ANOTHER MUTINY FEARED

London, Nov. 22.-Evidences of unrest in India have deepened the apprehensions with which the outlook in that section of the British Empire is regarded in responsible quarters. King Edward's recent proclamation seems to have had the immediate effect of initiating a series of political offences and demonstrations of disaffection. The alarmists are talking of another mutiny, and one highly placed officer in particular, who has just arrived in London from India, is circulating a statement to the effect that the Indian Government is in the possession of evidence showing that a systematic propaganda has been set on foot with the object of tampering with native troops.

In official circles the idea of another mutiny on any considerable scale is regarded as practically impossible, but, nevertheless, the situation is viewed with considerable anxiety. One authority-that same Indian officer-said:

"We wish that we could ascribe the agitation to the partition of Bengal alone, for then it would die down, but the truth is that sedition and unrest are spreading to all parts of the

BRITANNIA STILL RULES THE WAVE.

The Navy League Annual for 1908-9 contains an interesting article on the various powers. It shows no change often and as long as he pleases when in their relative positions, Great Britain still being greatly in advance of all competitors, followed by the United States, Germany, France, Japan, Italy, Austria-Hungary and Russia, the latter's navy still showing the effects of the war with Japan. Battleships are divided by the writer into Dreadnoughts and pre-Dreadnoughts and armored cruisers into Indomitables and pre-Indomitables. Britain is credited with six Dreadnoughts and Japan with two. Other cruisers are outclassed by Indomitables as former battleships are by Dreadnoughts, and of these modern cruisers Great Britain has or soon will have afloat the only three yet constructed.

CANADIAN DOCTOR DIED A MARTYR

Dr. Thos. Wilson, Foremerly of Attwood, Dies of the Glanders.

A VICTIM OF A DARING ZEAL

Investigator Is Exposed in His Quest for a Cure for the Rare Disease.

Chicago, Nov. 21 .- Dr. Thomas M. Wilson, 405 West Monroe street, died early yesterday morning at the Presbyterian Hospital, a victim of his unrestrained zeal for scientific research. Like so many of his colleagues in the medical profession, Dr. Wilson lost his own life in an attempt to stay the ravages of disease among his fellow men.

The disease to which he succumbed after weeks of torture was glanders, a malady which rarely attacks the human organism, but which is one of the most malignant and stubborn known to medical science. So uncommon is the disease, indeed, that the belief is general that horses alone are subject to it. He was attended by Dr. Arthur Bevan and Dr. Frank Billings.

For twelve months Dr. Wilson had over which he had been working.

Battles Without Hope.

Familiar as he was with the deadly nature of the disease he must have known during the three weeks that he battled for life at the hospital that there was little hope. Yet the only regret he expressed was that death should come to him in a way which might be attributed by other members of his profession to carelessness. To his associates at the laboratory

ne said "I don't mind dying, but I hate like blazes to go from this infection. Peo-

ple may think that I was careless." When Dr. Wilson realized that his case was desperate he begged the attending physicians to adminter to him a remedy which he believed might save him. The physicians, however, declined to take the responsibility.

Dr. Ludwig Hektoen, head of the institute, said last night that Dr. Wilson had been a most thorough and patient investigator, and that undoubtedly his researches would have been of value o the medical fraternity had he been able to throw them into their final piece the notes together so that something of the contribution he was preparing to make may become known.

Mystery in Infection.

Little is known at the institute of how the infection took place, and if Dr. Wilson knew he failed to reveal the fact. It is supposed that he inhaled some of the bacilli while he was working over a culture in the laboratory of the institute more than three weeks ago. The first intimation Dr. Hektoen had of his unfortunate plight was when he received a telephone message from the Presbyterian Hospital acquainting him with the facts.

Dr. Wilson's preliminary equipment had been exceptionally thorough. He was a graduate of the University of Toronto in science, and of Rush Medical College in medicine. He was about to receive the degree of doctor of philosophy from the University of Chicago. He already had passed the test in his major subject, physiology, and was preparing to submit to examination in pathology, which was his minor.



omorrow. That is, usually. This is the unusual case. Ketchell is due to whip Papke. You like Papke? Very well; you pick the Illinois boy, and I'll stand by the Wolverine. It's a difference of opinion-good-natured difference, understand; and after all, neither of us may be right, and the referee may call it a draw.

As far as my reasoning goes, there is really no reason why Ketchell shouldn't whip Papke. They met in Milwaukee, and Stanley won on a wide margin. Then Biggs and Burton; quarter. And Ketchell's, I take it, is a real lion's heart. He will not be afraid of Papke because that young man had the good fortune once upon a time of knocking him silly. Far from it. His feelings will be those of gratitude, that he has before him the opportunity of exacting vengeance, and rage to be about his task. Doubtless he will jump into the fray in his old familiar way, throwing caution to the wind, ipping and slashing and hooking and jabbing, with all his guns in action at once, and his heart set on a quick knockout.

CANNOT CHANGE HIS STYLE. His friends, of course, will counsel him to have a care, to guard himself more, o draw the other's fire and hold his own back; but it will be wasted counsel. Ketchell must fight his old, natural way. It's his style. When you change a man's style you ruin him. People remain mediocre because they try to fight life's

scrimmages with another man's style. You've seen pugilists do it.

Benny Yanger is a sample case. He was real good, had a rough-and-ready way that landed them, one after the other, as often as they faced him. His style was ough, but his own. Then the managers and the critics took hold of him. They old him he wasn't fighting prettily enough, that he ought to pattern after Gentleman Jim" Corbett. So Benny discarded his own crude style, and took up the fancy boxing. That ended Benny Yanger right then and there as a championship factor. He continued to outpoint opponents, but he couldn't knock 'em ut as of old. Finally he ran into someone who could knock him out, and-that's the end of Benny Yanger's story.

Ketchell, being a wise man, doubtless will not court defeat by amending and evising his battle plans.


