## PORT ARTHUR FALLING

Jap Miners Destroy Walls and Force Russian Retirement.

Side Escamped On Hills Russing Out te the Bay-All the Northern Defences Shattered-Every Commanding Mill In Possession of the Japanese-End Is

Tokio, Nev. 23 .- The fall of Port

Tokio, Nev. 23.—The fall of Port Arthur may now be regarded as imminent. The Russian forces practically are all on the southern side of the city, encamped on the hills running out to the bay. On Sunday morning the Japanese miners were able to destroy the redoubts on the southerly side of Quail Hill and southwest of Rihlung Meuntain.

This forces the retirement of the Russian defenders to the hills back of Port Arthur and into a series of entrenchments between Orlung and Laoluichui forts. From these points and from Golden Hill the Russian artillery can dominate the city of Port Arthur and prevent its occupation, but the northerly defences of the town are now shattered and events. Port Arthur and prevent its occupa-tion, but the northerly defences of the town are now shattered and ev-ery commanding hill is in possession of the Japanese troops. The Imperial Army Board an-nounces that on Sunday shells from the navel some of Overline in the payel some

nounces that on Sunday shells from the naval guns on Quail Hill battered the Russian warships. The vessels were towed out to Weiyuen fort, on the easterly side of Tiger's Tail, but shells at a high angle can be dropped even now among the fleet. The last of the entrenchments south of Rihlung Mountain were mined and destroyed on Sunday morning. These were the last remaining permanent fortifications due north of Port Arthur.

RARE CAMBRIAN FOSSILS. The Vorld-Famous Collection of Dr. Mat-thew, of St. John, N.B.

The University of Toronto has again been the recipient of a gener-ous gift. The collection of Cambrian fossils made by Dr. George F. Mat-thew of St. John, N.B., one of the two acknowledged experts in North two acknowledged experts in North America in Cambrian palaeontology, has been for sale for some months, and until now it was feared that, although it can never be duplicated, it would, like so many other Canadian objects of scientific interest, become the possession of one of the great museums of the United States or Great Britain. The sum required, several hundred dollars, was not at the disposal of the University of Toseveral hundred dollars, was not at the disposal of the University of Toronto, nor apparently at the disposal of the National Museum at Ottawa, to which the collection would certainly be a most valuable addition. However, by the generosity of Mr. William Mackenzie, of the Toronto Street Railway, this collection has been saved to Canada, and will become the possession of the university. In addition to the cost of the collection, Mr. Mackenzie has also provided the cost of a number of cases for the fossils.

The following note on Dr. Matthew's collection by Mr. Parks of the university will be of interest:

In view of the great antiquity of the Cambrian series, well preserved organic remains are exceedingly scarce in these strata. In fact, nearly all the Cambrian fossils ever found, in any part of the world, are more or less fragmentary and imperfect. However, as the history of the chain of life, so far as it is exhibited

fect. However, as the history of the rect. However, as the history of the chain of life, so far as it is exhibited by fossils, begins with the organisms of the Cambrian, the importance of the forms there occurring cannot be over-estimated. It is almost superfluous to say that the scarcity and fragmentary character of these fossils render their collection very difficult and their 'dentification imposcult and their 'dentification impossible, except to one who has made a
life study of the organisms of this
distant period. Such an one is Dr.
Seorge F. Matthew of St. John, N.
B. Forty years ago Dr. Matthew began the study of the Cambrian rocks
of New Brunswick. At that time but
one or two fossils were known in
these rocks; now more than 400 have
been recognized, and every one of been recognized, and every one of these is represented in the collec-tion. We have then 400 different species each represented by from five to ten specimens, say 2,500 in all. The peculiar value, both academic and historical, lies, however, not in the numbers of the collection, but in the fact that they are nearly all the actual specimens first found and described by Dr. Matthew, in technical language the "type specimens". language, the "type specimens." These can never be duplicated, and must always remain a unique and valuable possession of the University

of Toronto. Besides containing all the type specimens, the collection shows many forms which, in addition to being type or first specimens, are absoluteby the only ones ever found. This will serve to show the peculiar value of such material and to point out the extreme rarity of many of the organisms of this ancient series of rocks.

Another feature of this collection of especial value is the fact that it is complete; it contains all the known fossils from the Cambrian of eastern Canada. It is unnecessary to say that such a remark can be made of very few collections from any place

r any age.
In addition to the material above described, the collection contains about as many more specimens from the Cambrian of other parts of the world, making in all about 5,000 specimens.

The Canadian Jay. Mr. Charles Pickering of Toronto, writes: On the 15th October I saw three Canada jays (Perisoreus Cana-densis), the Wis-Ka-Tjan of the Indian, the Whiskey Jack of the lum-berman, which were killed this morning on Fisherman's Island. Though common throughout northern On-tario and northward to Arctic Am-erica, it is very rare in southern Ontario. MeIlwraith in his Birds of Ontario gives no authentic record of its capture so far south, though he mentions hearing of one being taken at Oshawa. This bird, well known to all lumbermen and prospectors, with whom he is a star boarder, is not thought so much of by the hunt-ter, for whom he has destroyed many a fine carcass of venison, tearing off the fat and strips of flesh, which he would store in the cleft of some nearwould store in the cleft of some near-hy tree for future use. Who can tell the cause of this unusual migration? It cannot be fear of cold nor yet scarcity of food, as he is a general scavenger, as much at home in the dense pine forest as around the min-ing camps, picking up whatever is thrown out in the shape of food. On the 15th I saw a large flock of snow-birds, and on the 11th and 12th flocks of wild geese were seen. On the 16th three more Canada jays were seen.

Came of Newfoundland.

Newfoundland, like Ireland, is innocent of snakes or reptiles. Its hills, all in the interior, are infested with bears, mountain lions, wolves, foxes and gophers. Song birds are few, the robin predominating in numbers, although there is a species of unmusical jay that may outnumber the redbreasted beauty familiar to more southerly and inland latitudes.

## GOVERNOR-GENERAL

Farewell Dinner to Earl Grey At the Princess in London.

Lord Strathcona Presided and Informe Governor-General Elect That He Would Find a People Proud of the Name Cana dian-In Response, Lord Grey Made Many Prophesies of the Coming Great ness of This Colony of the Empire.

London, Nov. 22.-(C.A.P.)-Som 230 assembled in the Princess Les-taurant, London, at a farewell din-ner to Earl Grey, Governor-Genera-elect of Canada. Amongst others present were the Archbishop of Can-terbury, the Agents-General of Bri-tish Columbia and Nova Scotia, the Earl of Aberdeen, the Earl of Lith field, General Lord William Sey mour, Lord Vaux of Harrowden, Vis-count Bury, Baron Suyjatza of the Japanese Embassy, Rt. Hon. Sir John Brodrick, M. P., Sir Percy Girouard, Sir Neville Lyttelton, Sur Charles Rivers-Wilson, Major-Gener-al Baden-Powell and J. G. Colmer, cretary to the Canadian High Com-

issioner.
Lord Aberdeen, in proposing the Imperial forces, drew attention to the splendid work done by the Cana-dians in South Africa. The Cana-dians combined pride in the British Empire with equal pride in the great Dominion to which they specially beonged. He emphasized the high op-nion of them held by Col. Lake. Sir Neville Lyttelton said dians were always ready to help the mother country, as was proved in the South African campaign.

Preud of Their Name,

Lord Strathcona, the chairman, read a letter of regret from Lord Lansdowne, who was unable to be Lansdowne, who was unable to be present, owing to the death of a near relative. In the letter he said the new Governor-General would find the inhabitants of the Dominion proud of the name Canadian, and still more proud to be members of the British Empire. A short time ago the (Lord Strathenna) was desired by he (Lord Strathcona) was desired by the Premier and Government of Canada, to say that Lord Grey would receive the warmest possible wel-come. Lord Strathcona then proposed the toast, "The Dominion of Canada and the Governor-General-

Lord Grey's Response,

Lord Grey, in responding, referred to the Anglo-French agreement and, remembering a third of the Cana-dians were French, he felt grateful to Lord Lansdowne for the manner in which the way had been smoothed. The Duke of Argyll, better known to Canadians as the Marquis of Lorne, had told him he was never so happy as when Governor-General of Canada himself. He was going to a country where there was a sky blue atmosphere sparkling like champagne. The Canadian winter was more exhilarating than the average English summer. In vastness of wealth, var-iety of resources and breed of mer-iety of average by any portion of the globe. He hoped to see by the conclusion of his term of office, the American mails reaching England through Canadian ports instead of vice versa, and was looking forward to the time when steamers would cross to Canada in four days. Our Magnificent Future.

He looked forward with the great-st zeal to five years in Canada, whose population, he said, there was every reason to expect, "in the life-time of our sons, and perhaps even of some of us here present," would equal that of the United Kingdom. The Archbishop of Canterbury dwelt on Canada's splendid presper-ity, judging from her tremendous re-

Mr. Brodrick, Secretary for India, also addressed the company, as did Vice-Admiral Sir Archibald Douglas, one of the lords commoners of the Admiralty, who had served in Can-ada in 1866.

A Note of Optimism.

The Times says Earl Grey struck a note of optimism at the Canada Club, and sees clearly the great destiny unfolding for the Dominion, the great west being eagerly taken up by settlers in a way giving some fore-shadowing of the vast possibility of the future. It says Lord Grey apthe future. It says Lord Grey approaches his task in the spirit of an Imperial patriot, well informed not only by experience gained in the Doonly by experience gained in the Dominion, but also in different regions of the colonial Empire. The Times says the governor of a self-governing colony is not exactly an expensive figurehead, yet he has no room for intrusive political activity. No doubt every colonist can tell a good governor when he sees one.


