A Brief Sketch by the Senior Pastor.



HIS beautiful structure is the result of the growth in our people, of the love of fine art, and the development of that sentiment which demands the best we have for God and His work. The present edifice is the fourth in a series of churches built for St. James' Congregation. The first church was humble enough. In 1803, the Rev Joseph Sawyer came to Montreal from his circuit on the Bay of Quinte to see if a Minister could be stationed here. In accomplishing the journey he rode through forests for about 250 miles. He found a few Methodists waiting for a stationed Minister, and in 1804 Samuel Mervin was sent to them. In 1807 the congregation built their first church, on St. Sulpice Street. In 1821 the second church was erected on the corner of St. James and St. François Xavier Streets. The congregation rapidly increased in

numbers, and in 1844 it was decided to build the third church, known as "Great St. James Street Church," from the Street on which it stood. The corner stone of this church was laid by the late Senator Ferrier who had the unique honor of laying the corner stone of the present building, with the same trowel, forty two years later.

For over Forty years the church which we now call "the old St. James Street Church" was the grand rallying-centre for the great religious anniversaries of the city. However as the city developed financially the site on which this church stood was required for business purposes, and the residences were pushed to the streets toward the mountain. It was thus imperative that a new site should be chosen and a church built which would be both commodious and attractive, and as the outcome of these requirements the present magnificent church adorns our city.
