NEWS IN A LINE

A valuable horse owned by Mr. W. G. Rendell, butcher, perished Thursday morning.

A special train conveying the Governor and suite passed through here Wednesday en route to H. Grace to open the Marine Railway Dock and the Exhibition.

The Turks are reported to be confident and holding their own against the opposing forces around Adrianople. There are about 150,000 Turkish troops engaged.

Vice-President Sherman, running mate of Pres. Taft in the Presidential election, died on Wednesday.

After two days' fighting, the Bulgarian Army has gained a complete victory over the principal Turkish troops.

Bell Island is likely to have a tramway system and Curling is considering a telephone system.

The S. S. Nascopee was expected to reach St. John's Thursday afternoon.

A number of fishermen who failed to secure a passage home to Cupids on the Labrador boat, arrived on Friday morning by the S. S. Earl of Devon.

Mr. Geo. Hierlby will have another shipment of fish to send to St. John's shortly.

New St. Matthew's Church is nearing completion. The organ arrived in St. John's by the Allan liner Mongolian, and will likely be erected during next week. The opening of the church will likely take place some time in November.

Sanctumettes

(Trade Review, Oct. 26.)

St. John's has been a busy town this week, and there was probably more codfish and fish products landed and sold than for any similar period in the history of the city. Such a condition should mean a corresponding activity in the retail stores along the street, but, strange to say, there is not a great rush yet in the stores. The explanation is easy. Three years, at this time, dull days and fine days alternated, and when fishermen could not engage in landing cargo, they stayed in the stores and did some buying. This October has been almost a month of sunshine, and fishermen will clean up landing and selling the voyage completely before starting to purchase the necessary winter supplies.

Another cause of complaint by the city shopkeeper is the growth of the retail trade in the outports. In old times the fishermen who came to St. John's in the fall bought everything he wanted here—from a needle to an anchor—and the only outport business left to the outport shopkeeper was giving out provisions on credit during the winter, on the strength of the summer's supply. Now it is different, the outport store has grown larger and more pretentious, and sells various lines that formerly were only sold in St. John's. Very few outport shopkeepers import their own goods from abroad, but the net result of the change is the growth of the trade with the larger city houses at the expense of the smaller ones.

Brief News

The S. S. Progress arrived here to-day with passengers from Bell Island. Mr. Philip Snow, who has been cook for some time on her, is now captain of the steamer.

Any man desiring of securing employment now in the fishery is over can secure same with the Reid, Nfld. Co. on the Trepassy and Heart's Content branch railways, the iron mining companies at Bell Island, the lumbering companies at Grand Falls, Bishop's Falls and other points in the interior, and with the Dominion Steel Co. in the limestone quarries at Port au Port, all of which pay good wages.

After four days' hard fighting, 150,000 Bulgarians defeated 250,000 Turks. The Turks are said to be in full retreat, being closely followed by the victorious Bulgarians.

Uskub Captured

Heavy Losses in Both Armies

London, Oct. 27.—Turkish troops were the first to take the offensive in a desperate battle which ended in the fall of the town of Kumanovo into the hands of the Serbian troops, and opened up the way for their further advance on the stronghold of Uskub. During drizzling rain and heavy fog, the Turkish troops advanced on the Serbian position, five miles from Kumanovo. Heavy fighting lasted throughout the afternoon, and both armies suffered severe losses; but the Serbians succeeded in staying the Turkish onslaught. The battle was resumed at 1 a.m. on Thursday, the Serbians taking the offensive, and attracting the Turkish troops, who had entrenched themselves during the lull in fighting. After an artillery duel a general advance was ordered by the Serbian Commander, at 6 o'clock under the cover of artillery, to which the Turkish field guns vigorously replied. The ground over which the Serbian troops had to advance was open, and the infantry was exposed to a sweeping fire. They stormed the Turkish trenches again and again, until finally, at the point of the bayonet they drove the Ottoman troops out. It took the Serbians four hours to clear the valley, but it was found necessary, before occupying Kumanovo, to take the heights on the right bank of the river, to which the Turkish troops had retreated in disorder. At one period of the fighting, the Serbians' artillery annihilated three squadrons of Turkish cavalry. The Turkish losses are said to number 5,000 killed and wounded, while 12 of the field guns were captured. The Serbian casualties were also heavy. They lost many officers, including two regimental and several battalion commanders. At the town of Novi Bazar, farther to the north, there was a brisk battle. After the town was taken by the Serbians the Turks attempted to retake it, but were repulsed and virtually annihilated.

Deer Lake Oil Shale Areas

(Western Star.)
Mr. John M. Hall, of London, a prominent geologist of the Old Country, and a brother of the eminent King's Council, Mr. Marshall Hall, has been for the past four weeks at work on the shale areas at Deer Lake, having been sent out by Sir Deverton Redwood, the leading British authority on oils, etc., to thoroughly investigate these deposits. We hear that Mr. Hall is very favorably impressed with the deposits, and that the outlook for their being worked at an early date is very favorable. Sir Deverton Redwood is acting for leading British capitalists in this matter, and it is sufficient to show his standing in regard to such questions for us to say that he was recently appointed by the imperial Government as a member of a Royal Commission to investigate the subject of oil fuel for the navy. Surveyor McLellan has gone to St. John's to confer with Mr. Hall.

Bank of Commerce Gives Bonus

Montreal, Oct. 21.—The Canadian Bank of Commerce has announced that with the regular quarterly dividend of 2 1/2 per cent. payable on Dec. 1st, a bonus of 1 per cent. will be paid to shareholders.

Pugilist Arrested

Sydney, Australia, Oct. 21.—Hugh McIntosh, who had offered the negro Johnson \$50,000 for fights with Langford, McVey or Jeanette, has cancelled all negotiations owing to the abduction charges having so angered the sporting men and public of Australia.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—The Federal charges against the pugilist Johnson moved swiftly to day. Twenty-five subpoenas were served on his associates to appear before the Federal jury to-morrow. Charges of violation of the White Slave Act and of the saloon closing laws will be preferred.

Carriers of Infantile Paralysis

Washington, Oct. 28.—Ordinary stable flies have been conclusively identified as carriers of the dreaded infantile paralysis, according to a report made to the Public Health service by Dr. Anderson, director of the hygienic laboratory and assistant surgeon. Further experiments will be necessary to determine whether this is the only or usual method of transmission of the malady.

A Sample Shipment

The S. S. Catilla left for Swansea last week with 3,100 tons ore from the new mine, Terra Nova, at Baie Verte. This is a sample shipment, and if it proves satisfactory, large quantities will be shipped there next year.

The Floating Refrigerator

(Western Star.)
On the invitation of Mr. C. N. Hall, manager of the Gordon Pew Fisheries Company's business in Newfoundland, a number of citizens visited that company's steamer Alcona, the floating refrigerator, Monday afternoon, where they were met by Capt. Arsenault and Chief Engineer Ralph who showed them through the ship and demonstrated to them the process of operation of the cold storage plant. The Alcona is 106 feet long, 37 feet beam and 26 feet deep. She was built at Gibraltar, Mich. Is 1190 tons gross, and is built of white oak. She is fitted with a Steeple comp. engine of 550 h.p. capable of driving her about 8 knots. She has a hold capacity of 1 1/2 million pounds of herring, and is lighted throughout by a high speed dynamo engine capable of generating 125 volts. She is fitted with a refrigerator plant built by M. J. Falson, of Gloucester, Mass. It consists of Amonia Absorption 2 30-ton machines capable of delivering 60 tons in 24 hours, using the brine system. This plant may be operated at 1/2 or full capacity, at will, and its automatic regulators reduce the necessity of attendance to a minimum, in fact one man can attend to what it would otherwise require five men to look after. The cold storage plant is equipped with 35,500 feet of 1 1/2 inch pipe. Besides the large main plant there is also a smaller compartment which might be operated for small quantities or at times when for any cause whatever it may be found inconvenient to operate the whole plant; this will tend to minimize the cost of operation. She is fitted with an electric fan which may be placed in the hold of a vessel while being loaded and the air in her hold kept to zero point. For conveying cold air in the hold of the Alcona, she is fitted with a 2 h.p. gen. electric motor, so that frozen fish, etc., may be placed in her hold and kept there in cold storage for an indefinite period. The Alcona has a fresh water capacity of 18,000 gallons. She carries a crew of 20 men. The mess-room compartments are in the after part of the ship. She was formerly used on the lakes, and her draught is shallow. It is the intention of the owners of the Alcona to keep her on the Newfoundland coast the year round. She is said to be the only floating refrigerator on the Atlantic seaboard. She has many advantages over a stationary refrigerator, particularly for bait supplying purposes. Not the least of which is the fact that she can go where the bait may be had or where it would be most convenient for the greater number of vessels for either procuring or supplying the bait.

Goodridge's New Auxiliary Coaster

The new auxiliary coaster, which was built at Exports during the summer for A. Goodridge & Sons, Ltd., is now at the Firm's wharf. The vessel is sloop rigged, about 50 tons burthen, and as pretty a model as has been seen in the harbor for some time. She was built by Thos. Winsor & Son, after the design of Mr. R. A. Scieavour, who came in her as master. She is named A. F. Goodridge, and is fitted with a 30 h.p. Gideon motor, which is fed by kerosene, and is capable of propelling the boat at 5 knots an hour. With a favorable wind, and all her canvas spread, her speed is almost double the above. The A. F. Goodridge will be used collecting fish for her owners.

Deserting Seamen

Halifax, Oct. 21.—Twenty-three of the cable ship Minia's crew deserted to-day in a body, refusing duty. Warrants were issued for their arrest and fourteen returned to duty. The trouble was caused by the crew refusing to load cable to the Minia from S. S. Rappahannock.

WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in our said Island, that it is our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island, shall be open and holden—

At Brigus, on Friday, the Twenty-second, and Saturday, the Twenty-third days of November next;

At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-fifth, Tuesday, the Twentieth, Wednesday, the Twenty-seventh, and Thursday, the Twenty-eighth days of November next;

At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-ninth, and Saturday, the Thirtieth days of November next.

And the said Courts shall be kept open for the periods herebefore prescribed, at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that, in the event of a Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Northern District of Our said Island being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days herebefore appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places herebefore named for holding our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and shall deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those herebefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods herebefore stated, as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

Educational Matters

(Editor the Guardian).

Dear Editor.—We all feel the force of your just criticism of Education and Drawing in your issue of October 18. True it is that everybody seems to get hold of the wrong end of things; but the teacher, very often, has no choice whatever in the matter. He has to take the end that's proffered him and be silent.

We were, indeed, glad to get another visit from Prof. J. H. Nichols. He has again awakened us to the importance of Drawing in school-work, as well as its practical utility in after life. But alas! it is true that many of our good people are inclined to laugh at the work and competition that that gentleman is striving to incite in our schools. They cannot seem to be able to console themselves to the idea of teaching anything practical to people who imagine that when a child reaches the Standard IV or V class, and has crammed a geography containing a hundred or more pages of unintelligible names and facts; or has worked through one of our school arithmetics, which require no more intelligent thinking on the part of the child than getting ready for school does, then (so think they) he or she is possessed of all wisdom!

It is high time to discard those antediluvian ideas how and to get down to hard fact. Of course, we know it is about as easy for the teacher to criticize the parents as for the parents to criticize the teacher. But we also know something else.

The following would be an appropriate bill to post over the door of many of our schools:

WANTED

THE CO-OPERATION OF PARENTS. If the parents would once learn to appreciate the work of the teacher, and to co-operate with him in his work, things would very soon show a different face. When he does depart from the ordinary routine laid down in the Syllabus and tries to make things as practical as possible, he very soon meets a wall of opposition. It's a coward, of course, who shrinks in the face of opposition; but opposition to the teacher means Death.

Then, again, our schools could be better equipped than they are. Imagine a teacher having to teach hygiene, for instance, from a mere text-book and the black-board, without the least apparatus in the world. They see in the book that carbon dioxide is a non-supporter of combustion, but they have never seen a jar of that gas, much less a flame extinguished by it. And so on through all the other elements or compounds taught.

The same applies to all the other branches of study—History, Geography, Drawing, etc. The fact is, teachers cannot teach intelligently; first, because the parents fail to act their part; secondly, because they are supplied with sufficient apparatus to teach nothing. The general idea seems to be, "Jam it in, cram it in, children's heads are hollow."

How to Treat a Headache

(Present Truth)

In the treatment of any headache, the first duty is to ascertain its significance. Is it merely a stomachache in the head, due to overeating, to improper mastication, or to improperly combining the foods? If so, wash out the stomach and the colon, or take a purgative. Do everything possible to clean up the alimentary canal and thus remove the exciting causes, and then after avoid the causes. If the headache is due to congestion of the brain and increased pressure, do everything possible to draw the blood away from the brain. A hot foot-bath with cold compresses to the head and around the neck will give relief. A towel wrung out of hot water and then folded and placed over the face, with only the nose exposed, and cold compresses to the top of the head, and an ice-bag at the base of the brain, will also afford relief. A hot enema is helpful, especially if the increased blood pressure is due to the absorption of poisons from the colon, resulting from the decay of foods.

If a bilious headache exists, the hot enema, followed by hot fomentations over the liver and stomach, and a hot bath followed by a cold mitten friction will be beneficial. A fast or a fruit diet for a day or two will, when combined with this treatment, usually bring permanent relief.

Remember that headaches do not come without a cause. They are nature's danger signals, calling attention to certain causes that need to be removed. To tear down the signals without removing the causes is doing this. As long as the causes remain, men and women, to feel at all comfortable, find it necessary to be under the nerve-numbing and heart-depressing influence of alcohol or some other drug; as acetanilide, most of the time. While under its influence they may feel better, and imagine they have peace, when no peace exists. The path of transgression always leads to destruction, even though by the use of some drug we render ourselves unconscious of it. The sensible thing to do is to ascertain the significance of the headache, and then cease to do evil and learn to do well.



The Harbor Grace Exhibition

Marine Railway Dock Opened

XThe Hr. Grace Exhibition and the Marine Railway Docks were officially opened by His Excellency Governor Williams on Wednesday last. Despite the adverse weather conditions, about 60 persons went from St. John's and other places along the line to attend the opening. More would have been present but they thought the affair would be postponed until the day following. Lady Williams, Miss Dean, Sir E. P. Morris, the Minister of Agriculture, Minister of Fisheries Piccott and the Hon. R. K. Bishop were among the visitors.
The morning was taken up with the formal opening of the Docks. A schooner with 2800 qts. of fish on board was hauled up and let off again. There was no necessity to unload her. Since the Docks opened last spring over 100 vessels of all kinds have been repaired.
In the afternoon the Agricultural Exhibition was formally opened in Coughlan Hall by Hon. S. Blandford, Mr. H. Archibald being in the chair. Mr. Blandford addressed the gathering, and he was followed by Governor Williams, who spoke of his visits to different parts of the country and the beautiful scenery it possessed; the progress of the Colony during his years of office, and pointed out that the growth of the railway system was the forerunner of prosperity. New Zealand and South Africa had proved this.
Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris was the next speaker. He cordially thanked the Committee for including him in their list of invitations; spoke of the help and sympathy given to the agricultural movement by the Governor, and referred to the advances Hr. Grace was making along industrial and commercial lines. "If we knew that every town was doing the same as Harbor Grace, one of our greatest difficulties would be solved," declared Sir Edward.
The Chairman then addressed the gathering, after which an Address was presented to His Excellency. The Governor and party then proceeded to the Court House, where a reception was held.
Codol sold for from \$78 to \$80 per ton in hardwood packages. Pork and beef remain about stationary. Sugar will likely go lower.
