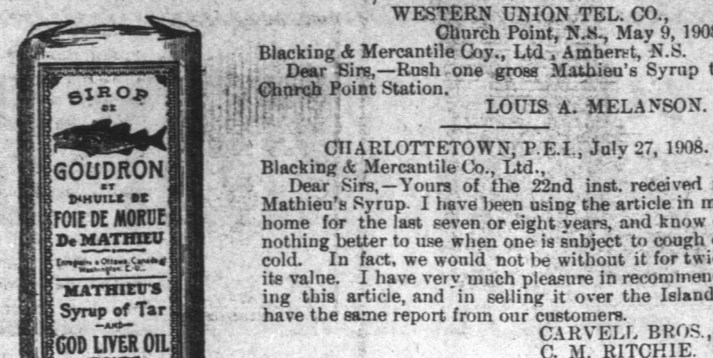

Household Notes.

As you are working around the house, or perhaps are very intent upon some special piece of work, or maybe vexed about something, peep at yourself in the nearest looking-glass and take a moment or two to relax the muscles of the face—and smile.

Discolored marble can quite well be cleaned in the following way: First of all wash with soap and water, then wipe dry and apply a paste made of powdered bathbrick and lemon juice. Rub it well into the marble.

Large-sized collar supporters, says a clever mother, will keep children's soft ribbon sashes from having a "springing" appearance. Get the largest size of celluloid or bone supporters and put one in front and one on each side of the sash—or more, of course. If the softness of the ribbon makes it necessary.

To take out rain marks from the cloth on the right side with a moderately hot iron, placing a clean damp cloth between the material and the iron. The cloth must be kept damp in order to be a success. Treated in this way the rain marks will not only disappear, but the cloth will not spot again.

Frequently only half a cabbage is required at a time. To keep the remainder fresh, wrap it in some of the loose leaves and afterward in damp paper. Put it in a cool place, and it will keep fresh and crisp for a day or two. Half a cut cucumber may be kept fresh by standing it in a tumbler of water.

To remove the deposit from the inside of tea kettles, fill the kettle with water and add to it a drachm of sal-ammoniac. Let it boil for an hour.

When the fur or petted substance found on the metal will be dissolved and can be easily removed. Rub the kettle well, then buff out once or twice before using the contents.

Marks caused by silts or cracked places on furniture are easily filled in with beeswax and the mark is never detected. First, slightly soften the beeswax until it is like putty, then press firmly into the cracks and smooth evenly with a thin knife. With sandpaper rub over the surrounding wood and work the dust into the beeswax.

Woodashes may be scattered freely upon the grass after it has grown. This should be done just before a shower, or the ashes should be watered before they are blown away or lifted by the wind. Only wood ashes are to be used for this purpose. It is better to scatter them over the turf in the late autumn. They protect the roots and sweeten the soil.

Montreal Sued for Ten Thousand Dollars.

Montreal, Sept. 24. — An action claiming \$10,000 damages has been entered against the city of Montreal by the Metropole Hotel Company, as the result of the civic authorities having seized all the stock of liquors in the hotel, which contract was renewed after the commissioners had refused to renew the license. The claim rests upon the legality or otherwise of the notification to the hotel company of the commissioners' refusal.

Members Expelled.

Sydney, N. S. W., September 20. — An uproarious scene took place to-day in the New South Wales parliament. Speaker Willis and the Liberal members at odds for some time outside the House and to-day Willis' rulings were questioned, whereupon the speaker summoned and had seven members expelled amidst wild confusion.

What Does It Matter?

No one was surprised at the publicity given in the Government press to the stunts performed by the Right Honourable leader of the Picnic Party through the bogs of Burin. There was something so human about the whole story that it readily caught the public fancy. Here was the Picnic-in-Chief wined and dined to repetition on the Coronation Picnic, rushing off to Placentia in a special train, barely giving himself time to get a square meal, and only waiting impatiently for an interview with Mr. Emerson, all anxiety to jump in the arena where doughy deeds were to be performed. Not his thin soul to pant in vain for publicity, so long as a trusty press was there to chronicle deeds of derring-do. With actions so mete for the public eye, why should he or his press tire themselves or weary the public mind with a dispute about the building of a Spur Line at Trinity West?

If the Picnic Party provides fun, why should it be called upon to explain what it does not wish to explain?

Having taken the People's name in vain in christening the party, why should it be expected to take the People into its confidence about reciprocity?

Have the people not got a circus? Being provided with spectacles in bog-trotting, picnicking, Government picknicks, why should the people expect rectitude? If the people get the sport, why should they expect principle?

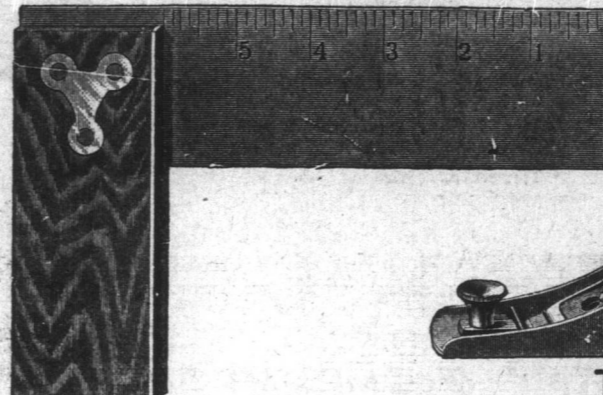

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Workmen for Quebec.

By the express last evening 38 workmen left for Jonquiere, Quebec, to work at installing a large pulp and paper plant. They will be met at Riviere du Loup by Mr. Lincoln, who will take them across the St. Lawrence in a steamer to Lacombe. They will then continue their journey by a smaller steamer up the river Saguenay to Jonquiere where a Quebec lumberer that has acquired timber rights on the Lake St. John is building a large pulp mill. The journey from Tadoussac on the St. Lawrence up to Jonquiere is about 45 miles. Most of the men who went yesterday, can do carpenter work, and a few of them were in Mr. Lincoln's gang when he built the plant at Grand Falls.

An Ambulance Call.

The ambulance was called out last evening to Crosbie's wharf to take J. Sparks, a seaman, of the S. S. Fogota to the General Hospital. He was injured in the head when helping to get a boat into the davits. A doctor was called and temporary aid given. He then suggested that Sparks be sent to Hospital.

Housing Problem.

The representatives of St. John's in the Legislature and the City Council here including Mayor Ellis met in the Executive Council Chamber last evening to receive the report of the sub-committee on the housing problem, selected at a previous meeting. A circular letter addressed to manufacturers and employers generally was drafted and will be sent forward to-day asking them to erect one or more houses for their permanent employees, purely as a business matter, and to relieve the present congestion. The committee intimated that they would call on all employers to discuss the matter freely with them. The Street Railway Co. will be asked to extend their street lines as an aid to this desirable object.

Sale of Work.

The Sale of Work in the Aula Maxima of St. Bonaventure's College was opened by His Grace Archbishop Howley at 2 p.m. The ladies interested have done everything possible to make it a success, and they hope to be liberally patronized by the public.

MEETING POSTPONED.—The meeting of the Cathedral and Sunday School Teachers set down for this evening will not take place till tomorrow at 8 p.m.

FOGOTA HELD UP.—The s.s. Fogota did not sail last evening on account of the E.N.E. gale that prevailed. The wind is abating and she will likely get away this afternoon.

FROM LABRADOR.—The schr. Daisy Kean, Skipper J. Blackwood, arrived from Labrador to Brookfield last Wednesday with 700 qts. of fish. Skipper Blackwood got his fish near Cape Chidley.

SHELTERED AT BURIN.—The storm of last night was very severe in Placentia Bay, and the Argyle had to harbor at Burin as the sea was very high and she could not attempt to cross the Bay.

ONLY HALF FARES.—A large number of Bonavista Bay schooners are still on the Labrador. On the whole the voyage is below the average; one-third of the schooners getting only half a load. Those that secured big trips are very few indeed.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. TOULON, Sept. 26. The official statement gives the casualties resulting from the fire and explosions aboard the warship Liberte as 225 dead and 88 injured.

Special Evening Telegram. CHENG TU, China, Sept. 26. Serious engagements between Government troops and insurgents occurred yesterday at Sha Wang Hu. The troops lost heavily, but the insurgent losses were still greater. The rebels hold Mei Chow.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Sept. 26. A Daily News despatch from Rome this afternoon, says: "It is admitted here that the Italian charge d'affaires at Constantinople has presented to the Porte a note, to the effect that any despatch of Turkish military transports to Tripoli will be regarded as a serious action."

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Sept. 26. The Daily Mail's Paris correspondent learns that if Turkey executes her threat to expel Italian subjects from Tripoli, Italy will instantly declare war. She is willing, however, to meet Turkey in any amicable arrangement that will permit Italy to establish herself in Tripoli.

Special Evening Telegram. TRIPOLI, Sept. 26. Foreigners are alarmed over the situation growing out of the reported intention of Italy to occupy Tripoli in defiance of the Turkish Government. An Arab revolt is feared, and foreigners are fleeing hastily. Every available boat leaving here is crowded with Europeans.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Sept. 26. A despatch from Rome says that a general strike will be declared throughout Italy within twenty-four hours. The Socialists have arranged for the movement as a protest against the occupation of Tripoli. It is expected that the strike will be rigidly enforced in all the principal cities.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Sept. 26. The Government has decided to appoint a Board of Trade Commission empowered to arbitrate all Labor disputes. The Commission will consist of twelve commissioners, representing equally employers and employees, with Sir R. Askwith, the well-known strike-breaker, as its permanent chief.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Sept. 26. The Bank of Egypt, Limited, has suspended payment. In a notice to depositors, the directors say that advances from Egypt make it apparent that the Bank cannot provide sufficient cash to meet current obligations, and that the Company will file a petition for liquidation. The suspension came as a big surprise.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, Sept. 26. The Turkish Ambassador to France said to-day that he did not know whether Italy designed an attempt to occupy Tripoli, but Turkey would maintain the integrity of the Empire. Tripoli, unlike Bosnia and Herzegovina, was not divided either by race or religion. All were Mohammedans. Tripoli was not a Colony, but a vital member of the Empire.

Death of Mrs. Chambers.

At her residence at Pushthrough, on the 18th inst., Mrs. Chambers passed peacefully to the Great Beyond. Deceased who was in her 59th year was a native of Pushthrough, and was loved and respected by all who knew her. Her many friends both far and near, in whose esteem she was held, will read of her death with sadness. She leaves to mourn for her, beside her many friends, a husband, 4 daughters and one son. A Suggestion.

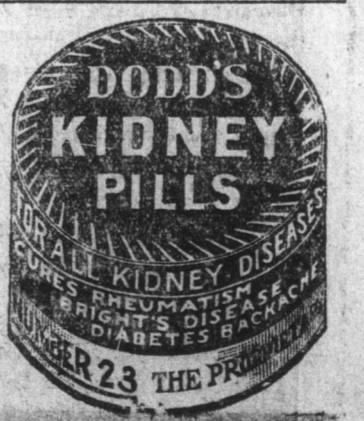

Splendid Indications of Gold.

Country May Rival the Klondyke.
We learn to-day from some of the crew of the Kite, which arrived yesterday from Baffin Land, that Messrs. White and Elmsley have struck a veritable Klondyke in that country. The reticence of these gentlemen as to their discoveries is not natural, but the crew say a big thing is pending and that the world will be startled by and when more exhaustive explorations have been made next summer. To show the faith of the prospectors in the wealth of Baffin Land, we learn that during the coming fall and winter, the syndicate which Mr. Elmsley represents, and the headquarters of which is in Ottawa, will have a steamer built to present extensive inspections of the coast of that comparatively unknown land. She will be equipped with the most modern devices for contending with the Arctic floes and will be a fine substantial vessel capable of wintering in these latitudes. When the Kite was in Baffin Land, Messrs. Elmsley and White were ashore at Brevort and secured excellent results from washings obtained from a river there, also getting a deal of gold-bearing quartz. It was at Salmon River, however, that their greatest success was achieved. The sand of the stream which they washed contained a large percentage of the precious metal and the quartz secured abounded in it. Their principal objective point was Erik River, about 20 miles further north than Pond's Inlet, but the ship could not reach there owing to the ice barrier encountered. If the things hinted at by the crew mature, and they say they are likely to, there will be a rush to Baffin Land which will outrival the famous Klondyke craze. Not alone have samples of gold been brought up, but they also took specimens of iron, copper, platinum and mica, and they say the country abounds also in these minerals.

Turkey More Amenable

LONDON, To-day.
It is learned from high authority that the view of the Porte is that, if Italy is not seeking the territory of or a protectorate over Tripoli, the relieving of the present tension will not prove difficult. The Ottoman Government is ready to consider the reasonable claims of Italy. It is understood that the Italian Government repudiates the suggestion that she is seeking compensation from Morocco or territorial expansion, but complains that Turkey offered systematic opposition to every attempt of pacific Italian expansion and development in Tripoli. Italy is fully determined to insist that she no longer placed under a position of inferiority.

Italy Ready.

VENICE, To-day.
It is reported that three Italian warships have arrived at Tripoli, and are cruising before the harbor. Six thousand troops are assembled at Palermo, ready for embarkation.

Big Battle in China.

CHUNG KING, To-day.
A battle between the Chinese troops and the rebels has taken place at Shuangsten. Heavy casualties are reported. The rebels retired.

Heavy Rainfall.

KINGSTON, St. Vincent, To-day.
The rainfall last night was nearly eight inches. The flooded rivers washed out many plantations. Much damage was done to crops and live stock throughout the island, and communication by land is cut off. There is no loss of life.

Flooded Out.

PORT DE FRANCE.
The flooding of the Madame River has inundated the nearby portion of the city. Houses and stores are washed from their foundations. The river embankments are crumbling.

DUBLIN, To-day.
Richard Croker has accepted Redmond's invitation to unveil the Parnell monument, Ireland's tribute to the great Irish leader.

Two New Glaciers Found in the Rockies.

Edmonton, Alta., September 18.
After two months spent in the Rockies, the celebrated mountaineers, Dr. S. Collier and A. L. Munson, of London, England, have returned to Edmonton. Their explorations led them into hitherto untraveled regions northwest of Mount Robson, accompanied by a train of 20 pack horses and that they state that in some places the forests were so impenetrable that a way had to be cut through. They made several discoveries. In one place they came across two great glaciers, as large or larger than any known to exist in the Rockies, and sighted a towering peak that had the appearance of being even higher than Mount Robson. One of the glaciers was forty to fifty miles in length and seven or eight miles in width, and of striking formation.

Swears He Saw Fish Serpent.

Captain Tallaksen, of the Norwegian bark Alm, laden with coffee, 170 days out from Java, arrived at New York this week with the "prize" sea serpent story. The creature was seen in the Indian Ocean, according to the captain, who is quoted as follows:— "I swear by Thor and Odin it was a sea serpent. Its body was round and its head square and it had two big eyes and four wings. Its eyes were two feet in circumference and its body about 24 feet across. The wings were six feet long and it used them to swim and not to fly. On the back of the monster were seated two of its young. The serpent opened a lid in its back and began to feed its young. Yes, sir, it just lifted an oblong section like the lid of a cigar box and the young serpents dipped their heads into it and each one pulled out a fish. Perhaps the beast had a sort of refrigerator in there—I don't know, but I'd believe anything about it if it was so queer. The captain added: The sea serpent followed the ship for three days.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

This could not be as on Sunday the ship had a gale of west wind "right in her teeth" going up the shore. The officials at Harvey say that the ship did not arrive until 10 Monday night and made the run from here in 46 hours.

Nelson Shields for the Colony.

We are authorized to state that this Colony has been brought into the great plan of issuing shields made from the copper of Lord Nelson's own flagships to the British Empire. Rev. Alfred Hall, of Durban, South Africa, the originator of this patriotic movement, visited Newfoundland in July, and now informs us that the shields have been offered to every Board of Education in the Colony. In South Africa the shields gave \$25 each for the schools. In Canada Lord Strathcona's munificence enabled them to be obtained on special terms. After full consultation with Superintendents of Education, it has been decided to offer a shield together with \$2 worth of the Nelson souvenirs for prizes for \$5. to each school. Six months are given in which to take advantage of the offer, and it is hoped that every school in the Oldest Colony of the Empire will get one. All proceeds of the movement go to the welfare of the Sailors' Home and Institutes of which the King is Patron.

Splendid Local Tomatoes.

Yesterday we were shown some splendid tomatoes which came from Mr. Grace, which were grown at the farm of Dr. Goodwin, Dentist, of that town. The doctor raised these as an experiment and so pleased is he with the result that he will grow them on a large scale in future. The soil is exceptionally adapted over there for the propagation of these vegetables at Harbor Grace. The doctor has also raised some fine pumpkins and apples and has also experimented in the raising of corn and achieved much success in the production of this cereal. The doctor is an expert agriculturist and believes that the soil in the country about Harbor Grace is rich and splendidly adapted to the cultivation of a variety of fruits, vegetables and cereals.

Heroic Rescue by Life Savers.

Boat was Capsized, but All the Crew of Barque Record Saved.

Louisburg, Sept. 20.—Further particulars from the scene of the wreck, states that the Record is a steel barque of 1,300 tons, registered in Lvedstrand, Norway. Capt. Grendsen, bound from Bahla Blanca, for a St. Lawrence port. The crew of sixteen have been landed at Mainadeu. The ship is in a very exposed position surrounded by breakers, and will be a total loss.

Captain Grendsen speaks in the highest terms of the courage of his rescuers. When Capt. Martell first arrived on the scene with his life saving crew it was impossible to board the ship, but after standing by for some time an attempt was made to get along side which proved successful, but as the first boat load, eleven of the crew were leaving the ship, the boat overturned and the men thrown into the water. The life boat righted, however, and with the assistance of Captain Pope of the Western Light and his two sons in their gasoline boat, were again rescued, and safely landed. The captain and crew of the tug D. H. Thomas which went to the scene of the wreck rendered most valuable assistance in the rescue. With the falling of the tide the sea subsided somewhat, and the remaining five of the crew were taken off with less danger to all.

"Punch's" Latest Strike News.

MR. ASKWITH OUT. National Consternation.

"Commercial England was thrilled this morning by the announcement that Mr. Askwith, the famous arbitrator, the keystone of the business arch, had himself come out on strike," says Punch. "The Government decided at once that every effort must be made to induce him to return to his duties. A regiment of cavalry was wired for from Aldershot, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer motored round to his residence.

"Mr. Askwith sternly declined the employers' terms — £20,000 a year plus time and a half for overtime and double time for Bank Holidays and Sundays. He made no objection to the pecuniary terms, but he insisted on a maximum of sixteen arbitrations and two thousand miles railway travelling per week, and that no working day should exceed eighteen hours. The Chancellor was compelled to refuse the terms as the Board of Trade has already 12 arbitrations in hand and fresh ones are coming in at the rate of three a day.

Later.

"A Cabinet Meeting has been called to consider the crisis. It is felt by Ministers that if Mr. Askwith does not return to work, no strike in England will ever end. The Cabinet is at present considering the possibility of nominating Mr. Askwith as arbitrator in his own strike. The difficulty is that Mr. Askwith cannot arbitrate without constituting himself a black-leg.

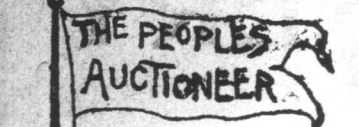
