One of the greatest nuisances that the public has to contend with is the smoking automobile that leaves an evil-smelling smudge as it travels through the streets.
This evilis due mostly to carelessness and in most instances can be avoided. Much of the smoke bricating in from too much luengine. This may come from having the reservoir too full, that is, well above the level indicated by the manufacturer. The remedy would be to draw off the surplus.
