THREE HORSE THIEVES CAPTURED IN COUNTY

At Least Police Think They Are Right Parties—Happenings of a Day.

HAMILTON, Aug. 17.—(Special.)—Threatened reorganization of the county police force has apparently had the effect of stirring up the force, for three alleged horse thieves were captured today. Two were caught at Watford this morning, and County Constable Tufford rounded up another this afternoon.

A Fisheries Dispute. Magistrate Jelfs and the fisheries department do not see eye to eye on the interpretation of the Fish and Game Act. Two young men were before the court, their alleged offence consisting of standing upon the shore and catching minnows by means of a net. The department has ruled that they violated the law, while the magistrate, although he admits that the order-in-council prohibits fishing with nets, contends that the accused were not fishing in the ordinary acceptance of the term.

Police Reorganization. Local politicians claim that they have had an inkling that the county police forces in all parts of the province are to be dismissed and reorganized.

A younger named Schaffer, who escaped from the Mimico Industrial School, was captured here this morning.

Released to Leave Canada. William Heal was before Judge Morgan yesterday charged with the theft of tools from the Barron Brick Co., Weston. He will reappear next Tuesday and if he is then prepared to leave for the old country, the charge will not be pressed.

One Woman's Achievement. Mrs. Bertha Ayrton has succeeded in ascertaining the cause of the refractory behavior of the searchlight in certain respects and devising a remedy. The British admiralty called on Prof. Ayrton to investigate the trouble some time ago. After making many investigations turned the problem over to his wife, who is the only woman member of the Institute of Electrical Engineers and who received the first medal ever awarded to a woman by the Royal Society of London for original, unaided work.

COLONEL LAMB SHOTS DOWN IN CANADA

Will Direct Emigration to Other Countries For the Next Two Years.

Col. Lamb, chief emigration officer of the Salvation Army, is paid as a staff sergeant and rank, with jet black hair. His dark eyes had the flash of the zeal as he spoke of his work to the World in Commissioner Coombs' sanctum at the Salvation Army Temple yesterday evening. But his smile has a winning charm indicative of the philanthropic commissioner.

Col. Lamb stated that the Canadian reports to him are that there is not likely to be any field for emigrants to Canada cities and towns for the next two years, but that there is still a demand for British emigrants in the domestic service. He will spend about six weeks personally investigating Canadian conditions, going as far west as British Columbia.

"We have stopped sending emigrants to Canada this season, and the only others who will come out under our auspices this year will be members of families to join relatives who have come out in advance to get homes established," said Col. Lamb.

The government also announces its intention to endeavor, with the powers to abolish capitalizations, with the power to show that privileges no longer exist.

The situation on the Turkish-Persian frontier again is alarming, owing to the forward movement of the imperial troops, provoked by chaotic conditions in the Persian provinces.

At present we are diverting the tide of emigration to Australia and the Argentine. None are now going to South Africa, as the labor conditions there are much worse than here, and we are advised that they are bad in the United States.

"We are met on both sides of the Atlantic by a certain amount of labor official criticism. In England labor leaders want the unemployed left as a basis for political reforms, but the very leaders who criticize the Salvation Army for its emigration policy frequently send personal letters of introduction for worthy unemployed workers who are seeking a chance to emigrate to where work is to be found.

Col. Lamb expects to be in England to meet General Booth on the general arrival from South Africa."

Wireless Phoning 310 Miles. Marvelous Success of French Naval Lieutenant With New Invention.

PARIS, Aug. 17.—The Naval Lieutenant, Colin, Jeanne and Mercier, the inventors of a wireless telephone apparatus which recent tests have shown to be superior to anything existing, have achieved remarkable success with their new instrument, communicating with the wireless station at Ruz de Seine, department of Finistère, a distance of about 310 miles.

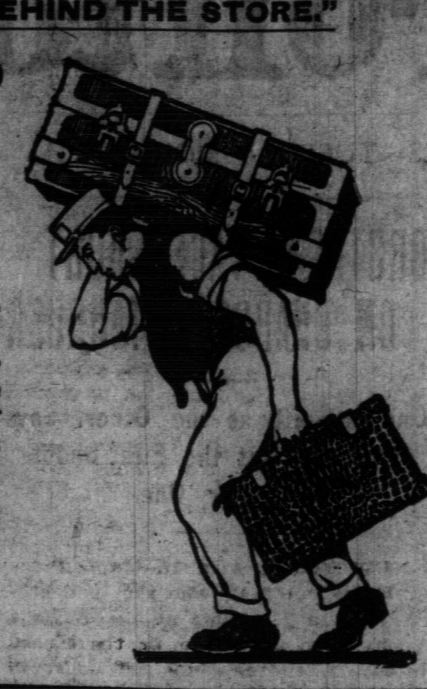
Game Warden Parks of North Bay reports visit to the Solid Comfort Club at French River.

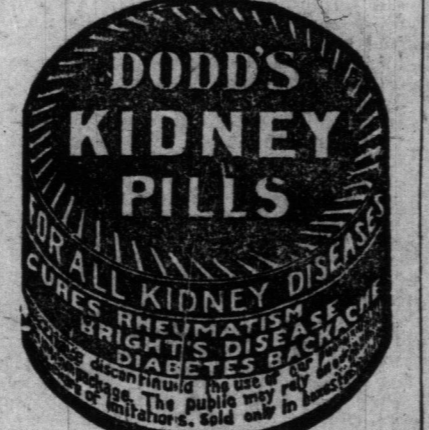

EXONERATES VICE-PRESIDENT.

Montreal-Governor of Quebec "Nails" a Hilarious Paragraph. The widely published criticism of Mr. Fairbanks' conduct at Quebec during the visit of the Prince of Wales has called out a vigorous protest from Lieutenant-Governor Jette.

A prominent English woman, said to belong to the Canadian official family, has been given as the author of the following paragraph in several American and Canadian papers:

"What business was it of Mr. Fairbanks to stand ahead of Sir Louis Jette, the governor of the province at the garden party in honor of the prince, to receive the guests? Pure cheek, I call it."

To-night the governor's secretary publishes a letter saying that his honor cannot let the assertion pass without contradiction, and adds the following statement:

"It is not true that the vice-president stood ahead of Sir Louis Jette at the garden party at Spencerwood. The lieutenant-governor and Lady Jette and the vice-president invited him and Mrs. Fairbanks to receive the invited guests with himself and Lady Jette and from the same motive of doing honor to the occasion the vice-president and Mrs. Fairbanks consented to do so."

"When His Royal Highness arrived, both Sir Louis and Lady Jette had to go and receive him at the door, so that Vice-President and Mrs. Fairbanks were left alone to shake hands with the incoming guests who were introduced to them by myself in the usual way, and, as above stated, at the special request of the hosts themselves. It is much to be regretted that such an ordinary and most proper proceeding should have been given an interpretation which nothing in the manner, and intention of the vice-president could justify."

MAGISTRATE IS SEVERE ON HARBOR'S ACTIONS

City's Endeavors to Square Leslie Matters Are Criticised in Court.

Sharp words of censure on the neglect of Mayor Oliver and the police authorities to prosecute Col. J. K. Leslie when the original shortage of \$16,000 was discovered were spoken by Magistrate Denison on the resumption of the preliminary enquiry yesterday.

Col. Denison made some biting references to the advice given the mayor by Corporation Counsel Fullerton, wherein the latter said that the city's first duty was to recover the money and that there was no obligation to prosecute. The magistrate reaffirmed his belief that illegal means had been taken to obtain restitution.

The only witnesses called were auditor Harry Vigon and the mayor. The former told of the dramatic scene in the mayor's office following the exposure and also of the manipulation of figures in the bank pass book. As for the mayor, he had to hear the brunt of a heavy fire of criticism, which was promptly turned upon Corporation Counsel Fullerton, on his worship's explaining that he had acted under legal advice. The enquiry was then adjourned for a week.

Mr. Vigon submitted the bank pass-book ordered by the cash book for 1904 were \$266,535.66, with payments of \$247,980.54, leaving a balance of \$18,555.12, which, with an overdraw of \$1,000,000, made the balance \$17,555.12. Errors in addition in the cash book had been rectified since the audit. It seemed that \$100,000 had been left out, and mentioned this to Mr. Leslie on July 26th. The case was cited as a precedent during the first Thaw trial.

Brother Killed Man Once Before. It is recalled that this is the second tragedy in which T. Jenkins Hains has figured, for in 1891, when he was twenty-nine years old, he shot and killed his most intimate friend, Ed-

ward Hanesagan, a young man who, like himself, was prominent in Washington society, after a trivial quarrel while the two were in a canoe at Fort Reservoir. He was acquitted on the ground that he had acted in self-defense, but the verdict aroused so much adverse comment that many indignation meetings were held to express the popular feeling of disapproval of the findings.

Captain Hains, the chief figure in the drama, is a slight man of thirty-six. He wears glasses, and has a size upon an aquiline nose, and has much more the appearance of a student than of a soldier. Nevertheless, he has several letters written by Capt. Hains to her husband threatening his life.

When she saw Captain Hains and his brother at Bayside just before the shooting, she shouted a warning to her husband and begged him not to come to the landing from his yacht while the shooting was in progress. Captain Hains was there, Mrs. Annis did not believe upon Mrs. Annis intended to shoot her husband, she says, but thought he wanted to serve papers in a divorce proceeding.

"Broken-Hearted Brother Wrote." L. A. Page, a Boston publisher, who is stopping at the Hotel Breelan here, has published a number of T. Jenkins Hains' letters, to-day made public a letter he says he received from T. Jenkins Hains more than a month ago, in which the writer referred to the trouble between Captain Hains and his wife. That part of the letter which has a bearing on the case reads:

"I wish you would come and visit us. I want to see you very much at this time. I am in great distress—due to the shooting of my wife. My brother is broken-hearted on account of my having shot her. Can you not come and help us out?"

Locked in the safe of the Flushing police station is another bit of evidence that will be used at the trial of the Hains brothers.

While Mr. Annis was lying on the float of the Bayview Yacht Club, where he had been shot, a friend, Mr. Rockefeller, scribbled on an envelope these words:

"Shot by Captain Peter C. Hains, U.S.A., Aug. 15, 1908."

The envelope was handed to the dying man, and he signed his name to it.

Mr. Adamson, however, contended that the deficit was caused by another clerk, who left the department years ago. He has been under suspension by the city treasurer for several months, and has written several letters to the mayor repeating his assertions that he is not to blame.

Since the London Account and Guarantee Co., who are liable for a \$2000 bond on Adamson gave notice some weeks ago that they would refuse to pay unless he were prosecuted, the city has been practically forced into such a course, and the city treasurer has reached an understanding with the crown attorney to this effect:
