

RAID WAS MAGNIFICENT

Greatest Air Feat in History of World Makes British Take Notice.

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 13. - The retirement of the Russian forces in East Prussia and the great British air raid on the coast of Belgium appear today as the biggest factors in the military situation. Since August our profits have been lessened, but despite that shrinkage they are over \$37,000 in excess of those of any previous year. CONTINUATION OF HURON AND ERIE REPORT.

Since our last meeting the Company has suffered a great loss by the death of Dr. William Saunders, C. M. G., a former President and Director of the Company. His long experience as Director of the Experimental Farm System of Canada, his knowledge of agriculture and of land values in the Northwest Provinces, and his sound judgment were much

appreciated by his fellow directors, I have pleasure in moving the adoption of the report. The Vice-President, Mr. F. E. Leonard, in seconding the motion to adopt the Report, spoke as follows:

Your approval will be asked to a donation of \$5,000 to the London and Middlesex Patriotic Fund. So warmly

do your Directors support this fund that not only did they pledge the Company to make this donation, but as well are furnishing free of charge the office accommodation and clerical assistance needed for its administration. Bylaws Nos. 42 and 43, which you will be asked to confirm, make provision for the proper conduct of the Company's affairs in view of their recent growth, while Bylaw No. 44 puts upon a definite basis the Pension Fund established under the resolutions heretofore passed by the shareholders.

I have pleasure in seconding the adoption of the report. In discussing the report, Mr. W. J. Christic, of Winnipeg, who for thirty years has been a resident of the Province of Manitoba, after congratulating the company upon so handsome a statement in a year of disturbance like 1914, pointed out that although in certain portions of the Provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta there had been a crop shortage last year owing to conditions of drought, there had rarely been a more propitious autumn for the preparation of land than the one just passed. BY CORPORAL FREDERICK WILLIAM HOLMES, V. C. [Corporal Holmes' Own Story Was Obtained by Mary Boyle O'Rellly, The Advertiser's London Representative.]

London, Eng., Feb. 13.-My story can be told in a few wards. But thousands of words would not convey the bravery and gallantry of the regiments around me, and particularly the bulldes pluck of my own battalion, sticking determinedly to their trenches below that little hill near Le Cateau, when the regiments to their right and left had been ordered to retire.

To have seen our boys on that glorious autumn afternoon fighting brilliantly against desperate odds, fighting over every foot of the ground, and "taking it out" of the advancing Germans, although it was a rearguard action, would make a sight to forever live in memory. This is the spectacle that thrills me every time I think of it, while the incident which has brought the honor of the Victoria Cross to me is very small indeed beside it.

GERMANS OVER HILL. We were in our trenches at Le Cateau and our retreat from Mons had nly just begun. I do not remember my feelings at the moment. I think I must have had none. The gun was there, and I plunged in to save it from capture. GETS AWAY WITH GUN.

I fixed the trumpeter on one of the rear pair of horses, picked up a bayenet off the grass, turned the lever of the gun to safety, jumped on the leading pair of horses, prodded them with the bayonet, and off we galloped over the road. We went at a furious pace, and passed many of our dead in the first stage of this dash. After going a few miles I caught up the rear of the column and reported to an officer of the artillery.

This was not done, however, without a tragic mishap, which grieves me and pains me every time I think of that afternoon. I turned my head back to see how the trumpeter was faring, and I found that he must have fallen off on the way. I believe that no more has been heard of him-he is missing. Hard luck!

Mr. T. H. Purdom, President, having taken the chair, asked Mr. Mills to act as secretary and read the Annual Report, as follows:

FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT TO THE SHAREHOLDERS OF THE DOMINION SAVINGS AND INVESTMENT SOCIETY.

The directors beg leave to submit their report for the year ending December 31, 1914, together with the duly audited balance sheet.

The Society's Building was destroyed by fire so as to render it unfit for occupation on the 21st day of April. It was rebuilt, and reoccupied in the beginning of December. The Manager of The Ontario Loan & Debenture Company kindly offered the use of the offices formerly occupied by The Agricultural Loan Company, which were very suitable. In consequence, the business of the Society suffered very little. "The Dominion Savings Building" is now as near fireproof as possible.

The dividend was increased. Two half-yearly dividends at the rate of five per cent per annum amounting to the sum of \$46,737.76 were paid. The Reserve Fund was increased by the sum of \$25,000.00, and now amounts to the sum of \$225,000.00. The Contingent Account was slightly increased, and now stands at the sum of \$4,464.36.

These sums consume the net profits \$71,785.24, which were larger than usual for exceptional reasons. Last year and this year, additional profits were realized which made the net profits greater than could be realized in the usual course of business.

The Directors paid the sum of \$500.00 to the Patriotic Relief Fund. They have faith in the British Statesmen of today, and believe that they are quite equal to any of Great Britain's 'illustrious sons of long, long ages." They earnestly hope that their views will soon prevail and peace be restored.


