





Court House, St. John's, December 1st, 1914. o His Excellency Sir W. E. Davidson, K.C.M.G., Governor.

May it please Your Excellency: I beg leave to report that in pursuance of the Commission to me directed by Your Excellency appointing me a Marine Court of Inquiry to investigate the circumstances connected with the loss of the steamship 'Southern Cross" and to report thereon, I have, with the assistance of two assessors, viz., Captain Edward English and Captain Robert Caveinquired into the circumstances attending the loss of the said ship, and







TO MR. GEORGE HICKS, GRAND FALLS.

God-speed Mr. Hicks replied as follows, very eloquently, although so wholly taken by surprise:

Mr. Balleny, Boys, and Girls: It is not often I find myself at a loss to give expression to my thoughts, but this evening I must confess the wind has been completely taken out of my sails, to use a sailor's term. This pleasant surprise has been sprung on me so suddenly that I feel embarrassed to say the

For eight years I have worked with you, feeling assured that I had your good-will, esteem and co-operation, but to-day seems to demonstrate and conclusively prove it. As I look back over the few short years spent with you, your kind and noble-hearted action, planned with such cool deliberation and carried out so successfully this evening, serves, not only to obliterate the mistakes we have made. but to crown this short period of years with peace, good-will and undying friendship. The sentiments expressed by your worthy representative, I take it are indicative of you all, and your hearty good wishes will certainly serve to stimulate me at the

unique period in my life. I have volunteered because I realize fully that it is my bounden duty to do so. Every British subject who can do his part in this grave crisis should do so, and I feel this is my part. I trust I may be given courage to perform my duty under all circum-

I sincerely hope the work of the school will not be disarranged on account of my leaving, and I know you will do your best to make a record

year for the school. I can only sincerely thank you one and all for your very appropriate and valuable presents, and I assure you that your gifts will be cherished and associated with pleasant memories

of friendship created at this school. I shall not say good-bye, but on Tuesday evening, we shall meet at the Staff House when we shall have an afternoon tea together and say farewell, but I hope not forever. I


