INCORPORATED SYNOD of the DIOCESE OF HURON

THIRTY-SEVENTH SESSION.

(Being the Twentieth under the Synod Act of Incorporation of 1874).

FIRST DAY.

The Synod was convened at London, on Tuesday, June 19th, 1894.

Divine Service was held in St. Paul's Cathedral at 10 o'clock a.m.

The Holy Communion was administered to the Clergy and Lay Representatives by the Lord Bishop, assisted by the Very Rev. G. M. Innes, Dean of Huron, and Revs. Canon A. C. Hill, Canon Evans Davis, Canon J. B. Richardson and Canon W. A. Young.

The Synod assembled at 3 p. m., in Bishop Cronyn Hall, for business.

The Lord Bishop in the chair.

The appointed prayers were said by the Ven. Archdeacon of London.

The rolls of Clergy and Lay Representatives were then called, when 99 Clergymen and 59 Lay Representatives answered to their names.

The ballot papers were, in accordance with the Canon, distributed to the members as their names were called.

**Report of Committee on Certificates and Assessments.**

The Committee appointed under Section 8 of the Constitution, for the examination of the certificates of election of Lay Representatives to Synod, beg to report as follows :—

1. That certificates have been furnished by 244 congregations for 286 representatives.

2. That the following congregations have elected substitutes for Lay Representatives for which no provision is made in the Constitution, viz.:

Parkhill, Lucan, Highgate, Delhi.

3. The following returns are incorrect :

Stratford, St. James', 3 delegates; 149 registered voters.  
Burford, Trinity, 2 delegates elected.

The first named struck off by the Chairman on the ground that the congregation is only entitled to one.

4. The following congregations have applied for reduction and remission of assessments :

Warwick, Fourth Line, and Kirkton, St. Paul's.

The Committee recommend that in the former case the arrears be cancelled and the assessment be reduced to one dollar. In the latter, that one-half of arrears be cancelled and the assessment be fixed at two dollars.

**THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.**

REVEREND BRETHERN AND BRETHERN OF THE LAITY :—

It is ours to acknowledge with devout and grateful hearts, God's infinite goodness in having spared us throughout another year, and in having made us the recipients of so many of His blessings, alike spiritual and temporal. We have, however, to record the names of some whom the Lord has removed from the Church militant to the Church triumphant, and given them, after the tears and sorrows of time, to rest forever among them that are sanctified by faith that is in Christ. Among these I shall mention :

1. The late Rev. Freeman Harding, so well known and so dearly loved by all who knew him. Ordained on the 22nd of February, 1866, in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, by Bishop Cronyn. 2. The late Rev. Edwin Winfield Murray. Ordained in 1848 by Bishop Burgess, the first Bishop of Maine. He was admitted into this Diocese from the United States by the Rt. Rev. Bishop Hellmuth, on the 1st April, 1876. After serving Berlin, as Incumbent, three years and four months, he removed to Dresden, where, owing to a severe stroke of paralysis received in 1882, he was superannuated. He died in perfect peace last year.

3. The late Rev. Clarence Widmer Ball. Ordained Deacon by the present Bishop of Toronto in 1882. He was appointed by the Rt. Rev. Bishop Hellmuth to the Incumbency of Thorndale, where he remained until the 1st of November, 1885. He then removed to Glanworth, and was subsequently Rector of Port Burwell and Viedna. His sudden and unexpected death last year is deeply regretted, not only by his late parish, which most sincerely loved him, but by a wide circle of most attached friends throughout the Diocese at large. He was called away in the midst of his work, the Lord having in store for him some higher and more joyous scenes on which his emancipated spirit was forever to gaze, and in which he was continually to dwell.

4. The late Venerable Francis William Sandys, D. D., Rector of Christ Church, Chatham, and Archdeacon of Huron. Born in Ballymahon, in the County of Longford, Ireland, in the year 1815. He received his education in Dublin. Removing to this country, he was ordained by the Rt. Rev. Bishop Strachan in 1845, and appointed as travelling missionary for all the district lying between Tyrconnell and Amherstburg. In 1849 he was appointed to the Rectory of Chatham; in May, 1866, he was collated to the Archdeaconry of Huron, by the first Bishop of Huron, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Cronyn.

I understand that it was mainly through his influence and exertion that this Diocese was originally set off from that of Toronto, and that it was subsequently by his unwearied labors that a division of the funds was effected, so that this Diocese was enabled to have a separate and automatic existence. The vacancy created by his death in the important Rectory of Chatham has been filled up by the appointment thereto of the Rev. Robert McCosh.

in Synod, the most general constitution of the Church. The long desired, which has at length, through the efforts of the Synod, been accomplished, so that to-day we are united to the United States,

and from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast, is now practically and organically one. The unification of our Church is a grand and imposing result, which will need far more than human reason to make harmonious in all its details, comprehending as it does so many widely remote Dioceses, and including such a variety of different and not always congruous interests.

Leaving, however, all these matters to be evolved in God's own time by that wisdom which He has promised His Church, I cannot but draw your attention to the wide and far-reaching gain which has been effected by the late momentous unification.

*First.*—The Canadian Church is now enabled for the first time in her history to speak as a united whole. No longer a collection of separate and widely remote integers. She is to-day an organized and well-developed body, whose strength, it is true, is yet untried, but whose possibilities for the future lie in the unknown regions of illimitable hope. With a General Synod representing every Diocese in British North America, and with a Primate whose nobility of character and pre-eminent fitness for his office will be admitted by all, our Church can make her voice to be heard both in the Government and abroad in a manner wholly impossible in the past.

*Secondly.*—A uniform scheme of general legislation and Canon law can now be established, by which the uses of all Dioceses may be effectually be harmonized, and the divergencies at present existing be wholly removed.

*Thirdly.*—The difficulties which to-day are felt to be so serious as to the removing of Clergymen from one Diocese to another, in the matter both of their status and the various Trust Funds in which they are interested, may possibly be removed. The present state of affairs, by which the standing of a clergyman is confined to the particular Diocese in which he is laboring, ought not any longer to exist. And though we do not at present see how all conflicting interests are fully to be met, and the matter adjusted on a solid and permanent basis, yet let us hope and pray that light may break through the present gloom, and that a speedy and satisfactory settlement may happily be reached.

*Fourthly.*—*The Unification of the Missionary Work of the Church.* The adjustment of the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions to the enlarged condition of our Church is one of the great questions which awaits solution. We do not know what lies before us in the untravelled future, but we have every reason to be thankful for the past. The present Canadian Church has laid a mighty foundation. Let those who follow us see that they only erect upon it a superstructure worthy of so grand a base.

#### THE PRESSING NEEDS OF THE CHURCH.

In view of the peculiar difficulties of our financial position, which this year gives me great anxiety and distress, I shall not



attempt to review our balance sheet, except to say that, notwithstanding all the supposed severity of the times, and the stringency of the money market, our general receipts are about the same as last year. Our total receipts for the year ending April 29th, 1893, were \$21,448.83, while those for the year just ended are \$21,397.11, a difference only of \$51.72. If now we look back at our receipts ten years past, namely, in the year ending April 30th, 1884, we find that they were \$13,995, or \$7,402 less than they are to day. Still, we are in the face of a very serious deficit, which imperatively demands not only thoughtful care, but immediate and vigorous action. As a contribution toward the general settlement, I would humbly submit the following considerations:—

*First.*—The real want of the Diocese is not more money, but more piety; not that our people should have larger bank accounts, but larger grace; not more gold in the hand, but more love in the heart. The well is deep, and the water within it plentiful, but there is in many instances nothing to draw with. The grace, the love, the self-sacrificing zeal, which would lead people freely and liberally to support the Church of Christ, seems in some cases—I am thankful to say, not in all—to be absolutely wanting. And here I must add that so long as giving is merely the result of caprice, fancy or whim, and not founded on any solid Biblical foundation, the results must always be unsatisfactory and disappointing in the extreme. I am a firm believer in that extremely ancient, scriptural and most righteous principle by which some are led to consecrate one-tenth of their incomes to the service of God, and to works of benevolence and charity. If this plan were only once adopted among professing Christians, our coffers would not only be full, but we would have abundance for all the work and development of the Church.

If we understand anything of the Bible, we know that one great underlying principle of that book is self-denial. Is money wanted? The Bible would say; Deny yourselves, and give it. Do without some luxury, some needless refinement. The modern method is not that of the Bible. It is: Give up nothing; but, rather, indulge your fancy and caprice. It says emphatically, do not *deny*, but *gratify* yourselves. The right use of money is one of those deep lessons which the grace of God alone in the heart can effectually solve. If the Church needs money—and it does, sorely—let it pray much; let it believe much; let it practice self-denial, and the money will come, providing only the object is God's glory and the welfare of His people.

*Secondly.*—I would respectfully urge on the laity the necessity of their undertaking far more earnestly than they have done in the past the work of supporting their own clergy. the Mission Fund should pay more, and the parishes less, toward the support of their respective clergymen. It is simply impossible to go on in the future as we have been doing in the past, and I would, therefore, implore the laity of those parishes whose clergy are receiving supplementary grants from the Mission Fund to kindly see if they cannot possibly relieve us by an increased exertion on their part. Not only would we be most grateful for their action, but I am sure the knowledge that they were supporting their own ministers themselves would give them an amount of satisfaction and self-respect which would more than compensate them for all the sacrifices they would have, necessarily, to make. It is astonishing what a parish can do if only it will make the effort, and the burthens they are sometimes called upon to bear, instead of being a hindrance and a clog to their advancement, are rather in some instances a stimulus and a help. They not only unite their people in the common cause, but they inure the limbs and strengthen the heart for further exertion and still greater success. An eagle cannot rise except it face the opposing wind; and parishes may rest assured that the last condition in which they can develop their energies, and expand the usefulness of their church, is one in which there is no battle to be fought or victory to be gained over self and its imperious interests, on the one hand, and difficulties, real and imaginary, on the other; but all things, from that sheer want of interest which always exists where no real exertion is made, are allowed idly to float on the unrippled surface of a waveless sea, unmoved, or even untouched, by the presence of a solitary wind.

*Thirdly.*—I would now respectfully draw the attention of the Clergy to one aspect of their confirmation classes.

After all the spiritual part of the confirmation class has been seen to, and the candidate been confirmed, I cannot but think it well that the Clergy should impress upon them all the important fact that, as they have now been admitted into all the privileges of our Church, they should now begin to bear some of its responsibilities, and though they might not be able to contribute much, yet I would strongly recommend that an account should be opened with each one, whether a minor or one of full age, and let each one contribute, if it be never so little, *something* towards the support of the Church. This plan would have two manifest advantages; first, it would, as a general rule, deeply interest the confirmed. They would feel from the very first that they had their part to take, and their burthen to bear; and secondly, it would give them that very kind of education which some of our people so much need—education in the Christian principle of supporting, and supporting liberally, the ministrations of our Church. If this plan were only adopted, I feel perfectly sure we would soon have a large body of liberal and systematic contributors throughout the Diocese. Let me ask you to give it your earnest and prayerful attention.

## SOME OF THE DANGERS OF THE DAY.

Amid all the unrest and disquietude of the present times, amid its social and financial upheavings, let me urge upon you, the Clergy of this Diocese, to reaffirm, to iterate and to reiterate, with all the boldness which the grace of God bestows, the grand foundation truths of the Gospel of our blessed Lord. The principles of anarchy and strife, now asserting themselves in various parts of Europe and America, will not down at the bidding of human authority, however strong or even resistless that may appear to be. The spirit of which I speak is that of the cyclone and the storm. It comes neither from the north, nor from the south, from the east, nor from the west. It is the fierce, unregenerate heart of fallen man unrestrained by any holy influence, and swept over by Satan, the prince and god of this world. The Church of Christ has her part to perform in the present emergency. She has to shake off the negligence and apathy of the past and preach, with fresh consecration and redoubled energy, the blessed Gospel of Him who died.

Men are crying out for greater *freedom*; and Christ says: "If the Son shall make you free ye shall be free indeed:" for a universal *brotherhood*. And Christ says: "That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in Thee:" for universal *wealth*. And St. Paul says: "That for this very end, Christ became poor, that we, through His poverty, might become rich." These are truths the world does not know, but which the Church must teach, line upon line, and precept upon precept, and, if need be, like the Monk Telemachus, throw herself into the very midst of the arena and die, that thus the lost may be forever saved. In these times, therefore, reassert the principles by which the whole sacramental host in Heaven and earth has been once and forever saved. Preach a Christ declared to be the Son of God, with power, by His resurrection from the dead. Preach to a guilty, sin-laden world, the atoning, infinite value of that precious blood which alone cleanseth from all sin. Preach Christ, our awful and Divine substitute, who on the bloody Cross became sin for us, that we, in Him, might become the Righteousness of God. Preach complete justification by faith in Him alone, that poor, soiled and weary sinners may stand at last arrayed in the imputed glory of their risen Lord. Preach Christ as God's great gift to man—free, present and eternal, and in the pulpit and in the parish, as you seek the sheep that may have wandered from the fold, cry aloud, and say: "Behold the Lamb of God that taketh away the Sin of the World."

## THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE.

I am sure that the very large attendance uniformly present must to some extent repay them for all their labor.

## HURON COLLEGE.

Huron College.—The Rev. Principal Miller and his excellent staff are laboring, as usual, for the development of the young men committed to their care, with zeal and fidelity. The examinations for orders, lately held, reflect in some instances great credit upon the patient industry with which they have been trained.

I must particularly call your attention to the Boys' College, which has, under the supervision of the Council, been established. The headmaster, Mr. John Andras, is highly qualified for the duties of his office. And I would strongly recommend to the members of the Diocese this most excellent institution.

The Boys' College needs your hearty support, and I trust you will recommend this good Church School to your friends and all others who may be anxious to have their sons well and judiciously trained. The School will (if the Lord permit) re-open in September next.

## THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

I have much pleasure in stating the excellent work that this noble institution is doing, gathering, as it does, fresh strength and vigor every year.

The total receipts for last year were \$4,774.92.

Already have they materially assisted the Diocese in the matter of Lion's Head, and in Kanyengh, to which latter they give \$100 a year. I have laid the matter of our financial embarrassment before one of their committees, and they have promised to take the whole matter into their mature consideration, awaiting for the present the action of this Synod.

#### PROGRESS IN CHURCH BUILDING.

Since last we met three very handsome new churches have been built.

1. St. Paul's Church, Wingham. This beautiful building has been put up by the zeal and self-denying exertions of the congregation, headed by their praiseworthy and indefatigable Rector, Mr. Louis Wood. Mr. Crowell Willson, well known to many here, has been most liberal in his contributions to this church. The building has cost \$10,000, all of which is already paid for, with the exception of some \$600. The capacity is 300, and is well filled.

2. St. James' Church, Hespeler. This beautiful edifice has been erected through the earnest labors of Mr. Jabez Edmonds, their devoted Rector. Especially must I mention the services of the Rev. John Ridley and the members of his flock, who have most largely contributed to it. The capacity is 250; cost, \$2,800; debt, \$900.

3. St. John's Church, Glencoe. This is another very handsome building, erected through the efficient labors of the Rev. Wm. Lowe. The capacity is 300; the cost, \$8,500; debt, \$4,000.

The Cathedral itself has now been enlarged and beautified and made more worthy of the position as the Cathedral Church of this vast Diocese of Huron. It will not be needful to say more, as your own eyes can see its beauty, and judge of its merit.

The Very Rev. the Dean, his Wardens and Building Committee, deserve the highest praise for the results arrived at, and the completion to which they have brought the structure.

### Receiving Report of Executive Committee.

The annual report of the Executive Committee was presented, and printed copies distributed. The printed audited accounts were also placed in the hands of the members of the Synod.

The Executive Committee beg to present herewith their annual report:—

The accounts for the year have been audited and printed, and are submitted herewith.

Your Committee, while acknowledging with pleasure that the total amount of collections and other offerings for all purposes show no serious falling off, and that the regular quarterly collections for the Maintenance and Mission Fund show a small increase, still have to regret that there is a considerable decrease in the Parochial Association Collections for the General Purposes Fund of the Diocese. This is no doubt partly accounted for by the financial depression which has existed during the past year.

The tabulated statement of collections from the various congregations throughout the Diocese is this year printed with the accounts before the meeting of Synod, and will be of assistance when considering the proposition for the collection of the necessary funds for Diocesan purposes in a different way, which has been made by the Committee appointed at last Synod to consider the deficiency in the Mission Fund, and which is printed in the convening circular, and will engage your attention at the proper time.

#### PAROCHIAL ASSOCIATION COLLECTIONS.

The amount of these collections received was \$4,639.61, being \$466.29 less than that of the previous year, and \$632.50 less than the year before that.

The payments from this fund include \$371.50 to Lay Readers, Indian Interpreters, and School Teachers; \$695 to the Widows and Orphans' Fund, under the Canon; \$737.50 for special grants; \$225 to the widows of commuted clergy, under the resolution passed at last Synod; \$385.80, expenses of General Synod and other items, leaving to be transferred to the Maintenance and Mission Fund the sum of \$131.20. The sum transferred at the end of the previous year was \$2,086.91.

A special collection was made in December last in response to an appeal from His Lordship the Bishop, as requested to be done at last Synod, and amounted to the sum of \$716.73.

The collections made on Bishop's visit amounted to \$105 97. The donations include the sum of \$300, the amount to which one of the active clergy of the Diocese is entitled according to the Canon and returned by him.

We also refer with pleasure to the parish of Ailsa Craig, Brinsley, and McGillivray, and their rector, the Rev. W. M. Shore, who have voluntarily relinquished their grant from the fund, and become a self-sustaining parish.

The thanks of the Synod are again due to the Women's Auxiliary for the sum of \$277 for Libn's Head Mission.

Since the transfer of the Synod Archdeacons' Fund to that of the latter fund has taken place, the Synod Expense Account is overdrawn \$1,443.45 at the end of the Provincial Synod.

Your Committee would regard thereto, especially in view of the fact that the amount is much larger than usual, as chargeable to this account.



## WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

It is with much pleasure that we mention the continued success of this fund. The two half-yearly collections amounted to \$1,249.95, and entrance fees and subscriptions to \$470. There was transferred from the General Purposes Fund, \$695, and from Widows and Orphans' Fund Investments Account, \$3,623.59. The sum of \$4,874.50 was paid to the widows and orphans of deceased clergymen, and \$1,000 carried to the credit of capital account. One widow, Mrs. Elliott, widow of the late Rev. Adam Elliott, died during the year, and three widows and one orphan added as follows:—Mrs. Ball, widow of the late Rev. C. W. Ball; Mrs. Murray, widow of the late Rev. E. W. Murray; Mrs. Sandys, widow of the late Ven. Archdeacon Sandys, and one orphan, daughter of the late Rev. Freeman Harding.

There are now twenty-five widows on the fund.

## COMMUTATION FUND.

There are at present four commuted clergymen on this fund, the Ven. Archdeacon Sandys having died during the year.

The number of superannuated clergy is now 18, the Rev. Freeman Harding and the Rev. E. W. Murray having died, and the following added since last Synod, viz.—The Rev. James Carrie, who had served 14 years in the Diocese; the Rev. William Shortt, 16 years; the Rev. Canon Chance, 22 years, and the Rev. Canon Smith, 28 years.

## CONSOLIDATED INVESTMENT ACCOUNT.

The moneys in the Synod's hands as Trustees have been kept fairly well invested during the year, and interest has in nearly every instance been satisfactorily paid.

The rate earned for the year was 5.84%.

A large block of debentures, bearing a high rate of interest, will fall due on the 1st of July next, which will take some time to reinvest, even at present rates. The rate for this year may, therefore, be expected to be somewhat lower than the last.

## DEPOSITORY.

The cash sales for the year amounted to \$1,168.70. There is on hand a good selection of books and Sunday School supplies.

## REQUESTS.

Your Committee have to acknowledge the receipt during the year from the executors of the late Mrs. Hill, of St. Mary's, of \$100, bequeathed to the Mission Fund, and \$200 to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

II. Your Committee asked for the privilege of meeting with the Council, which request was cheerfully granted them. The members of the Committee were all present, except the Rev. R. McCosh, who had in the meantime been elected a member of the College Council.

Certain proposals were made by the Committee, which they, to the best of their judgment, thought ought to be made, if the terms of the Memorial were to be carried out. The leading proposition was that it was advisable, if closer relations were to be created between the Synod of the Diocese and Huron College, that members of the Synod should be elected by the Synod to act as members of Huron College Council.

III. The Committee had its conference with the Council in March, 1893. The Council did not reply in time to enable the Committee to report to the Synod at the last meeting in June, 1893. Since then a reply has been sent, which is here given:

"Moved by Geo. F. Jewell, second by Rev. Canon Smith, and Resolved—That the Council of Huron College desire to convey to the Synod of the Diocese their warmest thanks for the interest taken in the welfare of the College and the appointment of a Committee to confer with them, with a view to its advancement and the closer identification of the mutual interests of the Diocese and the College, by means of Synodical representation upon the College Board and otherwise.

In view, however, of the fact that nearly all the members of the present Council are also members of the Diocesan Synod, and that the Bishop of the Diocese is also *ex-officio* President of the College, the Council do not recognize it as necessary for the purpose of the Synod that there should be any such further direct representation as is proposed, nor, as far as they are aware, is it usually the custom for other Synods to have such direct representation in the government of other theological colleges.

It will, perhaps, be deemed sufficient to meet the requirements of the case that the College should formally report its financial position and the principal features of its work through the Educational Committee of the College at the meetings of the Synod in each year, to which the Council are willing to agree.

Previous to the conference of the Synod Committee with the Council, steps had been taken to commence a partial canvass of the Diocese in order to obtain annual subscriptions to the Maintenance Fund. This was done because the Council were convinced of the necessity of such aid, if the work of the College is to be efficient and progressive, and also persuaded that the time has come when such assistance should be procurable in our midst. The work has, as yet, only been started, but the prospect of procuring the needed help is good. It is of much importance that this appeal should have the approval of the Synod, as it has of His Lordship the Bishop, so that as in the sister Diocese of Toronto, where liberal financial support, as well as the personal countenance of prominent men in the Diocese, is accorded to their theological College, the churchmen of Huron may be encouraged to aid similar efforts, which in this less wealthy field are in greater need of such help."

IV. Your Committee would also remind the members of the Synod that another memorial from the Alumni of Huron College was presented to the Synod, asking that a Committee on Education be appointed (pp. 30, 31, Journal, 1893), a proof that there is still a feeling that the Synod of Huron and Huron College ought to be in closer relation to each other.

V. Your Committee would state that—in addition to this clearly expressed desire on the part of those so deeply interested as the Alumni—their reasons for suggesting Synodical representation in the Council were briefly: (a) The whole life, energy, work, forces and pecuniary interests of the Church and the Diocese ought to come under the purview and cognizance of the Synod of the Diocese. (b) The laity as a body are not so familiar as others with colleges and the working

of colleges, and it seems to your Committee that it would arouse the interest and quicken the sympathies of the laity if they had a share, as members of Synod, in the government of the College, and if the affairs of the College were a part of the programme of the Annual Synod.

VI. Your Committee would state further that so far as their information goes, and they have taken care to be accurately informed, that with three exceptions, so clearly has it been realized that the support, usefulness and success of colleges in connection with the Church of England in Canada depend so much upon the active sympathies of the laity that large Diocesan and Synodical representation, by the Bishop's appointment and direct election, is welcomed and encouraged.

They would also state that Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist theological colleges are so completely in touch with their Synods, conferences and conventions, that the appointment of Professors is in their power.

VII. Your Committee, therefore, would reiterate their conviction that the life and usefulness of Huron College can be made fuller and increased by its coming more into line with the ecclesiastical and civil customs and usages of the people. They are also of the opinion that if this matter were fully explained to the generous founder of Huron College, the Rev. Alfred Peache, D.D., of whose character, as manifested by his good deeds, we wish to speak in the highest terms, he would readily consent to such modifications in the mode of election to the membership of Huron College Council as would admit representatives of the Synod.

We do not think it necessary to state that these observations and suggestions proceed from a deep interest in the welfare of Huron College.

We have but one desire: to see Huron College increase in strength and capabilities so as, with some measure of success, to provide what is needed in this age—a properly trained and cultured ministry.

VIII. Your Committee, in conclusion, would respectfully submit the following as a reasonable mode to have the Synod directly represented on the Council: Three members of the Synod to be elected at first to sit on the Council—one to serve three years, one to serve two years, one to serve one year; thereafter, at every annual meeting of the Synod, one to be elected to serve three years and to retire by rotation; such representative, however, to be eligible for re-election.

The Committee on the Archdeacons' Fund beg to report as follows:—

By an award, dated September 29th, 1859, it was provided that the Church Society of Huron should covenant that a certain sum provided by the Church Society of Toronto, supplemented by a further sum to be provided by the Church Society of Huron, should "be and remain forever a fund, from the proceeds of which should be paid a salary of £400 per annum to the Bishop of Huron for the time being, and a salary of £100 per annum for an Archdeacon of Huron for the time being."

From the date of the award until the month of February, 1867, a committee existed, known as the Episcopal Fund Committee, but, for sufficient reasons, it was not until the last mentioned date that action was taken in regard to what is termed the Bishops' and Archdeacons' Fund.

In February, 1867, a Committee was appointed "to report a by-law for the future management of the Episcopal Fund, and of the Bishops' and Archdeacons' Endowment Fund."

In June, 1867, the Committee, with some additions, was reappointed.

The moneys received at that date did not amount to the full sum required, so the by-law provided for the distribution of the interest in the proportion of one-fifth to the Archdeacon and four-fifths to the Bishop until the Fund should be completed. No by-law is reported as having been drafted in accordance with the foregoing, but

At the same meeting of the Church Society it was by resolution agreed:

That the \$400 appropriated for an Archdeacon of Huron, or so much of it as may be available from time to time, be, with the consent of Archdeacons Brough and Sandys, equally divided between the two Venerable Archdeacons, upon the understanding that the whole salary be paid to the survivor, and that thereafter the whole \$400 be paid to the Senior Archdeacon.

This arrangement seems to have been thenceforth acted upon, the \$400 "or such of it as was available" being paid in equal proportion to the two Archdeacons until the death of Archdeacon Brough, in March, 1873, from which date until his death, in the month of March, 1894, the whole \$400 was paid to Archdeacon Sandys.

In August, 1868, it was agreed that "all former resolutions passed by the Society, with reference to the disposition of the proceeds of the Episcopal Fund, be and are hereby rescinded."

The final settlement with the Diocese of Toronto, on the death of Bishop Strachan, is then referred to, and it was resolved that the several securities should form one fund, from the income of which \$400 should be paid to an Archdeacon, and the balance, after paying the necessary expenses, to the Bishop.

In November, 1871, it would appear that some doubts had been expressed as to whether the terms of the award, in regard to the constitution of the Episcopal Fund, had been fully complied with. A committee was, on the advice of the Bishop, appointed to examine into the question and report thereon.

In March, 1872, the Committee reported to the effect that the terms of the award had been substantially complied with, and the covenant entered into by Huron under the award fulfilled.

In their report the Committee recite the report of the Committee of August, 1868, in relation to the Fund, and recommend that a by-law be passed directing that the Consolidated Fund "shall stand, be, and remain forever a Fund, from the proceeds of which shall be paid a salary of \$400 (less the percentage for management) for an Archdeacon of Huron, so long as securities as these (sic) received from the Diocese of Toronto produce six per centum interest," but with power to make a proportionate reduction in future, according to the decrease in the rate of interest, should such reduction take place, and that the balance, less the necessary expenses, shall form the stipend of the Bishop of the Diocese for the time being.

The report was adopted and a committee appointed to draft a by-law "for the carrying out of the recommendation" thereof.

In June, 1872, the Committee reported a by-law accordingly in the terms *verbatim* of the report, so far as its enacting clause relating to the Episcopal and Archdeacons' Fund was concerned.

Your Committee must, from the above recited facts, ascertained by an examination of the original minutes of the Church Society, assume that the Episcopal and Archdeacons' Fund was duly constituted as provided by the terms of the award.

But your Committee feel bound to direct attention to the omission of the Synod to charge the amount paid to the Archdeacon or Archdeacons with the expenses of management, as directed by the by-law, nor, except as above mentioned, has any reduction ever been made consequent on the rate of interest falling below six per cent.

The By-law of 1872 became a By-law of the Synod in 1874, and a Canon in

the consolidation of 1878-9; but with the important alteration that the provisions charging the Archdeacon's share in the Fund with expenses of management, and also directing that the payment should be dependent on the rate of interest received, are omitted. By throwing the whole expenses of management on the Bishop's portion, which forms only a part of the Episcopal stipend, and by paying the full amount, any loss of interest notwithstanding, it is clear that a certain charge has annually been made upon the general purposes, and ultimately Missions' Fund, in order to pay the \$400 in question.

The clause directing the disposition of the Fund is re-enacted in the present Canon.

The Committee recommend :

That the present Canon be so amended as to declare the power of the Synod over the disposal of the Fund subject to the terms of the award; and also to provide that the Archdeacon's portion of the Fund, as directed by by-law of 1872, be chargeable with expenses of management and subject to reduction, should the rate of interest fall below six per cent.

### 3. The report of Committee on Temperance :

In presenting their second yearly report to the Synod, the members of this Committee desire to express their thankfulness that the subject of Temperance is evidently engaging the more serious attention of the whole Church of England.

Some weeks ago the Committee sent out a series of nine questions to the clergy of the Diocese upon this subject. They desire now to express their thanks for the most careful way, as a rule, in which these questions were answered, and for the light thrown upon the subject by the replies. From them it is gathered that it is most difficult in this land, except in large centres, to plant the "C. E. T. S." in our parishes. This does not imply, necessarily, a lack of interest in the work of the Society, but it means, first, that many of our people are total abstainers already, and, secondly, that it is difficult from the sparseness of material in our average parish to provide for programmes and to carry on meetings. A very general feeling is expressed that the Sunday School should be in itself a "Band of Hope," and all the young taught in due season the truths underlying the word Temperance, as contained in the Church Catechism.

With reference to the question of Prohibition, upon which your Committee recognize there is much diversity of opinion in the minds of the most conscientious and the best of people, it is found (so far as the replies are given) that there is a considerable number of our clergy, especially our younger clergy, who view it with favor. Some of our most hard-working and thoughtful men are earnest advocates of it. A few of the clergy in their answers disapprove of it.

The clergy were also asked their opinion (question No. iv.) as to the desirability of making total abstinence a prerequisite to ordination. While some consider it undesirable, a number favor such a rule. As this question is to come before the Synod on a direct motion, the Committee refrain from further comment on it.

There is a general expression of opinion that the subject of Temperance should be more prominently brought before the Synod, while there is considerable diversity of opinion as to the method by which this should be brought about.

With reference to question 7, there is an almost unanimous opinion that the Church of England in Canada (as declared recently by several writers in the press) suffers in membership and reputation by not taking a more active interest in and identifying herself more closely with the Temperance cause.

Your Committee deem it by far the wisest course to give to this Synod the well-digested and matured thought of the assembled wisdom of the Mother

Church, rather than their own opinions upon this whole momentous, complicated and vexed question of the best remedies for the sin of intemperance. Thus they now bring before you the *Report of Convocation upon Intemperance*, issued as recently as February last, feeling sure that it will be received with calmness of judgment, with interest, and with prayerful consideration. While your Committee express no opinion themselves upon the question of prohibition, they do most earnestly desire to draw the special attention of the Synod and the Church to the calmly expressed conviction of Convocation upon this matter. They, therefore, here introduce the said report, the first part of which it will be seen refers to this subject:—

REPORT OF CONVOCATION.

"It becomes, in our opinion, the plain duty of all members of the Church of England, and especially of the clergy, to engage with more serious energy in the truly Christian work of our national emancipation from the forces of intoxicating drinks, which bring evils so deadly and so continuous, issuing in the ruin of countless souls. The present Archbishop of Canterbury uses these emphatic words:—'Non-legislative remedies are open to each and all, from the personal example, which shuns what may be a peril to one's self or others, to the many modes of union by which the strong assists the weak, and the customs of society are purified and reformed.' But legislative remedies ought to be made and supported by persons of all parties, classes, and religious communities. Thus common justice requires that the absolute control of the liquor traffic should be in the hands of those who are most deeply and directly affected by it. The people have an indefeasible right to *diminish or do away* with a traffic, if they come to the conclusion that it has no legal or moral ground of existence, and in cases when, so far from being demanded by them for the supply of their needs, they consider its abnormal development to be the most fruitful source of the misery and ruin of themselves and of their homes.

As to remedies, the Committee of Convocation make the following sugges-  
tions:—

1st.—Wherever practicable, the formation of Temperance Associations.

2nd.—Total abstinence. While on the one hand we reprobate the condemnation of all use of intoxicants as though such use were sinful—a condemnation which in the face of Scripture is unpermissible and uncharitable; we reprobate no less distinctly the attempt to brand total abstinence as though it were simply due to weak onesidedness, fanatical folly, or Manichean opinions. In their arguments on this question we would recommend all Christians to avoid in both directions the falsehood of extremes.

The Committee desire to call attention to the earnest reasoning of St. Thomas of Aquino, and they declare that those who are inclined to condemn the practise of total abstinence should at least bear in mind the fact that a large number of our most eminent surgeons and physicians have pointed out the dangers which may often be involved in the moderate use of alcohol.

Again, we would suggest that the clergy should more frequently impress on their parishioners that drunkenness is a sin, as well as a disease and a curse. The drunkard is not only a victim of the conditions which thrust temptation upon him at every turn, he is a responsible moral agent, who directly contributes to his own destruction, as well as a sufferer from conditions which a fatal carelessness has permitted to be accumulated around him. We doubt whether drunkards are sufficiently taught the duty of never abandoning the struggle of their besetting vice. We would also especially urge the importance of education, based on sound religious principles. We think it highly desirable that the children of the nation should be trained from their earliest years to recognize the deadly evils of the physical, moral and social, to which they will render themselves liable if they allow themselves to fall into that sin of intemperance for which the only absolute effectual remedy for many of them is total abstinence. *For them at least total*

abstinence becomes a precautionary remedy of the utmost necessity, surrounded, as they are, by a complication of dangerous conditions, liable to be corrupted by daily contact with bad example, exposed to a multiplicity of incessant and violent temptations, and above all, born, as so many are, with that alcoholic taint in the blood which renders them liable to an intense hereditary craving, such as if once yielded to can never afterwards be resisted, save by a sovereign miracle of Divine Grace.

We cannot venture to recommend the adoption of the Gothenburg or Burgen systems, or the scheme which is proposed in the Bill of the Bishop of Chester, and for the following reasons:—1. It is true that Sweden and Norway, once the most intemperate countries in Europe, have become among the foremost for temperance and thrift; but much of the improvement is not due to those particular methods, but to antecedent legislation, by which, forty years ago, farm distillation was prohibited, power given to the people to prevent the local sale of intoxicants, and the number of rural public houses so much reduced (without any compensation) that often not one may be seen in a day's journey. We consider it doubtful whether it is really desirable to add new attractions to places where drink is sold. We are specially apprehensive of the effects of such attractions on multitudes of young persons who have been trained in habits of total abstinence. Many of the most active promoters of temperance reform, too, would seriously object to any scheme which would give to the community a direct pecuniary interest in the profits gained by the sale of drink.

We strongly recommend the earlier closing of hotels on week-day evenings, especially on Saturday, and a great reduction in the number of drinking houses throughout the land. There is an unanimous opinion that the number of licensed houses is far in excess of the needs of the population. Lastly, the rigid enforcement of the penalties now attached to drunkenness, especially in the case of licensed persons who allow drunkenness to occur on their premises.

This house further expresses an earnest wish that some organization in connection with the Church of England Temperance Society should, if possible, be established in every parish, and specially commends such efforts for promoting devotional meetings, and the use of intercessory prayer for the advancement of Temperance, as are provided by the Prayer Union of the Society.

We respectfully urge the subject of Temperance, as affecting the entire social life of the nation, upon the consideration of all connected with the Universities, the Public Schools, and Collegiate Institutes.

We desire to express our sense of the importance of the subject of the Temperance work of the Church having a due place in the training of candidates for *Holy Orders* in the Theological Colleges, as affecting the efficiency of their future ministerial work.

We urge upon all Church people the desirability of encouraging all measures that indirectly tend to withdraw people, and more especially young men, from the temptations that are presented by public-houses and by drink."

Reverting to their own opinions, while your Committee have no sympathy with the contention that drinking an intoxicant is *per se* a sin, yet they do desire emphatically to point out the high privilege and Christian duty of all members of the Church abstaining from the use of those intoxicating drinks, as beverages, immoderate indulgence in which has been in every age condemned as a sin by the Divine Spirit. This view is in accordance with that enunciated by His Lordship the Bishop in his first charge in this Diocese.

Finally, your Committee, in looking over the whole field of Temperance energy, reform and work, would commend this cause to the prayers of all believing people, and in the words of the poet would cry:

"Ring out a slowly dying cause,  
Its bloodshed, poverty and strife;  
Ring in a nobler mode of life,  
With sweeter manners, purer laws."

#### Receiving Notices of Motion.

#### 1. By Mr. Matthew Wilson, Q.C.,

That, as one of the objects of the Provincial Synod of Canada was, from its formation, declared to be to promote the further consolidation and united action of the whole of the Dioceses of British North America;

And as a General Synod has now been formed, with jurisdiction extending over the whole Dominion of Canada upon the following fundamental principles :

"We declare that the General Synod, when formed, does not intend to, and shall not, take away from or interfere with any rights, powers, or jurisdiction of any Diocesan Synod within its own territorial limits as now held or exercised by such Diocesan Synod.

"We declare that the constitution of a General Synod involves no change in the existing system of Provincial Synods; but the retention or abolition of the Provincial Synods is left to be dealt with according to the requirements of the various Provinces as to such Provinces and the Dioceses therein may seem proper."

And, as such General Synod may exercise jurisdiction over almost (if not quite) all the subjects and matters which might come under the consideration of and lead to action on the part of the Provincial Synod of Canada ;

And, as all the Dioceses represented in the Provincial Synod of Canada are and will be represented in the General Synod of the Dominion, and, as in matters affecting the general welfare of the Church, it is desirable to secure full representation, free deliberation and united action, without the burden of over-legislation ;

And, as provision is now made by the constitutions for the holding of the Provincial Synod of Canada, in September in every third year, or oftener, and for the holding of the General Synod in September, 1896 ;

And, as no alteration of the Constitution or Canons of the Provincial Synod shall come into operation until it has been confirmed at a second session of the Provincial Synod ;

And, as the cost of a Session of a General Synod (which is borne by the various Dioceses in the whole Dominion) amounts to about \$3,000, and the cost of a Session of a Provincial Synod (which is borne, as an additional expense, by the Dioceses in the Province only) amounts to over \$3,000 ; and, as in addition thereto, considerable incidental expenses are necessarily borne by individual members of the Church in connection with such Sessions :

(1) Be it therefore resolved, that in the opinion of this Synod it is desirable that, so far as practicable, the General Synod should supersede the Provincial Synod of Canada, and the latter should meet (if at all) only when the necessity of any particular case may require a session thereof, and that the Constitution of the Provincial Synod should be amended at the two next concurrent sessions thereof ;

(2) That the various Diocesan Synods in this Province be respectfully requested to unite in the endeavor to procure such amendments to the Constitution and By-laws of the Provincial Synod as will abolish or materially reduce the number of sessions and expense of the Provincial Synod, and as will conduce to the strength, usefulness and efficiency of the General Synod.

#### Letter from Bishop of Algoma.

The Bishop read to the Synod the following :—

Bisphurst, Sault St. Marie, Ont., June 11, 1894.

My dear Lord Archbishop :

Since my last communication to your Grace, the subject then hinted at has been taking more definite and tangible shape in my mind, and I have now come practically to the conclusion that it will shortly be my duty to place in your hands my resignation as Bishop of Algoma.

I shall take this step very reluctantly, and with many sincere regrets, but only because in taking it I shall be complying with the recommendations strongly urged upon me by both my medical advisers, in Montreal, and in London, England.

I need scarcely say that the unsatisfactory financial position of my Diocese, and the constant strain of anxiety which it imposes, have contributed largely to the decision referred to, but the primary considerations which will move me to it have to do with conditions entirely inseparable from my missionary work, and hence lying altogether beyond the reach of ecclesiastical legislation.

I shall take the liberty of forwarding a copy of this letter to each of the Bishops in this Ecclesiastical Province.

### Receiving Reports of Committees.

#### 8. The report of Committee on Education:

In accordance with your instructions, we beg to bring before the members of the Synod a report on the educational work being done in the Diocese.

We would first speak in reference to the institutions doing educational work on the lines of the Church of England.

#### HURON COLLEGE.

As we understand that the Huron College Council purpose making a special report to the Synod, we will but briefly refer to the noble and excellent work being carried on under the able and energetic Principal and Faculty. There were during the past year 17 students in attendance; one in his fourth year; three in their third year; seven in their second, and six in their first. The indefatigable labors of the learned Principal and Faculty have been eminently successful in not only maintaining the standard of the work, but in improving the same. We

understand that the College is much in need of hearty Diocesan support. In this wealthy section of Ontario it should only be necessary to bring the needs of the training College of the Clergy before the people to secure at once all necessary support. For every reason should this responsibility resting upon the Diocese be willingly assumed, and the support freely accorded; for to permit the work of the Divinity School of the Diocese to be hindered or hampered through lack of support is nothing more than impeding in a most important and essential department the work of Our Lord in this Corner of His Vineyard.

A report relating to this Institution is attached hereto.

#### HURON COLLEGE—SCHOOL FOR BOYS.

This Institution was established last year, by the Bishop of Huron and the Council of the Huron College, with the object of providing a Classical and Mathematical training for boys, at the same time joining with such training religious influences and instruction, in conformity with the doctrines of the Church of England. During this, the first year of its existence, the school has been becoming more and more established, and the number of students rapidly increasing, the number being now 16; and we feel no doubt that it will receive the encouragement and support of those who value a thorough school, and at the same time a sheltered home for their boys. The long experience and ability of the Headmaster, Mr. Andras, assure the establishment of the school upon a solid basis.

A report relating to this Institution is attached hereto.

#### HELLMUTH LADIES' COLLEGE.

This Institution has completed its twenty-fifth year, and its eleventh year under the able management of Principal and Mrs. English. During the year seventy-one students have been enrolled, and at the recent "Commencement," eleven young ladies received their Diplomas; three graduating from the School of Literature; four from the School of Music; three from the School of Art, and one from the School of Elocution.

Three students have been confirmed by His Lordship the Bishop, who takes the deepest interest in the work and religious welfare of the College.

The Faculty, twelve in number, are talented and enthusiastic educators, devoted to their great work; and equipped as the College is, to meet the fullest requirements of the young ladies, there have been excellent and successful results in the training of the students in all those things which appertain to true and intelligent womanhood.

The great active and personal interest taken in the College by Her Excellency Lady Abetdeen, who has become a Patron, has also contributed much to the success of the past year.

This College for Girls, and the Huron College School for Boys, constitute two very important factors in the educating of the youth, not only in secular study, but on Church of England lines, and they should receive all the encouragement and support that this Diocese can give.

This Committee would also express their conviction that parents and guardians make a lamentable mistake when they send their children to be educated in Roman Catholic Institutions.

#### THE NATIONAL SCHOOLS.

It is a matter of regret that in the National Schools there is not more adequate provision for training the scholars in the Scriptures and religious truth. It is impossible for a Clergyman, in addition to his exacting parish work, to give the necessary religious instruction in the Public schools continuously, for it is by line upon line, and precept upon precept, that religious instruction becomes effective.

Your Committee would suggest the advisability of having a simple Scripture History drawn up, if it would be possible to compile one which would be generally acceptable for use in the schools.

#### UNIVERSITY ENLARGEMENT.

Finally, we would suggest the importance of steps being taken towards University Enlargement in this Western Centre, in order to meet the requirements of the youth in this rich and populous portion of Ontario.

Your Committee would recommend that the Committee on Education be continued as a Standing Committee of the Synod.

#### 9. The report of Committee on Sunday Schools :

The Sunday School Committee beg to submit the following report:—

First, as regards the Depository : While the sales have not been quite as large as in former years, they have been satisfactory, and particularly so from the fact of an unusually large number of Prayer Books having been put in circulation in the Diocese.

Attention is invited to the supply of Confirmation Memorial cards and Teachers' and Scholars' admission cards issued by the Sunday School Institute, which will be found in our Depository, as well as a full line of suitable books. We have also added to our stock a supply of attractive Marriage certificates.

The question of supporting a Foreign Missionary, as proposed last year, has been left in abeyance owing to the present circumstances of the Diocese, but it is hoped that the time will soon come for some decided effort in that direction. In this connection, the Committee would recommend that there be introduced in each Sunday School a Children's Birthday Missionary Box as a useful method of raising means for missionary purposes.

In view of the large deficit in Diocesan finances, the Committee would take the liberty of drawing the attention of the Synod to the desirability of devoting the Lenten collections of the Sunday Schools to our own Mission Fund.

Secondly, as to the state of our schools: The Committee regret that the returns from the Sunday Schools sent in response to their request are not as complete as in 1890, and consequently will not be as valuable as they might have been for purposes of comparison.

Reports have been received from 173 Sunday Schools, representing 1,675 teachers and officers, and 14,838 scholars, making a total of 16,513. The Committee must, however, here warn the Synod that these figures, owing to the exceedingly defective returns sent in, are far from representing the full Sunday School strength of the Diocese, which exceeded 21,000 at the time of our former report. Teachers' meetings are held weekly by 34 schools, and monthly or occasionally by 42 others. Thirty-six schools are open only during part of the year, the time being from 5 to 8 months.

The Church Catechism has a place on the lesson scheme of nearly every school reporting, but the reports sent in would indicate that in many cases it holds a very subordinate position. The Sunday School Committee regrets that so few make use of the exposition kept on hand in the Depository. The memorizing of Scripture would also seem as a rule not to hold the high place that it should, although there are several of the clergy and Sunday School workers who give it special attention.

Children's services are held monthly, or quarterly, in 37 congregations, but in general they do not appear to be considered a necessary part of Church work, as only in 43 others are they held even occasionally. One parish reports weekly children's services.

There are 133 schools which are supported by the Sunday School offertory. The others by subscriptions and grants, supplemented in a few cases by Sunday School entertainments. In some schools the expense is borne by the incumbent.

The expenses of 129 schools amounted to \$5,553.96, but although one school reports cause of encouragement in the increase of missionary interest, the feeling does not seem to be general, as only 79 schools contribute for missions, the amount being \$1,738.27. Only 33 schools report having special school accommodation apart from the church; and 116 own libraries, aggregating 17,996 vols. One library, reported as having been in use 30 years, is certainly open for renewal, when means permit.

The grounds for encouragement in this work have their expressed foundation in the promises of God and the presence of the Holy Spirit manifested in greater self-denying interest and better work by the teachers, increased attendance of scholars, both at school and at the church services; growth of Bible classes, some of which are of necessity held during the week; greater interest shown by young people, especially young men, in the work of the Church, owing largely to the existence of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, the Society of Christian Endeavor, and similar organizations. A number of new schools have been opened; the Committee would note 3 in one mission, making 5 schools in charge of that one clergyman.

While some clergymen are happy in being able to report that they have no difficulties, the great majority are not so fortunate. With most, the giants and the cities walled up to Heaven have their counterpart in the deadly indifference of parents to the spiritual well-being of their children, their responsibility being considered at an end when they hand them over to the Sunday School. The equipment of the Sunday School to undertake even its legitimate share of this work is very imperfect. Owing to the scarcity of school buildings, it is difficult to maintain proper order and discipline, while a spirit of irreverence is unconsciously fostered by using the church proper for Sunday School purposes. The congregations are said in many cases to entirely ignore the Sunday School, and as a result male teachers of position and influence are conspicuously absent from its work. The majority of our schools plead for teachers who, by self-denial and self-sacrifice, will qualify themselves for this work in which there are such immense possibilities for fruitful service.

The Committee desire to thank the clergy for their kind co-operation in compiling their report. If those who have hitherto neglected the matter will attend to it on their return from Synod, and mail the required information to the Secretary, it will be in time for publication in the Synod Journal.

The Sunday School Committee would also say that in some of the reports the lack of a correctly kept register is evident (one clergyman not knowing whether he had a school building or not). They would respectfully urge the keeping of class books and registers in such a condition that an accurate report as to the state of the Sunday School could be given at any time, and would suggest that the clergymen require from the superintendent of each Sunday School under his charge such a report quarterly.

Diocese to assist them in making this annual gathering a success. All who have attended the Conventions in the past have borne testimony to their enjoyable and profitable character as seasons of brotherly intercourse and inspiration to renewed efforts in the Master's service.

The attention of the Committee has been again directed to collecting information as to the extent to which Lay Help is availed of in the church elsewhere than in Canada, as well as in the Dioceses of the Dominion. Lay Help in the Mother Land was particularly referred to in the report of the Association for 1892. In 1893 the accounts received from Great Britain's transmarine possessions were summarized, and in the next report the progress of the Lay Help movement in the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States will be noticed. Thus will have been presented a picture of Lay Help in the whole, great Anglican Branch of the Church Catholic. What, it may be asked, do these returns show?

- (1) That Lay Help is rapidly becoming, not the exception, but the rule.
- (2) That wherever Bishops and Clergy have sought for and secured Lay Help, it is admitted to have been of large and unquestionable benefit.
- (3) That where it has not been secured, its loss is felt, and its absence regretted.

(4) That as a means of church extension, in many places the Association of Laymen, under a lay superintendent, but subject to Episcopal supervision and direction, is found eminently useful, and as the first step towards planting the church and preparing the way for parochial organization.

(5) That by these and other means the use of Lay Help creates an increased demand for an ordained clergy, and in no case supersedes the necessity for their appointment, when the field is ripe for it. The Committee have had considerable correspondence with members of the Synod of Niagara, and are glad to observe that the foundation of a Lay Workers' Association in that Diocese has been decided on.

The Committee have carefully avoided drawing to more than a limited amount upon the funds of the Synod. The amount this year expended is \$48.00, and during the current year even less, it is believed, will be required.

That a copy of the memorial, and of this resolution, be transmitted to the Bishops of the other dioceses in Ontario, and to the Secretaries of their respective Synods, with a view to bring this matter under their notice, and soliciting their co-operation in the same.

Be it, therefore, resolved that this Synod do also appoint a committee, with the view of co-operating with the Committee of the Synod of Toronto in the furtherance of this important movement in the interest of the Church in the Civil Province of Ontario, and to report at the next meeting of the Synod.

**CANON XXVIII.**

That Canon XXVIII. be amended as follows :—

**CANON XXVIII.**

**ON MISSION AND CHURCH EXTENSION FUND.**

**PREAMBLE.**—Whereas it is desirable to make each parish, as soon as practicable, self-supporting, and to extend the ministrations of the Church to all her members within the bounds of the Diocese, it is hereby enacted :—

1. There shall be a fund known as the Mission and Church Extension Fund, which shall consist of the proceeds of such invested funds and general offerings of the Diocese as are available for the purpose of this Canon.

2. The duty of maintaining the clergyman, and providing him with a residence, shall rest primarily upon the parish receiving his services, and aid from the Mission and Church Extension Fund shall be regarded as temporary, to be reduced or withdrawn as soon as the circumstances of the parish will admit.

3. No clergyman shall be a recipient from the Mission and Church Extension Fund whose parish is assessed to the amount of his canonical stipend as hereinafter provided, including the net proceeds of any endowment. Except in the case of a new or travelling mission no clergyman shall receive from the Mission and Church Extension Fund more than three hundred dollars in any one year, and should any parish fail to pay the amount for which it is assessed, the clergyman thereof shall receive from the Mission and Church Extension Fund only so much as with the sum assessed, and the proceeds of any Endowment, would have brought his stipend up to the canonical amount as hereinafter provided.

4. At the September meeting of the Executive Committee there shall be appointed annually, from the members thereof, a committee to be called the Missions Committee, whose duty it shall be to assess all the parishes in the Diocese for such sums as, after due enquiry, they may be adjudged able to contribute towards the maintenance of their respective Clergymen.

5. The Missions Committee shall consist of the Bishop, who shall be Chairman, and seven Clergymen and seven Laymen, of whom four of each order shall be elected by ballot by the Executive Committee, and the remainder shall be nominated by the Bishop. Five members of the Missions Committee shall be a quorum.

The Missions Committee shall meet quarterly in the same months as the Executive Committee, or may be called together by the Bishop at any time.

6. The Clergy in parochial charge in each Rural Deanery, together with the Church Wardens and Lay Delegates of the several parishes, shall meet annually in the month of September, the Rural Dean presiding, or in his absence, the Senior Clergyman present, to consider matters affecting the interests of the church in the Rural Deanery. At this meeting a Committee shall be appointed, consisting of the Rural Dean, who shall be Convener and Chairman when present, and two Clergymen and two Laymen being communicants, of whom three, including the Rural Dean, shall be a quorum, which Committee, when requested by the Missions Committee, shall act as Assessors for the purposes of this Canon, they shall co-operate with the Clergy of the Deanery in raising and increasing the contributions to the several Funds of the Diocese, and report to the Bishop any openings for extending the Church within the limits of the Deanery. Nothing in this clause shall prevent the Missions Committee of Synod from ascertaining by other agencies than that herein provided the amount for which any parish or parishes may properly be assessed.

7. Immediately after assessment the Secretary-Treasurer shall notify the Churchwardens of each parish of such assessment, who may, if not satisfied therewith, appeal against it to the next ensuing meeting of the Missions Committee. If the appeal is not allowed by the Missions Committee, it shall be reported by them to the next ensuing meeting of the Executive Committee, whose decision thereon shall be final. All appeals shall be signed by the Churchwarden or Churchwardens.

8. No Clergyman or Layman shall act as assessor of his own parish, and no member of the Executive Committee or of the Missions Committee shall vote on any question affecting the assessment of his own parish.

9. The Vestry of each parish, whose clergyman receives aid from the Mission and Church Extension Fund, shall vote by resolution the amount for which it is assessed and record the same in the minutes of the Vestry, and cause a certified copy thereof to be sent to the Secretary-Treasurer of Synod. It shall be the duty of the Church Wardens to remit the assessed amount of stipend in quarterly payments, or the clergyman's receipt therefor, to the Secretary-Treasurer, who shall pay such amount as is received from the parish, and in any case the sum due from the Synod.

10. In the event of a parish failing to meet its obligation in the last aforementioned regard, the Secretary-Treasurer shall report the fact to the Executive Committee, who shall direct the default of payment to be made the subject of enquiry by the Missions Committee of the Deanery or such other agency as the Executive Committee may see fit to employ.

11. The parochial assessments shall be revised annually at the December meeting of the Missions Committee, for the year commencing May 1st then next ensuing, or on reorganisation or change of incumbency.

12. The scale of grants shall be as follows:—

In each case such an amount as shall, with the parish assessment, and the net proceeds of any endowment, make up the stipend per annum, as follows:—

(a) For Deacons .....	\$ 600
(b) For Priests of less than 7 years in active service as Priests in the Diocese .....	700

It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer at the beginning of each financial year to notify the Rector and Churchwardens of each parish of the amount of their required contribution, basing it on last annual statistical report to the Bishop, and the Missions Committee of each Rural Deanery shall act in co-operation with the Clergyman and Churchwardens of each parish in raising the same.

MY LORD,—I take the liberty of enclosing resolutions relating to Prison Reform, which I would respectfully submit for approval.

The reforms which we are asking of our legislators have now been before the public for over three years; they have met with the approval of all of our best citizens, and our legislators admit that they are wise, practical and necessary, but they are evidently waiting until impelled by force of public opinion. We hold that this is not as it should be. In matters of moral reform, as well as in other public matters, surely we have a right to expect our legislators to take the initiative. A strong resolution in the line indicated will very materially strengthen the cause of Prison Reform in Canada.

Adjournment of the Synod.

The Bishop then rose to dismiss the Synod, and addressed the members as follows :

REV. BROTHERS AND BROTHERS OF THE LAITY :—

I desire to thank God, and also to congratulate you on the important and progressive work which has been effected by this Synod now drawing rapidly to a close.

The discussions which have taken place on the state of our finances, and, above all, the amended Canon which has been happily passed, cannot fail in producing good results, and I here desire publicly to thank the Rev. Alfred Brown, Rector of St. James', Paris, for the ability, zeal and patient industry which he has shown in elaborating the Canon in the first instance, and in bringing it into completion, in the second. To him mainly the credit is due of having devised and promoted it.

I think that an important step has been taken in a right direction in having laid down the principle that henceforth a certain sum will be expected from each Parish, according to the number of the families, leaving it to the Parish itself to raise the amount according to the plan best suited for its capacity.

I think also that the enlargement of the sphere of the Executive Committee work, by giving to Ruri-decanal Chapters the power at least to express an opinion on the proper assessment of Parishes, is a wise and much needed improvement. It will vastly increase the interest of the Diocese at large in the work of the Executive Committee, and will remove the complaint of some that the government of the Diocese is too much centralized in London.

I will gladly accept the suggestion that I should publish an appeal to the Diocese on the subject of proportionate giving, and am sure that, with God's blessing, if our people would only give the tenth of their incomes to the service of God, and the works of benevolence and charity, our treasurer would not only have enough, but to spare.

I am pleased also to endorse the principle laid down by the Committee on the State of the Diocese, that *free churches* should by all means be encouraged; I do not believe that pew rents are in harmony with the brotherhood of the Saints or the doctrines laid down by our blessed Lord.

Trusting that God's blessing may rest upon our undertakings, and that the Diocese may progress in every good word and work, I now commend you to His eternal love and care.

The doxology was sung, and the Bishop dismissed the Synod at 2 p.m., with the benediction.
