CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF ORDER

OF THE

EASTERN NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association, composed only of Ministers and Delegates, who shall be members of the Churches which they represent, shall be styled "The E. N. B. Baptist Association."

ARTICLE 9.—The Association shall meet annually, at 2 o'clock, F. M., on the second Thursday in July, at such place as they shall appoint; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The meeting shall be opened with Social Conference; after which, the Officers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meeting held by adjournment from time to time during the session of the Association, shall be opened and concluded by prayer.

ARTICLE 3.—Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate, or more; but no Church, however numerous, shall be entitled to a greater number than five, in addition to their Pastor.

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ARTICLE 4.—At each meeting of the Association, the Delegates shall deliver to the Clerk of the preceding year immediately on their arrival, the Letters from the Churches; a list of the Delegates having been prepared by the Clerk, their names shall be called, and they shall take their places. The Moderator of the preceding year shall call the vote for a Moderator, by ballot, without nomination, and the person who shall be chosen by a majority of the members present, shall, upon his acceptance, lead the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, notify the Committees, and maintain due order among the members. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the pressure of the Association giving an account of its state, particularly of the addition and diminution within the last year; and generally, of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity, together with the whole number of members in communion. It s

tion must be made by letter, and satisfactory evidence furnished of their faith and order: this being done, and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall, on behalf of the Association, give to one of their Messengers (if any be present) the right hand of fellowship.

ARTOLE 7.—When/A Church shall neglect to make any communication to the Association for three years successively, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members request its continuance, and shall engage to enquire into its standing, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

ARTOLE 8.—Although as an Association, we displain all navae over the

Arricle 8.—Although as an Association, we disclaim all power over the Churches, so far as respects any interference with their independence and discipline, yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety continuing any Church or Minister in our connexion, which to us shall appear to be unscriptural in principle, or irregular in practice. In order, however, that we may not withdraw our fellowship without sufficient reason, from any Church or Minister against whom a complaint is made by two members of this body, it shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a Committee to investigate the points of complaint, and report the result of their enquiries to the Association, that they may decide as duty shall appear.

Arricles 9.—Alterations and amendments may be made in this Constitution from time to time, such as experience may dictate.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. That each meeting be opened by prayer.

2. That motions be made and seconded, according to parliamentary usage.

3. That no delegate speak more than twice to the same motion.

4. That every resolution be written out and handed to the Clerk.

5. That motions which are lost be not recorded.

6. That invited members enjoy all the privileges of Delegates, except voting-

7. That these regulations be read at each session.

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We hasten to remark, first of all, that we have cause for devout thankfulness in the successful consummation of the effort which, for two years, has been sustained and pushed forward under the most perplexing difficulties, to liquidate the debt that has so long encumbered our Seminary at Fredericton, imperilled the honor of the denomination, and, in no small measure, embarrassed our educational enterprize in this Province. Every one of us, with anything like a just conception of the vast importance of this result, cannot but feel deeply grateful for its accomplishment. Let us not fail to thank God for the blessing of His approval and assistance, so clearly and signally indicated in the success which has at length crowned our endeavour to remove from our path that very serious obstacle. Next to a recognition of the divine aid vouchsafed to us in the struggle to relieve our denomination of this indebtedness, it is eminently fitting that we

should make a formal and distinct record of our obligations to Dea. Z. G. Gabel, for the unflagging zeal, the unswerving purpose, and the indomitable persistency with which he has pursued, and finally completed, the movement to wipe out "the Seminary debt;" thus contributing so essentially to sustain the moral integrity of the denomination, and to preserve, for the present and future generations of our Baptist households, an Institution, whose early history enshrines the prayers and struggles of our self-sacrificing and now sainted ministers and laymen, who, with a large liberality and with high aspirations, reared and consecrated those walls to the noble and ennobling service of Mental and Moral Culture. It is also due that we give some expression of thanks, at this, and at the next anniversary of the Western Association, for the liberal aid received through W. O. Smith, Esq., during the progress of our effort to liberate the Seminary from its encumberance.

And now, brethren, are we not plainly and emphatically summoned as a Denomination to arise and go forth with a renewed earnestness, with a more general and vigorous determination to press forward the cause of Education in connection with our Seminary at Fredericton?

Shall we not, both ministers and laymen, gravely reconsider the important character and relations of the cause of Education, in its bearing on our denominational existence and mission? Can we longer venture with impunity to depreciate and neglect a matter, so vitally linked with our influence, usefulness, and growth as Baptist churches? The times in which we live are imposing new and heavier demands for more thorough MENTAL TRAINING; and the years near upon us will multiply still further, and press with more unqualified rigor those demands upon the men and women of our Denomination. In the Pulpit and the Pew, in the Court House and the Counting Room, in the Senate and the Chair of State, in the circle of Home Life, and throughout the whole domain of Human Society, disciplined and furnished MIND will be imperatively demanded. Those not qualified to meet that requirement will be inevitably sent to the rear. Next to the work of saving souls by augmenting and sustaining the agencies for propagating the gospel, is that of making immediate arrangements for establishing a department of sacred learning in conjunction with the literary, in order that the young men entering the ministry among us, and precluded by circumstances from pursuing a course of liberal culture, may have placed within their reach the facilities for procuring theological instruction.

We have space only to remark that we are gratified in learning that our College at Wolfville, N. S., is now supplied with a large and able corps of professors, and that it is giving promise of advancing to a higher degree of usefulness. But a more generous contribution of funds from our churches is urgently needed to defray current expenses.

That it is cause for deep regret and grave apprehension, that there is at present, and has been for some time, a division of interest and effort in carrying forward the plans and purpose of the Home Mission Board; and would earnestly recommend to the pastors and churches to combine and centralize hereafter their contributions, making the Board appointed at the Associations the medium of carrying Mission funds to the respective fields requiring assistance.

Unity of feeling and action, in respect to this matter, is of essential importance. Separate and independent action, on the part of merely local societies, will ultimately, if not speedily, result disastrously to our Home Mission enterprize. We would recall the attention of the brethren to the Constitution of the Home Mission Society, in which directions are suggested for establishing auxiliary branches. Your Committee would also most cordially commend to the good will and co-operation of our pastors and churches, our esteemed brother— Rev. E. C. Cady—as the general missionary and financial agent for the Province. We are hoping, under God, that this appointment of Bro. Cady (whose entire salary is provided for by the city churches), will be productive of the best results to the cause of Home Missions J. IRVING.

DEARLY BELOVED-We would, at this time, call your attention to the fact, that many important recommendations made at our yearly Sessions, are entirely unnoticed by the most of our churches.

Take for expmple, the following Resolution of last year: "We would recommend each church to make a collection for Foreign Missions, at its first prayer meeting in each month." You know, brethren, how few churches have acted in accordance with that advice; and, in consequence, how small our fund for that most worthy

It must always be remembered, that this Association is not a higher executive court to which the churches appeal; neither is it a higher legislative body, whose decisions bind the churches. A recommendation by this body is of no force whatever, until it is adopted by vote of the churches, then it becomes law to such churches as adopt it; while to those who reject it, it is still without any force.

If the above quoted recommendation had been brought before the churches for adoption, and after discussion, had been rejected, we would have less ground for complaint. We complain that such recommendations are not even taken into consideration by those bodies,

whose adoption of them can alone give them any value.

We remember two other recommendations of last Session. One asking the churches to take an annual collection in aid of the Seminary, on the Sabbath following the third Thursday in February, to be devoted to the assistance of young men studying for the ministry; and another requesting the churches to held an annual platform Missionary meeting. All these have been alike neglected, as many similar ones have been in past years; and it is mournful to think of the loss which has been sustained in consequence.

And now, beloved, for this state of things we suggest a simple remedy. Immediately after the receipt of the Association Minutes, let them be publicly read in church meeting, and let those recommendations that require action on the part of the churches, be treated exactly as you would treat the report of a Committee; let their adoption be moved, seconded, discussed, and carried if it may be.

We believe that if last year's request, for a Monthly Missionary collection had been thus dealt with, not one church in two would have rejected it; and, as the result, an annual contribution, averaging not less than twelve dollars from each church, would have been received from that source alone for Foreign Missions. Dear brethren in the Lord, we have read your letters with deep interest. NEWCASTLE, NORTHESK, LITTLE SOUTH WEST, AND NELSON.

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ACT OF ASSEMBLY.

AN ACT FOR THE INCORPORATION OF CERTAIN BODIES IN CONNECTION WITH
THE EASTERN AND WESTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS.

Passed 12th April, 1855.

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Whereas certain persons are associated together in Churches constituting a religious community known as the Baptist Church, in connection with the Eastern and Western Baptist Association: And whereas sundry chapels and other buildings have been erected, and lands purchased or otherwise conveyed or held in trust for the use of such churches in the several Counties of this Province, or for educational or other benevolent objects in connection therewith, and inconveniencies have been experienced in managing the same by Trustees, without being incorporated for that purpose:—

Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Coun-

cil, and Assembly, as follows :-

1. Every Board of Trustees of any Chapel or Seminary for education. and land and buildings held therewith, or held for the purpose of erecting any Chapel or Seminary thereon for the use and benefit of any Baptist church in connection with the Eastern and Western New Brunswick Baptist Association, or in connection with any Baptist Education, or other Society, to be hereafter chosen for any such purpose, and their successors, shall be a body corporate by the name of "The Trustees of the Baptist Chapel," or other property as the case may be, in the place in which the trust property may be situate, and by that name shall have perpetual succession, power to sue and be sued, a common seal renewable at pleasure, power to hold and receive real and personal estate, and improve, sell, let, or assign the same or any part thereof, or any interest in or arising out of the same, and make bye-laws, and exercise such other powers as are conferred by law for the purpose of managing the temporal affairs of the said chapel, or other property for the benefit of the Church to which the same may belong, or the educational or other objects to which it may be devoted

2. All Chapels or other property as aforesaid, held in trust as aforesaid in any part of the Province, shall be subject to the provisions of this Act whenever a Board of Trustees to manage the same shall be elected as hereinafter mentioned, and a conveyance thereof shall be made to the Corporation by the existing Trustees; and the said Corporation shall then hold the same for the purposes aforesaid with as good a title, legal and equitable, as such Trustees had at the time of

the conveyance.

3. Every such Church, together with the congregation regularly attending and contributing to its funds by pew rents or otherwise, may annually at such time and in such manner as each Church shall prescribe by the male members present at any meeting for the purpose, elect any number of Trustees, not less than three nor more than nine, from among the male members of the said Church or congregation, or both, who shall continue in office for one year, or until others are elected in their stead.

4. Every meeting of the Church, or Church and congregation, for any of the purposes aforesaid, shall act on notice to be given by the Pastor or Minister presiding over the same, or if there be none, by any

Deacon thereof, of any usual meeting of the Church for worship or business.

 Such Trustees may, on due notice, meet together and manage the temporal affairs of the Chapel for which they are elected, and the property in connection therewith, for the benefit of the church to which it

6. Every Educational or other Society as aforesaid, may, at its Annual Meeting to be held at either of the said Associations or elsewhere, on notice by post or otherwise, elect from among its members such number of Trustees as may be deemed necessary for the management of the affairs of any Seminary in connection therewith, who, together with all the ministers of the denomination accredited at such Association, as additional or exofficio Trustees, may transact its business on due notice to be given as aforesaid, or by a Committee to be be appointed for that purpose at the same time by the said Trustees.

7. Whenever by this Act any Board of Trustees or number of persons may require to do any act, a majority of those present at the meeting shall be sufficient for the purpose.

8. The annual revenue derived from the rent of lands belonging to any such Chapel, Seminary, or Society as aforesaid, shall not exceed

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A DECLARATION

Of the Faith, Practice, and Covenant of the Church of Christ, composing the Eastern New Brunswick Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1. We believe that there is but one only living and true God, who is a Spirit, infinite, eternal, and unchangeable in his being, wisdom, power, holiness, justice, goodness and truth: Deut. vi. 4; John iv. 24; Ps. xc. 2, cxlvii. 5; James i. 17; 1 Tim. i. 17; Mark x. 27; Isaiah vi. 3; Deut. xxxii. 4; Ex. xv. 11, xxxiv. 6, 7.

2. That there are three persons in the Godhead—the Father, the Son,

2. That there are three persons in the Godhead—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost—who are but one God, the same in substance, equal in power and glory: Matt. xxviii. 19; John xv. 26; 1 Cor. xii. 4-6; 2

Cor. xiii. 14; Eph. ii. 18.

3. That the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, in which He hath given us our only rule of faith and practice: Luke xvi. 29-31; 2 Tim. iii. 15-17; 1 Thess. ii. 13; 2 Peter

. 21, iii. 2; Rom. iii. 2; Isa. viii. 16, 19, 20.

4. That God, who is infinite in knowledge, and perfectly views all things from the beginning to the end, has forcordained that whatsoever comes to pass, either by his order or permission, shall work for the eternal glory of his great name: Acts xv. 18, ii. 23; Ps. lxxvi. 10, xxxiii. 11; Rom. ix. 17-23, xi. 36.

5. That in the beginning God created the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that in them are; and he upholds and governs all things by the word of his power: Gen. i.; Ex. xx. 11; Dan. iv. 35;

Heb. i. 3.

6. That God made man in his own image, in knowledge, righteousness, and true holiness; and made with him a covenant of life, the condition of which was perfect obedience: Gen. i. 26, 27; ii. 16, 17; Ecc. vii. 29; Gal. iii. 10.

7. That man being left to himself soon fell from that happy and glorious estate in which he was made, by eating the forbidden fruit, by which he brought himself and all his posterity into a state of death:

Gen. iii. 6; Rom. v. 12-19.

8. That man being thus dead, his help and recovery are wholly in and

from God: John vi. 44; Eph. ii. 4, 5, 7-10; 1 John iv. 10.

9. That God the Father has chosen a great multitude of the human family, whom no man can number, of all nations, and kindreds, and people, and tongues, and given them to his Son in the covenant of his grace, that he might redeem them from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works, which is the only foundation of salvation for lost and helpless sinners; and thereby the Ministers of the Lord are encouraged to preach the Gospel to every rational creature, because the purposes of God, and the infinite value, of Christ's atonement, secure the increase and establishment of Christ's kingdom, so that the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdom of our Lord and of his Christ; and He shall reign for ever and ever. Rom. viii. 29, 30; Eph. i. 4, 5, 11; John vi. 87-89; Rev. vii. 9; Titus ii. 14; Mark xvi. 15; 2 Tim. ii. 19; Isa. ix. 7; Rev. xi. 15.

10. That Jesus, the eternal Son of God, hath come, and taken on him our nature, and in that nature hath yielded a perfect obedience to the

law which we have transgressed, and suffered death for our sins, and hath brought in a complete and everlasting righteousness, and hath risen and ascended to the right hand of God, and ever liveth to make intercession for us: John i. 1, 14; Heb. i. 1-3, vii. 25, x. 5-10; Rom.

11. That the Holy Ghost, and he only, can and doth make particular application of the benefits of the atonement made by Christ to every elect soul: John iii. 5-8, xvi. 7-15; 1 Cor. xii. 8.

12. That the Spirit of God applies the benefit of this atonement, by convincing us of our sinful, lost, and miserable condition; and then discovering the glorious Saviour, as he is exhibited in the gospel, in his suitableness and sufficiency, and enabling us to embrace him with our whole souls, by which he is made unto us wisdom, righteousness, sanotification and redemptiou: John zvi. 8-11, 18-15; Gal. v. 22-28;

13. That the life of religion consists in the knowledge of God, and conformity with him in the inward man, which necessarily produceth an external conformity to his commands, and brings us to live in obedience to his holy will in all our ways, and in our several places and relations: John xvii. 8; 1 Cor. x. 81; Eph. 1i. 10; Col. iii. 2; 8; Gal. ii. 20; Rom. xii. 1, 2.

14. That true believers being united to Jesus Christ, shall never perish, but live and reign with him for ever. with God, and by his Spirit they are united with each other, and have communion one with another, whereby they are made partakers of each other's gifts and graces: John vi. 39, x. 28; Rev. iii. 21; John xvii. 7,

15. That the first day of the week, commonly called the Lord's day, is the Christian Sabbath : John xx. 19; Acts xx. 7; 1 Cor. xvi. 2;

16. That God hath appointed the ordinance of civil government for defending the poor as well as the rich, in their civil rights, without infringing upon the consciences of any, or attempting to dictate or govern in the worship of the eternal God, which belongs only to Jesus Christ, the great lawgiver and head of his church : Mark xii, 17; Rom. xiii, 1-6; 1 Peter ii. 13-15; Mat. xxii. 10; Rom. xiv. 4.

17. That there will be a general resurrection, both of the just and the unjust; and that God hath appointed a day in which he will judge the world in righteousness, by Jesus Christ, and will reward every man according to his works; when the wicked will be sent away into ever-lasting punishment, and the righteous received into life eternal: John v. 28, 29; Acts xvii. 31, xxiv. 15; Rom. ii. 15; Matt. xvi. 29, and

PART THE SECOND. Concerning a Visible Church of Christ, and its Discipline.

1. We believe that a particular visible Church of Christ is a number of Saints and people, by mutual acquaintance and communion voluntarily and understandingly covenanting and embodying together, for upholding and promoting the worship and service of God, to shew forth

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n him to the his glory, and for their own edification: 1 Peter, ii. 5; Acts, ii. 42, ix.

31; Hebrews, x. 25; Eph. iv. 15, 16.

2. That Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ to be continued until his second coming, and that the former is requisite to the latter-that is to say, that those are to be admitted into the communion of the Church, and to partake of all its ordinances and privileges, who upon profession of their faith have been baptized by Immersion, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Matt. xxviii. 19, 29; 1 Cor. xi. 23-26; Acts ii. 41, 42, and ix. 18-26; and viii. 12, 35-39; Matt. iii. 6-16; Rom. vi. 4; Col. ii. 12; Gal. iii. 27; Matt, xxvi. 26-28; Acts xx. 11; 1 Cor. x. 16.

3. That since none but true believers can rightly partake of the ordinances, therefore the door of the church should be carefully kept against all such who cannot give scriptural evidence of their union with Christ :

1 Cor. xi. 27-29; Matt. vii/6, 15-20; 1 Peter, ii. 5.

4. That a Church thus gathered hath power to choose, and by Elders to ordain those officers that Christ hath appointed in his Church, viz. : Bishops or Elders, and Deacons; and also to depose such officers who walk contrary to the rules of the Gospel; and to discipline their members, though in some cases it may be convenient and profitable to request the advice of the neighboring Churches of Christ: Acts i. 21-26, vi. 3-6, xiv. 28, and xv. 6-31; 1 Cor. v. 13; 2 Thess. iii. 6, 14, 15;

Titus, iii 10.

That a Bishop or Elder hath no more power to decide any case or controversy in the Church than any private brother, yet they, having superior gifts for teaching and ruling, ought to exercise and improve the same for the benefit of the Church; and the Church ought to be subjected to the gifts bestowed on the Minister from the Lord, while he is rightly administering in his place; whose place it is to lead in the actings of the Church, and to administer the ordinances of the Gospel, and devote himself to the work of teaching, warning, rebuking, and exhorting the people publicly, and from house to house: Matt. xx. 25-29; 1 Peter v. 8; Acts xx. 20-28, 31; Heb. xiii. 17; 1 Thess. v. 12, 18.

6. That the Deacon's office or work is to take care of the poor, and to have the oversight of the temporal affairs of the Church, and to min-

ister at the Lord's Table: Acts vi. 1-5; 1 Tim, iii. 8-14.

7. That every believer is commanded to be faithful, to improve every gift and talent which is bestowed on him; in order to which, there ought to be such a Gospel freedom that the Church may know where every particular gift is, that it may be improved in its proper place, and to its right end, viz., the glory of God and the good of his people; and the Church ought to be subject to such improvements: 1 Peter iv. 10, 11 and v. 5; 1 Tim. iv. 14; 1Cor. 12th and 14th chapters; Rom. xii. 3-8.

8. That there is a mutual obligation between Minister and peopleone to administer in things religious and spiritual, according to the gifts God has given. The Church to communicate of their temporal worldly substance for his comfort and support, and that by an equality as nearly as can be ascertained, that one may not be burthened and another eased. But this is not to be effected by force or compulsion, or by the sword of civil power; but it is to be a free-will offering, agreeably to the Scriptures of truth; and every member deficient in this matter ought to be disciplined by Gospel rule, as for any breach of covenant, or neglect of performing Christian duty: Luke x. 7; Rom. xy. 27; 1 Cor. ix.; Gal. vi. 6.

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COVENANT.

We do now, in the presence of the great, all-seeing and most glorious God, and before angels and men, give up ourselves to the Lord Jehovah, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, and avouch him this day to be our God, our Father, our Saviour, and our Leader, and receive him as our Portion for ever. We give up ourselves to the Lord Jesus Christ, and engage to adhere to him as the head of his people in the covenant of grace, and rely on him as our Prophet, Priest, and King, to bring us to

We acknowledge our everlasting and indispensable obligations to glorify God by living a holy, righteous, and godly life, in this present world, in all our several places and relations; and we engage by the assistance of the Divine Spirit, to improve our time, strength, talents, and advantages to his glory and the good of our fellow-men; promising, by Divine help, to walk in our houses as becomes those professing godliness, and to maintain the worship of God in our families, and to train

up those under our care in the ways of religion and virtue. We also give up ourselves to one another in covenant, promising to conduct towards each other as brethren in Christ, watching over one another in the love of God-reproving, rebuking, and admonishing one another for good as occasion may require; and if we at any time know that any members of the church are guilty of immoral conduct, that we will not expose it by tattling it to others; and if we have any personal difficulty with our brethren, we will not cherish enmity or speak of our grievances to others, but will faithfully labour with them, according to the direction of our Lord—Matt. xviii. 15, 17—that sin may be put away from among us, and that iniquity may not be harboured in the church. We engage to watch not only against the most gross evils, but also against all foolish talking and jesting, which are not convenient— vain disputing about words and things which gender strife—disregarding promises, and not fulfilling engagements—tattling and backbiting, spending time idly at taverns, or elsewhere, and vain, unnecessary worldly conversation on the Sabbath, and whatsoever else is contrary to sound doctrine, according to the glorious gospel of Christ. We promise to hold communion together in the worship of God, and in the ordinances and discipline of his church, according as we are or shall be guided by the Spirit of God in his word-expecting that He will yet further and more gloriously open his word and the mysteries of his kingdom; applying to the blood of the everlasting covenant for the pardon of our many errors, and praying that the Lord, would prepare and strengthen us for every good work to do his will, working in us that which is well pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. - Amen.

A., Tutor in Mathematics and Natural Science, has resigned the position he has held for the past three years, and the Committee cannot permit his retirement without recording their high opinion of his services as an instructor and the esteem in which he is held by them as a gentleman. His place will be filled by Mr. Geo. R. Foster, B. A., a graduate of the University of N. B. a gentleman who has had experience in teaching, and who comes highly

From the foundation of the Seminary to the present, it has had able men for its Principals, and the good it has been doing our Province and denomination, in fitting its youth for the different callings in life, and for higher scholarship, by a thorough preparation for a College course, has never, we think, been sufficiently acknowledged or apprecourse, has never, we think, been sumciently acknowledged or appreciated. If it had been the debt, so long standing as a hindrance to greater usefulness, would not have been left to the past year for its liquidation, and repairs long needed, and urged from year to year, without meeting a ready response. While we rejoice that the debts have been paid, we cannot boast. It must not be disguised, however, that we want each and every year money. Educational institutions in other countries are liberally aided, and New Brunswick Baptists have tried the withholding system too long not to be satisfied that another course must be adopted if we are to advance. In the United States—that land of Colleges and Academies—our brethren are moving as they have never moved before, to place their Academies in the front rank, seeing that if their Colleges are well filled by properly prepared students, they must

look well to the feeders.

The late Educational Convention in Brooklyn, N. Y., composed of the foremost men in our body, from all parts of the Union, gives weight to a subject that has been mooted several years—the raising of an endowment for the Seminary. The Watchman and Reflector, one of the leading Baptist papers in the United States, in commenting on that Convention, says :- "It is evident that in the view of our most "distinguished educators all over the country, the Academy is the "great educational question of the day. As we provide for and "perfect this, we provide for and perfect the whole system. As "Baptists, we are behind other denominations, and have already "suffered vast loss, both in our higher institutions of learning on the "one hand, and in our Ministry and Laity on the other. Let us hasten "to repair our loss. Let our men of wealth and far-reaching wisdom "come to our help. Let the Academy be well endowed, strongly "manned, amply furnished, and have the very best curriculum." * "Our neglect, as Baptists, of the Academies has worked disastrously

"on the Universities." Comment on the above extract is unnecessary, but we ask that it

be pondered well by our whole people.

Although we have had no professedly Theological students the past year, still we have good reason to believe that four pupils have the Ministry in view-two of them, we may mention, were not professors when they commenced their studies. This fact speaks for

We are desirous to draw tighter the bonds between our Seminary and Acadia College, and we do not know of a better way to bring this about than for the learned President of Acadia, or some of her Professors, to visit Fredericton annually as part of an examining body.

Before closing, let us put a few questions to each brother and sister

of our Churches:

1st.—Has the Institution had your prayers?

2d.—Have you done your duty in helping to forward its interests, either by taking the opportunities presented or seeking opportunities to present its claims?

3d.—Have you given to the Seminary? If so, has it been systematically, year by year, or only a spasmodic effort—a giving to prevent disastrous and mortifying consequences?

4th.—Will you hereafter keep the fourth Thursday in February as a day of prayer for institutions of learning, and give to Acadia College and the Baptist Seminary a special place in your petitions?

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APPENDIX-No. 3.

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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

ARTICLE 1.—This Society shall be called the New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society.

ART. 2.—The design of this Society shall be to promote the faithful preaching af the Gospel of Christ, and to spread Bible Christianity

throughout the destitute sections of New Brunswick.

ART. 3.—Any person may become a member of this Society, by contributing \$1 or upwards; annually to the funds. Thirty dollars paid at any one time shall constitute a life member; and any person paying a sum, which, in addition to previous contributions, shall amount to one hundred dollars, shall be a Director for life; and any Baptist Church or Association or Auxiliary, which contributes annually to this Society, shall be entitled to be represented by one delegate for every twenty dollars so contributed.

ART. 4.—The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Auditor, who shall be annually appointed by the Society.

ART. 5.—The Society shall appoint an Executive Committee, exclusive of the officers above named, residing in the City of Saint John and its vicinity. The officers above named shall be members ex efficio of the Executive Committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum at any meeting regularly convened. This Committee shall have power to call its own meetings, form its own rules of business, and fill any vacancies which may occur during the year, and convene special meetings of the Board and of the Society, shall appoint Missionaries, and instruct them as to their sphere of labors, shall expend the funds for the objects of the Society, providing that all amounts contributed for any specific object, shall, as far as possible, be faithfully applied in accordance with the wish of the donors; shall employ such agency or agencies for the collection of funds, and for all such purposes as the interests of the Society may demand, and shall make an annual report of their proceedings to the Society.

ART. 6.— Every Auxiliary Society, who shall agree to commit all its funds to the direction of the Society, shall be entitled to receive missionary labor, in such field, as it may designate, to an amount at least equal to its contributions; provided such designation be made at the time of

payment.

ART. 7.—The officers of Auxiliary Societies shall be ex officio Directors of this Society, and their members shall be members of this Society, ART. 8.—The annual meeting of this Society shall be held at such time and place as shall be determined upon at a previous annual meeting.

ART. 9.—No alteration of this Constitution shall be made without an affirmative vote of two thirds of the members present, at an annual

FORM FOR THE CONSTITUTION OF THE AUXILIARY.

ART. 1 .- This Society shall he called the-MISSIONARY SOCIETY—Auxiliary to the "New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society."

ART 2.—The object of this Society shall be to aid in supplying the destitute with the blessings of the Gospel.

ART. 8.—All persons contributing \$1 per annum shall be members of the Society, and every person paying \$10 at any one time, shall be a

Agr. 4.—The business of this Society shall be conducted by a Board, consisting of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Managing Committee, seven of whom shall form a quorum to do

ART. 5. - The Society shall meet annually, at such time and place as may be agreed upon at a previous meeting, when the officers for the ensuing year shall be elected, and such other business transacted as the requirements of the Society may demand.

Agr. 6. - The Secretary shall keep up such correspondence with the New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society, as the general interests of the Missionary cause may require.

RULES TO BE OBSERVED BY MISSIONARIES.

Rule 1.—The Missionaries of the Board are expected to communicate with the Corresponding Secretary monthly, and oftener, if necessary; giving a condensed sketch of their labors, and such items of intelligence relating to their Mission as may be useful to the Board, or of general

2.—Each Missionary shall be instructed to form Auxiliaries to the New Brunswick Home Missionary Society in the field of his labor, for the purpose of raising funds for the Society, to take collections publicly and privately, whenever he can do so with propriety, and in every way that he can consistently replenish the funds of the Society.

3.-A faithful account of all contributions in money, or in other things, shall be transmitted through the Corresponding Secretary to the Board, and no money shall be paid him by the Treasurer without an order signed by the Chairman and Corresponding Secretary, or in their absence, by three of the members of the Board.

4.—Each Missionary shall keep a faithful record of the places visited, the number of sermons preached, of converts baptized, of churches formed, of visits made, of meetings held, of Sabbath Schools established, of Temperance Societies formed, of Tracts distributed, &c., in the course of the year, and report the same to the Corresponding Secretary

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5.-When Missionaries are employed permanently, in case of their wishing to retire from the service of the Board, they must give three months notice to that effect, and no Missionary shall change his field of

labor without consent of the Board.

6.—The Missionaries of this Board shall be amenable to the Board for a faithful performance of their duty as Christian Missionaries, and shall be liable to be dismissed at any time for dereliction of duty, or immerality of conduct, or for preaching sentiments in opposition to God's Word.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD.

RULE 1.—There shall be a meeting of this Board for the transaction of business on the first Monday in every month.

2. The Recording Secretary shall keep a faithful record of the trans-

actions of the Board.

3.-The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare a faithful report annually, of the operations of the Society, which, if judged advisable,

shall be printed under the direction of the Society.

4.-No man shall be employed by the Board who cannot furnish satisfactory evidence of good moral and religious character, of consecration under divine influence to the work of the Ministry, and of such mental attainments as shall enable him, with the divine blessing, faithfully and successfully to fulfil its responsible duties.

5. In case of wishing to dismiss a Missionary permanently employed, on account of incompetency on his part to fulfil the duties of his calling, or on account of inability on the part of the Board to pay his salary,

three months notice shall be given to such Missionary.

SALARIES FOR MISSIONARIES.

The salaries of Missionaries shall be governed by their circumstances, and by their field of labor. In every case strict economy shall be observed.
