New York, April 9, p. m. A Washington despatch says, that it is generally expected that the President will, in a few days, release Jefferson Davis and Clement C. Clay.

Portland, April 9.—About 200 Fenians sailed for Eastport in the steamer New Brunswick this P. M. The boat was unable to take the arms this trip and a scur was chartered for the purpose.

New York, April 10. The U. S. House of Representatives yesterday passed Civil Rights Bill over the President's veto.

London, April 10.—The British army in Ireland is 40,000 strong, but is composed of about one half Fenians, and there is not a single regiment in which there have not been arrests for Fenianism.

Toronto, C. W., April 10.—Michael Murphy, President of the Hibernian society, and five others were arrested at Cornwall on their way to Portland on suspicion of being connected with the Fenian movements.

New York, April 12. A special despatch to the "Herald" from Eastport, Me., says—"Two large English war ships are here with steam up and port guns open and everything ready."

New York, 13th April.—P. M. The Herald's Eastport, Me., despatch of the 11th says, another English war ship, making three altogether, and a Revenue cutter have arrived during the last 12 hours.

The Herald's Toronto despatch says it is the intention of the Council for Shea to get out a writ of habeas corpus to-morrow. If the prisoner is not released, he will be taken to Cornwall for trial.

The trial of Murphy and his party, commenced at Cornwall, this p. m. Reporters and the public were excluded, in obedience to a provision in the alien act.

Thirty cases of arms which arrived at Ottawa for Volunteers on Monday last, have been spirited away, and search is being made for them.

The Cornwall people sent to Boston for 60 stand of arms, which have arrived.
