

# BRITISH GUN **GERMAN TERROR**

New Piece of Artillery Soon A Finds the Range-German Fire Effective

London, Oct. 28.—The new British gun, used for the first time in recent days, says the correspondent of the Times in Northern France, has provided a fresh terror for German air-The gun, the correspondent states, succeds in finding its target

Telegraphing about the fighting in Belgium, the correspondent of the Times in Northern France says: "The enemy's most furious and Deutschland, Deutschland, Ueber Almost vigorous attack along the line of the Yser was at Ypres where a quarter of a million Germans, for five critical days, were held back by the British troops

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#### German Soldiers' Songs

CORRESPONDENT who was with the German army in Belgium and France gives a touching description of the enthusiasm of the soldiers in singing the songs of the Fatherland. "When the rumble of the distant cannonade has died away, when the clanking swords are silent at the end of day," he writes "the sound of men's voices, singing in chorus, drifts out on the night air.

"It is a group of German soldiers singing. For no matter how hard the day's work or how long the journey, the German is never supremely happy until he can sing the song that is most typical of the German spirit of

Ueber Alles in der Welt

"The French soldier sings the Marsellaise with a kind of fiery love. The Belgian sings the Brabaconne, which Jenneval called into being during the revolution of 1830. The Englishman remains true to God Save the King. But the German has any number of songs and he sings all of them well.

"The German soldier can march all day and have voice left for a heroic outburst of song at night. This was impressed upon me as I lay in bed at Binche, in Southern Belgium. The chimes in the medieval town hall just across the public square had tinkled a whole chorus on a set of bells that sounded like a child's music box. The more sonorous bell had boomed out which may be translated freely as 'Hold out to the End.' The men had been marching all day and more than half the night and yet they sang with

#### **DEADLY FUMES** USED BY ENEMY

When Worsted by British in Fight at Cambrai

A wounded sergeant of the Royal Berks Regiment, staying with friends in Garlands-road, Redhill, yesterday, gave an account of the night attack the at Cambrai when the regiment lost

The alarm was sounded about nine in the evening. D company, my company, was billeted in a schoolroom, and we fell in just outside and marched along the road. After going about half a mile there was a turn in the road. As soon as we reached this spot we were faced with bursting shells and rifle fire.

We scattered on either side of the road, and crept on our hands and knees for about 100 yards and charged the bridge over the canal. Here we met the Germans in full force, and we fought as we never fought before. About twenty of our men climbed through a fence, and, up to their waists in water, broke through barbed wire entanglements. They got out of this mess and charged the enemy with bayonets on their left, while the remainder of the company used their bayonets on the Germans on their

When at close quarters the Germans screamed and tried to get away, and nearly everyone left was wounded in the back. Quite suddenly a large number of what appeared to be olue lights were thrown at us. We made inquiries next morning as to what they were, and ascertained that the lights were poisonous fumes.

#### VIENNESE SICK OF WHOLE THING

Have Had Enough of Sacrifices in Present War

A message from Vienna says that the hospitals and all temporary asylums for the sick and wounded soldiers being fearfully overcrowded, the City Council has decided to build additional wooden barrack hospitals, with 10,000 beds. A great block of buildings, comprising the University of Vienna, has been entirely given over to wounded soldiers.

The army of destitute and unemployed is increasing daily. Thousands are threatened with starvation. he local authorities estimate that it s necessary to supply free meals to 100,000 persons daily.

Large kitchens are being organized in local centres, capable of supplying food for two to five thousand persons. Meals are distributed through the joint efforts of the Government, the municipality, and private charity, but the burgomaster complains bitterly that private subscriptions fall very short of what might reasonably



Glad to be Off. You can imagine how glad we felt that Sunday night when we heard the siren blow and saw the anchor being weighed. The day we spent on board in St. John's harbour was the heardest part of the whole voyage, and it was very difficult trying not to

The run across was very pleasant, and as I was not a little bit seasick you can judge (from our past travelling experiences) how smooth the water must have been. Nevertheless some of the boys suffered terribly from mal-de-mer, and "Mothersills" was very much in evidence. It was funny to see some of the local "pr ventatives" which were in use.

## **RUSSIANS ON ENEMY'S HEELS**

Chasing the Germans Beyond the Vistula-More Defeats for Austrians

Paris, Oct. 31.—The Havas Agency as received the following official connunication concerning the fighting in the East as issued by the War Office at Petrograd.

Severe fighting is taking place along the East Prussian frontier. Our troops have repulsed repeated attacks in the region of Balkalbeve. Beyond the Vistula, our troops are on the heels of the rear guard of the enemy.

On the Ledz-Yawaghvesk front, a number of artillery parks and aeroplanes have been captured.

In the region of Tarneve, the retreating Austrians were attacked, on Oct. 29th, by our troops, who crossed the Vistula south of Luzezoff. Caught under a cross fire, the ene-
