Strong Sentiments On Prohibition

(Editor the Guardian).

Dear Sir,—As I believe you to be an ardent supporter of the temperance cause, and a strong advocate for Prohibition, I venture to ask you if you will kindly favor me with space in your columns for a few words re this important question now confronting us.

First, permit me to say, for my own part, I am in favor of total Prohibition, for reasons that I shall try to state in as plain language as I have at my command.

One of the first reasons I shall give is, that in my own experience of over forty years I have not proved alcoholic beverages to be a necessity, but rather, wherever I have seen it used, it has brought about more or less evil results. Now I know that this is putting it rather mildly, and it is not my purpose at this time to enumerate the many evils, crimes and diabolical deeds that have been committed by many persons while under the influence of alcohol, as I believe that most, if not all the people that will read your popular paper are aware of the drunkenness that has been one cause of poverty, distress and crime.

Some years ago, while I was yet a boy, the majority of our fathers in St. John's District did for us something that we as men and women of to-day ought to thank God for, viz: voted for Local Option. Many young men and young women of to-day do not seem to realize the benefit we have derived from it. And not only the young but some of the older men I am sorry to say talk very lightly of it and keep jabbering about Shebeens and the ill kept bond-store, and saying that some people are getting all the liquor they want and so on.

But, Mr. Editor, I can remember (what perhaps you cannot) of seeing both old and young men around the licensed grog-shops of Bay Roberts engaged in a drunken row and knocking the blood out of each other, and it was not an uncommon sight to see men lying in the gutter drunk, or reeling about the street like raving maniacs.

Now, although I regret to have to admit, there have been some breaches of the Local Option law, still I feel confident in saying that many an aged father and mother in Bay Roberts have been spared many a disgraceful scene in their home, and I believe ought to bless God for the day when such a law was passed curtailing the sale of liquor to such a degree that many of their sons grew up to manhood without ever tasting intoxicating liquor and are teetotalers to-day.

And now, sir, this brings to my mind several other reasons I have for being in favor of Prohibition. My wife as well as myself has the same reason. What are they, you may ask. I will tell you. They are the little boys in our home—our children—that are as dear to us as our own lives. They do not know the taste of liquor and I am determined that they shall never know it by my voting against or neglecting to vote for Prohibition.

Understand me, Mr. Editor, I am not pretending that I can make saints of my children, but I feel that I have a duty to perform toward them and I am reminded of it day by day by that which is contained in the first prayer that I ever was taught, and which is acknowledged and repeated all over Christendom. "Lead us not into temptation" we often repeat,

Pins Union Jack on Her Dress as Huns Shot Her

London, Oct. 22.—The Amsterdam correspondent of the "Daily Express" sends a story concerning the case of Miss Edith Cavell, in which he says, he has secured from an intimate friend of the British nurse. The despatch follows:

"She had long been suspected by the Germans, but always refused to leave, as long as there was a single wounded man left in Brussels, saying that duty compelled her to remain where there was suffering. It is believed that before her arrest she was spied on. Little is known of her trial, but it is reported that when the President of the Court asked if she wished to add anything to her defence, or to sign a request for the German Emperor's pardon, she merely shrugged her shoulders and walked out.

"She was as brave before the German rifles as she had been before the Court Martial and refused to have her eyes bandaged. She pinned a small Union Jack on her dress."

In Prison Five Years Then Found Innocent

Kansas City, Oct. 16.—Groos S. Edison of St. Louis, a book agent, has been released from the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, where he served five years for a crime he did not commit.

Edison was arrested in St. Louis in February, 1911. He had in his possession a \$20 banknote issued in 1837 on a Savannah, Ga., bank. He was convicted in the United States District Court of passing counterfeit money and sentenced to eight years in prison on four counts.

A habeas corpus proceeding to get him out of the penitentiary on technical grounds was brought recently by a Leavenworth attorney, L. S. Harvey. Deputy United States District Attorney, examined the indictment on which Edison was convicted.

He learned Edison was accused of counterfeiting a Georgia State bank bill which was issued in 1837, when State banks were permitted to issue banknotes. It was not the money of the United States Government at all, and therefore was not a crime against the Federal laws.

Harvey placed the case before Judge John C. Pollock and he ordered the immediate release of the prisoner.

Why I Vote for Prohibition

I. As a Citizen. The drink traffic is an evil that cannot be defended. It is directly opposed to the social, economic and moral welfare of the country.

1. It destroys the manhood of the country—the best asset of any land. He goes into the "gin-mill" a bright honest boy, a sober, promising young man—he comes out a "bum," a loafer, a good-for-nothing. Are such citizens helpful or desirable in any country?

2. It produces crime. At Portage la Prairie in Western Canada during the months of June, July and August, 1914, under license, there were 75 police cases. In June, July and August, 1915, when the bars were closed, there were 9 police cases.

North Dakota is a Prohibition State with a population of 575,000. It has 175 in the State prison. Montana is "wet," and with a population of 375,000 has 900 in the State prison. Newfoundland has 800 in the Penitentiary and jails. The united testimony of the judges and magistrates is that at least two-thirds of these are there through drink, i.e., 585 out of the 800. Should any citizen support such a hotbed of crime?

3. It produces poverty. Large sums of money are paid annually from the public taxes to relieve drinkers, families. Private charity relieves many more. A large proportion of the inmates of the Poor House are the victims of Drink. It produces slums, filthy alleys, miserable, ill-clad wives and children. Shall I support such a poverty-breeder?

4. It produces insanity. It is an undeniable fact that it destroys the brain cells, and frequently ends in insanity. Shall I support a traffic that deprives my fellow of God's greatest gift and makes him a public charge and burden?

5. It burdens the taxpayer. It has been repeatedly and conclusively proved that the cost of the results of strong drink far exceeds the revenue it produces. Is it right to permit a traffic that manufactures paupers, criminals, insane, etc., and then tax sober, virtuous and industrious people to keep them? Moreover, if the revenue argument be true it means this—The more drink the more poverty; the more drink the more revenue; therefore the more poverty the more revenue—which is absurd.

2. For the sake of the Boys and Girls. The average revenue from liquor during the past six years has been \$302,000 per year. If we have only 1000 drunkards in the country, it means that we are selling our manhood body and soul to the liquor dealers for \$302.00 apiece. "I have a boy of my own for whom the liquor traffic is reaching, and whom, and other parents' boys, it must have for the money it pays to the revenue, and being unwilling to so sell my own boy, I am not selfish enough to vote to sell other people's children at this or any other price." If a hawk had killed 40 chickens, what would the farmers do? License it? Not Shoot it. III. As a Christian.

1. The Liquor traffic is the greatest single enemy of the Church and Kingdom of Christ. This is the universal testimony of Christian workers.

2. I am my "brother's keeper." I owe it as a duty to the weaker fellow to remove from his pathway the temptation he is powerless to resist.

4. Because Prohibition has proved the most effective method of dealing with the traffic. Precept has failed, example has failed, moral suasion has failed, license has failed, local option has only been partially successful. Prohibition has proved such a success that 19 States of the United States have gone dry; Russia has banished liquor and thrived amazingly; Iceland has Prohibition; Sweden voted 1,184,296 for Prohibition, 16,715 against; while in Canada, Prince Edward Island and Alberta have prohibitory laws, and Saskatchewan has closed the bars.

5. Because in this moral question there can be no neutrality. He that does not vote for Prohibition, helps and supports liquor just as really as if he voted against Prohibition. To-day we are partners of the Liquor traffic, and jointly responsible for all the evils it causes, for we license it and take the revenue from it to help pay our taxes. But many are unwilling partners. On November 4th we have the chance of dissolving the iniquitous and disgraceful partnership. Any man who votes "No," or is indifferent will no longer be the unwilling but the willing active partner in every future evil result that it may cause. Can you dare be the willing partner of such an unholy business?

London, Oct. 21.—The execution of Miss Cavell was characterized as a crime that dwains even that of the Lusitania, by the Bishop of London, preaching in St. Martin's Church to-day. "Always up to now," said the Bishop, "Christianity has enlightened the horrors of war, but it is not so with our enemy of to-day, whose latest crime is murder in cold blood of a poor, defenceless English girl." The Bishop remarked that Admiral Nelson would not have resorted to diplomatic inquiries in such a case,—he would have made his inquiries with the thunder of the guns of the fleet. Continuing, the Bishop said: "The spirit of Nelson is dead in the young man of the present day if he does not want to know the reason why this crime was committed."

Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents and two cents for each additional word. A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

Published by Authority

Under the Provisions of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order as follows:-

1. The Colonial Secretary may, if he considers it expedient so to do, appoint a person to be Censor of the writings, copy or matter printed or the publications issued at any printing establishment or works, and any person so appointed shall have the right to enter and visit the premises with any assistant or assistants, from time to time, and remain there for such time as may be reasonably necessary, and to examine, consider, approve or reject any writing, copy or matter printed or proposed to be printed at or issued for publication from the said premises, and after the appointment of any such person and the notification thereof to the proprietor, manager or person in charge of the said premises, no writing, copy or other matter shall be printed there or issued for publication therefrom which is not approved by the person so appointed as Censor, and any such printing or issue for publication, without such approval, shall be deemed to be a contravention of this order.

2. The printing or circulation or procuring to be printed or circulated of any letter, communication, report or news concerning the operations of the present war or the movement of any of the forces, naval or military, of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or as to any of the naval or military forces or operations of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies connected with or for the purpose of the war, or criticizing or commenting upon the policy, proceedings or action of the Government or any neutral state, if such printing or circulation or any of the statements contained in such letter, communication, report or news be likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to prevent, hinder or interfere with the success of the forces by land or by sea of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with any foreign state or otherwise to assist or encourage the enemy, or to prevent, embarrass or hinder the successful prosecution of the war, shall be deemed to be a contravention of this order, and, in any prosecution for or in respect of any such offence instituted by the authority of the Attorney-General, it shall be presumed, in the absence of proof to the contrary, that the printing or circulation of the statements in respect of which the prosecution is brought were likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to prevent, hinder or interfere with the success of the forces by land or by sea of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with any foreign state, or otherwise to assist or encourage the enemy or to prevent, embarrass or hinder the successful prosecution of the war.

3. For any contravention of this order the offender shall be liable upon indictment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years, and to a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars, or upon summary conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, and a fine not exceeding two thousand dollars, and the proprietor of the premises, and every director or officer of any corporation controlling or operating the premises, where any such offence is committed, shall also severally be liable upon indictment or summary conviction to imprisonment and fine as aforesaid. Moreover, all copies of any book, newspaper, periodical, pamphlet, or tract printed, issued, circulated or published in contravention of this order, in the possession of whomsoever they may be, may be seized and destroyed by any peace officer, and, if the Colonial Secretary so direct, the printing presses, plan and machinery within or connected with the premises may be closed indefinitely or for such period as the Colonial Secretary may name.

with respect to the plans of any such forces or ships or with respect to any works or measures undertaken for or connected with the fortifications for defence of any place, if the information is such as is calculated to be or might be directly or indirectly useful to the enemy.

2. No person shall, without permission of the competent naval or military authority, make any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation of any of the forces or ships of His Majesty or of His Majesty's Allies, or of any naval or military work, or of any dock or harbour work or in connection with any place in this Colony, and no person in the vicinity of such forces, ships or work, shall, without such permission, have in his possession any photographic or other apparatus, or other material or things suitable for use in making any such representation. For the purpose of this regulation, the expression "harbour work" includes lights, buoys, beacons, marks and other things for the purpose of facilitating navigation in or into a harbour.

3. No person shall, by word of mouth or in writing, spread reports likely to create disaffection or alarm among any of His Majesty's forces, or among the civil population.

4. Any person who attempts to commit, or procures, aid or abets, the commission of any act prohibited by the foregoing special regulations, or harbours any person whom he knows, or has reasonable grounds for supposing, to have acted in contravention of such regulations, shall be deemed to have acted in contravention of the regulations in like manner as if he had committed the act.

5. No person shall, without lawful authority, sell, give, distribute or permit the selling, giving or distributing of any newspaper, tract or pamphlet or any information which is forbidden to be published or communicated under paragraph one of these Orders and Regulations.

6. No person shall, without lawful authority, sell, give, distribute or permit the selling, giving or distributing of any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation which is forbidden to be under paragraph two of these orders and regulations.

7. Any person contravening any of the provisions of the foregoing Orders and Regulations shall be liable, upon summary conviction before a Stipendiary Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding five thousand dollars, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years, or to both fine and imprisonment.

Peace Rumors

It is rumored that Prince Buelow, former German Chancellor, will shortly submit to President Wilson and King Alfonso an outline of considerations on which Germany might be disposed to discuss peace terms.

In addition to the deaths in the ranks of our boys reported last week, there is one more to record, that of Walter Gasse, son of Mr. Peter Gasse, of Tilton. He joined the R.N.R. last October, and went across in the Mongolian on Dec. 17, 1914. While serving on the armed trawler "Mina" in the North Sea, he was drowned with others of her crew, the trawler having struck a mine. He was 19 years of age and was the chief support of an invalided father.

Woman Spy Shot, As She Faints, By German Officer

Charge Against Her Was Aiding Belgians to Escape to England

London, Oct. 18.—A wave of intense anger, as well as a feeling of horror, has swept over Great Britain as a result of the execution in Brussels of Miss Edith Cavell, an English nurse, daughter of the late Rev. Frederick Cavell, former Vicar of Swardeston, Norfolk. It is certain to come up in Parliament.

A despatch to the Daily Mail from Amsterdam says: "Such details as it is possible to collect here concerning the execution of Miss Cavell at Brussels are as follows: The charge against her was of aiding Belgians to escape to England. It is stated she hid them in her house and provided them with money and addresses in England and helped to smuggle them across the frontier."

"The German military court found her guilty and sentenced her to death by shooting. The execution ground was a garden or yard in Brussels surrounded by a wall. A German firing party of six men and an officer was drawn up in the garden and awaited its victim. She was led in by soldiers from a house nearby, blindfolded with a black scarf."

"Up to this minute the woman, though deadly white, had stepped out bravely to meet her fate, but before the rifle party her strength at last gave out and she tottered and fell to the ground thirty yards or more from the spot where she was to have been shot."

"The officer in charge of the execution walked to her. She lay prone on the ground, motionless. The officer then drew a large service revolver from his belt, took steady aim from his knee and shot the woman through the head as she lay on the floor."

"The firing party looked on. The officer quietly returned his revolver to its case and ordered the soldiers to carry the body to the house, when charge was taken of it by a Belgian woman, acting under the instructions of the Spanish Minister, who had undertaken the responsibility for the body being buried in Belgium."

"The execution has shocked the whole of the Belgian community, who speak of it as the bloodiest act of the whole war."

Miss Cavell's relatives knew that she was under arrest, but her mother had not heard from her directly since last April.

What has so deeply incensed many people here is the fact that a German woman on trial for espionage in September, at the Old Bailey, received a sentence of only ten years' penal servitude. An accomplice, a German man, was sentenced to be shot.

Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, President of the National Council of Trained Nurses, and editor of the British Journal of Nursing, said: "She was of that resolute type that would persist in whatever she thought it right to do."

"I remember her very well. She came to London in 1909, to the International Congress of Nurses, and read a short paper on nursing in Belgium. Her age then was between forty and forty five, and she impressed me as a woman of exceptional strength of character."

"She was intensely devoted to her work at the Ecole Belge d'Infirmiers Diplomes, Brussels. She went there in 1907 to start this school for nurses."

"Whatever she did she would do with a purpose. You may be sure it was no foolish blunder that caused her death."

Whereas We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern and Northern Districts, respectively, of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:—

At Placentia, on Wednesday, the Eighth, and Thursday, the Ninth days of September next;

At Channel, on Monday, the Thirteenth, and Tuesday, the Fourteenth days of September next;

At St. George's, on Thursday, the Sixteenth, and Friday, the Seventeenth days of September next;

At Bay of Islands, on Saturday, the Eighteenth, and Monday, the Twentieth days of September next.

And that Our said Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:—

At Botwood, on Wednesday, the Twenty-second, and Thursday, the Twenty-third days of September next;

At Bonaville, on Saturday, the Twenty-fifth, and Monday, the Twenty-seventh days of September next;

At Trinity, on Tuesday, the Twenty-eighth day of September next;

At Brigus, on Friday, the Nineteenth, and Saturday, the Twentieth days of November next;

At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-second, Tuesday, the Twenty-third, Wednesday, the Twenty-fourth, and Thursday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next;

At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-sixth, and Saturday, the Twenty-seventh days of November next;

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinbefore prescribed, at each of the respective places, as aforesaid; provided the Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that, in the event of the Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Southern or Northern District of Our said Island being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinbefore appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinbefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and should deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinbefore stated as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

The ballot papers for the purpose of the voting under this Act shall be in the following form:

Are you in favour of prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of spirits, wine, ale, beer, cider, and all other alcoholic liquors for use as beverages? YES

Directions For the Guidance Of Electors In Voting

EACH Elector, on entering the room where the Poll is to be held shall declare his name, surname and address.

After so doing he shall receive a Ballot Paper in the above form. Each Elector, if required by the Deputy Returning Officer, the Poll Clerk, or one of the agents shall, before receiving his Ballot Paper, take an oath of qualification.

After receiving his Ballot Paper, the Voter shall go into one of the compartments and with a pencil there provided, place a cross to indicate his vote on the question at issue. An affirmative vote on the question submitted shall be made by placing a cross (thus X) in the space after the word 'Yes,' and a negative vote by placing a similar cross in the space after the word 'No.'

The voter will then fold the Ballot Paper, so as to show a portion of the back only, with the initials of the Deputy Returning Officer, and shall hand it folded up to the Deputy Returning Officer and the Deputy Returning Officer shall, without unfolding it, ascertain that it is the Ballot Paper which he furnished to the elector, and then immediately place it in the Ballot Box. The voter shall forth with leave the Polling Station.

If a voter inadvertently spoils a Ballot Paper he may return it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who will give him another.

If a voter places any mark on the Ballot Paper by which he can afterwards be identified, his vote will be void and will not be counted.

If a voter takes a Ballot or Ballot Paper out of the Polling Station, or fraudulently puts any other into the Ballot Box than the Paper given him by the Deputy Returning Officer, he will be subject to be punished by a fine of Five Hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding Six Months, with or without hard labour.

Public Notice Passports

Residents of this Colony, intending to travel out of Newfoundland, are hereby notified that they may be required to produce Passports at various points on their journey.

Passports are issued at the Department of the Colonial Secretary, in accordance with Rules and Regulations approved by the Governor in Council, to persons domiciled in Newfoundland, who are:—

- 1. Natural-born British subjects; 2. The wives and widows of such persons, or 3. Persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies, or in India.

A Passport cannot be issued on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission or Consulate. Passports must not be sent out of Newfoundland by post.

Applicants are requested to have their Forms of Application (which can be obtained at this Department), properly filled in, according to marginal instructions thereon, and forwarded to the Department in sufficient time to permit of any necessary alterations being made in the same before the date upon which the Passport would be required.

The charge for a Passport is \$2.50 which covers a period of two years, after which it may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, at a charge of \$1.00 for each renewal.

Copies of Rules and Regulations, Forms of Application, or any desired information may be obtained upon request.
