

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


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#### ITEMIZED COST OF HAND-MIXED CONCRETE WORK.

Mr. Fred R. Charles, city engineer of Richmond, Ind., has compiled the following notes concerning the cost of five pieces of hand-mixed concrete work done by day labor under his charge as engineer and superintendent of construction.


The first wor': was the construction of an abutment and six river piers for a bridge over the Miami River at Fernald, Ont. The piers were put down with cofferdams. Sand and stone were secured close to the site, but the cement had to be teamed 10 miles. The concrete amounted to 1,542 cu. yd., and cost \$6,30 a yard, made up as follows : Cement at \$2.10 per barrel, \$1.58; sand, 35 cents; stone, 75 cents; bumber, 64 cents; tools, 20 cents; total for materials, \$3.52; pumping, 15 cents; labor at \$1.75, \$2.78.

The second work was the construction of two abutments, measuring 434 cu. yd., for the Ernst street viaduct in Cincinnati. The cost per cu. yd. was 6.08, itemized as follows: Cement, at 1.70, 1.48; sand, 64 cents; stone, 51; lumber, 40 cents; tools, 6 cents; total for materials, 53.58; excavating in rock and shale, \$1.12; mixing end placing concrete, \$1.13; building forms, 25 cents. Labor was paid \$1.75 a day.


The third work was the construction of 570 cu. yd. of concrete in the pedestals of the Quebec avenue viaduct at Cincinnati. These measured 5 ft. square on top and were from 8 to 20 ft. high. Their location was very inconvenient for the delivery of materials, which was wholly team and wheelbarrow work. The total cost was \$7.16 per cu. yd., itemized as follows : Cement, at \$1.60 a barrel. \$1.40; sand, 53 cents; stone, \$1.84; lumber, 38 cents; tools, 5 cent-; total for materials, \$4.20; labor at \$1.75 a day, \$2.96

The fourth work was a pier, two abutments and some pedestals for a railroad viaduct in Cincinnati. The pier was 56 ft. high and a steam derrick was used in handling the concrete for it. On the remainder of the work all enterials were teamed or wheeld. The total amount of concrete was 2,111 cu. yd., and its cost was \$7.23 per cu. yd., itemized as follows: Cement, at \$1.60, \$1.44; sand, 50 cents; stone, \$1.03; lumber, 54 cents; tools, 25 cents; water, 3 cents; total for materials, \$3.79; labor at \$1.75 a day, \$3.44.

The last work was a reinforced concrete dam across the Whitewater river at Richmond, Ind. It measured 220 cubic yards. The footings were put in with the help of cofferdams and steam pumps. The cost was  $\$_{5}, 58$ , itemized as follows: Cement at \$1.60,  $\$r_{1,4}85$ ; sand and gravel, 80 cents; lumber, 60.8 cents; tools, 44.5 cents; total for materials,  $\$_{3,3}38$ ; clearing and excavating, 96 cents; \$timp forms and mixing concrete,  $\$_{1,007}$ ; pumping 27.5 cents.



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This cut shows ONE of SEVEN arch bridge spans which we are now completing at Ottawa, Ont. 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
Mr. Henry Longcope, recently read a paper on this subject before the National Association of Cement users of the United States. After stating that he had, through the courtesy of Messrs. ConstantineSchuman and Percy H. Watson, two well known engineers, been able to present for the consideration of the Convention a number of illustrations showing the manufacture of concrete piles, and the erection of buildings thereof, under the different methods, he went on to show that the matter of concrete piles and abutments was by no means a modern invention. That it was used by the prehistoric Race of Lake Dwellers which inhabited one portion of Europe. Piles were then driven with very crude instruments. The first method adapted to modern uses was the sand pile, produced by driving a wooden torm in the ground and withdrawing the same ; the hole was then filled with moist sand, well rammed. The next method was to drive a metal form into the ground and, after withdrawing, to fill the hole with con-crete. This he maintained was not successful, because in withdrawing the form the ground would collapse before the concrete could be insert-ed. The next method that was introduced was that of dropping a cone shaped piece of metal weighing five tons, a number of times from a considerable height, in order to form a hole which was alterwards filled with concrete. This method never passed the experimental stage. Then the plan was devised to mold a pile, using concrete, sometimes reinforced. This pile, after perfectly hard, was driven in a similar manner as is now in vogue. While concrete piles made by this method were effective, yet they were open to several criticisms, such as difficulty in handling and the time wasted in waiting for the concrete to set hard. He said that while it seemed well nigh impossible to construct a form that will entirely resist the repeated blows of the hammer, the only solution was to, build all the apparatus of such a rugged nature as to reduce the punishment to a minimum.



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

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
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
