MONTREAL FIRE HORROR

3 DEAD, SEVERAL INJURED

Blaze in Canada Steam Laundry Attended With Fatal Results - Injured Are Girls, Who Had to Jump to Save Their Lives - Monetary Loss \$35,000

MONTREAL, April 18.—(Special.)—Three dead and nine injured, several of them severely, is the result of the latest conflagration in this city. At 9 o'clock this afternoon fire broke out in the second story of the three-story brick building on St. Justine street, just below St. Catharine, and occupied by the Canada Laundry and Dry Works.

The fire spread with such fearful rapidity that for a few moments it seemed as tho a score of lives would be lost, but by rescue stairway a number of the girls were enabled to make their escape.

The casualties are: DEAD. William Martineau, Jane Furlong, Mrs. P. Giroux.

INJURED. Miss Albertine Paradis, 38 years, arm fractured and face burned. Miss Victoria Daigle, 39 years, ankle fractured.

Miss Jeanette Bonenfant, 38 years, face burned and back injured. Miss Emma Edienne, badly burned. Miss Bertha McMercher, face burned and arm fractured.

Mrs. Georgina Lavigne, hand fractured. Miss Marie Rodger, slightly injured.

There were nearly fifty people in the place when the fire started. All the injured met their injuries by jumping for the life net.

The fire started in the cleaning-room, being caused by a burning which was used in one of the machines, catching fire. In a few minutes the whole place was in flames. A panic ensued among the hands, who all rushed to try and escape, but their escape was cut off by the dense smoke.

The man Martineau and the woman Furlong were overcome by smoke and their dead bodies were afterwards found in one of the windows. Mrs. Giroux received her injuries in jumping.

A general alarm was sent to all the hospitals and fire ambulances were soon on the scene, the cry that 25 lives had been lost spreading thru the city even as quickly as the fire thru the building.

There were three alarms all sent in to the fire department, but even the excellent work of the firemen was absolutely no chance at any stage of the conflagration to prevent a complete destruction.

There were twenty girls and ten men employed and the majority of the girls lived in the immediate neighborhood of the laundry. As a result of this scores of relatives hastened to the scene, pushing their way madly thru the immense crowd that had gathered and crying for the safety of their loved ones.

It is estimated that the loss by the burning of the laundry was about \$35,000 and possibly \$10,000 to \$15,000 for machinery.

FREE POSTAL DELIVERY FOR PLACES OVER 10,000

But Little Hope For the Farmers - Improving Port of Montreal.

OTTAWA, April 18.—(Special.)—Mr. Fielding and Mr. Lemieux clashed this morning, the latter had his way and the evidence taken by the insurance commission will be printed in French.

Many things were needed, especially facilities for loading and unloading, and parliament should appropriate money for electric cranes. He also urged the building of a dry dock and floating elevators.

There was some discussion re W. T. Preston. Mr. Fielding said he had done nothing to justify his dismissal from the public service.

WEALTHY MERCHANT GRAVELY ACCUSED OFFERS BIG BRIBE

Benedict Gimbel of Philadelphia Arrested in New York—Police Refuse \$2000 to Give Him Liberty.

NEW YORK, April 18.—Benedict Gimbel, a member of the firm of Gimbel Bros., proprietors of one of the largest department stores of Philadelphia, was arrested here to-day, and on being arraigned, was held on the double charge of improper conduct and attempted bribery of a police officer.

The latter complaint was preferred at the instance of the district attorney's office after Gimbel had been taken into custody. It is alleged he then sought an illegal release.

Unable to furnish immediate bail in the sum of \$5000 he was committed to the Tombs for the night.

The original complaint was the wife of a Wall-street broker, whose 16-year-old son, Ives Clark, was in the company of Gimbel when he was arrested.

Gimbel, who is 39 years of age, has a home in North Broad-street, Philadelphia. He is reputed to be a wealthy and influential citizen of that place.

Recently he has been stopping at the Waldorf-Astoria, and made the acquaintance while here of young Clark, who is a cripple, living with his parents in West 57th-street.

Gimbel, and his companion took a closed cab and drove up Fifth-avenue, followed by the detectives in an automobile. At 57th-street the carriage was halted and the arrest was made.

At this point Gimbel is said to have offered the detectives \$1000 each for his immediate release. The officers demanded cash, and as Gimbel did not have the ready-money the party went to the banking house of Wolf Bros. & Co.

There, according to the second complaint, Gimbel was identified and drew a cheque for the amount, after which he proffered \$2000 to the officers. He was then told that a charge of attempted bribery would be added to the initial information.

STOCK WEAKNESS HITS BRITISH REVENUES

Altho Trade Has Been Remarkably Flourishing, Disappointment is Acknowledged in Asquith's Budget.

TELEPHONES REPLACE LETTERS AND STAMP RECEIPTS FALL

Further Reduction of National Debt the Paramount Duty—\$7,500,000 Set Apart for Old Age Pensions.

LONDON, April 18.—No budget statement of recent years has been awaited with so much interest as that of Chancellor of the Exchequer Asquith to-day.

Altho it was his second budget, that of last year really was only a legacy from the previous administration, as his proposals to-day constituted the first real Liberal budget in twenty years. The house of commons was thronged and the public galleries were densely crowded.

The financial statement issued by the treasury in advance of the chancellor's speech informed the house that the existing surplus for 1906-07 was \$26,956,000, which in accordance with the law would be devoted to the reduction of the public debt.

Mrs. Asquith estimated the expenditure for 1907-08 at \$708,785,000. The revenue on the existing basis of taxation was estimated at \$720,550,000.

The permanent reduction on the national debt for 1906-07 was announced to be \$8,500,000. The surplus for 1906-07 was estimated at \$26,956,000.

CASE AGAINST COMBINES WAITING ON A JUDGMENT

As Soon as Chief Justice Mulock Gives a Decision, the Prosecution Will Be Resumed.

The following statement, which was given out yesterday by the attorney-general's department, explains the delay in the trial of the combine cases...

"The Globe this morning asks, if combines existed outside that of the plumbers, why were the offenders not brought to trial? Why were investigations apparently dropped?"

"No cases have been dropped. The case against the Plumbers' Supply Association was tried by Justice Clague, who delivered judgment on Dec. 9, 1906. From this judgment the accused appealed to the court of appeals as was their right. The evidence was very bulky and the reporter had to take some time to get it out. The case was argued in due course, judgment was reserved, and on March 14, 1907, judgment was given affirming the conviction, three judges being for allowing the appeal and quashing the conviction."

"In the meantime cases against individual members of the association have been pressed, and they had all pleaded to the indictment and elected to be tried by the judge (Chief Justice Mulock) without a jury. Chief Justice Mulock fixed a special sitting for the trial of these cases, and the trial began on Feb. 19, 1906, and was selected against the Messrs. McMichael, this being in the opinion of the crown counsel the strongest case, various other defendants during this case going into the box and giving their evidence so that the whole matter should be before the chief justice."

"At the conclusion of the argument the chief justice reserved judgment, intimating that he thought the proper course would be to withhold his judgment until the decision in the court of appeal in the plumbers' supply case, as he would be bound by that case and he directed that all other cases before him should in the meantime stand."

"The court of appeal having given judgment on March 14 last, it is now the duty of the chief justice to give judgment in the cases before him, and he has decided to do so, and he has directed that all other cases before him should in the meantime stand."

"The counsel for the defendants strenuously argued that no offence had been committed under the act, and that the judgment was a mere interpretation of the criminal code."

"No assizes have been held since the judgment of the court of appeal, either in Toronto or Hamilton, and unless the judgment of Chief Justice Mulock is not forthcoming before the next Toronto assizes, it is very likely that the tack combine case will be then proceeded with. It will be seen that until this judgment is given deciding what the law is, it would be waste of time and money to have brought the matter up at an earlier assize, all the defendants under the act having a special right to appeal to the court of appeal. There has consequently been no failure to bring the case to trial, and no dropping of the case."

"If what has been selected as the strongest case should fail of course there would be no object in proceeding in the police court with other similar cases, until after we see the judgment."

"The conclusions that were come to and the course pursued in these proceedings were after consultation with eminent counsel, and in some cases by the express direction of the court."

IT WAS A REBATE.

Interstate Commission Gives Decision Against the Union Pacific.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—In what is known as the Peavey elevator case, the interstate commerce commission, has decided against the Union Pacific Railroad Co.

The commission holds that the arrangement between the Union Pacific and the Peavey elevator was unlawful, as it was in excess of the actual cost of the elevation of the grain, and therefore, a rebate.

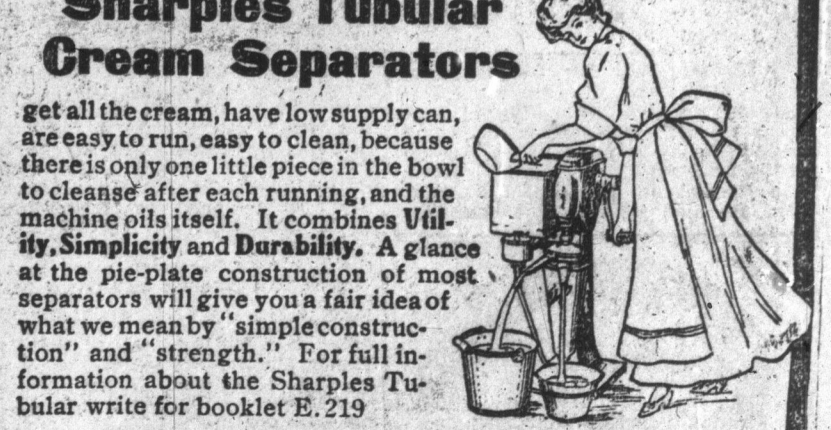

The penalty for carrying a seaman who has not signed these articles is a fine not exceeding \$50 for each offence.

MEANS MONEY TO KINGSTON. Navigation Season Employs Hundreds of Men and Benefits Stores.

KINGSTON, April 18.—(Special.)—The importance of the marine business to this city is evidenced from the following figures: In connection with the Montreal Transportation Co. 400 men are employed on the vessels all summer and 50 on shore. In winter the number falls to 150. The number employed by the other boat companies, or partly here, are about 500. These men receive, say, \$1.50 each per day, and thus in the aggregate the wage bill is \$1500 a day. Most of the employees have their homes in this city, and hence spend the money here. Then there is much trade for the merchants in connection with vessel repairs and supplies for voyages. A vessel which left this port a few days since took on board \$10,000 worth of groceries and provisions, dry goods and hardware. This was exceptionally large owing to the men for whose maintenance the men for a single season is very considerable.

KING EDWARD IN ITALY GETS WARM RECEPTION

With Royal Consort His Majesty Pays Visit to Victor Emmanuel.

GAETA, Italy, April 18.—The British royal yacht, Victoria and Albert, which King Edward and Queen Alexandra on board, arrived here at about 9.30 o'clock this morning, from Malta, escorted by the British armored cruisers Suffolk and Lancaster.

King Edward was received by King Victor Emmanuel, who was on board the Italian royal yacht, Trinacria, surrounded by 12 Italian warships and torpedo boats.

The usual salutes were exchanged and hearty cheers greeted the British king from the people on shore and the sailors on board the war ships.

The two kings embraced each other repeatedly when they met on board the Trinacria and King Victor Emmanuel kissed Queen Alexandra's hand.

The mayor of Gaeta sent her majesty a bouquet of orchids and roses, with a card bearing the words, "Devotion and admiration to the most powerful queen in the world." A lunch on board the Trinacria followed.

It was mainly attended by military and naval officers, a crowd of English women who were permitted to witness King Edward's arrival from the high bastions of the fort, and the municipal authorities.

8000 OZS. TO THE TON NEW VEIN ON BUFFALO

Recent Rich Discovery Has Been Made Near the Centre of Cobalt Camp.

Cobalt, April 18.—(From the Man on the Spot.)—On Saturday last at a distance of 20 feet north of the line between the Buffalo Co. and the property of the Cobalt Township Mining Co., and on the Buffalo location, a rich silver vein was discovered. On the surface there was a deposit of 8000 ounces of silver in a distance of 20 feet north of the bed rock. When this vein was removed and the capting taken off a silver vein four inches in width was located. It has been stripped for some distance and average 20 inches in width, a mass of pure silver, and assays disclose that it carries 8000 ounces of silver to the ton. The vein probably runs in a north-south direction, and has been followed for several hundred feet on the Buffalo location. It is a joint vein, and is bestly situated to run into the Nancy Helen. The trend of the vein is northeast and southwest.

Locates Nice Vein.
The City of Cobalt Mining Co. are getting busy and have 12 men at work trenching and stripping. Just south of the vein a good sized silver vein, 1 1/2 inches wide has been located, and a shaft will be put down from the lake, and the vein will be followed. The vein is 13 feet deep and the water is giving them some bother. Near the Nancy Helen, a silver vein has been located, and it is a four-inch vein, which has been stripped to a depth of 100 feet. 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WHEN U.S. SUPPLY ENDS CANADA WILL BE CUTTING

American Wood Supply Runs Out in 30 Years—Five Billion Feet a Year.

The present supply of timber in the United States will be exhausted within thirty years, was a statement of Dr. E. B. Ferrow, director of the New York State College of Forestry of Cornell University. It was quoted by J. D. B. Langill in his address to the Empire Club at the St. Charles Cafe yesterday.

The speaker, an expert who has been connected with the forestry department at Quebec for the last twenty-five years, gave an interesting information concerning the forest wealth of Canada, and suggested ways and means whereby its value might be greatly enhanced. He said that 15,000,000 cords of wood, or 20 per cent. more than the next best wood country, is produced annually at least 5,000,000,000 feet of saw timber, worth \$60,000,000, and to this might add 15,000,000 cords of pulp wood, valued at \$75,000,000.

Great possibilities are before Canada as a pulp producing industry. Her only important competitor is the United States, and her supplies of spruce are rapidly being exhausted. The production of our finest wealth and encouragement of local manufacture of timber by-products should be a policy of a truly national administration.

THAW AND HIS COUNSEL.
Who's Who in Legal Array for Defence is a Pretty Problem.

NEW YORK, April 18.—It became definitely known to-day that the question of counsel for Harry Thaw has not been permanently settled.

The publication of a letter sent by Thaw to Hartridge and Peabody yesterday, in which he informed them that they would continue as counsel for the prisoner, was generally accepted as disposing of that phase of the case for the present, at least.
