

#### Kill That Fly, and Do it Now!!

The housewife's battle against the ver-dangerous moth has been carried on assiduously down the centurording to her plan of attack, for unless the guard is constant the moth, and its sister pest the fiy, will work ncalculable damage to such of her essions as are their prey.

Mischievons Moths.

It is just now, when furs, blankets, woolens and fiannels—which attract moths like a lighted candle—are being laid away for the summer, that special care should be taken to render them free from attack. As moths detest light, air, and cleanliness, and tle and specially prepared "moth kent in cold storage at a temperatur moths themselves can live. But this

When blankets and flannels are to ed first, and the trunk or receptacle for them must also be thoroughly fresh and clean. A chest of cedar wood is a splendid place for blanket storage, as moths dislike the odour of the cedar, but it, too, must be kept absolutely clean and perfectly airtight. Furs are apt to be dusty and dirty after a hard winter's wear, and the furs should be gently beaten or the wrong side with a cane, and then very carefully combed, before they are put away in company with a moth repellant.

Killing No Murder. Many excellent housewives who are almost festidious about moths are prone to ignore the danger of the house fly, which, with its ious moth. #### When Young Corbett **Put Terrible Terry** in Land of Dreams.

New York.-There has been many famous upsets in the realm of fistiana since "Gentleman Jim" Corbett tipped over the old dope pail by grabbing the world's heavyweight championship from John L. Sullivan over thirty

But it is extremely doubtful, however, if a more striking and unexpected surprise was ever handed followers of the ring than the defeat of Terry McGovern by Young Corbett in their featherweight titular battle at Hartford, Conn., Nov. 28, 1901. Not only in the outcome of the bout is this true but in the quick and precise manner in which it terminated as

The dethroning of the Brooklyn boy on that memorable occasion will never be forgotten. It created a sensation which shocked the entire pugilistic world. It came almost like a great catastrophe for "Terrible Terry" had been dropping ambitious opponents in reckless fashion ever since he won the title from that gallant fighter George Dixon. Terry had waded through the field in easy manner leaving a trail of beaten foes in his wake. His followers, and they included folk in all walks of life, thought him well nigh invincible-unbeatable.

But out of the west came one Young Corbett practically unknown, save for a few bouts he had participated in out on the coast. A good hoy in his class, ventured the wise ones, but out of place with a lad like McGovern. Consequently, Young Corbett was a rank outsider as the two boys squared away in the Hartford arena. Just another "set up" for the

champion, was the general opinion. What the clean-cut Denver youth did to McGovern, however, is history. For Corbett, undismayed and unafraid of the savage-like attack of the redoubtable Terry, went right at the title holder, and ere that first round was over had the crowd "sittin' up." The end came in the second session, when the challenger sent the great McGovern to the canvas for the fatal count. And thus was another ring champion deprived of his much cherished crown. And by a boy who hadn't hardly been heard of east of

But to-day no one can export gold or silver coin or use it other than as currency. But for this restriction people would have exercised their legal right and changed their notes into gold at

Some would then have sold the metal at its market price (on Feb. 5th, 1920, the intrinsic value of the sovereign was just over 30s.), while others would have exported it to countries where the paper pound was



An experimental trip to show the practicability of an air mail service between London and New York by way of the Azores and Halifax is projected now. What has become of the Sampeio-Correia, by the way? -Boston Globe.

#### The Motor Fuel.

Dr. Warren K. Lewis, Professor of Chemical Engineering at the Massachusette Institute of Technology, holds that available supplies of gasoline alone, are sufficient warrant against a gas famine and mounting prices. He says: "Let us assume that the motor industry will grow during . the next 15 years at the rate it has maintained in the past ten. If so, there might be 35,000,000 automobiles in use in 1937, against 12,500,-000 registered to-day. This might mean a possible consumption of 280,000,000 barrels of gasoline per annum, as against the present consumption of 100,000,000 barrels. Has the United States sufficient petroleum reserves to meet this demand?" He replies that it has, pointing out that the production of crude oil in the United States now amounts to 2,000,000 barrels a day, of which 29 per cent, is refined into gasoline. He calculates that in 1937 there will be available 3,000.-000,000 barrels of gasoline as against an estimated requirement of \280,000,000 barrels. The assumption that the Standard Oil Company controls the situation he points out in contrary to the facts of the case. There are some 30,000 producers and 450 refiners. and from a production of 20,000,000 barrels of gasoline in 1913 the sup-ply was raised to 120,000,000 barrels in 1922.-Montreal Herald.


