BOY'S MANHOOD MORTGAGED BY DILATORINESS

By L. M. Houlding, Secretary of the London Boys' Work Board.

"What are you going to make of yourself, Bill?" is a common question of the boy to boy, parent to boy, instructor to boy and church to boy; common but vastly more important in its consequences than any other question save that of his decision to follow the Christ.

Keeping in mind the boy, the leadership and the church, let us honestly and frankly discuss the question of how we

frankly discuss the question of how we can wisely direct the boy into his proper life-long calling.

Few teen-age boys know themselves. Their whole life spells activity, and they rarely ever take time to sit down by the side of the road and watch themselves go by with the definite object of placing themselves into their life's work. I know of nothing finer to make these boys think than the use of a well prepared self analysis blank, such as that issued by the London Boys' Work. Board. A large number of boys answering the many printed questions, received a revelation of their own temperament and were more than surprised to know of the variety of opportunities of work open to them in the industrial, professional, commercial and agriculprofessional, commercial and agricul-tural fields.

Self Determination.

Self Determination.

Every boy must study his own talents or faculties or capabilities and alongside of this self analysis he must place his knowledge of the jobs available in life. This plan should at least give him a general direction.

He needs help. He looks to the public schools and finds no solution to his hunger for a knowledge of vocations and their requirements. In the average school he gets little to help discover his individuality. One of the liveliest agitations in educational circles today is for vocational educators. Detroit, like many other wide-awake cities, has full-time vocational directors, who not full-time vocational directors, who not only help the boys while in school, but they follow them out into their em-

they follow them out into their employments.

In London today we need a new hotel, it is true; we also need a union station and many municipal improvements, but there is even a greater and a more insistent need. If it is true that boys are the greatest asset in the community, then it naturally follows that one of the first acts of the new board of education should be the securing of two efficient vocational councillors or directors one for boys and one for girls; experts who not only assist the boys and girls to find their callings, but who will see that they get better facilities for training in the schools, where the boy spends 1,000 hours a year in a manmaking process. ployments. In Lond making process.

making process.
Education is misunderstood by so many chaps. They see their pals out making money, and they want to cut school and light on to the first job that presents itself. Here is where the church can step in to dignify education; to concern itself with the boy who is too anxious to pass out into the domain of toil and at an early age mortgages his manhood. his manhood,

his manhood.

Let the church assist the boy to choose his calling and get ready for it, to teach that education means better jobs, higher wages, greater efficiency, truer happiness, nobler citizenship and increased service.

What is of more value to the church.

What is of more value to the church, What is of more value to the church, a skilled efficient man, or a cheap, idle man, disposed to worthlessness. The church answers this easily, but it so often forgets its mission to the young, growing manhood, and spends its time in a sort of mutual improvement society for adults. The 'teen-age boys drift out of the church body so easily, and then we strain our patience, our energy and our money to bring them back into the church membership and church relachurch membership and church rela

tionships.

The church has a mission to the growing boy to guide and inspire him.
I owe much to the splendid leadership
of men in the church of my boyhood,
which had vision enough to handle our which had vision enough to handle our gang so ably, that when it came time for us to choose our life's work they were prepared to wisely suggest the occupations open to us through their knowledge of our dispositions, our faculties and our ambitions.

Vocational Guidance.

This is the age of service. No unit is more fitted than the church to point out to the inquiring boy the jobs that will best enable him to serve his community yielding him the maximum

will best enable him to serve his com-munity yielding him the maximum amount of enjoyment and of service. If we were conscientious about this task it would not be necessary for two of our strong denominations to go over to England and Scotland in order to re-cruit preachers for Canadian pulpits.









Motorist Emphasizes Points in most cases. Necessary For Economical Operation of Cars.

Advises Use of Hand Throttle in Place of Foot Accelerator.

Nearly everyone is interested in the question of minimizing car expense, and the ways or methods that may be employed are numerous and varied. Every motorist has a different

angle on the problem. Some emphasize tires; others gasoline, and so on. The suggestions given herewith are the best and most practical selected after putting the question of economy to a large number of experienced motorists.





No laws prohibit pedestrians from using the streets. In fact, pedestrians have equal rights on the streets with automobiles and other vehicles, to get their bearings before at-Just because some pedestrians use the streets needlessly and incaudrivers of motor vehicles not taking some other person you are usuan, every precaution to avoid injuring held responsible. Juries are incline edestrians. Drivers can think of many laws your wife, your child, or someone that if enacted, and enforced could else near and dear to you. limit the movement of the pedestrian, but until such laws are passed we must remember that the law is usually on the side of the pedestrian.

Driver Must Use Care. Automobile drivers must be espe-cially careful to avoid injuring pedestrians who cross the street at the middle of the block.

Many accidents happen at regular rossings. If pedestrians do not pay attention to your horn, that some people are deaf, while others are mentally deficient, and that hundreds of people are using the streets whose old age, youth, infirmities, and physical defects would throw all the responsibility of an accident upon you.

Be especially careful when two or more people are crossing the streets together. Quite often before an approaching automobile one may stop, or they may separate and

Above all, do not unnecessarily or suddenly squawk your horn. Pedestrians may be easily frightened and temporarily "paralyzed." Public Gets Nervous

Drivers should stop 10 feet behind street cars which have stopped to load or unload passenger.

BOTH STAND PAT.

Hazleton, Pa., April 15.—The third week of the anthracite coal mine suspension started today with unbroken ranks among the men, and no efforts on the part of any company to resume, according to statements given out at headquarters of the union.

The streets of Hazleton and all other large anthracite centers in this district were alive with idle miners today in preparation for the observance of Easter, which is always one of their big holidays. In normal times the colleries generally have been forced to shut down the Monday after Easter on account of the Dublin ASK NON-UNIONISTS' AID.

Indianapolis, April 14. — With the end today of the second week of

the general suspension of work in the coal industry, interest at union headquarters here was centred in the pro gress of enlisting more non-union workers in the walkout. The total of 665,000 idle miners, claimed by the unions, showed a gain of more than 25,000 during the week, and the opinion in union circles was that the strike had not yet reached its peak strength. Gains scored in the Pennsylvania

coke districts were the most significant developments from the union point of view, while the only reverse seemed the temporary injunctions, affecting two important West Virginia fields, which hampered the union activities. In the latter fields, however, the union did not admit any loss of men, who joined in the suspension during the first week. Plans also were being laid by counsel for the union to contest the court orders, with the view of casting them aside, whole, or part. The support gained in the Penn-

sylvania non-union fields had enouraged union officials to concentrate much of its work there, new organizers having been sent into the districts. While the hope apparently was to gain a complete shutdown of the mines there, no prediction of such success had yet been made by union officials. Organizers in some localities were said to be having trouble establishing contact with the nonunion workers, union officials assert-ing that meetings were difficult or impossible because of the activities of the mine guards.

Abdicates When Partisans
Present Demands to French Authorities.

PARIS, April 14.—The Nationalist agitation in Tunis on the eve of the visit of President Millerand, who is due there towards the end of the month, is attracting considerable attention, although up to the present it has developed any great force. The Communists have joined the Nationalists in the agitation, but it is said in official circles that the number of persons engaged in it does not exceed five or six hundred.

The abdication of the Bey has been eported and denied several times. It is now reaffirmed by a Frenchman, M. Fabre, who was expelled from Tunis, and who declares the partisans of the Bey presented 21 de-mands for reforms to the French authorities, the Bey abdicating when no satisfaction was given. To this report also an official denial has been given.

APPEALS ELECTION CASE

nsel For Hon. R. B. Bennett Protests Court's Decision on West Calgary Contest.

CALGARY, April 13 .- An appeal in he Bennett-Shaw West Calgary election case from the judgment handed down recently by Mr. Justice Stuart and Mr. Justice Ives, has been forwarded to the registrar of the supreme court of Canada at Ottawa by counsel for Hon. R. B. Bennett. The judgment of the supreme court of Alberta allowed Mr. Shaw the election by the majority of seventeen votes, the previous recount giving him sixteen.

The appeal forwarded on behalf of Mr. Bennett will be laid before the judge of the supreme court in cham-bers, who will decide whether the record has to be printed or not. He will then decide if the case is to be heard at the sitting in May or held over until October.

MONTREAL MAN STABBED

Stanley Smith in General Hospital With Two Knife Wounds.

MONTREAL, April 14 .- What is thought to be an aftermath of the murder of Vicenzo Trescoli, who was killed in his restaurant in the east end of the city, January 5, last, occurred last night when Stanley Smith, 42 years of age, who was a witness in the Trescoli case, was stabbed on St. Catherine Street West, the city's most crowded thoroughfare, by a man so far uncaptured.

The victim received two knife wounds and is now in the general hospital, where his wounds are reported as not serious. At the time of the stabbing, Smith is reported to have said that it did not matter if pened, some one else would be killed


