The Lepine Case.

The Lepine Case.

It appears that the question of jurisdiction raised by Lepine's counsel, under which he hoped his client would escape both trial and sentence, has now been settled by Chief Justice Wood. The question raised in the interest of Lepine was that, as the place where the murder of Thomas Scott was perpetrated was no part of the Dominion of Canada at the time, therefore the Canadian Courts have no jurisdiction over the question was the Imperial Government; but as the latter had never formally invested the Dominion with this authority, none such existed at the present day, and therefore the Canadian Courts are still incompetent to deal with the question. The judge before whom this question was argued had twice reserved judgment, and finally it was submitted to the recently appointed Cheir Justice Wood, who has lately delivered a very elaborate and exhaustive opinion, in which he establishes the jurisdiction of the learned Cheir Justice is marked by deep research, and by candid and logical criticism on the various points raised. With this decision before them, we may expect to have this vexed question brought to an end at last. There is no longer any reason why the trial of Lepine should not be proceeded with, and if found guilty, there will be an immediate flort made on the part of all friends of jinstice to plang in the dock the instigator of the foul "ceed of which Lepine was only his petty instrument.—London Frie Press.
