



IS IT MANSLAUGHTER? he Caroner's Jury Which Investigate Abe Claus' Beath Took a Light View of Jake Hill's Act

Burford, May 12.—The remains of he Indian, Abe Claus, who was killed by stabbing by his stepfather, Jake Hill, on Saturday night, were buried here to-day. The coroner's inquest was held in this village this afternoon, the witnesses being chiefly relatives of the deceased man and the prisoner, Hill, who was present. Dr. Harbottle who performed the post-mortem examination gave evidence to show that the deceased was in a well nourished state of health prior to the stabbing. There were two knife wounds found on the body, one of which had penetrated the heart and which in itself was sufficient to cause death.

After hearing all the evidence the jury brought in a verdict that Claus came to his death by wounds inflicted by a knife in the hands of Jacob Hall during a quarrel.




