Canada's Proposition re Lumber Duties.
OTTAWA, June 28.—The Dominion Government, through the medium of the Foreign Office, has proposed to the United States Government that both Governments should Government that both Governments should consider the propriety of removing the import and export duties on lumber of all kinds, or in other words, that the Canadian Government will abolish the import and export duties on lumber providing the Washington authorities reciprocate. As an earnest of good faith the Dominion authorities have meanwhile reduced the export duty on pine logs from \$3 to \$2 per thousand feet, board measure, the figure at which it stood in November last, previous to the representations of the lumbermen asking for an increase. This reduction in the export duty takes place on July 1.
