



In the fourth quarter the score was advanced to 6 goals to 2.

Vancouver played rings around New Westminster yesterday and thruout earned the victory. At every stage they were masters. Again and again they beat the opposition, and were clearly and fairly the superior combination. New Westminster never looked like probable winners. It was a question of how much Vancouver would win by, and how effectually New Westminster could stem the tide of scores which was overwhelming them. Roused again and again by shouts from the spectators, the players seemed to eclipse themselves. They provided an exhibition which was in keeping with the best traditions of the game. Excitment was intense, and the greatest enthusiasm was manifested thruout the struggle, which will live long in the minds of all those who witnessed it. It was a game of a lifetime. The talent playing was sufficient to induce a large crowd to be present, but the exhibition provided was far above reasonable anticipations.
