AN EXTRAORDINARY MEDICAL CASE IN NEW ORLEANS.

The doctors of New Orleans are greatly interested in the case of a young German named George Niekem, who fell from a platform about four months ago. The particulars of the case are as follows:

It was supposed that he would die in a few hours, for his head was severely injured, and nearly every structure of the skull was broken. The left half of the skull was broken in several places, causing the brain to be exposed. His eyes were closed, his nose was broken, and his five fingers were separated. His body protruded from his chest, and his feet were almost as black as coal. The bladder was enormously distended and completely paralyzed. The lower portion of the bowels were in the same condition. Both had to be emptied mechanically. His pulse was very faint, except in the great arteries of the neck. His body could be picked up with a plank to any place without the slightest evidence of pain. By a novel mode of treatment, the patient was kept in a state of unconsciousness, and the physicians of the hospital, who were called in to attend to him, were able to keep him in that state for several weeks. Madrid, Jan. 31.
Franklin, the Papal Nuncio, is about to withdraw from Madrid. All the foreign ministers in this city, with the exception of the representative of Russia, have protested against the insults offered to the Nuncio.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.
The bill to amend the Constitution so as to secure the right of suffrage without reference to color in all the States, passed the National House of Representatives yesterday. It goes to State legislatures for ratification.

Telegrams from Montreal announce that orders have been received from England to withdraw all the troops in the Dominion except two Regiments, which are to be stationed at Montreal and Quebec, and the Navy at Halifax.

The Alabama Claims and Gen. Grant.
The following intelligence, if reliable, is highly important as indicating the feelings and disposition of the President elect of the United States, towards Great Britain. The information is furnished by the reliable Washington correspondent of the New York Times, who says:

"Gen. Grant is quoted to-night in well-informed circles as opposed to the ratification by the Senate of the protocol of the Alabama treaty, now pending in that body. He is reported to have expressed the opinion that the question is not so much a demand for the mere dollars and cents lost by the destruction of some of our vessels, as it is a question of injury sustained by our commerce generally in driving our flag from the seas, and in impairing the support and sympathy accorded to the South by Great Britain. This seems to indicate that Mr. Grant will be recalled at no very distant day, and the entire question reopened on a totally different basis under the new Administration."

The Scottish American Journal, commenting on the above significantly observes:

"We are warranted in assuming that the publication of this statement has the sanction of some member of the General's staff, through whom he has been communicating such hints as he may choose to give concerning his future course."

If this supposition is correct, the report we now reproduce is of the very highest importance. It indicates a determination on the part of General Grant to force upon Great Britain the alternative of humiliation or war.

The Hon. Joseph Howe, it will be seen from the Montreal telegraph despatch, was sworn in on the 30th ult., President of the Council. This will be gratifying intelligence to his numerous friends both Unionists and Anti in the Maritime Provinces. He opposed Union and advocated it as long as he believed anything could be done, but he wisely accepted the situation when he failed. He has also gained important concessions for Nova Scotia.

A despatch to Mr. Cameron on the 30th ult., from the Privy Council of England, states that they refuse to hear Wilkes's case.

The Pacific Railroad is being built with a rapidity unequalled by any other railway; two to three miles a week are reported to be made ready for the rails. The United States Government are paying greatly for the work; the Contractor's charge \$51,000 per mile, while it is asserted that the cost has not exceeded \$35,000 per mile. \$16,000 clear on each mile will make the Contractor's rich. It is also said that the Contractor on the San Francisco or Union portion of the Line will clear \$18,000,000 while the Central from Omaha will give its builders \$10,000,000. These figures should lead the Dominion Government to look sharp after the Contracts on the Intercolonial Railway. Such profits would swamp the Dominion, but the Pacific Railroad is quite another affair. Still the desire for large profits actuates contractors everywhere.

Dominion Offices.
Very general and well-grounded complaints are made in this Province of the unfair distribution of offices by the Gen. Govt. Out of 269 employees at Ottawa, there are but 12 from New Brunswick. The Privy Council, Governor's Secretary's office, Department of Justice, Militia Department, Finance and Audit, Public Works, Inland Revenue, Secretary of State, and Secretary of State for the Provinces, Department of Agriculture, and Revenue General's offices, in which 176 officials are employed, there is not a single New Brunswicker among them. In the Post Office Department out of 33 there is only one from this Province—in the Senate out of 81 there is 1 from New Brunswick—in the House of Commons out of 93 there are only 3—in the Customs out of 18 there only 3, in the Marine and Fisheries out of 12 there are only 4 from this Province, in all 12.

It is not surprising then, that the people feel they have been unfairly treated. When New Brunswick went into Confederation its people expected justice at the hands of the Canadians, but as far as the offices are concerned, they have been grievously disappointed. It should be borne in mind that all these offices under the Dominion were New Brunswick, and that each Province was entitled to a fair share but the Upper Provinces got more than the Maritime share.

When the question of Patronage in connection with the Dominion Provinces came up in Parliament last Session, the lament of the Hon. Mr. McGee uttered the least consolation, and he was recited correctly, his suggestion was tacitly accepted, and understood to be the one upon which appointments would be made. He said that "it would not be just to turn persons out of situations to make places for people from the Maritime Provinces, but as vacancies occurred, or new appointments were created, they should be filled by people from the Lower Provinces, until they got their quota, and then all appointments should be in rotation."

Just so—and now that there is a vacancy in the Chaplaincy of the Senate, we trust that the Rev. C. P. Bliss will be appointed to that situation—an office that from his education and profession he is so well qualified to fill. We hope that his modesty will not prevent him applying for the position, but that he will urge his claims; and we trust that the United Press of New Brunswick will advocate his appointments. The general government will please the people of this part of the Dominion by giving the office to Mr. Bliss. We know that his appointment will give general satisfaction, and be looked upon with pleasure by the inhabitants of his native Province.

Volunteer Artillery Meeting.
A meeting for the purpose of reorganizing the St. Andrews Artillery Battery, was held in the Town Hall, on Saturday evening last.

Wm. Whitlock, Esq., in the chair, Mr. Francis Gresham was asked to act as Secretary. The Chairman in opening the meeting stated they had met for the reorganization of the St. Andrews Battery under the New Militia Law, and he was glad to see so full a meeting. He then requested all those present who wished to join to sign the service Roll. 62 members signed.

He then stated that in accordance with the understanding of a previous meeting (when it was agreed to amalgamate the Gordon Rifles Co. with the Battery) when the roll was full, the members should have the opportunity of naming the Officers (from the list of officers holding commissions in the two Companies).

It was proposed by Sergt. McKinney, (Gordon Rifles) that Captain Osburn be requested to continue Captain of the Battery. Carried unanimously. Proposed that Capt. Polleys (Gordon Rifles) be second Officer. Carried. Proposed that Lt. Wm. Whitlock (C. C. Militia) be the second Lieut. Carried.

The men were then formed in line and such portions of the Militia act as had reference to the Volunteers was read by the Captain.

The Chairman in acknowledging a vote of thanks for his able conduct in the chair, said that it afforded him much pleasure to be present at the meeting; he being an old N. B. Artillery officer, and still held his commission as Captain, dated 40 years ago. He was much pleased to see so many promising young men joining the Battery, and wished it every success.

A DARING BOY.—On the occasion of the fire that destroyed the Driscoll property in Fredericton lately, the fire alarm bell had become jammed in some way and would not ring. The door of the Baptist meeting house being locked, the bell on that building could not be reached, until a boy named Niles, 14 or 15 years of age, succeeded in the boldy by the lightning rod and rung the bell, but in doing so he froze both his hands and ears.

The young lad referred to is Joseph Shaw, a native of St. Andrews, son of Mr. Henry

The Governor General has, under the authority of the Railway Act of 1863, appointed Sir John A. Macdonald, Tilley, Rose and Langevin to constitute a Railway Committee of the Privy Council.

DEATH OF JOHN DUNCAN, ESQ.—This old and respectable citizen died last evening at his residence Paradise Road. The time of which he was a member—and of which he was a surviving partner—was known everywhere for his business integrity; and in his modest and liberal spirit—Globe.

As far as ordinances can effect such a purpose, all the civil servants of the British Crown must either live within their means or resign their positions, and order to this effect having recently been promulgated. The employees are not heretofore to be allowed to resort to accommodation bills to meet their extravagance. If a man receives a salary, he must live upon it, or else it out from his private fortune, but he must not borrow of money. If he wishes to retain his position, this money must be used in a man's right to run his house, which every Englishman manages is granted to him by the Magna Carta, but there is great wisdom in such a regulation. It will keep spendthrifts out of public employment, and it will be a safeguard to protect the higher interests of the State.

The emigration returns from the Mersey for the year just closed show an increase in the number for the year of 13,656. The whole number was 126,317. England furnished the largest number, 43,299; Ireland sent 24,543, and Scotland 3,585. Of the 46,256 foreigners, the greater number were Germans. The majority of the others, who did not slip under the net, was not entertained. The United States received 102,323 of the emigrants, and Canada 15,493. The decrease of Irish emigrants during the year was equally balanced by the increase of English.

RECIPROCITY.—The Oxford Democrat and some two or three other papers in the State are opposed to reciprocity. Very well. They are not imaginary lines and cause one county to pay tribute to the other. We candidly believe that whenever the people of Maine look at both sides of this question they will decide for Reciprocity. [Portland Advertiser.]

They are the parties who attempted to elope on the previous evening, intending to take the steamer at Portland, but owing to the detention of the western train they were surprised and brought home by the bride's father, and married next day.

—One of the last of Nelson's brave companions at the battle of St. Vincent has just died at Framington, near Barnstable, at the great age of ninety-seven. Thomas Pile was one of the crew who boarded the San Josef and assisted the immortal hero into the chains of that vessel. Nelson exclaiming, "Give me your hand, Pile; I'm a good soldier but a poor sailor."

—Another of the Japanese sent over here to study has become a convert to Christianity. His name is Renoski.

REV. MRS. P. A. HANNAFORD, of Hingham, Mass. has received the unanimous vote of the Second Universalist Parish of Portland to become their settled pastor.

The Westbrook Acadian says that A. W. Ransford is likely also to be a candidate for the representation of Victoria County.

HOMELANDS AND SCHOOL TEACHERS.—A correspondent of the Union Advocate says that the people of New Brunswick pay men to train and look after their horses, better than they do to teach their children. There are more hostlers in the Province receiving over \$300 per year than there are school teachers receiving over \$280.

QUICK RUN.—The bark "Jennie Ellenwood," built by Mr. O. B. Rileout, at Bay-Side, St. Andrews, recently made the run from Philadelphia to Lond's End, England, in fourteen days and arrived in Havre on the 18th day out.

MASONIC.—Lodge Saint Andrew F. & A. M., located at Richibucto, having completed their new Masonic building were to have dedicated the same, with masonic ceremonies, on yesterday. Several Grand Lodge Officers, including the M. W. B. L. Peters Grand Master, and W. John E. B. Editor of the "Globe," Grand Director of Ceremonies, passed through yesterday on their way to assist in the dedicatory services. A Masonic Ball was to be held last evening under the banners of the Lodge. [Moncton Times.]
