. In this increase a notable item is the wider sale of the cheap edition of the New Testament—so many have been desirous to possess 'the tiny beautiful book.' On the other hand, the national Society has this year reached its largest circulation, and surpassed its previous record by some eleven thousand copies.

But to speak of Holland is to think of the greater Empire immediately near. In the vicinity of *GERMANY* every other interest grows comparatively unimportant. The native home of philosophy, yet at the same time of the noblest practical Christianity, the classic land of the Reformation, and still the Continental fortress of Protestantism, half-sister also in lineage and temper of our own—in all these respects the Fatherland is the centre of unequalled interest. Nor is any question more present

and practical than the bearing of Germany towards the Bible. In the tremendous problems, political and social, of the time no intellectualism can replace the simple strength and majesty of the Divine Word. And it can hardly be thought strange that in such circumstances it has already for years been the Society's policy to encourage in Germany a Bible organisation great and energetic as its own people. No important work can be permanent or fully effective which is extraneous; nor can Germany ever be evangelised from England. But though the wisest, as well as the friendliest and the most patriotic course, it has been necessarily gradual. Happily any initial difficulties are lessening every year, and with an Agent so capable as Mr. Watt they are certain to be minimised at every stage. It is satisfactory to know that just as the British and Foreign Society is carrying out its policy of friendly withdrawal the German associations are coming to the front. And whether in the case of our own or of all the societies together, the past year has been a very satisfactory one. The circulation by the British society for 1887 exceeded the average of the decade of 1872-81 by between two and three thousand copies; and the aggregate circulation of all the societies together is quite up to the high level of the last two years, and nearly 25 per cent. over that of 1881. Of equal importance is the direction of colportage work to those quarters where it is most required—the sympathetic and patient presentation of the Gospel to the Roman Catholics and the poor. One of the veterans of the service, Knabe of Stettin, has died full of age and honour, but the colporteur band is practically unbroken, and the men have worked with exemplary steadiness. A more serious loss has been the death of Captain von Dewitz, the Emperor's Commissioner for the supply of Bibles to the Royal Prussian Army; but that Christian soldier has been succeeded by a like-minded companion, Colonel Klefeker, whose high character is well known in Berlin. In other respects, and in the country generally, there seems an advance in deep and serious godliness. The Crown Prince and Princess have earnestly encouraged Christian work, and their devotion is but a continuation of the influence of the Imperial House. When Mr. Watt closed his report, the

late Emperor was still alive ; and his son was passing through the shadows of San Remo. Surely the darkening and solemn gloom which has since gathered in the Fatherland cannot but be a power for spiritual influence and for the strengthening of the kingdom of the Son of Man.

What is slowly taking place in Germany is already largely accomplished in *SWITZERLAND*, and while the supplies are mainly from England, the work of the circulation of the Scriptures has passed into the hands of the native Bible Societies. The new organization—a kind of colony from the mother country—is working with encouraging success. The event of the year has been the formation at Basle of a Swiss ‘Union for Bible Circulation,’ which is full of the promise of good. The year’s work is summarised by Mr. Watt in an interesting way : ‘The total circulation of the Scriptures in Switzerland is ten thousand copies above the average of the five years which preceded 1882. Estimating the population of Switzerland at 2,900,000, about twenty-four copies of the Scriptures went last year to each thousand of the people. This is just double the figures reached in Germany. In Russia the circulation for each thousand of the population was five copies ; in Scotland over sixty.’

The *AUSTRIAN AGENCY* is now superintended by Mr. Henry Edward Millard. The devoted son of a devoted and gifted father, Mr. Millard gives, in the admirable spirit of his first report, the best assurance that the work is safe in his hands. And though his territory is so extensive as almost to touch with one limit the surges of the Baltic, while with the other it skirts the sunny Adriatic ; and to stretch, east and west, from the Black Sea to the Lake of Constance, it is not larger than the Christian love and energy which would fain bring into every household in this vast territory the authentic message of the Gospel of peace. The tone of the report is one of uniform thankfulness ; for though candid with reference both to discouragements and defeats, it everywhere preserves a healthy spirit of confidence and of hope. The circulation of the year has not reached the unusually high level of 1886, but the decrease can be satisfactorily

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explained ; and Mr. Millard surveys his balance sheet in no spirit of despondency. His colporteurs have been energetic and patient. They are, he says, the very backbone of the work, and in many districts the only representatives of Christian enterprise. And if, however busy, they seem to have been less successful in circulating the Scriptures than last year, the printers have been proportionally more active, and the Press record shows an increase of some fourteen thousand copies.

And in other respects the survey is pleasant. In Vienna, in spite of socialism and other secular influences, there is a wonderful change for the better. In Croatia the colporteurs' work has been 'singularly blessed.' In Bohemia a light yet lingers on the fields where the martyrs suffered, and the spiritual atmosphere is still perceptibly warm. 'Last year's work,' Mr. Millard is delighted to be able to say, 'has been blessed beyond every expectation. The circulation has been the largest ever effected in Bohemia.' The Králická Bible at once a memorial of the Reformation and a masterpiece of Bohemian literature, and with a history interesting as a romance, has been one of the most popular publications of the year. Referring to Hungary, with its mingling populations and polyglot languages, Mr. Millard cannot help expressing his joy at the unmistakable signs that the Lord's work is gaining ground there. In Roumania, though 'indifference to the truth prevails in all classes of society,' there is a steadily increasing circulation and other healthy signs of advance. In Russian-Poland, the fragment of a once imposing and powerful kingdom, there are, Mr. Millard thinks, substantial reasons for believing that the cause of Christ is steadily making way. In the Southern Tyrol a door firmly closed for many years has been thrown open, and a license granted for Dalmatia, where for a long time no colporteur could gain a footing. These successes give a gratulatory tone to the closing paragraphs of Mr. Millard's survey which is not entirely absent from any part of it. Altogether it is a report of distinct pleasure in the past and assurance for the future.

Across the Alpine ranges as they slope towards the plains of Lombardy stretch the classic fields of *ITALY*.

Home of the ancient empire of the world, and of one of the most important modern kingdoms, it engages us with a keen interest from the future as well as from the depths of the past. Mr. Meille's report is vital with a spirit of achievement and of hope. Everything is not favourable, but there are encouragements which rise above all depressions. The circulation in the Roman depot has been the largest known. Religious liberty is gaining a secure position. Whole Bibles seem increasingly in demand. In one district of Piedmont there are thirty little towns where groups of Bible-readers meet regularly to study the Word of God, although they are very seldom visited by any pastor or evangelist. Such are some of the brightest passages in a message full of cheer.

The narrative turns to *SPAIN*, and is continued in Mr. Palmer's report. It is the last, owing to his resignation, the Society is to have from him. His estimate of the year's progress is favourable; but the circulation is considerably lower than before. The failure has not been with the colporteurs, but in the supplies to the National Bible Society of Scotland and similar agencies. Mr. Palmer gives a detailed account of two missionary journeys. We follow him in his narrative from Madrid to Ciudad Real, to Córdoba, to Cadiz; then, by Gibraltar to Malaga, and by Cartagena back again to the capital. His second tour led him by Saragossa and Barcelona to Majorca, returning by Valencia. His surveys were not always encouraging. There is a dead mass of secular thought in Spain nothing but fervid spirituality will move. But the colporteurs, though weakened in numbers, are in most cases standing to their work. Few details are given. But it is very clear that Christian-work must, if successful, be urged with apostolic devotion and endurance. Some other agencies are being withdrawn, as if paralysed by difficulties. But Mr. Palmer hopes, and he may be assured of it, that the Bible Society's motto will be *Nunquam retrorsum*.

Crossing the frontier into *PORTUGAL* we are conscious of a change of spiritual air. Mr. Stewart's report is brief; it is occupied largely by personal details about the men of his little army of colporteurs, and he

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and of one of the pages us with a tone is at once resolutely calm and hopeful. There is a very great advance of evangelical life, and an increase of membership in the churches. If sales have been less favourable, but for Jesuit opposition, recently greatly intensified, accounts largely for it. This concentration of hostile force shows at least that vital resistance is felt. And such is the case. The interest in God's Word is deepening and spreading, and thus the ground is being prepared for the widespread religious revival to which we are looking forward in Portugal.

From the Peninsula, the order of the Agencies leads us back to the north. In *DENMARK* the policy of the Society is withdrawal in favour of the Danish Bible association, and Mr. Plenge, necessarily though most reluctantly retiring, is, as he says, retreating with his face to the foe. But it is not a defeat; and, to take the place his forces have so gallantly held, his Danish allies are slowly coming to the front. In the meantime, despite many difficulties, the circulation is as great as ever; the demand is increasing, and vigorous Christian work is advancing year by year. Colportage in Denmark is exceptionally cheap. Mr. Plenge's veterans, though disabled by age and illness, are full of spiritual fighting power, and have been singularly successful. The Society's work in Denmark is certainly remarkable.

From this, one of the smallest European States, the survey leads us at a step to one of the largest Empires of the world. *RUSSIA*, watching from Cronstadt and Helsingfors across the Baltic, sweeps her other frontier round the globe and stands sentinel on her eastern limits ever against America. Towards the north her boundaries become lost in the eternal snows and silence of the pole; southward they skirt the sultry valleys of Persia, and march with the marches of Afghanistan. This vast territory is divided for the Society's purposes into two agencies: Northern European Russia with Siberia and part of Central Asia are superintended by Mr. Nicholson; and the southern section, from Odessa across the Caspian, belongs to Mr. Morrison. Territories they are which might satisfy the utmost ambition for empire, and happily

with a work to do greater than political imperialism has ever conceived. Nor is the country greater or more important than the race which holds it as its home. With its portentous powers of increase, its potential and but half-developed abilities—its past so full of prophecy, and a present so commanding in possession—the Slavonic race has a special place among the peoples of the future. And it is one of the best assurances for his yet unwritten history that the Slav is at once teachable and inclined to turn favourably to the highest wisdom of the Word of God. 'As soon as the Russian learns to read he is eager to possess the Bible.' Wherever he is found, in Poland or Siberia, the Muscovite soldier is one of the likeliest and the most hopeful customers of the colporteur. During the past year between four and five thousand copies of the Gospels and the Psalms were distributed among the exiles on their way to Siberia; and the authorities were courteously attentive to your Agents in their kindly work, for passes were given to them by steamer and railway, and they were treated as allies and friends. Another pleasant fact is the heartiness of some of the clergy, who in case after case become the colporteurs' most helpful assistants. These things make for encouragement and advance. But the country is sparsely inhabited, and the rigid climate of the north increases the distances a hundred-fold. The lower classes are very poor. Towards the Asian frontier Islam presents its stolid opposition—'Islam, which, with all respect to its European friends, does *not* "prove all things and hold fast that which is good." But in spite of all difficulties your Agent reports increased circulation in almost every province, and a total advance of some twenty-two thousand copies. His elaborate report is a model of statistical completeness and precision; and his colporteurs' journals often read, in their simplicity of narrative and spirituality of tone, like a story of the days of the Apostles. All things considered, the year has been one of hopeful and healthy achievement.

A similar summary may epitomise the report from the south. Its tone is perhaps somewhat less encouraging than that from the north, but not because there has been any failure in honest and even heroic work. There is a slight decrease in circulation, some five thousand in a

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total of a hundred and fifty thousand copies, but not in the colportage department. The hostility of some of the priests and people has been vexatious, but Mr. Morrison is confident the Bible Society only needs to be fairly understood in South Russia to be thoroughly supported. His twenty-five colporteurs have travelled some fifty thousand miles in all, and often under circumstances which would try the most adventurous explorer. One reports on his Bible work from Penjdeh, and in a few picturesque sentences photographs Bokhara. He has hardships, but in his quiet devotion he is a type of his heroic race. 'I am glad you have sent me here to work, although the sun is blazing and the water is bad, and not a blade of grass to be seen, only sand, sand everywhere, and a hard dry wind from the east. Still I am glad.' In this southern Agency, as elsewhere, all things considered, there has been a year of true work which will remain.

From Russia it is a natural transition to *TURKEY*. Here, in the ancient and famous capital of the East, Dr. Thomson directs the movements of his scattered but effective forces, and anticipates the time when Islam shall recognise in Christ a greater prophet than its own. His report is as candid as it is able, hence its uniform and vigorous hopefulness is all the more reliable. From Albania and Bulgaria, from Macedonia and Bithynia, from Cyprus and Crete, there is a similar account of progress. The total circulation, excluding free grants, is largely in advance of the previous year. 'The steady and, generally speaking, increasing circulation of the Turkish Scriptures since the Crimean war holds out a sure hope of a reform among the governing classes of this country.' In a Greek village in Bithynia a company of Bible-readers—recalling the *Collegia Biblica* of the Evangelical Revival in Germany—now includes most of the inhabitants, and Dr. Thomson thinks 'there is no doubt the Word of God is leavening powerfully all classes of the people, and preparing them to act decisively in due time.' In Cyprus 'the good work is going forward,' and in Crete 'the light is spreading to every part of the island.' These opinions of a candid and competent observer are as important as they are welcome.

In this rapid survey we have approached *GREECE*, and no one can approach that famous land without emotion. Herself—like her most illustrious city, and in a still larger sense—‘mother of arts and of eloquence,’ and the native home of that language long ago classic from its superb treasures of imagination and style, and now for ever consecrated by its use in the Septuagint and the New Testament—it cannot but be a question of unique interest how she will receive that body of sacred literature, which is itself the most classic of the classics, as well as the one ripe flower of perfect culture and of truth. And it is delightful to know that the year’s report is an answer full of hope. There had been difficulty in always securing suitable colporteurs, but with a happy intuition Dr. Kalopothakes turned to the Christian students who were available for summer work, and secured their educated gifts for the service. The experiment has so far been most successful. And in other regards the accounts are healthy. The settlements fringing the coasts of Asia Minor and Macedonia are peculiarly open to receive and study the Word. The Isles of Greece—the sporadic kingdom of the Archipelago—have been visited with a thoroughness unequalled with the last ten years. Your Agent made a tour in the historic Peloponnesus, and was received by clergy and people with every respect. Surely there is still heard from the Greeks, not only the echo, but the renewal of that ancient message, ‘We would see Jesus.’

Close to the home of ancient classical literature stretches another realm, possessor also of the memories of a learning and a supremacy which have passed away. The wide spaces where Arabic is the language and Islam the religion, and including the regions from Alexandretta, close to St. Paul’s birthplace, in the north, down to the southern boundaries of *EGYPT* and *ARABIA*, form the next Agency in this rapid review. It is the shadowy Empire of Muhammad, and it holds the shrines and fortresses of his faith. To attack this seat of superstition, and that with substantial success, is no unimportant achievement; and the point of Mr. Weakley’s report is that during the past year this has been done. After many a difficulty and delay direct colportage work among

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Muslims has been begun in 'the home of Islam and of the Arabic language, and the hitherto almost inaccessible stronghold has been entered by the Stronger than Muhammad.' In this brief sentence Mr. Weakley describes an achievement and implies a hope of the highest significance; and it is sufficient to make the year memorable. No reference can be made to a mass of details, but it is stimulating to know that, in spite of Turkish jealousies and opposition, the circulation by sales has more than doubled, and the gross total is three thousand copies in advance of last year.

In a review where populous territories receive but a glance, there can be no adequate reference to the myriad-peopled *CHINA*. To so many the fear and the problem of the future, the vast Eastern Empire is the Christian's hope. With excusable ardour the Society's Agent in the North says:—'I believe in our work, and that it will tell mightily on the heart and mind of this people, and that the Christianity of China will be a far more robust Christianity because of the Bible work in the land. Our work is truly the foremost pioneering work in the country.' In the South Mr. Kenmure's expressions are equally vigorous; and from Amoy, Mr. Macgowan, reporting a net increase of ten thousand copies, believes the general survey shows 'splendid results.'

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No message of the year is brighter than that received from *JAPAN*. A quiet light, as if from the dawn, lies upon every page. It is the opinion of Mr. George Braithwaite, the devoted Assistant Agent, that 'Christianity is rapidly spreading through the country,' and he has had the advantage, in forming so hopeful an estimate, of two recent and careful tours in northern and southern Japan. The sales of colporteurs have nearly quadrupled, and instead of some six thousand total circulation of the previous year, the return for that just closed is over sixteen thousand.

Up to this point these sketches have been drawn from the accounts of the Society's Agents. But there is another band of workers whose reports—not in manuscript,

but printed with all the apparatus of officials and contributions—indicate independent organisation. These are the Society's Auxiliaries—a group of christian colonies—which in their adopted countries are centres of light and energetic benevolence. Passing eastwards from the Arabic populations, and leaving on the north the Central Asian territories of the Russian district, we approach and enter upon our *INDIAN POSSESSIONS*—that vast peninsula-continent, with its two hundred and fifty millions and almost uncounted languages and dialects. No Agent reports on this Eastern world, but a group of Auxiliary Societies in Calcutta, in Madras, in Bombay, in Allahabad, in Lahore, represent the nobler rule which is realising the Christian conquest of India. If ever interest, stimulated by many a fascinating subject, and combined with a sense of responsibility, be felt, it should be at its height in regard to Hindustan. And though no details can be given here, the mind is invigorated by the accounts of the wide work done and its restless if gradual advance. The Calcutta Auxiliary reports for the past year the highest sales on record, and notices with surprise and encouragement the number of Zenanas open in the city to Bible teaching; only. Bangalore, with its seventeen colporteurs, has nearly doubled the sale of New Testament Portions, almost entirely among non-Christians. At Madras there has been a larger circulation than in any previous year. 'The Word of God has found its way to the soldiers and the sailors, the sick in hospitals and the children in orphan homes, the dwellers on hill and plain, and the emigrants to foreign lands, the visitors to fairs and festivals, and the pilgrims to sacred shrines. Many labourers have borne a part in this glorious work, and from far and near comes the testimony that their efforts have not been in vain in the Lord.' The Bombay Auxiliary testifies to 'the vigour and efficiency of its various agencies,' and a substantial increase in circulation; and the workers in Lahore—with difficulties their southern brethren do not experience—have increased their vernacular sales one-third. In these encouraging notices of the past year reference is frequently made to two very interesting agencies—the distribution of the Bible among the young university men on passing their

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examinations, and the ever-extending work among the women in Zenanas and elsewhere. No more important classes exist, and successful work among them must be correspondingly influential.

AUSTRALIA merits a larger notice than any 'Abstract' can give. So vast in its southern seas this continent-home of our developing race, so partially populated, so various in the circumstances of its scattered colonies, it cannot but send a report as varied in detail as its own condition. But there is no want of potential energy, and little of actual devotion. There has been considerable depression in several districts: others send messages of unusual prosperity. The Home Society is very sensible of the unwearying services of its Agents, East and West, and of the Auxiliaries who are building up, in the face of many natural difficulties, a nobler kingdom than politics or commerce can know.

Another of these Auxiliary outposts is in *SOUTH AFRICA*. There also Anglo-Saxon and Dutch energy is elevated and directed by a sense of Christian duty to the dark races and the neglected populations around. The Cape Town Auxiliary has now nearly a hundred agencies and branches in different places in the Colony, and there are sister Auxiliaries in Natal and elsewhere. The sales for the past year have increased 70 per cent., and it is one of the most encouraging aspects of the well-organised work in these southern fields that ladies take a special interest in its advance.

A third group of Auxiliaries, and in some respects the most interesting, have their fields of work in *CANADA* and the North American Provinces. These strong young branches of the parent tree are evidently full of potential vitality and rich in fruit. The report of Upper Canada is itself a closely printed volume of some 120 pages, and those of Ottawa and Montreal are scarcely less. They give evidences everywhere of health and progress, and reflect from their western shores a light on the home whence they sprang. But when, passing in mental survey the dominions of a mighty people yet to be, we stand on its western limit and look across to the Russian

agency we have left, we recollect that in following the work of the Bible Society we have encompassed the globe.

Slight and even saddening the survey may indeed seem—for all the largeness of numbers, the limitless field, the various and consecrated ability—when we remember the vast moral gloom of the world. A mere margin to the cloud, we say—a little more colour on the map—a flush on the deadly pale cheek of a sinful race. But when we remember the Great Patient One whom, on a sultry day in Samaria, one soul, uplifted and saved, made glad with fresh strength for His work and His suffering; when we recall the thought that in heaven, there is no false conceptions darken the perfect sense, where is joy over one repentant sinner—then our mood will change. There is indeed a world of difficult work; but there is also a world of hope, and it is ours to work and to be steadfast, leaving the times and seasons with the Father, and with the Son who has not loved the world in vain.

“ We dare not think
The time too long in which it pleases Thee
To wait ; and yet forgive us, gracious Lord,
If, bowed in reverence, earnestly we pray,
Patient in our impatience, for the time
When Thou shalt to Thyself take Thy great power,
And reign o'er all the Earth in every heart.
Yea, come, Desire of Nations ! ”

Referring again to the work of your Auxiliary, we have to testify to the continued and increasing confidence still reposed in your Agent and his work. He has laboured with much diligence and great acceptance in the cause, and his reports submitted speak for themselves of labour and travel, and we are happy to notice that that confidence is shared in by the several branches, as shown by increased subscriptions from them.

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As already noticed, we mourn the departure from our midst of THOMAS A. BROWN, Esq., so long an active worker with us. His name first appears in the title page of the Report for 1847, which year he was elected a member of the committee, and ever since that time to the day of his death "continued in labours more abundant." It was him who, in conjunction with the late Miss Cogswell, first organized the Religious Tract Depository, which was the foundation of the institution now known as the British American Book and Tract Society. To the Depository both gave loving labour during their long and active lives, and before his death Mr. Brown left by his will substantial tokens of his attachment to both institutions. The bequests cannot compensate for earnest labour given with so much pleasure during the past *forty* years, during which period he was almost a constant attendant at meetings, and prompt and diligent in the discharge of duties to which he was called in this and the many other institutions with which he was connected.

The REV. ALEXANDER RUSSELL, another earnest labourer, has gone to his rest. Twelve or fourteen years ago, Mr. Russell's name was a household word among the Branches in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, where he laboured first as colporteur and then as agent.

"Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

Referring to the financial statement in the parent Society's report, we have the following credits for Nova Scotia, viz:—

We have again, with regret, to notice decrease in the sum total. Reasons might be assigned for the decrease with respect to Halifax, "*so many calls*" may be pleaded as one of them. And throughout the country death and distance have intervened among the older and earlier members of the Society, and a painful apathy characterizes so many of the younger members that did not seem to have an existence thirty or forty years ago.

At last meeting of the committee a movement was set on foot for a canvas of the city, which we trust will meet with a liberal response.

In analysing the above remittance to the parent Society, as to the sources from whence the Nova Scotia Auxiliary in Halifax made up the amount, the Treasurer's account for 1887 gives the items—

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improvement. The subscription of Branches increased over three hundred dollars. In the previous year we had \$274.50 of legacies; in this there is none except the Blackburn Estate, which will give a permanent income. Several legacies have been devised and will be paid on the maturing of the bequests, and when paid will be duly acknowledged.

It may not be out of place here to notice one item of the distribution of the funds during the present year ('88). By and with the consent of the parent Society's committee, ninety dollars was paid for binding a quantity of Scriptures in the *Mic-Mac* language, which had been printed in portions many years ago and kept in stock. The venerable Dr. Rand has sent the annexed Report of the progress of the Word among that people during the past thirty years.

Some of our older citizens will remember the enthusiasm manifested at the formation of the *Mic-Mac* Missionary Society. The high expectations formed which culminated in the purchase of a tract of land for mission purposes, which was duly invested in Trustees who hold the property in trust, which trust still remains, and only one of the Trustees now lives. The *Mic-Mac* Missionary Society's committee have not met for many a day.

But the spirit which first prompted the now venerable missionary to dedicate in his early and subsequent life to this work, with all its associations of wigwams, blankets, etc., still remains. Some of the original subscribers to that mission still continue to support it,

having respect to the immortal promises of God. For nearly forty years precious seed has been sown, and the sum of the whole is—

“Unto them were committed *the oracles of God.*”

During the past year ('88), an application came from the committee by the British American Book and Tract Society for Bibles, which had been sometime in stock, to be sent to the coast of Labrador and Newfoundland. One hundred of such Bibles were granted without any restrictions as to the locality in which they were to be circulated.

On the previous year an application was also made for two thousand copies of the Penny Testament, to commemorate the “Queen’s Jubilee Year,” which was to be circulated among the destitute in the Maritime Provinces. This was also granted.

A third application was made this spring by the same body for Scriptures at half price, or fifty per cent discount, for the colporteurs of that institution, and to be disposed of throughout the Maritime Provinces. This request was transmitted to the parent society, and a favourable answer was received, so far as relates to Bible Work in Nova Scotia. Two consignments of Scriptures have been received.

There is yet another branch of the work in Halifax which claims attention. The Ladies’ Auxiliary not only collects subscriptions and manages certain departments of Bible work, but they employ a Bible woman on their own responsibility, having in their collections

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separate columns for the Bible Society and for Bible Woman. This being a local enterprise, is not specially reported here, but we are glad to say the funds which partially support the Bible Woman has a certain amount invested, the interest of which helps to pay the salary. But particulars of all this will be found in the Ladies' Bible Association Report.

In conclusion, your committee would pray that their feeble efforts may be crowned with a measure of success, and be accepted as part of the means to the end. "The days that the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established on the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills; and all nations shall flow into it."

It may not be out of place here to notice that there are differences of opinion among the committee on the subject of this grant. Thus it is held on the one hand that the British and Foreign Bible Society is a wealthy institution; that the colporteurs are ready to do its work for it, and it is the duty of this institution to begin at home, as it was Christ's injunction to "begin at Jerusalem." That the B. A. B. and T. Society has facilities for performing this work which is not within our compass as an auxiliary. And on the other hand, it is held that Christian benevolence in Nova Scotia ought to supply every Bible required within its border, without going to the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society even for assistance to do it. That the time was when the sparse population and poverty in Nova Scotia required, and received, such valuable

assistance from the parent Society for the dissemination of the Word. Thank God, that period of semi-pauperism should now be past forever. But these are questions that has been left to the consideration of their successors in office, and it may be submitted to the Branches in some way.

THE CIRCULATION OF THE WORD OF GOD
AMONG THE MIC-MAC INDIANS.

TO JAMES FARQUHAR, ESQ.,

Secretary of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society.

DEAR SIR,

In reply to your note, I beg to state that I have much to report, and that of a most encouraging character, respecting the circulation of the Scriptures among the Indians of these Maritime Provinces during "the past thirty years."

I have, as many others must have, a vivid recollection of the state of things in this respect then; I can readily recall how our work proceeded, and can look with "wonder, gratitude and praise" at the present prospect.

When we began our labors in this line the prospect was dark indeed. A few persons had a little faith in the matter; the hopes of a few may have been raised too high; but to thoughtful—to the majority—looking on the human side, there was no probability of success. It was not known that a single Indian of the tribe had ever learned to read. The language was supposed to

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be unconquerable. Every attempt to master it had hitherto failed, so far as we knew. And even were the language mastered, and a translation, in whole or in part, made of the Scriptures into it, of what use could it be? The Micmacs, being all Roman Catholics at that time, and completely under the dominion of their priests, and full of prejudice and mistrust toward all the white people in general, and against all the Protestants in particular, would not, it was reasonable to conclude, be easily induced to receive the book and learn to read it, and put it into practice; thus changing their whole mode of thought and of practice.

This was the state of affairs a little over "thirty years" ago, and we had to meet all the anticipated opposition and more. But "those that were for us were more than those that were against us."—(See 2 Kings, 6: 15.) By the grace of God the language was mastered, and the books of the New Testament, one after another, were translated, revised and published. The Gospel of Matthew, with a small spelling book, was the first to see the light. Immediately the Indians began in earnest to learn to read. First one and then another, and another, so that when at last, after about twenty years, when the whole of the New Testament, and the Book of Psalms and several other books of the Old Testament were put in circulation in their language, there were scores of Micmacs, young and old, who could read them, and hundreds that would listen with eagerness to their contents, and not a few had proved by their woes and happy deaths that they had received the word, "not as the word of man, but as it is in truth, the Word of God, which effectually worketh in them that believe." It should be remembered that people can learn to read without *schools*, but they cannot learn to read without *books*.

When we began our work the Micmacs, with few exceptions, did not know there was such a book as the

Bible, and they had been led to believe that the Protestants did not pray or know anything about Christianity. It was the policy of their religious teachers to keep them in ignorance, and hence after having them under their control for about two hundred years, they were, so far as civilization was concerned, just about as they were when the white people first invaded their territory. But this, now, is greatly changed. Much room for improvement remains. But the change wrought during the past thirty years, for which, under God, we must claim all the credit, is remarkable. They mostly live now in houses, some of them spacious and comfortable, with clocks, lamps, beds, rocking chairs, and other appurtenances of civilization and comfort. They dress like their white neighbors. Seldom do you see a *wigwam*, and women's peaked cap have disappeared. Many of them can read and write, and many—not all—are honest, sober and industrious.

The Scriptures are received and read, and, as one of them told me some years ago, "*They can't get them away from us.*"

It may be mentioned as a pretty good confirmation of the good we have been the means of effecting, that now and then I get an inkling of what the priests think of me and my doings. I am denounced in no measured terms for the "*mischief I have wrought among the Indians.*"

A goodly number of Indians have given evidence in life and in death of the saving power of the Word and of the blessedness of the Gospel. I could fill pages with details that I am positive would thrill the hearts of the Lord's people with joy and praise.

But a small number of the Testaments were bound up in one volume when we had them at first printed. These, with many copies of the separate Gospels, have

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long ago been distributed. I had hardly opened the boxes, just received from the binder, before requests began to come in for copies.

One more fact and I close this brief sketch. Within a few years I went, during the summer, from Fredericton, round by the Restigouche, Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton among the Indians, and through different portions of Nova Scotia. I visited and read the Scriptures, and "preached the Gospel" in their own tongue, to hundreds of Indians. Never was I treated by any people with more kindness and respect, and never did white people listen to the word of God with more serious attention than did those Indians, with scarce an exception.

AGENTS' REPORT.

To the Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society.

GENTLEMEN,—

I have very little new to report for 1888, among the branches of your auxiliary, but as usual present you with an abstract of my journal.

On March 26th my work began in the beautiful Valley of STEWIAKKE, the place which, I was told, had the honor of sending the first money across the Atlantic in aid of the British and Foreign Bible Society. At MIDDLE STEWIAKKE, on the following afternoon, the meeting was held as usual in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance, considering the state of the roads, was very good, and the interest in the cause unabated. The contribution of \$25.70, which was handed to me, shews an improvement on the previous year.

On the afternoons of the 28th, 29th and 31st, I addressed fair meetings at SOUTH BRANCH, UPPER STEWIAKKE and SPRINGSIDE. At the last named place I received \$19.81, and from UPPER STEWIAKKE you have since received \$31.00, a very marked advance on that of the past. There also I had the pleasure of seeing a quiet but genuine religious revival—genuine, for although my visit was so untimely as to break up an appointment for prayer, it was not considered by the people as an obtrusion, but rather a cause of rejoicing, and that through this Society they were offered a good channel for their Christian charity.

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The previous year in NEW BRUNSWICK, in two instances very boisterous "awakenings" boycotted our meetings and almost killed our cause. Crying for Heaven's Mercy is proper, but scrambling and jostling and jockeying, are indicative of unseemly selfishness, and to-day, as on MOUNT CARMEL, God answers by fire the sacrifice in honor of His name and word. "Give and it shall be given you," is as necessary to be remembered as "ask and ye shall receive."

Crossing over the mountain to DEAN SETTLEMENT I addressed a meeting there on Sabbath morning, and was kindly driven by Mr. Wm. R. Dean to UPPER MUSQUODOBOIT Church in time to address a very large congregation. The collections were \$2.86 and \$7.64. I regret that in this populous district we cannot obtain a systematic canvas among the families for aid. I hope that on my next visit some one will kindly assist me in this object. At the close of that meeting I walked down the valley about six miles to the hospitable home of Mr. Reid. At this place a snow storm on Monday prevented our meeting, much to my regret, as there are some warm friends of the Bible Society in this section of the Middle Musquodoboit branch. On Tuesday night we had a fair meeting in Middle Musquodoboit Hall. This branch is very efficiently worked, and has a Secretary devoted to his duty, as manifested in the very extensive collectors' lists.

I am glad to see that the contributions are annually increasing. We had a fair meeting at TAYLOR'S SETTLEMENT, another section of this branch, and the Musquodoboit minister kindly made a long and dark journey to assist the cause. I went to LOWER MUSQUODOBOIT with the view of organizing a branch there, and was privileged to address a large congregation from whom I received \$2.00, and have good reason to hope that my plans will yet be accomplished through the assistance of the Rev. Mr. Murray.

We had a good meeting at GAY'S RIVER on the 6th of April, and a collection of \$2.85.

At NINE MILE RIVER and ELMSDALE I held three meetings—two of them in advocating the claims of the Society, and received the collections \$3.78 and \$8.87, but there are no collectors at either of these places on GAY'S RIVER. Our meeting at DARTMOUTH on the 10th was a failure, and it was resolved to make a good effort to procure a meeting in the fall.

Mrs. Robson handed me \$67.31 which she and a few friends had collected. I had the privilege of addressing the Grove Church, RICHMOND, on the 11th and on the 12th. My reception at NEWPORT was cordial as ever, and my visit pleasant in spite of the snow storm and bad roads. I notice also with great satisfaction that the NEWPORT branch has taken a big bound forward, shewing an increase of \$14.00.

We had a fair meeting at BURLINGTON on the 13th. I walked from there to KEMPT SHORE collecting by the way, and on Sabbath addressed meetings there and at CHEVAREE. From BURLINGTON to NOEL I had a long walk over roads deep with mud and snow slush, and met with very little success by the way. Nearly all the people on that shore west of MOOSE BROOK complained of hard times and deserted homesteads, and could not get a cent in WALTON.

How different is NOEL. It is really a pleasure to visit NOEL and hear the people speak of the Bible Society. I held two meetings in that branch, and the returns of \$29.00 are praiseworthy.

We had a very good meeting in MAITLAND on the 19th, but I failed in getting a meeting at SOUTH MAITLAND. The Maitland Committee do not send out collectors as in most other branches, hence the list contains only the contributions of those in the town

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RIVER on the 6th and vicinity, which are collected by your agent, and it often happens that some are absent from home during the agent's visit. If this branch would only fall into line in the way of canvassing for support by local collectors, MAITLAND would undoubtedly make a better show on our books, for the Society has many generous friends there. Notwithstanding the withdrawal of some former contributors through a misconception of our work, I am happy to say that the acquisition of new friends more than made up for such loss. If expenses are out of proportion to the contributions, the remedy lies in increased contributions, not in their withdrawal. The Society is approved by God, and regarded as the indispensable handmaid of Missions by the leaders of Missionary work in all Evangelical Churches. Let then its hands be strengthened by all Christians rather than tied by Philistine withs. Every Christian has reason to question the correctness of advice to withhold support from such a blessed cause. The kingdom will be won to Christ by His inspired Word.

On Sabbath, 22nd, I addressed the Presbyterian Congregations of LOWER STEWIAOKE and SHUBENACADIE, and received the collections of \$2.90 and \$7.73. I have not yet seen any returns from SHUBENACADIE, but am highly gratified with those of LOWER STEWIAOKE, and thankful to Mr. Fisher for his interest in our cause.

I returned home on the night of 23rd April, and resumed work in Nova Scotia on June 27th.

At NORTH SYDNEY I collected \$37.90 and addressed two meetings there on the following Sabbath. My reception in this thriving town was again most friendly, and the response to my canvas freely given.

We had a very small meeting at SYDNEY MINES, but my canvas netted \$21.30.

At SYDNEY I collected \$46.91. This is a few dollars less than I received last year, owing to the absence of some good friends. Our meeting was small but select and representative in character. It is a source of gratification to your agent to know that in this most beautiful town the members of all the Churches heartily unite in supporting our cause; proof that they understand the Society's constitution and aim, and also from their liberal contributions that they appreciate its work in the world.

The meeting at GLACE BAY was small and the contributions were \$9.00.

I had the pleasure of addressing a very large audience in the Presbyterian Church, COW BAY, and collected \$17.50. Here I would again ask especially all mining districts which I visited, to organize lady associations in our aid. They will assuredly be successful and enjoy the blessing of doing good. Small amounts from hundreds of homes could be gathered where a stranger would entirely fail, even though but a little time could be given for such a canvas. Will the ministers who understand this, please shew them the way?

The small meeting at LITTLE BRAS D'OR, resulted in a contribution from that place of \$5.00. "Fair yet pursuing."

I addressed meetings at BADDECK and the FORT and collected there \$21.46, a slight advance on last year. If the value of BADDECK were better known as a watering place and summer resort, your agent's annual visits would swell your treasury more in the future than in the past; for bathing, boating, fishing and beautiful scenery, Baddeck is unrivalled on the Atlantic coast, while it is accessible daily to commercial centres by a well equipped steam-boat service.

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I lost a few days and many pounds of flesh by long and fatiguing walks through some other parts of CAPE BRETON. The Sacrament season was on and my appointments one after another had to be cancelled.

On the 14th I collected \$12.70 at PORT HAWKESBURY, and on Sabbath following received \$7.54 from the Presbyterian Congregation of PORT HASTINGS. I think that the latter place will henceforth give an annual support to the Bible Society.

I went from PORT MULGRUVE to CANSO on the Rimouski, and was not disappointed as to the liberality of the Christian people, but unfortunately no meeting was arranged for. I collected from a few friends \$9.50. Unless, however, you can procure for your agent a free pass on that boat, as he has always had from other steamboat companies in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, I will not visit Canso again. The outlay of travel and loss of time will not warrant the venture on my part.

Again we had a very small meeting at GUYSBORO', through an imperfect notice of appointment. There the Society has some warm friends, and I am glad to report that the Ladies Association of Guysboro' continues its good work. The Christian and accomplished lady who now presides over that Society, will, I am sure, permit the suggestion that a more extensive canvas in the vicinity of the village would greatly swell the already good contribution list. A few collectors might be procured for that purpose, and if a generous distribution of our Annual Reports would promote the enterprise, we will gladly furnish all that may be asked for.

I addressed a meeting a COUNTRY HARBOR on the 19th and at SHERBROOK on the 20th, where I was ably assisted by Rev. Mr. Maxwell and a distinguished

Professor of an American College, but I hope that **SHERBROOK** has not again forgotten the Society's claims upon it.

My visit at **GLENELG** was inopportune, a very important meeting was then being held. My very hurried presentation of the Society's claims on that occasion, however, has been most generously responded to, and I hope to be able to thank the ladies there for their praiseworthy efforts and their gift of \$24.00.

Sabbath, the 22nd July, was, I thought, the hottest day in summer, and after thirteen miles of a continuous walk and three hours of almost incessant speaking, I felt that I needed a good night's rest, and the Society a souvenir from the good inhabitants of **LOCHABER**. The former I found with other hospitalities at the very hospitable home of Mr. George Sinclair, and the latter your treasury already contains.

I thank the friends of **LOCHABER** and **UNION CENTRE** for their very generous gift of \$25.30, and (D. V.) will call there annually to exchange greetings and bear to you their tokens of liberality. I may now call this another new branch bearing fruit unto Eternal Life.

My visit to **ANTIGONISH** was again unseasonable for a good meeting. The people there, however, do not need to be stirred up to duty in our work, as our financial columns abundantly shew. It is always pleasant to meet them, and most cheering to see that they constantly grow in the grace of liberality. I notice that the last Report contains a printer's error, in the figures as to the books sold, such should read \$20.00 instead \$30.00.

Our warmest thanks are due to the Rev. Ebenezer Ross of Truro, for procuring the best Bible Society meeting held for many years in that beautiful and prosperous

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town. "The night of prayer" was chosen for the occasion, and the place the Methodist Church; and judging from the joy-giving countenance of the Rev. Mr. Moore, who presided over the devotional exercises, and the general enthusiasm manifested from platform and pew, the Christians of Truro who were present, did not lose any spiritual blessing when they agreed to close their Church doors on that night in favor of this world-wide Catholic charity. And who too can estimate the spiritual value to others contained in Truro's gift of \$132.00 for the spread of God's saving Word? While tendering our friends in Truro our hearty thanks, we hope for a continuance of liberality proportionate to their commercial prosperity.

Our meeting at CLIFTON was smaller than usual, and I regret to see a falling off in its contribution.

I failed in getting a meeting at ACADIA MINES, but collected \$9.25. On Sabbath, 29th July, the Rev. Mr. Chase opened his pulpits to me at OKSLOW and BELMONT, and the congregation gave me, respectively, \$11.47 and \$9.35, for which they have my deep thanks.

I again entered Nova Scotia on the 27th September, and addressed meetings at RIVER HEBERT, FOLLY, GREAT VILLAGE, ECONOMY, BASS RIVER, OXFORD, PUGWASH, AMHERST, WINDSOR, HORTON, CANARD and WOLFFVILLE. My reception at these places was much the same as on former occasions. OXFORD shews a marked advance in liberality; so does WINDSOR, while AMHERST is 50 % of an improvement, with one church yet to hear from. Some of these other places have not yet sent in their full returns.

The meeting at KENTVILLE was again a cheering one; stirring addresses were made by the venerable President and the Rev. Messrs. Begg and Black, while the contribution was at high water mark.

At WOLFVILLE, the contribution was double that of last year, although some old subscribers were from home when I called. Let our friends there unite and send out collectors, and WOLFVILLE'S annual gift to the Bible Society will treble its present value.

The meeting at BERWICK was fair, and the church choir rendered some splendid music, but the contributions are slow in coming in.

We had good meetings at WATERVILLE and LAKEVILLE, and at the latter place a new branch was formed.

On Sabbath, the 28th October, I addressed the Rev. Mr. McFall's congregation at GRAFTON in the morning, and in the evening received a good reception, as usual, in SOMERSET Hall. The contribution of \$40.75 from this branch is quite an advance on its hitherto splendid record, and yet nearly all this amount comes from a few hard working families. It is indeed a pleasure to visit such a Christian community.

I am delighted to report an awakening at AYLESFORD, and I trust that our friends there will henceforth remember that there should be no "off years" in Bible Society harvests, whatever may be the nature of the fruit-bearing trees in that nice locality.

We had a very small meeting at MELVERN SQUARE and none at LAWRENCETOWN.

BRIDGETOWN'S report shews quite an advance, but that pretty and prosperous town ought to contain more supporters of the Bible Society.

I am happy to report the formation of a new branch at ROUND HILL, and that the remittance of \$16.55 was the handsome response to my first appeal; and from the kind reception I met with, I am encouraged to hope for a steady and liberal support of our cause in the future.

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The contribution of ANNAPOLIS shews a return to her first love, but the collector, and not the committee, is entitled to the honor of keeping sweet on our list the name of Nova Scotia's oldest town.

I am sorry to see that DIGBY has not yet forwarded her contribution. There should be no "missing link" in her golden chain of charity, and the President's success in suppressing a bad traffic in DIGBY should be rewarded by honorable mention in our lists. We will gladly give DIGBY several pages in our financial end of the book. The Bible Society is a fitting altar on which to offer the sacrifice of gratitude, and none will rejoice over this form more than the Society's President in that pretty town.

My reception at WEYMOUTH was again very cordial. Indeed, my visit was more of the nature of a holiday than of business. The night was very dark and threatening, and only a few came to the meeting. But the returns of this branch are fully up to my expectations, and again my thanks are due to Mr. St. Clair Jones for his interest in our cause, and his kindness during my stay.

We had a good meeting at YARMOUTH, and my canvas of the town was again a success. It was no small joy to me to receive contributions from some who refused me on a former occasion. Again some old contributors were out of town, but the committee promised to collect from those whom I failed to meet, and also to add some new names to our already good list. I was indebted to the same old friends as before for favors extended to me personally, and for valuable aid in the prosecution of the Agency. It always gives me great pleasure to visit YARMOUTH.

We had a small meeting at SHELBURNE, three good meetings at BARRINGTON and the PASSAGE, and none at CLYDE OF LOCKEPORT.

The LIVERPOOL meeting was unusually good, and the committee reorganized. While the Society regrets the departure of Mrs. Anderson from LIVERPOOL, it rejoices in the acquisition of other new friends to assist in carrying on the cause, and I am glad to report a remittance of \$24.83. LIVERPOOL, however, should aim at an annual gift of \$50.00.

Our friends in MILTON are few, but favorable, and I am always warmly received at that pretty village.

There is just one family in MILL VILLAGE that takes any interest in our Society, and I cannot express too strongly my gratitude to Mr. Isaac N. Mack for his kindness in driving me to and from the Village.

I conducted the morning service in the Methodist church at PETITE RIVIERE, and addressed the congregation on our cause in the afternoon. This is an old branch, but it has contributed nothing for many years. I hope for another privilege to address it, for it is hard to hear the order, "cut it down."

At the Union Church, WEST DUBLIN, the Rev. Mr. Crawford kindly vacated his pulpit to allow me an opportunity to press the claims of the Bible Society on that community, and also arranged for two other meetings along the DUBLIN SHORE. At these places I received \$2.46, and had the pleasure of organizing a new branch. I hope that DUBLIN SHORE Branch will endeavour to emulate that of LAHAVE, on the opposite shore of Nova Scotia's most beautiful river, and share the blessings promised to all engaged in extending the Kingdom of Christ.

The meeting at LOWER LAHAVE was very interesting. Excellent speeches were delivered by the ministers of the three denominations in that populous district. Again do the lady collectors merit our warmest praise for their good canvas, as is shown by the lists. I trust

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that henceforth they may be able to arrange for two meetings when your agent again visits the branch.

You will share the joy of your agent when you behold the splendid contribution from BRIDGEWATER. From the personel of the committee I expected to see a good report, but the result of their work has far exceeded my expectations. The ladies there have done nobly, and words failed me in expressing to them my thanks. They, too, were most happy at their own success, and assured me that it was the easiest work, in the way of collecting, that they ever experienced. That the blessing of the Redeemer was in their hearts was expressed by their eyes and words as they handed me the large package of money, and the well-written roll of subscribers' names. I then felt, too, that there are many other branches officered by men that might bear re-construction after the manner of that in BRIDGEWATER. "The lords of creation" work vigorously enough in the realm of politics, but to the ladies we must look for success in the affairs of the higher Kingdom.

The meeting at BRIDGEWATER was also well conceived and suggestive of a *Te Deum* in honor of the Society's revival.

At LUNENBURG the meeting was again fair, and my canvas of the place realized almost as much as that of last year, which was the highest on record. Still the number of the subscribers in LUNENBURG bears too small proportion to its well to do inhabitants. I am sure that should the good ladies there undertake to collect for our cause they could easily add a hundred new names to the already good list. As in BRIDGEWATER, they will find a ready response to their call; indeed none but the sons of Naboth can refuse help to a cause which is our nation's strength and Society's safeguard; and

as they will know such by reputation, should they unhappily be in their community, they need neither word nor step over them. This plan adopted by the Society nearly everywhere, and always brings success. Will the ladies of LUNENBURG respond to this appeal?

On Sabbath 25th, I conducted the morning service in the Methodist Church at MAHONE BAY and addressed the Presbyterian Congregation in the afternoon. I cannot understand why that place does not respond to our annual appeal. It contains five churches and hundreds of elegant residences. Monday's great storm prevented me from making a personal canvas of the town, and I had to leave on Tuesday morning for duties elsewhere. I left our cause then in the hands of two ministers of the gospel and I hope they will prompt their adherents to this duty.

On the 28th November we had a large and enthusiastic meeting in the Baptist Church, DARTMOUTH. The Rev. Mr. Williams presided admirably and stirring speeches were made by the Rev. Messrs. Brown, George, and Morrison. This good branch was then re-organized under the management of ladies who, I doubt not, will keep up Dartmouth's reputation in Bible Society circles.

We had a fair meeting in the Methodist Church at SPRINGHILL, and a new set of officers chosen to carry on the work. I am delighted with the returns, and tender the collectors my thanks for their kindness. \$51.60 from SPRINGHILL is a good earnest of future trophies.

A charity concert prevented our meeting at PARRSBORO on the 7th December, I, as usual, canvassed the town, but with very poor success. I think

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however, that the ladies of that town will yet under-
 take our cause in the near future.

This closed my season's work outside of HALIFAX,
 and I have great cause for gratitude, that although my
 duties were trying on the best of constitutions, physical
 and moral, I did not loose an hour through sickness,
 and very seldom my temper by provocation, and even
 when from reasons the very opposite to those which
 moved Jonah to fret by the wall of Nineveh. I am
 thankful too for the measure of success which has
 followed my awkward efforts. Some branches that
 were ready to perish have revived; some fresh grafts on
 the parent stock have already borne good fruit, and
 other new ones give fair promise of fruit next season.
 On the whole, although I sometimes failed, I have
 reason to rejoice that my labor has not been in vain;
 and I hope yet further to gather into line other grow-
 ing places to the help of the Lord against the mighty.

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I also hope to see the day when, in every place where
 we have a Society to raise funds for the spread of
 God's Word, no minister of that Word will refuse either
 his coin or countenance to the cause. The Word was
written that men may believe. The printing press
 makes that same Saving Word accessible to millions
 of our race at a minimum cost, who otherwise would
 remain in ignorance of Him whom to know is life
 eternal. It has been argued in disparagement of our
 cause, that the *Book* depends upon the voice of the
 preacher for its efficiency unto salvation, and the
 marvellous interview between Philip and the Eunuch,
 cited in proof of this assumption; but I humbly sub-
 mit that their argument proves too much for their
 position. Of the many views which this very incident
 suggests against such cavillers is this,—that even there
 the *Book* was in *advance* of the preacher. Had there
 been no reader there would have been no interpreter

sent. That book was an Old Testament prophecy concerning Christ to come, and although He had come and fulfilled the prophecy, the event was evidently unknown to the Ethiopian.

Let us give the world the whole Book, that is our duty and privilege. It is the prerogative of God only to send the Interpreter, and blessed be His name, that perhaps, millions of our race have thus been enlightened while passing through the desert homeward bound.

“The words that I speak unto you they are spirit and they are life.” Howbeit, “the Spirit of truth will guide you into all truth,” “and He will shew you things to come.”
