James S. Fullerton, Q.C., City Counselor, C. R. W. Rogers, Esq., City Solicitor, and Mr. W. C. Chisholm, Assistant City Solicitor, appeared for the city.

Mr. E. A. DeVernier and Mr. J. E. Jones for the plaintiff, Hanlan, and John Macgregor and C. E. Macdonald for plaintiff McMillan.

John Hanlan, in his examination, stated that the letter of June 2 was written on the City Engineer's order...

He identified the annexed plan as a copy of one prepared by Major Sackville City Surveyor, in 1871, which showed the road allowance.

The witness had taken note of the signature of Major Sackville on the plan and the date of the plan, Sept. 23, 1872, was a renewal by the city of an old lease.

There have been three different alterations made to the plan since 1872. The first in 1877 was a movable tin tube, running north and south, resting on trees, covered up in the center.

The following year a wooden gallery, 75 feet long, running east and west, was put up with a tree in the center.

A third was erected on a different spot. The present gallery was erected on the site of the first wooden gallery.

The other witnesses called for the plaintiff Hanlan were Mr. Solomon (a sister), James Rice, the carman, James Simpson, ex-ld. Richard Fleming, Geo. Drexler and A. McIntyre.

Mr. Fullerton moved for a non-suit. The judge ruled that evidence must be given as to the injury done to the city and McMillan's case was proceeded with.

Major Sackville (City Surveyor), Mr. C.H. Best (Assistant City Engineer) and John Jones (Street Commissioner) were called and the plaintiff was himself under examination when the court adjourned.

WHO IS LIABLE? An interesting insurance case now before the courts.

J. D. Spencer, a traveler, killed on Aug. 29 last by falling from a rig, was insured in the Commercial Travelers' Association for \$50,000.

The association, which does not do its own insuring, although it receives the premiums and transmits the business with its members, by a sub-arrangement is in existence whereby the London Guarantee Company gets the business.

In the interim between the time the payment was made to the Travelers' Association and the time it was handed over to the Guarantee Company, the London Guarantee Company disclaims responsibility for the payment of the policy.

The question is whether the man who handled the premiums had the right to hold the premium for a month after receiving it. Mrs. Eliza Spence, wife of the dead traveler, who was the beneficiary named in the policy, is suing the London Guarantee Company for the amount.

Street Railway Notes. There was a slight decrease in the Toronto Railway receipts during March.

The city's share is \$5609, against \$5328 in the same month last year. For the three months just closed the city's percentage was \$16,206, which is 860 less than in the first quarter of 1924.

A sub-committee of the Board of Works will this afternoon inspect the route of the proposed street railway extension through South Parkdale.

It is contemplated to continue the King-street route southerly along Dufferin, where the railway tracks to Dominion-street, and along that thoroughfare and Victoria-street to a junction again with King-street near its westerly terminus, after again crossing the railway tracks. President McMillan will be present.

THE BUSINESS SITUATION. The Volume of Trade in the Dominion Shows No Improvement.

The Daily Bulletin (R. G. Dun & Co.) says: In Montreal the trade situation is about as last noted.

The going in effect of summer freight rates, this week did not indicate any increased activity. Refiners report a steady output of sugar, and several good lots of low and medium grades have been bought on Western account, but in general groceries there is not very active distribution.

There is a good inquiry for licks, but there is much scarcity of stock, owing to the active demand from the United States, which is absorbing supplies from many frontier points, which are generally marketed here. Values are 100 per cent. higher than this time a year ago.

The unsettled state of the weather has militated against the general movement of trade in dry goods is limited, but travelers seem to expect considerable improvement. The hardware trade is fairly active, but not going out very freely. Payments this month are said to be satisfactory.

About the usual percentage of commercial paper was renewed. The retail trade is particularly active, but will improve with finer weather. Some houses report a demand from the United States for the same month of last year, but the total volume of business done in the city is probably less. Small houses report a limited trade, but some of the large departmental stores have done a greater volume of business.

A NOVEL SUIT. The infant was Not Included in the Settlement of the Estate.

In suits where infants are parties it is the law and practice that any compromise or settlement of the actions must be with the consent of the official guardian.

Because of alleged negligence in obtaining the consent of the C.R.B. was yesterday made defendant in a second suit for damages for the death of Gushors Weibourne of Toronto Junction, killed in September last while in the employ of the company. The widow, Mrs. Alice Weibourne, brought suit in October on behalf of herself and her infant daughter for \$1500. In January last, and just before the trial, the action was settled on a receipt in full of her claim.

The receipt did not, and it is contended, could not bind the infant, not being consented to by the official guardian. No share in the settlement was paid to the infant, as it is contended, was required. The suit filed by the doctor against the company, for damages on behalf of the infant, was held to be entered by J. W. Elliott, and is the first of its kind.

Mercally vs. Vegara. The case of the Deer Park doctor came up before Magistrate Jackson at Eglinton on Wednesday night. Mr. Tyler represented the doctor, and Mr. Vegara represented the plaintiff. Lillian Vegara was charged with stealing a gold ring and diamonds, valued at \$1000, which she was accordingly committed for trial. Mr. Tyler entered the plea that the girl in question was under the age of 14, but this was overruled by the magistrate. The charge of assault preferred by the doctor against the girl was a limited one, and the doctor proved a most refractory witness. Frequent lifts between him and the defendant's counsel took place, and the magistrate had finally to intervene to prevent trouble. It appears that Vegara had made a charge against the doctor of assaulting his daughter during her visit to the doctor's house. High words passed between them, and Vegara finally struck McCully with a heavy cane, bruising his head and damaging one of his fingers.
