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

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

#### British Columb'a Business Review.

VANCOUVER, B. C., APRIL 26
Business has improved this week. The

i Vancouver, Victoria and New Westster are presperous in consequence,

prince. British Columbia has found a

place for every citizen out of work and places for thousands of Americans besides. The rush to the mining camps on the seaboard is unprecedented, steamers for the north are loaded every trip with men and supplies. Stage coaches for Lillooet. Alberni and other points tapped by the cities of Vancouver. Westminster and Victoria are packed with prospectors and mining men. But prosperity is not enjoyed by all branches of industry alike, farmers have left their ploughs in large numbers to hunt for rich rocks close to the numerous rivers lakes and streams, and loggers have dropped their woodmans' saw and axe to stake claims in the northwest waters along the gulf. In fact a mining mania has taken possession of the Province, and the boom which was to strike here in two years from the spring of 1895 has apparently arrived. There is scarcely a day passes that some 50 or 100 prominent merchants do not board the train for the numerous mining camps. The result of the rush of prospectors to the highlands has in the aggregate been of great value to the province for many magnificent prospects have been staked. Though inexperienced prospectors have made some ridiculous mistakes in locating "mineral in place," some of their properties having turned out nothing more than huge blocks of granite, with not a trace of precious metal, and others have been outcroppings scarcely a dozen feet in depth. In the Harrison Lake country. Westminster district some big strikes have been made of apparently great value and consistency. J. R. Brown's strike of free milling ore on Fire Mountain has been very carefully examined at 80 feet, 600 pounds of rock was taken from the tunnels face and sent to the smelter, the returns showing over \$100 to the ton. The consistency of the vein is partially proved by a foot of gold and copper smelting ore running into it at 80 feet assaying in itself \$33 in gold and copper. In Lillocet the Golden Cache Co., have about completed their road and a contract has been let for their mill, though the mill is not yet working, the stock is selling at \$1.80. The Alpha Bell mine, adjoining the Goldon Cache group and containing the identical vein of the Golden Eagle, the company's proved mine, is also looked upon with great favor, a new ledge has been discovered 10 feet wide on the Chief claim very rich in free gold. The Alpha Bell company have chosen a mill site and will erect a mill at Fairview. The Tinborn is still the talk of the camp, a mill for this property is on its way from San Francisco, it will be the biggest mill and plant ever erected in the province. The company have sold \$25,000 worth of treasury stock and are taking all stock off the market. This mine has been proved for 1,400 feet. A property at Boundry Falls, known as the Boundry Falls mine and owned by Peterboro and Vancouver citizens has created a sensation here this week. The property was bought for a low grade smelting proposition. It]ran some \$33 on the surface. A gang of men were put on to work it, at a distance

of about 25 feet a big bag of the rock was sent to Vancouver with the remark from the foreman that "it looked pretty rich, and that the vein, a true fisher, had widened to 4 feet." It was assayed and ran \$115 and \$120 in gold, about half of this quantity being absolutely free milling, while 90 per cent could be saved on the plates of a crusher. A mill will be erected.



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

#### The New Tariff.

Following gives the Canadian excise taxes, and custom duties in full, showing the changes, which have been made from the old tariff, in the new Liberal measure:

#### EXCISE DUTIES.

That it is expedient to amend section 180 of chapter 31 of the Act 49 Victoria (the Inland Revenue Act), as amended by section 1 of chapter 25 of the Act 58 59 Victoria by rerealing such section and substituting in liew thoreof as follows: -"There shall be imposed, levied and collected on all spirits distilled the following duties of excise, which shall be paid to the collector of an inland revenue as herein provided, that is to say: (a) when the material used in the munufacture thereof consists of not less than ninety per cont. by weight of raw or unmalted grain — on every gallon of the strongth of proof by Sikes' hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof, and for any less quantity than a gallon, \$1.90.

(b). When manufactured exclusively from

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(b). When manufactured exclusively from malted barley, taken to the distillery in bond and on which no duty of customs or excise has been paid, or when manufactured from raw or unmalted grain, used in combinations, in such proportions as the Department of Inland Revenue prescribes with malted barley taken to the distillery in bond and on which no duty of customs or of excise has been paid—on every gallon of the strength of proof by Sikes' hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength and for any less—quantity than a gallon, \$1.92.

(c) When manufactured exclusively from molasses, syrup, sugar or other saccharine matter, taken to the distillery in bond, and on which no duty of custom has been paid—on every gallon of the strength of proof by S.kes' hydrome'er, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength, and for any less quantity than a gallon, one dollar and ninety three cents.

Also to repeal so much of the Inland Revenue Act and amending acts as determented that the excise duties there a and upon sectional shall be as follows:—

whole or in part from sparres in bonds. 4 cents per proof

Acetic acid, produced by the destructive distillation of wood, 4 cents per proof gallon. Provided, that the Governor General-incured may establish regulations exempting extended from excise duty in whole or in part, when used in the mechanical arts.

That it is expedient that a license fee of 80 be collected in each fiscal year from every manufacturer of acetic acid.

Also, to so amend the said act and the acts in amendment thereof as to provide that the excise duty to be levied upon sigarettes shall beas follows:

On cigarettes, whether the product of lorign or domestic leaf tobacco, weighing not more than three pounds per thousand, \$3 per thousand. Old rate \$1.50 per thousand.

Oa cigarettes, whether the product of foreign or domestic leaf tobacco, weighing more than three poun is per thousand 88 per thousand. Old rate 83 per thousand.

thousaid. Old rate \$3 per thousand.

And that in addition to the excise duty at present levied on manufactured tobacco, rigars, and as herein determined in resyrct of rigarettes there shall be levied and collected the following excise duties, that is to tay: (a) On all fereign raw leaf tobacco, unstemmed, taken out of warehouse for manufacture in any rigar or tobacco manufacture, 14 cents per pound.

That it is further expedient to so amend the Inland Revenue Act, and the acts in amendment thereof, as to empower the Governor-General-in-connect to make regulations for the manufacture of tobacco, cigars and eigarettes from foreign and domestic leaf tobacco in combination, in such propertions as may be deemed proper, and to impose duties thereon, having regard as nearly as possible to the proportions of foreign and domestic leaf used, such duties not to exceed the excise duties now imposed on tobacco, cigars and eigarettes.

The excise duties bereby fixed and determined shall come into force and effect on and after the 23rd day of April, 1897.

#### DUTIES ON LIQUORS.

1. Ale, beer or porter, when imported in asks or otherwise than in bottles, 16e per allon. Unchanged.

2. Ale, beer and porter, when imported in bottles (six quart or twelve pint bottles to be held to contain one gallon. Unchange).

8. Cider, and clarified or refined, 5 conts per gallon. Unchanged.

4. Cider, clarified or refixed, 19 cents per gallon. Unchanged.

5. Lime jnice and fruit jnices, fortified with or containing not more than 25 per cent of proof spirits, 60 cents per gallon; and when containing more than 25 per cent of proof spirits, 82 per gallon. Unchanged,

6. Lime juice and other fruit syrups and fruit juices, n.o.p., 20 per cent. Unchanged.

7. Spirituous or alconolic liquors, distilled from any material or containing or compounded from or with distilled spirits of any kind, and any mixture thereof with water for every gallon thereof of the strength of proof, and when of a greater strength than that of proof at the same rate on the increased quantity that there would be if the liquors were reduced to the strength of proof. When the liquors are of a less strength than that of proof, the duty shall be at a rate herein provided, but computed on a reduced quantity of the liquors in proportion to the lesser degree of strength, provided, however, that no reduction in quantity shall be computed or made on any liquors below the strength of 15 per cent, under proof, but all such liquors shall be computed as of the strength of 15 per cent, under proof as follows:

(a) E-byl alcohol, or the substance commonly known as alcohol, hydrated exide of othyl or spirits of wine, gin of all kinds, n.e.s., ram, whiskey and all spirituous or alcoholic liquors, n.e.p., amyl alcohol or fusel oil, or any substance known as potate spirit or potate oil, methyl alcohol, wood alcohol, wood naphtha, pyroxilic spirit or methylated spirits, absinthe arrack or palm spirit, brandy, necluding artificial brandy and imitatious of brandy, cordials and liquors of all kinds, n.e.s., mescal puique, rum shrub, schiedam and other schnapps, tana, angostura and simitar alcoholic bitters or beverages, \$2.40 per gallon. Old duty,

\$2.25 per gallon,

(b) Spirits and strong waters of any kind, mixed with any ingredient or ingredients, as being or known or designated as anodynes, clixirs, essences, extracts, lotions, tinctures or medicines, or medicinal wines (so call i) or otheral and spirituous fruit estence, n e.s.. \$2.40 per gallon and 30 per cont. Old duty, \$2.25 per gallon and 30 per cont.

(c) Alcoholic perfumes and perfumed spirits, bay rum, cologno, and lavender water, hair, tooth and skin whshes and other toilet proparations containing spirits of any kind, when in bottles or flasks, containing not more than four ounces each, 50 per cent; when in bottles, flasks or other packages, containing more than four ounces each, \$2.40 per gallon, and 40 per cent. Old duty, \$2.25 per gallon and 40 per cent.

(i) Nitrous ether, sweet spirits, or nitre and aromatic spirits of amenia, \$2.40 per gallon and 80 per cent. Old duty, \$2.25 and 40 per cent,

(·) Vermouth containing not more than 86 per cent and ginger wine containing not more than 26 per cent of proof spirits, 90 cents per gallon; old duty, 80 cents; if containing more than these percentages respectively of proof spirits, \$2.40 per gallon.

(f) Medicinal or medicated wines contain-

(f) Medicinal or medicated wines containing not more than 40 per cent of proof spirits, \$1.50 per gallon.

(3) Wines of all kinds except sparkling wines, including orange, lemon, strawberry, raspberry elder and currant wines, containing twenty-six per cent or less of spirits of the strength of proof, whether imported in wood or in bottles (six quart or twelve pint bottles to be held to contain a gallou). 25e per gallon, and for each degree or fraction of a degree of strength in excess of the twenty-six per cent of spirits as aforesaid, an additional duty of three cents, 8 op. deg. until the strength reaches forty per cent of proof spirits, and in addition thereto 30 per cent. Unchanged.

9 Champagno and other sparkling wines in bottles containing each not more than a quart, but more than a pint, \$3,30 per dozen bottles; containing not more than a pint each but more than one half pint, \$1.65 per dozen; containing one half pint each or less, \$2 cents per dozen; bottles containing more than one quart each shall pay, in addition to \$3.30 per dozen bottles, at the rate of \$1.65 per gallon. On the quantity in excess of one quart per bottle, the quarts and pints in each case being old wine measure, in addition to the above specific duty there shall be an advalorem duty of 30 per cent. Unchanged.

10 But any liquors imported under the name of wine, and containing more than forty per cent of spirits of the strength of proof, shall be rated for duty as unenumerated spirits.

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

WINNIPEG, Saturday, May 1.

Basiness shows some improvement. The weather has been favorable and seeding has made good progress, except low points along the Red river which have suffered from high water Seeding is much earlier than last year, seeding having been delayed last year by excessive moisture. This season the snow went off very nicely and the land is in good condition. There is still uncertainty regarding the effect of the new tariff, particularly regarding the preferential clause which may or may not admit goods from some other countries than Great Britain. A report from Toronto says the liquor distillers have advanced the price of case goods 85 rercent per two gallon case, owing to the tariff changes.

Bradstreets says of the situation in the United States this week: "The movement of cotton goods is slow and prices are low, bayers purchasing in large lots only where indocements are offered. Woolen manufacturers are fairly supplied with orders, and are inclined to ask an advance on new busizes. The three months' restriction of output in cotton goods has ended, and mills will now run on full time. The movement of building materials has been disappointing, and the demand for raw material by manufacturers of tobacco is less than expected. General conditions in the Mississippi valley have improved, except at the south, where tigh waters are likely to threaten for two or three weeks."

Figures for the week have been 237 in the limited States, against 238 last year, and 40 in Canada, against 31 last year.

WHEAT - GENERAL SITUATION-Wheat The markets have made some heavy slumps this week, owing mainly to the prospect of an early cossation of the Turco-Greek war. Exports of wheat, flour included as wheat, from both coasts of the United States, amount to only 1,158,836 bushels this week, 1,260,000 bushels in the week a year ago, 2,550,000 two years ago, 2,773,000 bushels three years ago, and as compared with 2,-776,000 bushels in the like week of 1893. The current week's exports of wheat, flour included as wheat, are the smallest since the second day in May, 1891. Exports of corn have also fallen off this week, amounting to 3,657,465 bushels, against 4,769,000 bushels last week, and 2,142,000 bushels in the week a year ago.

WHEAT-LOCAL SITUATION.-The elation among heavy local holders of wheat, over the boom in prices of last week has had a sudden and quick set-back. A week ago to-day, when the market was at the top on the bulge, wheat was quoted here at 78c, and it is said that sales were put through at 781c. A good deal of business was done at about 77c for No. 1 hard in store Fort William. The decline this week in leading markets, however, caused a panicy feeling among local holders, and at the low point wheat was offered here at as low as 65c. Yesterday there was a recovery and to-day the feeling is about 73c for No. hard at the close. There were 8,682,185 bushels of wheat in store at Fort William on Saturday last. The receipts last week aggregated 68,244 bushels, and the shipments 17,239 bushels.

#### Poises

The export of deer, wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock, in the carcase or parts thereof, is prohibited.

That regulations respecting the manner in which molasses and syrups shall be sampled and tested for the purpose of determining the classes to which they belong with reference to the duty chargeable therson, shall be made by the Controller of Customs.

Wines, spirits, or alcoholic liquors subject to duty according to their relative strength of proof, such strength shall be ascertained either by means of Syke's hydrometer, or of the specific gravity bottle, as th Controller of Customs directs; and in case such relative strength cannot be correctly ascertained by the direct use of the hydrometer or the gravity bottle, it shall be ascertained by the distillation of a sample

All medicinal preparations, usually imported with the name of the manufacturer, shall have the true name of such manufacturer, and the place where they are prepared, permanen ly and legibly affixed to each parcel.

Packages, when imported, shall be subject to the payment of the following duti s:--

(a) All bottles flasks, jars, demijohns carboys, casks, hogsheads, pipes, barrels and all other vessels or packages, me ufactured of tin, iron, lead, sinc, klass or any other material capable of holding liquids, and all packages in which goods are commonly placed for home consumption. including cises, not otherwise provided for, in which bottled spirits, wines or malt liquors or other liquids are contained, and every package being the first receptacle or covering inclosing sods for purpose of sale, shall in all cases, not otherwise provided for in which they contain goods subject to an advalorem duty or a specific and advalorem duty as ist belevied and cullected on the goods they contain, and the value of the packages may be included in the value of such goods,

(b) Provided that all such packages as aforesaid containing goods subject to a specific duty only and not otherwise provided for, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per cent ad valorem.

(c) That packages not hereinbefore specified are not herein specially charged with or declared hable to duty, and being the usual and ordinary packages in which goods are packed for exportation, according to the general usage and custom of trade shall be free of duty.

(d) Provided further, that all such special packages or coverings as are of use, or pparently designed for use other than in the importation of the goods they contain, shall be subject to the same rate of duty as would thereon be levied if imported empty or separate from their contents.

#### Wheat Stocks
