THE WAR IN MOROCCO

GRANDE PRAIRIE MUST HAVE A DIRECT ROAD

James I. Brooks, Spirit River Settler, Declares Greatest Need is Direct Communication With Edmonton

The prairies of the Peace River country, sparsely settled, and over five hundred miles removed from Edmonton by the present route of travel, comprise the last great North West, which is more and more engaging the attention of the people of North America.

Not long ago the stories which are spread abroad concerning this last great west. Reliable information is not easily secured. Two men who know pioneer settlers of the Peace River plains are at present visiting Edmonton.

Mr. Brooks has done considerable prospecting in the mountains and says there are good paying copper mines. A specimen of ore which he sent to Minneapolis was analyzed and found to be 84 per cent. pure copper.
