But the preparation of one army corps is taxing the War Office to the utmost. The desperate state of unreadiness is shown by the fact that the War Office has already spent more than a million pounds, and is still short of provisions and other supplies for which it is ransacking the whole world. At the beginning of the week it tried to get three million pounds of canned meats. The colonies of Australia only afforded a quarter of a million. The War Office is now contracting for millions of pounds of colonial mutton at five pence a pound, As usual the War Office will prove expensive, but there is little doubt that the forces will finally be put into the field in good shape."
