 I.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, January 27. Visible in Canada.
 II.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, February 10. Not visible in Canada.
 III.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, July 22. Not visible in Canada.
 IV.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, August 7. Visible in Canada.

THE SEASONS.

Vernal Equinox.—Spring begins March 20th, 3h. 16m., Morning.
 Summer Solstice.—Summer begins June 21st, 4h. 50m., Morning.
 Autumnal Equinox.—Autumn begins September 22nd, 7h. 12 m., Morning.
 Winter Solstice.—Winter begins December 21st, 1h. 8m., Evening.
 Venus will be a Morning Star until 9th May, and from that date to the end of the year an Evening Star. Mars will be an Evening Star throughout the year. Until 17th April, Jupiter will be an Evening Star, from that date to 12th August a Morning Star, then an Evening Star to the end of the year. Saturn will be a Morning Star until the 7th of March, and from that date to the 11th of Dec'r an Evening Star. Venus will not be very conspicuous until the latter part of the year.

If to this we add the area of Prince Edward Island, 2,100 square miles; Newfoundland, 40,200 square miles; British Columbia, 220,000 square miles (including Vancouver's Island, 20,000); and Labrador, the Hudson's Bay and North West Territories, say 2,752,000 square miles, we shall have a total for British America of 3,389,345 square miles.

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GAME AND FISHERY LAWS.

The close season for Deer or Fawn, Elk, Moose or Caribou, in Ontario, begins on the 1st of January, and ends on the 1st of September. They are not allowed to be trapped or taken by any traps or snares whatever. The close season for Wild Turkey, Grouse, Partridge or Pheasant, is between the 1st of February and the 1st of September for Quail, between 1st February and the 1st October; for Woodcock, 1st March and 15th July; and Wild Swan, Goose, Duck, Widgeon or Teal, 1st April and 1st August. The law also provides that no Beaver, Muskrat, Mink, Sable, Otter or Fisher, shall be trapped or killed between the 1st May and the 1st November.

It is unlawful to fish for, catch, buy or sell the following fish in Quebec, between the dates named; Speckled Trout, 20th September and 1st April; White Fish, in any way, between the 19th November and 1st December, and by net between the 30th May and the 1st August. The close season for Bass, Pike, Pickerel (*doree*), and Maskinonge, is regulated by Order in Council, to suit different localities.

The close season for Red or Grey Deer, Moose, Elk, Reindeer and Caribou in Quebec, is from 1st February to 1st September; for Woodcock or Snipe, 1st March to 1st August; Grouse, Partridge, Ptarmigan or Pheasant, 1st March to 20th August; Wild Swan, Wild Goose, or Wild Duck of the kinds known as Mallard, Grey Duck, Black Duck, Wood Duck, Teal, Widgeon, or any other kind of Wild Duck, 20th May to 20th August; Muskrat, 10th May to 1st March.

It is also unlawful to fish for, catch, buy or sell any of the following fish between the dates named in Quebec; Salmon, 31st July and 1st May, (fly surface fishing is, however, permitted between 30th April and 31st August;) Trout or Lunge, 15th September and 15th December; Bass and Pickerel (*doree*), Pike and Maskinonge, 30th April and 1st June.

It is also unlawful to kill or snare any birds whatsoever, excepting Eagles, Falcons, Hawks, Wild Pigeons, Kingfishers, Crows and Ravens, either in Quebec or Ontario, between the 1st March and the 1st August in each year.

TIMBER MEASURING.

DEALS—Are generally sold by the standard hundred of 120 deals of the dimensions as follows—One Quebec standard deal contains 2 feet 3 inches 6 pts. cubic; one Quebec standard hundred contains 229 feet 2 inch. cubic, or 4.58 loads, and are equivalent to 2,750 feet superficial board measure of one inch thick.

One Quebec standard hundred is 100 pieces of 12 ft. by 11 in. by 2½ in., and is equal to 1 hd. 1 qr. 16 pcs. of St. Petersburg standard; and 240 Quebec standards are equal to 11 loads.

One St. Petersburg standard hundred is equal to 120 pcs. of 12 ft. by 11 in. by 1½ in., and is equal to 72 Quebec standard, and equal to 3 3-10 loads of timber.

A load of deals is 600 square feet by one inch in thickness, equal to 50 cubic feet, or 300 square feet of 2 inch, or 400 of 1½ inch.

A load is equal to 21 deals, 1 ft. 10½ in., Quebec standard, and equal to 36½ St. Petersburg standard deals.

To convert Quebec standard hundred into St. Petersburg standard, add ⅓ of quantity and divide by 30.

The customary allowance for freight is a hundred St. Petersburg standard at twice the rate charged for timber per load.

STAVES—One standard stave is 1½ ft. long by 1½ in. thick. One mille standard, 1,200 pieces, is equal to 16 1-9 loads of timber. One mille, or 1,200 standard staves, is equal to 343 ft. 9 in., or 6 43-50 loads. 175 standard staves are equal to 50 ft. 1 in. 6½ pts., or 1 load 1 in. and 0½ pts.

One mille West India staves, 1,200 pieces, is equal to 5½ loads of timber. Owing to the variations in breadth and thickness of staves, it is customary to allow one mille, Quebec standard, to be equal to 13 loads.

LATHWOOD—One fathom of 4 ft. long and 6 ft. by 6 ft. is equal to 13 loads.

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INDIAN LANDS OFFICE AND OUT-STATIONS.

THE UNSOLD LANDS consist of about 300,000 acres in the Saugeen Peninsula, the prices of which vary according to quality and situation, from 75 cents to \$3.50 per acre. The Department has contributed liberally towards opening a main line of road, with its starting point upon the Owen Sound and Saugeen gravelled road, and running northward up the Peninsula towards its most northernmost point, at the safe Harbor of Tobor Moray, opposite the southerly extremity of the Great Manitoulin Island. Funds have been provided for carrying the road in the course of next season to its northerly termination. The agency for these lands is at Toronto, under the superintendence of W. R. Bartlett, Esq., who is provided with maps and with lists of the disposable lands. The conditions of sale are one-fifth down, and the remainder payable by four annual instalments, with interest on each as it falls due, and actual and early occupation.

The Great Manitoulin Island has been in part surveyed. Nine townships have been laid out, containing about 270,000 acres; and Townplots also surveyed. At Little Current, now designated Shaftesbury, and at Shegandah, where are at least three good mill sites. The agent for the sale of lands upon the island is W. Plummer, Esq. The price of farming is 20 cents per acre, and actual and immediate settlement. Oil and mineral lands are charged \$1.00 per acre, cash down, and patents issue without reference to occupation or improvement. On the Manitoulin Island, roads have been constructed from Little Current to Manotowasing, and from thence a Road is in process of formation to Michael Bay, where Messrs. Lyon and J. White, M. P., have erected Mills. The Indian office is bestowing considerable attention upon the education and social and moral improvement of the Indians.

The Indian Department holds also for sale in trust for the Indians, lands in the vicinity of the Sault Ste. Marie, Batchewaung Bay, and Garden River, consisting of about 200,000 acres. The agent is Joseph Wilson, Esq., of Sault Ste. Marie, and the terms correspond with those laid down for the Manitoulin Island. The most direct access to both of these localities is by steamer from Collingwood, the Lake Huron terminus of the Northern Railway.

On Lake Superior there are Indian Lands also for sale, consisting of about 64,000 acres in the vicinity of Fort William on the Kaministagua River. The agent is Mr. McVicar, resident at Fort William, and the terms are the same as those for the lands around the Sault Ste. Marie.

The unsurveyed Indian Reserves in Upper Canada, which have not yet been yielded up for sale, are of considerable extent, and some of them contain timber of value, which the Department is prepared to dispose of, which can only be cut under official license from the superintendents, who attend to the local business of the lands under their superintendence.

In Lower Canada, the Indian reserves are of more limited extent, and there are no lands within them at present for sale, but the timber on some of them may be purchased from the Department.

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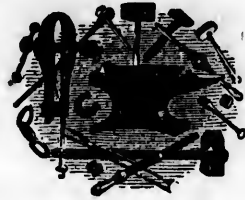

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COASTING REGULATIONS.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA,

Tuesday, 28th day of July, 1868.

PRESENT:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

IN the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and in pursuance of the provisions of the 11th Section of the Act 31 Vic. Cap 6, intituled: "An Act respecting the Customs," His Excellency in Council has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following Regulations respecting the Coasting Trade of the Dominion be, and the same are hereby adopted and established.

COASTING REGULATIONS.

1. Vessels and Boats employed solely in the transportation of Goods or Passengers from one Port or place to another Port or place within the limits of the Dominion of Canada, shall be deemed to be engaged in the Coasting Trade, and shall be subject to the regulations governing the same.
2. None but British registered Vessels and Boats, wholly owned by British subjects, can lawfully be engaged in the Coasting Trade of the Dominion of Canada, and the names of such Vessels or Boats and the names of their Ports of Registry, shall be distinctly painted on the stern of the said Vessels or Boats.
3. Such Vessels and Boats may, without being subject to entry, or clearance, as required by law, for Vessels trading between ports in the Dominion of Canada, as well as with Foreign Ports, carry goods the produce of Canada or goods duty free, or goods duty paid, or passengers from any Ports or places in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, to any other Ports or places in the said Provinces, or from any Ports or places in the Province of New Brunswick, to any Ports or places in the said Province, or from any Ports or places in the Province of Nova Scotia, to any Ports or places in the said Province, provided always that the Owners or Masters of such Vessels or Boats shall take out a license for the season for that purpose from a Collector of Customs in Canada, and that the Owners or Masters in taking out the said license, shall enter into Bonds of \$500, conditioned, that such Vessels or Boats shall not be employed in the Foreign Trade, and provided also that the Master of every such Vessel or Boat shall keep or cause to be kept, a Cargo Book in the form prescribed by the Customs Department, to be registered by the Collector of Customs who granted the license, in which Book shall be entered at the Port of lading, an account of all goods taken on board of such Vessel or Boat, stating the description of the Packages, the quantities, the description and values of the goods therein, as also of the goods stowed loose, and the names of the respective Shippers and Consignees, as far as any of the particulars shall be known to him; and at the Port of discharge shall be entered in the said Cargo Book, the respective days upon which any such goods shall be delivered out of such Vessel and also the respective times of departure from the Port of lading and of arrival at the port of unlading.
4. The Master of any such Vessel or Boat shall produce his License and Cargo Book to any Officer of Customs, whenever the same shall be demanded, and answer all questions put to him, and such Officer of Customs shall be at liberty to note any remark on the Cargo Book which he may deem proper; and if the Cargo Book shall not be kept in the manner hereby required, and the particulars of all Cargo laden and unladen, duly noted therein, the goods and vessel shall be forfeited, and the Master shall incur the penalty of \$100.
5. Before any coasting Vessel or Boat shall depart from any Port of lading in any one of the Provinces of the Dominion of Canada for any other Port in the said Dominion, not in the said Province of departure, an account or report with a duplicate hereof, in the form or to the effect following, and signed by the Master, shall be delivered to the Collector, who shall retain the duplicate and return the original account or report dated and signed by him; and such account or report shall be the clearance of the Vessel or Boat for the voyage and the transire or pass for the goods expressed therein, except for goods under Bond or goods liable to Excise or Internal Revenue Duty, which shall require the entries and warrants for landing to be signed by the proper Officers as required by law, and if any such account or report be false, the Master who signed it shall forfeit the sum of \$100.

6. Within twenty-four hours, after the arrival of any coasting Vessel or Boat at the Port of discharge, which requires a transire as above described, and before any goods shall be unladen, the transire with the name of the place or wharf where the lading is to be discharged, noted thereon, shall be delivered to the Collector, who shall note thereon the date of the delivery; and if any of the Goods on board such Coasting Vessel or Boat shall be subject to any Customs duty, the same shall not be unladen until due entry has been made at the Custom House and a warrant granted for the landing thereof; and if any of the goods on board such Vessel or Boat be subject to any duty of Internal Revenue the same shall not be unladen without the authority or permission of the proper Officer of Excise; but no entry shall be required at the Custom House for any goods brought coastwise, the produce of Canada or goods on which the duties whether of Customs or Excise have already been paid or which are duty free.

7. Vessels and Boats employed in the Coasting Trade and that shall not have taken out a license for carrying goods, and obtained a Cargo Book as above provided, shall report inwards and outwards from any port or place within the Dominion of Canada, and in default of their so reporting the Vessel or Cargo the Master shall in such cases be subject to the penalty of \$100 for departing; and arriving without due entry inwards or outwards as the case may be; Provided that when a Vessel shall sail from any place where there is no Custom House, or Officer of Customs, it shall be sufficient for the carrying out of this regulation that the owner or Master of such Vessel, do; as soon afterwards as possible, forward to the nearest Custom House a similar report in duplicate, or lodge the same at the first port at which he shall touch where there is a Custom House Officer.

8. Goods under a removal Bond from one Canadian Port to another Canadian Port, may be carried in any British registered Vessel or Boat, trading coastwise with a proper license and Cargo Book upon such goods being properly entered in the Cargo Book and in the account or transire. In duplicate, the Collector at the Port from which such goods are removed, being required to forward by Mail to the Collector of the Port for which the goods are destined, all the particulars and description of the goods so forwarded, and the packages shall be properly marked in red, as now provided, but no goods under Bond shall be carried in any Coasting Vessel or Boat until the Master has delivered an account in duplicate or transire to the Collector of Customs at the Port of lading.

9. No Coasting Vessel to touch at any Foreign Port unless forced by unavoidable circumstances, and the Master of any Coasting Vessel or Boat which has touched at any foreign Port, shall declare the same in writing under his own hand, to the Collector or other proper Officer of Customs at the Port, or place in Canada where his Vessel or Boat afterwards first arrives, under a penalty of \$100.

10. If any goods are unshipped from any Vessel or Boat arriving coastwise, or unshipped or water borne to be shipped to be carried coastwise on Sundays or Holidays, or unless in the presence or with the authority of the proper Officer of Customs, or unless at such times and places as shall be appointed and approved by him for that purpose; the same shall be forfeited, and the Master of the Vessel or Boat shall forfeit the sum of \$100.

11. Officers of Customs may board any Coasting Vessel or Boat in any Port or place, and at any period of the voyage search her, and examine all the goods on board, and demand all the documents which ought to be on board, and the Collector or any other Officer may require such documents to be brought to him for inspection.

12. No Fishing Boat or Boat used in Ferrying under 15 tons burden, shall, except by special license or permission, carry any goods from a foreign country, which are liable to duty, under pain of seizure, unless the same—in the case of Ferry Boats—be for the sole use of some passengers then on board.

13. No goods can be carried in any Coasting Vessel or Boat, except such as are laden to be so carried at some port or place in Canada, and no goods shall be taken into or put out of any Coasting Vessel or Boat while on her voyage by River, Lake or Sea.

14. The transire Coastwise required by these regulations may, in the case of any Steam Vessel carrying a Purser, be signed by such Purser with the like effect in all respects, and subject to the like penalty on the Purser, and the like forfeiture of the goods, in case of any untrue statement in the transire, as if the transire was signed by the Master; and the word Master for the purposes of these regulations shall be construed as including the Purser of any Steam Vessel; but nothing herein contained shall preclude the Collector or proper Officer of Customs from calling upon the Master of any Steam Vessel to answer all such questions concerning the vessel, passengers, cargo, and crew, as might be lawfully demanded of him if the report had been made by him, or to exempt the Master from the penalties imposed by these regulations for failure to answer any such questions, or for answering untruly, or to prevent the Master from making such report, if he shall see fit so to do.

15. The Coasting Regulations of the late Province of Canada, dated the 12th April, 1861, and all regulations heretofore existing in the Province of New Brunswick or Nova Scotia in reference to Coasting in any of the said Provinces are hereby repealed.

The following are extracts from the Act respecting Insurance Companies, 31, Vic. Cap. 48, (1868):—

Sec. 2.—Except Companies transacting in Canada Ocean Marine Insurance business exclusively, it shall not be lawful for any Insurance Company to issue any policy of insurance, or take any risk, or receive any premium, or transact any business of Insurance in Canada, or to prosecute or maintain any suit, action or proceeding either at law or in equity, or to file any claim in insolvency, without first obtaining a License from the Minister of Finance to carry on business in Canada; but the premiums to become due on policies actually issued previous to this date, may continue to be received, and the losses arising thereon may be paid as if this Act had not been passed.

Extract from Sec. 3.—The deposit to be so made as aforesaid, shall be as follows, to wit: by every, Life, Fire, Inland Marine, Guarantee or Accident Insurance Company, a sum of not less than fifty thousand dollars, and such sum shall be deposited before the License is issued. (For Canadian Companies there is a separate provision.)

Extract from Sec. 13.—Any person who shall deliver any policy of Insurance, or collect any premium, or transact any business of insurance on behalf of any such Company as aforesaid, without such License as aforesaid, or if such License has been withdrawn, without the renewal thereof, * * * shall be liable to a penalty of one thousand Dollars for each such contravention of the Act (or, in default,) imprisonment in any gaol or prison in the jurisdiction where he is convicted, for the space of three months.

Extract from Sec. 22.—As regards British and other Foreign Insurance Companies actually doing business in Canada at the time of the passing of this Act, which cannot by the terms of their constitutions or charters, or by law, invest in Canadian securities, it shall be lawful for the Minister of Finance, with the approval of the Governor in Council, to receive the amount of the deposit required of them under this Act, in British or Foreign Government securities, including Stock of any one or more of the United States, at their then market value, but with power to him to require from time to time, if such market value should decline, additional security equivalent to their diminution in value;—and the portion of the premiums received by any such Company required to be deposited under this Act, may be invested by the Company in any such British or Foreign Stock as aforesaid, and such Stock may be deposited with the Receiver General, subject to the provision above made as to value and diminution in value;—but all such Stock shall be replaced by cash or investment to the amount aforesaid within three years from the issue of the license to the Company, otherwise such license shall be void.

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POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS. CANADA.

- 1.—The following Post Office Savings Banks are open daily for the receipt and repayment of deposits, during the ordinary hours of Post Office business.
- 2.—The direct security of the Dominion is given by the statute for all deposits made.
- 3.—Any person may have a deposit account, and may deposit yearly any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$500, or more, with the permission of the Postmaster General.
- 4.—A depositor in any one of the Savings Bank Post Offices may continue his deposits at any other of such offices in the list, without notice or change of Pass Book, and can withdraw his money at that Post Office Savings Bank which is most convenient to him.
- 5.—Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, which is to be produced to the Postmaster every time the depositor pays in or withdraws money, and the sums paid in or withdrawn are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same.
- 6.—Every depositor's account is kept in the Postmaster General's Office in Ottawa, and, in addition to the Postmaster's receipt in the Pass Book, a direct acknowledgment from the Postmaster General for each sum paid in is sent to the depositor.
- 7.—When a depositor wishes to withdraw money, he can do so by applying to the Postmaster General who will send him by return mail a cheque for the amount, payable at whatever Savings Bank Post Office the depositor may have named in his application.
- 8.—Interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum is allowed on deposits in the ordinary Pass Book deposit account, and the interest is added to the principal on the 30th June in each year.

SPECIAL DEPOSIT ACCOUNT.

- 9.—Any depositor who has \$100 at his credit in his Pass Book, or ordinary account, may request the Postmaster General to transfer that sum to a special account, and will then receive from the Postmaster General a certificate of special deposit for each \$100 so transferred. These certificates bear 5 per cent interest, and are redeemable on such previous notice as may be thereon expressed. When repayment is required, the \$100 will be repaid to the depositor at any Savings Bank Post Office which he may name.
- 10.—Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.
- 11.—No charge is made to depositors on paying in or drawing out money, nor for Pass Books, nor for postage on communications with the Postmaster General in relation to their deposits.
- 12.—The Postmaster General is always ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank business.

PRESENT :

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is provided by Cap 6 of the Act 31st Vic., Section 10, sub-sec. 5, that "the Governor in Council may make such regulations as may be considered advisable for the appointment of Sufferance Wharves and Warehouses at which goods arriving by vessels in transit to other Ports or confined to certain days of departure, may be landed and afterwards stored before entry;" And whereas it is expedient that the accommodation so contemplated should be afforded in all cases where the same may be found necessary,—His Excellency in Council, on the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under the authority of the said recited Act, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that on application to the Minister of Customs by the owner or master of any Packet Steamer or other vessel being a regular trader, specifying the name and tonnage of the said steamer or other vessel, the general time of her arrival and departure, and the ports between which she is accustomed to sail, also designating the wharf at which she is accustomed to land and the building in which it is proposed to store her cargo, it shall be lawful for the said Minister of Customs to declare the said wharf and building to be a sufferance wharf and warehouse for the purposes of the Act, and to authorize the Collector of the port to grant a warrant or license, for a specified time, to the master of such steamer or other vessel to land his cargo and store the same at the wharf and in the building so declared to be a sufferance wharf and warehouse, without previous entry, the said Master having previously executed a bond to the Crown in such penal sum as the said Minister of Customs may consider equitable, but not less than one thousand dollars, providing that the said master will not fail to leave in the hands of the Landing Waiter or other Officer of Customs appointed for the purpose, a report of the contents of his vessel for each voyage, and that he will in all other respects conform to the requirements of the law in such case, and will use his utmost diligence to prevent any infraction thereof by any person or persons arriving at such port in his vessel.

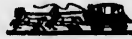
