Catalina Island is as far awa from the United States as if it cost real money to ge there. It has no automobiles, street cars, stock tick ers, factories, office buildings, billboards, city governments, departlarge whistles and insomnia. Armed only with a fishing outfit and an appetite a business man can go so far away from America in three weeks on this island that he will have to have baseball explained to him when he comes back.

Catalina is about twenty-five miles long, a few miles wide and contains about half as much territory as Chicago. Its land is mostly stood on edge, making it very desirable for golf, goats and scenery, but not for agriculture. It is separated from the mainland by twenty-five miles of sea-sickness varying from mild to acute. Nowhere can the traveler feel so badly at so little expense.

Catalina has one town, Avalon, situated on a little bay. The bottom of this bay is beautifully laid out by nature in marine gardens and can be viewed from glass-bottomed boats, owing to the unsullied clearness of the water. The island is also completely surrounded by huge fish called tuna, and nothing makes the visitor so proud as to catch a 150 pound tuna by means of a fragile line attached to an emaciated pole.

The climate of Catalina is so good that no one takes the trouble to discuss the weather. This makes it vastly popular with two kinds of deople-those who love mild climates and those who get tired of saying "Yes, it is a fine day."



RUSSIANS ARE FACING SERIOUS PROBLEM. LONDON, July 31.

The Russians are now facing the problem of evacuating Warsaw and surrounding country, without losing their armies, while the Germanic al-lies are making a supreme effort to get across their line of retreat. The Tentons are said to have met with a partial success in this attempt. The Berlin official report this evening says that Von MacKenzen has resumed the offensive and has reached way between these two cities. South-east of this as far as the Bug River the Russian front has been shaken The success of Von MacKenzen in getting across this railway after hav-ing been virtually stopped by Rus-sian counter-attacks, denies at least who might still be between him and Warsaw, and also places the Germans in a position to move against the Bug River front, should this be decided upon. British military critics, how-ever, refuse to believe that Grand Duke Nicholas has not provided for all contingencies, or that he was not pretty sure of the safety of his troops before indicating to the world he had before indicating to the world he had decided to take up a new line. The Berlin official statement says that the Germans have crossed the Vistula southeast of Warsaw, between Pilica and Kozienic, which leads military writers to believe that the Russians have already fallen back in this region, and that perhaps even the fort- Wilson Clarke ... ress of Ivangorod has been left to its fate. There is no news of the situation on the late of the situation fate. There is no news of the situation on the Narew River, or General Von Buelow's wide outflanking movement in Kovno province. However, the opinion expressed here is that as the German plans contemplate a series of attacks, rather than a simultaneous one, it is likekly, they are waiting for Field Marshal Von Mactaneous one, it is likekly, they are waiting for Field Marshal Von Mac-Kenzen to take some previously arranged positions before they resume ranged positions before they resume the attacks.
