New York, Jan. 2—The Times' Paris correspondent telegraphs as follows: Perhaps had Gambetts been like ordinary mortals he might have recovered, but high living and excesses of all sorts had brought on diabetes, which was complicated with other disorders. The patient being asthmatic, the use of anesthetics was prescribed, and without anesthetics it was feared he would die during the operation. Besides which, in the existing condition of his blood, gangrene was inevitable in consequence of the incision. Nevertheless, no doubt it is permissivole that the shot which directly or indirectly, caused his death was fired by a lady well known in Paris; and whose pseudo ym, Leoni Leon, conceals the patronymic of one of the most honorable Isravintish families of Bordeaux. She left her husband, conseiller-general of the Gironde department, to follow the fortune of him by whose eloquence in the Baudin subscription and trial she was completely fascinated, and uniting with him in 1863 she deserted her family. Their connection lasted ever since, but he was impatient of the chain he could not break, especially as a child was born in the succeeding year whose paternity he refused to acknowledge. These refusals caused scenes of recrimination and often positive violence between the lovers. The man wearied of his connection, whilst the woman clung devotedly to him for whom she had sacrificed her honor. Gambetta disliked the child, who was sickly but intelligent, and lived as his nephew. He resembled Gambetta in character and features. Two years ago Leoni's husband lied, and she summoned Gambetta to fulfil his promise of marriage, but received another refusal. He made an agreement, however, to provide for young Leon on condition that he should be educated in Germany. The mother hesitated, but finally consented, and accompanied the child and her father to Dresden.

GROCERS' LICENSES.


