



CANADA AND IMPERIAL DEFENCE.

Much that is being said concerning the proposal to create a Canadian navy is inconsequential and inconclusive. Those who denounce the policy of the Dominion Government do not agree among themselves, and are, therefore, divisible into several classes. There are of them who either expressly or inferentially deny that any obligation rests on Canada to participate in imperial defence, yet in most cases they profess imperial loyalty. Others leave no thing behind their contributions but an impression of bewilderment, since it is impossible to gather from the tenor of their remarks what, in their opinion, the position of the Dominion within the British Empire is or should become. Yet others acknowledge the obligation but differ in the mode of its performance.

In the conduct of this very important discussion affecting a subject of world-wide interest let the basic factor be kept constantly Canada is now at the parting of the ways, and has three courses from which to choose. She may remain one of a partner-ship of free self-governing British states, acting together for common purposes and mutual defence. She may cut herself adrift, become a separate nation and pursue her own policy, irrespective of all external considerations. She may sink her individuality by incorporation in the United States. Possibly there is a fourth option, suggested, indeed, by certain passages that have found their way into print, that of remaining within the British Empire while refusing co-operation and expressing the gravest distrust of the methods, intentions and good faith of the mother country. This need not be considered, since it cannot but be repulsive to any

self-respecting Canadian. Incorporation with the United States may be dismissed, since it cannot be ranked even as a possibility. It is in direct antagonism to the new and vigorous spirit of Canadian nationality. It would, in our opinion, be a retrograde step for Canada to take, tho it seems to be favored by some opponents of a British Canada. But they forget that were the Canadian provinces states of the republic they would not escape the burden of "militarism.

Canada's choice lies between continuance within the British co-partnership or separation from it. There can be no other, and, whichever is adopted, carries with it distinct duties and responsibilities. As a separate nation Canada might elect to stand out as established on the principle of non-resistance, escaping the charge of self-defence and virtually relying on the army and navy of the United States to protect her from attack. But would it be pleasing to patriotic Canadians to have their country remain dependent on United States good-will? Such a relationship could not be permanent. It could only be the precursor of practical absorption into the republic, which would really be in a position to dictate Can-

The World believes that the great majority of Canadians tavor continuance in the imperial co-partnership. They require with it absolute freedom of self-government and full national control over their home administration and foreign policy. That has been already practically conceded. Does separation from the British states offer any advantage over maintenance of the imperial bond? Canada would be free from imperial entanglements and responsibilities, but would that offset loss of the sense of brotherhood, of the width of outlook, of the experience resulting from immediate personal contact with great imperial questions and conscious participation in the evolution of a system of government which, whatever its faults, responds to the most advanced democratic conditions yet known? It is easy to magnify the blots on Britain's scutcheon and by contrasting them with ideals never realized to make them darker than they are. But where is the country that has done more or so much for the development of the highest known type of civilization yet attained? Canadians who draw disparaging comparisons between the mother country and the Dominion should remember the quaint comment of Dr. Chalmers, made more than half a century ago, after an American orator had descanted on the superiority of the new world, "When your lum has reeked as long as ours, it will, maybe, need sweeping too.

If Canada elects to remain a constituent state of the British co-partnership she must be prepared to accept her share of its responsibilities, including the burden of mutual defence. There is no getting away from that obligation, nor from the responsibilities nationhood, were Canada to withdraw from the imperial connector. The Dominion has already organized, to some extent her land defence, and it is one of the several inconsistencies apparent in the arguments of the opponents of "militarism" that they do not ask for the disbandment of the Canadian forces. Yet that is the logical conclusion of the premises from which they start. For if the establishment of an army is justifiable that of a navy cannot

Opinion may easily differ regarding the method by which Canada can best fulfil her obligation as a British state to share in imperial defence. It must not be overlooked that the construction of transcontinental railways, the provision of dock accommodation, the establishment of supply stations and other enterprises of kindred character have all an intimate connection with the problem of efficient co-operation. In these ways, or some of them, Canada has done nobly, and they are all important factors in her own expansion and in increasing her value to the empire. Canada also has created a military force, and has undertaken its reorganization on lines that will bring it into closer conformity with the British standard. There remains the problem of the imperial navy. Without entering into the vexed question of the double standard, it is generally admitted that Britain's insular position, vast shipping interests and extensive over-sea dominions give her the right to maintain preponderance on the ocean, just as Germany's situation obliges her to be the strongest military power in Europe. The measure of that preponderance is a matter of degree, but there will be general agreement that it should be sufficient to protect the United Kingdom from risk of invasion or from loss of the maritime supremacy on which she depends for the security of her food

In what way should Canada contribute towards imperial naval defence? Directly in money or by undertaking to build, equip and maintain her own part of the imperial fleet, and to that extent relieving the mother country, or by doing both? Fleets cannot be built in a day-they must be ready against the need of the moment. The World thinks there should be the fullest and freest discussion of this matter. Germany and other powers are watching the imperial defence movement with the keenest interest and The moral weight of united action will be great, and it would be very unfortunate if an impression were created that Canada is unwilling to share the burden. The World thinks that a beginning should be made, but only after the most careful deliberation. Contribution to imperial defence will entitle Canada to be heard in the shaping of imperial policy and in the promotion of necessary social and political reforms in the United Kingdom it-


