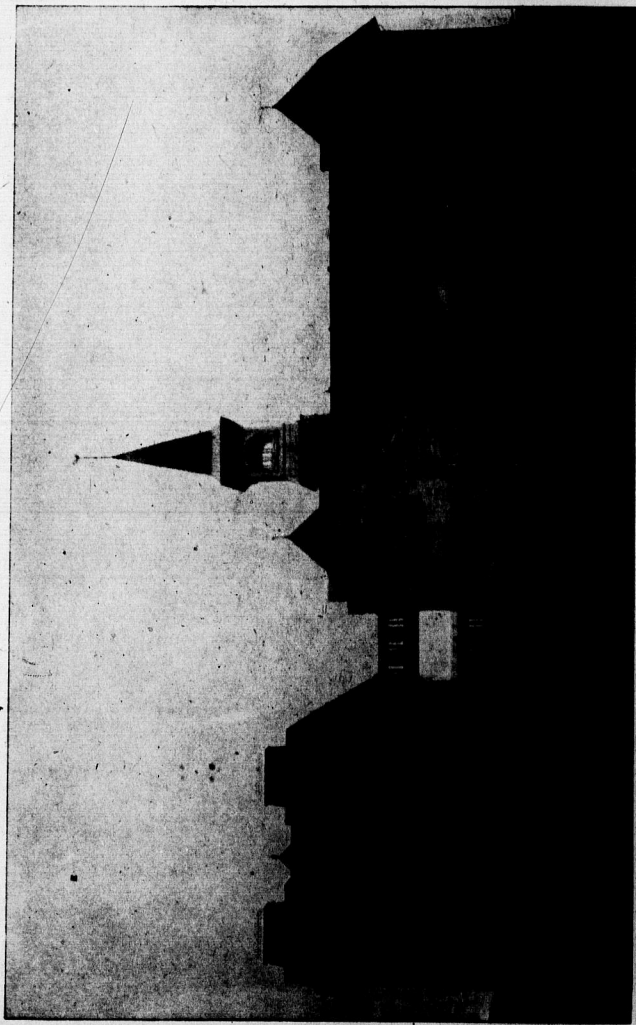

GEORGE MOORE MEMORIAL HOME — AND — OLD PEOPLE'S HOME AT LONGUE POINTE.

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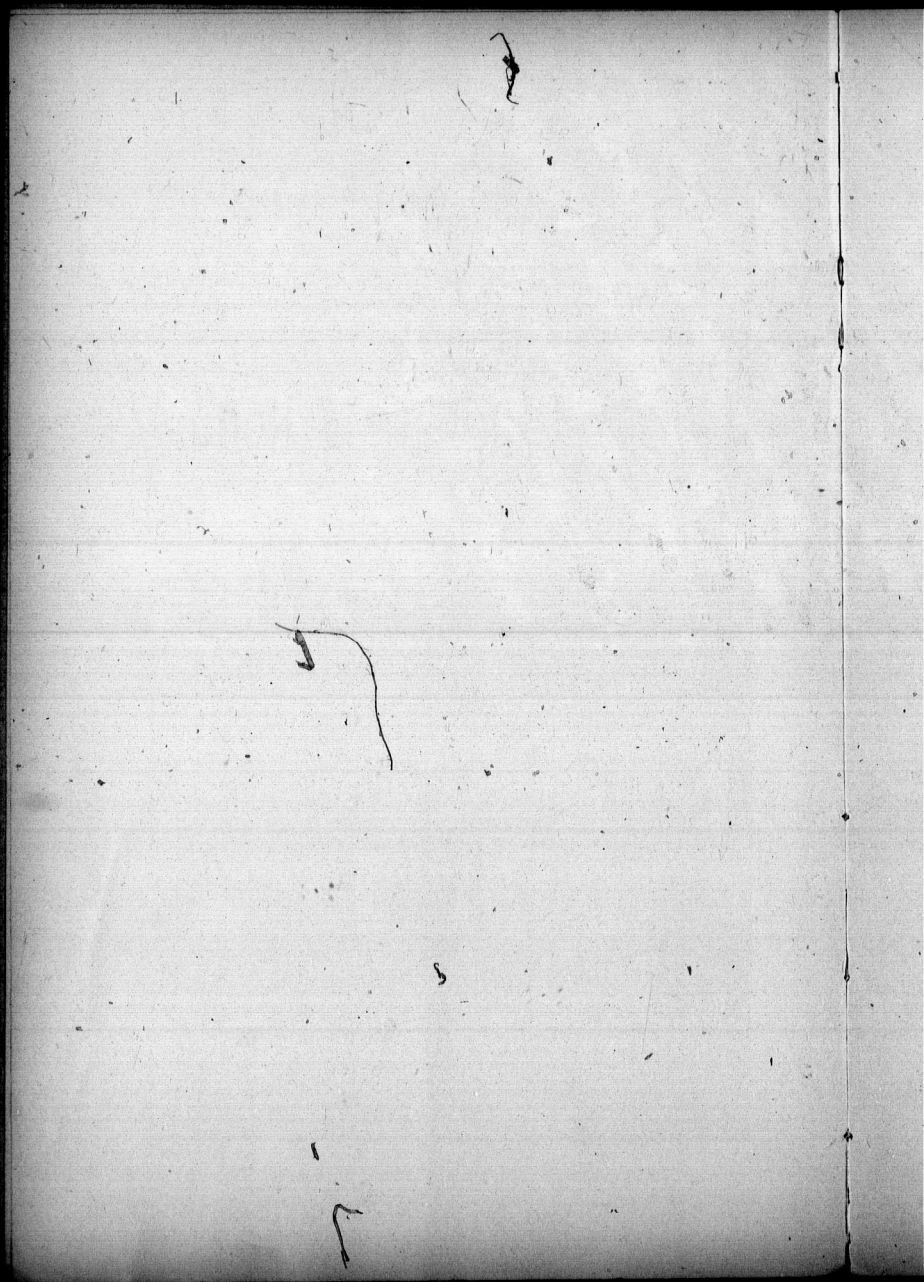

## THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.

MINUTES OF THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CORPORATION OF THE PROTESTANT HOUSE OF INDUSTRY AND REFUGE, held April 19th, 1899.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. John McKillican.

In the unavoidable absence of the Honorary Secretary, Mr. Jeffrey H. Burland, Mr. Joseph Richards was requested to act as Secretary. Letters of regret were received from the Rev. W. S. Barnes, and Principal Hackett, of the Diocesan Theological College.

The President then delivered his annual address.

He said we are again permitted by a kind Providence to assemble at our Annual Meeting, and it is due that we acknowledge the many helps we have had in carrying on the good work committed to our care. It may be as well to point out that there are two distinct works in connection with the House of Refuge.

1st. The Board of Relief, which gives careful attention to the general work of the Institution, and especially the Country House at Longue Pointe, and in addition

there is the relief extended to the poor, and refuge given in this building to those who may apply and who are found deserving. In the matter of the Home at Longue Pointe, great care is taken in the consideration of all applications that may be made, that they may be of good character and deserving of the assistance contemplated in the establishment of this Home, and we think the success of our efforts will find a very general endorsement on the part of the visiting Governors and other friends who have enquired into the management and can speak, we think, for the comfort, and we may say the happiness of the aged inmates. Much care has been given by our Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. McMillan, as also by Misses Wallace and Grant, their assistants, to this end. The healthy locality of the Country House has proved of great value to the work, and seems only right that we should keep in constant remembrance the generous thoughtfulness of the late Thomas Molson, to whose generosity the Association are indebted for the Farm, which was left by that gentleman for the express purpose of the work of the Institution. The Board desire, while referring in grateful remembrance to that gentleman, also to testify to the continued interest in the work extended by other members of his family.

The George Moore Home for incurables and convalescents still continues to be a valuable help and addition to the work among the suffering, and forms a part of this corporation and administration; the building was generously furnished throughout by the liberality of Mr. George B. Burland, and his family, who in addition to the necessary furniture, have kindly donated a book-case fairly filled with books suitable and instructive for the

enjoyment of the inmates, in the Country House as well as in the Night Refuge in the city.

Kind friends have given weekly entertainments of music, recitations and religious services, thus helping many downcast to fresh hopes and good cheer.

We have to record the loss of some valued workers among our Governors through death during the year, and the Board regrets that so far their places have not been filled, but the history of the Institution bids us have faith and hope that though there may be difficulties, we will not be left uncared for in caring for those who have been specially recommended to our care by Him who said: "The poor ye have always with you."

The Governors who have died during the year are: Messrs. John J. Day, Gilman Cheney, Francis Scholes and Robert Moat.

The Board of Governors having decided that the reduction of the amount required for the qualification of a life member from \$400.00 to \$100.00 was desirable, a special Act was obtained at the last session of the local Legislature, amending the charter in that regard, and the thanks of the Institution are due to Messrs. Robertson, Fleet and Falconer, Hon. A. W. Atwater, and the Hon. J. K. Ward, for their gratuitous efforts in securing such legislation. The members of the Legislature obtained a remission of the fees incident to the passage of the Bill, less necessary expenses. With regard to Out-door Relief, the details will be given in the Report to be submitted. A general misapprehension seems to have arisen with regard to the Out-door Relief and the work of the Home; the two works are kept entirely distinct, and the amount of Out-door subscriptions collected for the Out-door Relief is used to pay for fuel and provisions, and the House of Industry proper is not in any way responsible for the assistance incident to that work.

The Board desire to acknowledge the generous gifts of money paid in answer to the appeals on behalf of the suffering and poor. The sum of \$4,311 was received during the winter, and although the season

was a severe one and many claims were made on the Board for relief, there is a small surplus now on hand, which will be needed to help a few widows who require assistance during the summer.

The question of the relief of the poor during the winter is a difficult one, but the Board are doing their best to meet it as wisely as they can.

In concluding, it is proper to acknowledge and to keep in kindly remembrance the donations left to us by those who for years carried on the work.

Let us cherish in honored remembrance the names of John Redpath, John Green-shields, William Lunn, William Murray, William Workman, George Frothingham, Henry Lyman, the Hon. Thomas White, Norton B. Corse, the Hon. James Ferrier, and others, by whom much care and attention has been given.

Let us continue the good work, looking for blessings from the Infinite Father of all, which cost our predecessors of honoured memory so much self-denying and loving labour.

The Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year were then presented.

That the thanks of the Governors be conveyed to Doctors John T. Finnie, F. G. Finley, F. E. Thompson, H. D. Hamilton, Andrew Macphail and Howard M. Church, for the efficient and gratuitous services rendered by them as visiting Physicians during the year.

5. Moved by James Moore, seconded by Jonathan Hodgson, and resolved :

That the thanks of the Governors are due and hereby tendered to the Protestant Ministers and other Christian friends of the city who have so faithfully conducted Divine Service every Sabbath, and visited the inmates of the Country Houses and City Refuge.

The Meeting then adjourned and resolved itself into a Meeting of Governors for the election of officers.

#### THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING MARCH

31ST, 1899.

The Board of Management of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge have the honour to submit the following Report:—

##### INMATES.

The average number for the year, 135; the highest number for the year, 141; the lowest number for the year, 124; showing an average of 3 over last year. Number in the House at present, 136.

##### THE GEORGE MOORE MEMORIAL HOME.

The average number for the year, 35; the highest number for the year, 41; the lowest number for the year, 26. In Moore Home at present: males 18, females 22—total 40; total number received in the Moore Home since opening, males 91, females 191—total 282; of whom have been discharged: males 52, females 137,—total 189.

##### DIED.

Males 20, females 28;—total 48. Sent to Verdun Hospital, males 1, females 4;—total, 5. Remaining in Moore Home, males 18, females 22—total, 40.

##### NIGHT REFUGE.

Number of lodgings given in Night Refuge—males, 33,939; females, 2,005. Total, 35,944, being an increase of 1,659 over last year.



#### SOUP KITCHEN.

Number of quarts of soup and extra meals given, 91,115, being an increase of 3,366 rations over last year.

#### GENERAL MAINTENANCE.

The cost of general maintenance has been \$18,287.63. The sum of \$10,084.10 was expended for food, being an increase of \$1,139.22 over last year.

#### DEATHS.

In the Old Home, 14; in Moore Home, 10; in City Refuge, 4; in Hospital, 5. Men 20, women 13—Total 33.

#### KINDLING WOOD.

This industry is carried on as usual, and the returns are satisfactory, as will appear by the Treasurer's statement. A stock of dry wood is kept on hand, and it is hoped that the friends of the Institution will continue to patronize us.

#### OUTDOOR LABOR.

During the Fall and Winter men were as formerly sent out to work, and gave general satisfaction. Owing to the lack of snow in the early part of the season, as well as other causes, very little demand for men was had; the proceeds carried to revenue account was \$300, against \$333.70 last year.

#### POOR RELIEF.

This Committee met weekly during the Winter and every second week in Summer. Their duty is to attend to all that relates to the internal arrangements of both the City and Country Houses.

#### INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

The Ladies of the Industrial Rooms and Visiting Committee are entitled to the thanks of the Governors and the community for their unremitting attention to the work committed to their management.

#### OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The thanks of the Governors and the public are due to the Board of Out-door Relief for the efficient manner in which they have discharged the onerous duties committed to them.

#### RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

The Board place much value on the faithful and self-denying attention shewn

by the Ministers of the city and others, who attend to the moral and religious interests of our people, both of those of the Night Refuge and the Country Homes, and their weekly services at the Country House on the Lord's Day.

#### ENTERTAINMENTS GIVEN TO OUR PEOPLE.

The Board desire to express gratitude to the various churches, societies, and other kind friends who have contributed by social gatherings, at both City and Country Houses, with music, songs, recitations, etc., thus giving pleasure and enjoyment with kind words to our inmates, especially during the cheerless winter evenings; for all such and increasing interest, our Board is sincerely thankful.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF OUT-  
DOOR RELIEF FOR WINTER  
OF 1898-99.

The Board respectfully submit to the subscribers of the Outdoor Relief Fund the annual report of their proceedings during the past year, together with the accounts shewing the receipts and expenditure for the same period.

On December 8th, 1898, a meeting was held of some of the city clergymen, representatives of some of the National Societies and Board of Management of the House of Industry and Refuge, to arrange for the winter's work.

After a full discussion of the subject of relief, it was unanimously resolved that the operations of the Board be commenced and carried on as usual, and the following gentlemen were appointed a Committee for that purpose, and to make an appeal to the public through the press for contributions to carry on the work, viz:— Andrew F. Gault, James Moore, Hon. J. K. Ward, Daniel Wilson, Joseph Richards, William Reid, James Wilson, Jeffrey H. Burland, Rev. F. Riedel, and Charles Alexander.

The meetings of the Board for the distribution of relief commenced on Thursday, the 22nd day of December, 1898, and were continued weekly during the winter until March 16th, 1899, as shewn by annexed statement. Since the Board closed, a number of destitute families, widows, and deserted wives are being cared for.

The relief given consisted of wood and coal, bread, flour and oatmeal, tea and soap, new and second-hand clothing; each case brought under the notice of the Board was carefully investigated, and if found worthy, was relieved.

The Board acknowledges and returns thanks for the very generous support afforded by the citizens and friends at a distance. To the city newspapers, viz.: Gazette, Herald, Witness and Star, the Board desire to return sincere thanks.

The Board desire to record the valuable services rendered to them by the

Reverends Messrs. Patterson, McManus, Duclos, DeGruchy, Amaron and Doudiet, and other Christian workers, in attending the Board and reporting cases that came under their notice.

We have to acknowledge with thanks from the estate of the late Miss Ann McCauley, per H. J. Johnston, Esq., executor, her bequest of \$800, less 10% government duty, \$720, which is to be invested and to form the nucleus of a fund, the interest of which to be applied annually to current expenses of the Board.

During the winter months the old people suffered considerably, as usual, from chest affections of an influenza character. There were thirty-three deaths during the year, the age ranging all the way from 17 years to 93 years, the average being 56 years.

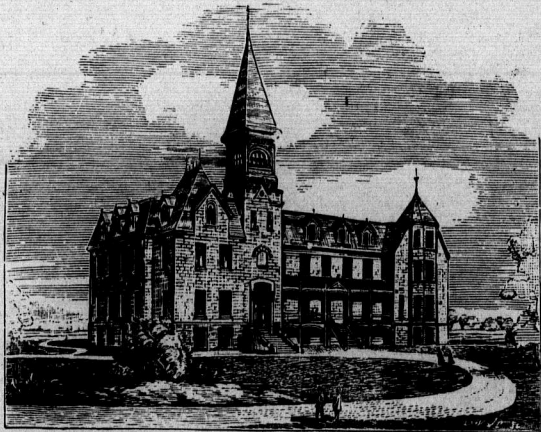
