Our Indians. From the Report of the Department of Indian Affairs, we learn that during the last year there was expended for the Indians of the North Eastern Agency, Chas. Sargent, Esq., Superintendent, \$894 for food, clothing, etc., and \$115 for medical attention, \$300 for 3 months salary of the teacher at Burnt Church. In his report Mr. Sargent says: "You will observe a slight improvement in the condition of the Indians. It is many instances they have increased their numbers."

THE DOMINION ELECTIONS are, it is said, now in the hands of the Government. It is not a question of the Government's determination, but it is, by no means, follows that it is so. It is highly probable that Sir John will be governed in the matter very much by circumstances and it is equally probable that no actual decision has yet been arrived at.

Mr. Blair's Speech.
