FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL. TUESDAY EVENING, May 4. Consols are unchanged at 109 1/2-100. A cable to Cox & Co. quotes London Bay at 42 1/2 and Northwest Lead at 72 1/2. Chicago despatches to Cox & Co. read: "New York reports three loads of wheat and eleven loads of corn taken for export. Six loads of hard spring brought for milling." "Strike has paralyzed the market. Raining hard here, which will probably demoralize strikers."

The Local Stock Market this morning was quiet and prices irregular. The only dealings in bank shares were confined to Commercial, which stock was very strong; it sold at 123 1/2, 124, at 123 1/2 for 20, and at 123 for 30 shares; closing at 123 1/2. Montreal was 1/2 firmer at 214 and 208 for 100 and ex dividend respectively. Ontario was wanted at 111, and Toronto at 109 1/2. Merchants' was 124 bid, and 124 1/2 asked, and a decision of 1 for the latter. Dominion was also 1/2 easier in bid, and Hamilton was wanted at 126 without stock. In miscellaneous stock there were some changes. British Assurance at 121; Gas was 126 bid, North-west was weak in sympathy with British markets; the best bid here was 73, as against 70 1/2 the close yesterday. Canada Permanent Loan sold at 102 1/2 bid, and Canada Land was 124 bid, without sellers. Building & Loan was at 109 bid, and London & Canada was wanted at 127, without sellers.
