THE WAR SITUATION.

The startling report comes by way of Tokio that Admiral Marakoff has abandoned Port Arthur and is making a dash for Vladivostock, having first blocked the entrance to the harbor by sinking four merchantmen. Admiral Togo's scouting ships have failed to find any sign of the Russian squadron. If the Russians has decided upon this bold stroke they will probably endeavor to get out to open sea by way of the Korcan Straits. Dalny is said to have been occupied by the Japs, and another of the Mikado's armies is marching on New Chwang. China repeats her intention of remaining neutral, but is rushing large bodies of troops to garrison the Manchurian frontier. Russia's present plan is to fall back at all points until a sufficiently large force is mobilized to cope with the Japs. They have already withdrawn well north of the Yalu.


