The firing for the 10th County Prize was held on the 22nd inst. at 2 p. m., the new Brunswick Engineers winning with a score of 369 points.

Major Arnold, of the 1st Batt., and Lieut. Hart, of the 2nd, were the only representatives of the Engineers, had an equal score of 186 points for the medals presented by His Excellency for the highest score in the 2nd and 4th matches of the 10th match. Elections.

The Election in West Toronto on Saturday was a great disappointment to the Grits, who had made the most thorough canvass with the hope of defeating the Government. The constituency was returned by the Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, Hon. Mr. Blake, and other leading Liberal lights, who took the field fully a week before the Government candidate's friends were actively engaged in the canvass, but they had to incur the responsibility that they had been injured by the working of the National Policy. Sir Leonard Tilley was almost alone in representing the able exponents of the policy of the Opposition, whatever that may be, but he was more than a match for them all, as proved by the vote. Mr. Beatty, the Government candidate, was not only opposed by a popular man, a Mr. Ryan—who was supported by the *Globe*, the *Irish Canadian*, and the *World*, a candidate whom he had to consider as representing the adverse circumstances of there being in the field two others, but he was also opposed by a man who inclined to be Conservatives. Yet notwithstanding this Mr. Beatty's vote was 2,098, as against 2,166 polled for the Conservative candidate. When the vote is divided to these figures must be added the votes cast for the other Conservatives in the field, Mr. Wright 45, and Mr. Capreol 19, and the total vote of the Conservatives is more than less than the vote in 1878. Where, then, is the reaction? Mr. Ryan polled 1,000 votes. When we consider the powerful canvass made by the Grits in the West Toronto—the leader and exponents of the Opposition in conjunction with the Government candidate, it is not too much to say that the party in power have


