**INSURGENTS IN QUARRELSOME MOOD**

Any Excited or Intoxicated Person May Precipitate a Battle Between the Opposing Forces.

Washington Jan. 24.—Senor Lopez, secretary to Aguinaldo, the Washington representative of Aguinaldo, called at the State Department at 1 o'clock this afternoon and lodged with the chief clerk a communication, which, according to the common expectation, marked the critical stage in the Philippine question. This is the third attempt made by the Filipino representatives to secure official recognition from the United States Government. Secretary Hay, at the time attending a meeting of the Cabinet.

General Otis is so sure of his ground that officials here feel no doubt as to the outcome of a hostile collision between the American and insurgent forces under Aguinaldo, but it is not altogether desirable that even a battle should be fought. The President has by no means surrendered his conviction that the Philippine problem can be brought to an understanding, and peacefully accept the conditions sought to be imposed.
