



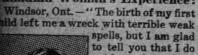

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

Not long ago that famous flyingman, Orville Wright, accomplished a feat which has never before been paralleled. From the crest of a tall

mid air on an engineless glider, and, lifted by a strong gale, rose to a height of two hundred feet. There he hung almost motionless, poised in mid air like a great sea bird, for just over

five minutes, then dropped safely earthwards. This marvellous performance seems to show that the time may come when aeroplanes will be able to hover over one spot just as a hawk does over its prey. At present, however no plane yet built can do anything of

the kind, and in the case of most heavier-than-air machines a minimum speed of forty miles an hour is necessary, or else they drop at once. To build a machine that can renain motionless in mid air is one of

he principal ambitions of air crafts-There is one form of airship, which. f it could be perfected, would certainly fulfil this ambition. This is the so-called helecopter.

"A revolution in the fish trade is foreshadowed by the invention of a Scottish-Australian gentleman, Mr. J. R. Henderson, who is now in London," says the Pall Mall Gazette "This is nothing less than the abolition of the use of ice for the transport and preservation of fresh fish. "First. the fish is placed in a cool-

ing chamber and slowly brought down to a temperature of 32 degrees F.; this part of the process takes about two hours. Its purpose is to extract the specific (or latent) heat of the fish. It is a well known fact that with fish which has been kept in ice decay starts from within, near the bone. This is because the latent heat

"The fish is next plunged into a tank of sea-water, fortified by the addition of 15 per cent. of salt to preextremely low temperature-11 deg. At the same time the water is kept in rapid motion by an electrically driven pump. During its passage the water passes through a filtering chamber charged with willow-char-
