AN OLD CAPTAIN DEAD. A respected citizen, Captain R. J. Holder, aged 79, died early this morn-ing, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. John Patterson, Cranston Ave-nue. Captain Holder lived at Holder-wille, but was spending the winter with his daughter. He is the last of a family of nine brothers and four sis-ters. He was of Loyalist descent and, like all his brothers, was a follower of the sea. In the year 1852 he went to Australia in the bark Amelia, a vessel of about 194 tons register, and he remained there for about four years, when he returned to St. John retired from the sea. The captain was well known in St. John and in fact all over New Brunswick, and his num-grous friends will hear with regret of bis death
