NEGRO LYNCHED BY MOB AFTER REFUSED VOTE

Oriando, Fla., Nov. 3.—A negro named Perry, who shot and killed two men at Ocose after he had been refused a vote, was lynched early today outside the corporate limits of Oriando. He was hanged to a tree and his body riddled with builets.

Election officials say Perry was refused a vote because he had not paid his poll tax. He returned to the voting place last night with a shotgun, and opened fire on the white men, killing two, one a war veteran, and wounding several others, not seriously. Perry was arrested and later taken from the officers by a mob.

PROHIBITION PLAN AS APPROVED IN B. C., IS **FULL OF LOOPHOLES**

Provincial Government Finds Itself Powerless To Act.

NEEDS FEDERAL AID

Dominion Parliament Alone Can Sanction Forbidding of Importation.

[Special To The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Nov. 3.-According to ficial opinion here the province British Columbia is in a somewhat interesting tangle with regard to its recent liquor referendum. The result of that referendum which was purely provincial and not federal in character, was to substitute for the existing provincial act, Government control of the sale of intoxicating liquors, it is now for the Government of the province to introduce legislation implementing the people's will.

Sebastopol, Nov. 3.—Four Soviet armies, with squadrons of cavalry, are pushing southward from Melitopot of the railway to Alexandrovsk, some fifty miles north of the Crimean Peninsula, in an attempt to cut off the forces of Gen. Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik commander, in retreat before the Soviet offensive. Some of the Wrangel troops are being removed by transports on the Sea of Azov from Tauride Province into the Crimea.

POLISH VOLUNTEERS OCCUPY MINSK CITY.

Copenhagen, Nov. 3.—Polish "volunteer" forces commanded by Gen. Bulak Balakovitch, have occupied the city of Minsk, which was reported on October 18 to have been taken over by the Bolsheviki from the Poles, according to newspaper dispatches. It is said these troops which have been reported operating in the rear of the Bolshevik lines for the past two weeks, are seriously threatening Smolensk, a city on the Dnieper River, about 250 miles northwest of Moscow, and it is asserted they plan an advance against the soviet capital. capital.

THREE SCHOOL PLAN ADOPTED AFTER BATTLE

Board of Education Assured Department Behind Solution of Collegiate Problem.

As a result of a long and wordy meeting of the board of education held Tuesday afternoon, three separate high chools situated in the north, south and east ends of the city in all probability will be built, London, thereby finding a solution of one of the most vexing problems ever to face a local board of education. With the adoption of this educational building program the original plan for a 26-room central to be erected on the former site Collegiate Institute will be dis-

This decision was reached by the This decision was reached by the board after many arguments and a long discussion in which every member took part, and despite a bitter fight put up by Trustees Edwin Smith, A. N. Udy and John Eggett, who favored the central school plan, with feeders in the outlying districts. It was the direct outcome of a visit of a deputation from No. 3 committee of the board to the department of education in Toronto, where the matter was thoroughly discussed.

It was also decided that the most feasible site for the north end school, which is to be built first, and completely care for the immediate needs of the city, would be the Beck property at Richmond and St. James streets, which was recently offered for sale to the school board. With this in view, No. 3 committee was given full power to take steps to immediately secure the property. The objection of Edwin Smith, who thought that the citizens should first be given a vote on it, was overruled.

Strong Favor.





Harding issued a statement tonight stating that instead of being exultant over the result he was "more given to prayer to God to make me capable of playing my part." Philadelphia, Pg., Nov. 3.—Senator Harding carried Pennsylvania yesterday by probably the largest plurality ever given a candidate in this state. The whole Republican state ticket was also elected by large pluralities, and the Democratic representation from Pennsylvania in congress was reduced.

Returns indicate that Senator Harding's vote will exceed that given to Roosevelt in 1904, when the colonel carried the state by 505,519, and may reach 600,000.

Complete figures from Philadelphia showed a plurality for the Ohlo senator of 219,945. The vote in the city was: Harding 302,165, Cox 87,641.

Eugene V. Debs, the Socialist candidate for president, polled 17,527 votes in Philadelphia, a gain of 12,811 over the Socialist presidential vote of four years ago.

Surrounded by members of his family and a circle of neighbors and personal friends he received quietly at his home here the tribute of the millions who had voted to present him on his 55th anniversary with the presidency of the United States.

The smile of confidence he had worn for weeks broadened as he read the early returns and began to receive a few of constants.

The smile of confidence he had worn for weeks broadened as he read the early returns and began to receive a flow of congratulatory messages hailing him as president-elect. He deferred any formal comment, however, until the result should have been established beyond all doubt.

During the day he outwardly had concerned himself very little with the pending national decision. With Mrs. Harding he voted during the morning and then made off for a forty-mile automobile ride and a game of golf at the Scioto Club near Columbus. He returned early in the evening, his face flushed by the raw fall air and his spirits heightened by the tramp over the muddy golf links.

Returns collected by the Associated Press were delivered to the senator in his home during the evening from the special leased wire which had been installed within a hundred feet of his front porch since the campaign began.

As throughout the whole campaign, Mrs. Harding was an active figure during the evening about the candidate's headquarters.

There may be lots to be said against the plan, and it hasn't worked out at its best in many places, but it looks like the only solution.


