### Trial by Combat

Dawn, With "Pistols For Two and Coffee For One."

The duel is not yet out of date. A recent criticism of the Portuguese Air Service had its sequel on the duellingground, when Senhor Alvaro de Castro, the critic, who was at the time engaged in les efforts to form a Cabinet, wounded Capt. Ribeiro da Fonesca in the right forearm. The duel was then stopped by the doctors.

Continental politicians are mostly ready to become duellists when occasion demands. Earlier in the year a sensation was caused in Paris by M. Poincare's challenge to M. Le Prevost le Launay.

Even in this country prominent men have sometimes fought political duels. Memorial Fund The Duke of Wellington fought with Lord Winchilsea, Pitt with Tierney, and Canning with Castlereagh, while Peel twice challenged political op-

Armies As Onlookers.

The most famous political duel was probably that fought in 1804 between Alexander Hamilton, the leader of the \$1078.70 Federalist party in America, and Aaron Burr, then Vice-President of the United States. Hamilton, who had been George Washington's right-hand man and the principal author of the American Constitution, was killed, and Burr went on to lead that Imperialist adventure in the undeveloped West which culminated in the great est political trial in American history. According to his enemies, Burr designed to make himself the Napoleon of America; but his schemes went

rong, and his followers dispersed. Not every duel has been an affair of formal arrangement. In the days before artillery, every battle was nore or less a series of duels between individuals. When two especially notable champions met, the general counter usually ceased for the time being and both armies gathered round to watch the encounter.

#### A Challenge to Buffalo Bill.

In frontier, as apart from civilized varfare, the same thing may happen o-day. In her story of the life of her brother, the famous Buffalo Bill, Helen Cody Wetmore tells how, after Custer's last stand, a party of Cheyenne warriors met Colonel Merritt's command, to which Buffalo Bill was attached.

After some preliminary skirmishing, chief rode out in front of the

Cheyennes and cried: "I know you, Pa-has-ka (Longhaired Chief)! Come and fight me if you want to fight!"

Buffalo Bill rode forward fifty ards, and the chief advanced a like distance. Then both rifles spoke. The Indian's horse fell, but at the same moment Buffalo Bill's charged stumbled and threw him.

Both men were on their feet again n an instant, and fired simultaneously at a range of only twenty yards. The Indian fell in a heap, dead, and two hundred warriors dashed up to avenge him.

At the same moment a company of soldiers charged to the rescue. As they thundered up, Buffalo Bill swung over his head the Indian's top-knot and war-bonnet and shouted: "The first scalp for Custer!"

#### Arctic Explorer

FOUND LABRADOR GOLD FIELDS A FAILURE.

MacMillan Tells of Conditions on Northern Trip and Adventures Exturn North Very Soon.

Sydney, N.S., Sept. 16. (Star Special).—Predictions made when he was here last year on his way north, conerning the failure of the Labrader gold rush then in progress, have been well austained by developments since then, Dr. Donald B. MacMillan, the Arctic explorer, remarked to-day on his arrival here on his way south. He mentioned an odd experience in this connection. "When off Grady, Labrador, on the way up the coast, we ran across an auxiliary schooner the Silvia. She hailed us and we exchanged visits. When we first came in sight of her, the crew, all Englishmen with full beards, manned the rigging and did some vociferous cheering. They thought we, too, were bound for the gold fields, at Stag Bay. They could not be persuaded otherwise. They were adventurers; some of them were war veterans, who had vowed not to shave their beards until they returned from the gold fields. The leader of their party, was a Major, navigator a Newfoundlander.

Voyagers Buck Through Ice to Indian Harbor, Ahead of Prospector's

"We intended to buck on through the ice, and finally did so, and got through to Indian Harbor. They held a council of war in their cabin which was very nicely fitted up and decided to put back to some harhor on Hamilton inlet. We beat them to Indian Harbor by four days and they would not believe it when they arrived and were told that we had been there and were proceeding

"It was a misty night when we anchored in Stag Bay. We did not see any prospectors, but there was party of Newfoundland police and the first building they had erected was a jail-a modern steel lock-up. don't think they ever used it.

"During the night a big motor beat came out and asked permission to lie under our stern until morning. Some of the men came aboard and exhibited a large nugget which was undoubtedly gold bearing quartz. They were honest enough, however to say that they had not found it at Stag Bay, but an Indian brought it to them from the far interior. I am not enough of a geologist to say whether placer gold can be found in the streams at the coast, but I have never believed there was any there



### NORTH AGAIN.

Sydney, N.S., Sept. 16,-(Canadian Press).—The schooner Bowdoin, with explorer Capt. Donald B. MacMillan and seven companions aboard, arrived here last night, after 15 months in the Arctic.

The greater part of the past 16 years spent amid snow and ice are not sufficient to satisfy the adventurous life of Capt. Donald B. Mac-Millan. He is going north again next summer.

That is what he told Mayor Mc-Connel when His Worship boarded the Bowdein to extend a welcome, a tew minutes after their anchor splashed into the harbor off the Cape







All foreigners, it has been pointed out, even French professors, have been offered every facility for inspecting the German schools for several years past. Many English teachers have taken advantage of this opportunity, but few Frenchmen have appeared.

#### Will not Discuss **Action of Russia**

U.S. STATE DEPARTMENT SILENT ON SEIZURE OF WRANGEL ISLD. WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 .- (United Press.)-Though the United States has never laid claim to Wrangel Island, various American citizens in times past have planted the flag there and claimed the island on behalf of

the Government. The State Department to-day refused to discuss the reported action of Soviet Republic, pursuing its policy of silence as regards this country's attitude toward the territory.

Wrangel Island is a barren waste north of Siberia. For many years it was generally conceded to Russia, but in the Klondyke gold rush in the '90's, some Americans landed and claimed it for the United States. The Government, however, did nothing to press the claims.

About four years ago. Vladimir Steffanson, the explorer, claimed it for Great Britain. Last autumn, another American, a Captain Lane, a Californian, set sail for the island, announcing his intention of definitely claiming it for the United States. Lane is reported to be the American reported to have been found on the island by the Russian landing party. As the matter stands, citizens of three countries have laid claim to the island, but Russia is the only power which has insisted on its right to the territory. What the future may bring forth, as the importance of Arctic air bases increases, is a matter of spec-

St. Partridge Day

#### Farmers' Birds.

An equally peppery old chap was irritated by his neighbour's propensity for claiming falen birds. His wrath took the form of gathering together all the birds within reach, and dumping them before the shot: "Here, take the lot!".

For some reason sporting ethics seem to wane in the partridge ground. We take shots when walking among the turnips which, on the moor, would be considered just a bit jealous. But the birds you are walking after have a different stream of flight to those which are driven to you over the heather.

Partridges are farmers' birds-they "follow plough land." Pasture is not cover enough for them, and the return of so much land to open grazing after the War has reduced the old stock. The grouse must have the stern, peaty moorland with its grass patches and heather; the partridge will live and flourish in the richest farm lands, near roads, railways, and even villages. There is a record of one pair of partridges taking up a home in a lily-of-the-valley patch outside a small cottage.

#### Record "Bags."

The late Francis Francis used to believe that a few tame partridges were useful in keeping a good stock of birds close to home. He often told a story of a Cockney sportsman who was shown a score partridges parading on the lawn within a few yards of his window, and the man's wrath when he was told that he must not The second bag of British partridges

was made at Holkham. Norfolk. in 1905 when 1.671 birds were killed. The best drive was 168, and the total for four days 4,749. At Welbeck, in the following year, 218 were shot in one drive. In the old "walking-up" days, Netherby, on the Cumberland side of the Scottish Border, was a competitor with Norfolk, but "driving" soon made mmense bags for the Southern folk. There were some curious partridge records. One gentleman successfully undertook to shoot one brace per day, Sunday excepted, for six weeks. In 1870 the Maharajah Duleep Singh shot 780 partridges for 1,000 cartridges in one day. On the Continent great partridge shoots are common; a party on Baron Hirsch's Hungarian estate killed 2,870 birds in a day. On another estate in the same country 17.048 partridges went down in a season. The Marquis of Ripon once killed

#### ,000 partridges here in five weeks. Killed by Fear.

Two or three birds are sometimes prought down at a shot by good men; they wait until the pack is crossing in flight, and bring off the feat with certainty. The Marquis of Ripon once had eleven birds in two shots.

Another partridge succeeded in loging its life to an empty barrel. The gun was turned towards the flying covey and so intimidated one bird that it twisted its wing in panic, and fell to the ground crippled.

A partridge usually weighs about 14 ounces, but glants up to 23 ounces are on record. Of the quality of partridge, a poet has written: "If the partridge had the woodcock's

The speed of game birds is difficult to measure; up wind they travel comparatively slowly, but in the reverse direction their flight becomes a flash. A partridge will not face a stronger wind than thirty miles per hour,

London, Sept. 3 (A.P.)-Stories of the sometimes romantic exploits of spies are recalled by the release from Dartmoor prison of Courtenay Henslot de Rysbach, who in October, 1915, was sentenced to penal servitude for life as a spy in Germany's service.

De Rysbach, a vaudeville actor and the son of a one-time Austrian subject who was naturalized in England, was arrested after the postal censor had stopped two songs mailed by him to an address in Switzerland. One was "The Ladder of Love" and the other was "On the Way to Dublin." When they were chemically treated, an account of conditions in England written in invisible ink appeared. After imprisonment De Rysback divulged German espionage methods.

The catch of sockeye, Mr. Sloan said, will be the heaviest in years. The marked increase in quantity this year will mean greater prosperity for the

The total value of the fisheries production of Canada was \$42,565,545 last year, according to the annual report, or an increase in value of \$765,-

The amount of capital represented in fishing vessels, boats, nets, traps, piers, and wharves employed in catching and landing the fish in 1923 was \$23,645,316. The number of men employed in these operations was 53,517.
