MUST CUT WAGES OR ELSE INCREASE FREIGHT RATES

Railroad's Representative Says That the Wages of 1,500,000 Men May Come Down.

Chicago, Ill., May 16.—Threatening that the wages of 1,500,000 railroad men would be reduced and the greatest struggle labor and capital have ever had would be precipitated if the railroads' intended increase in freight rates did not go into effect.

Resolved, that the carriers in official classification territory be notified that the carriers represented by this conference vigorously object to the carriers putting into effect the proposed increase in freight rates and then leaving to the shippers to thereafter complain and litigate a course which will involve years of controversy, and during which time the increased rates will continue operative.

On the other hand, the Western shippers, backed by telegraphic protests from more than one hundred cities, as strongly asserted that the increase, in the teeth of the present business depression, meant a sure and certain ruin for them.

The shippers contended that the increase in rates would impose additional burdens upon the shippers and consumers amounting to approximately \$100,000,000, and a committee of fifteen business men, headed by W. B. Conkey, reported these resolutions, which were passed.





THE EMPRESS DELAYED

North Sydney, N. S., May 17.—The Empress of Britain, the first fast mail passenger steamer to call at North Sydney this year, sailed from here at 5.15 this morning.

A special train from Montreal with mail and passengers, the mail consisting of 466 bags and 132 baskets, being transferred to the tender in twenty-four minutes. The Empress was at anchor well inside the harbor. Among the passengers on the special were Mr. and Mrs. Saville, Miss Phillips, Montreal; J. D. Dawson, of Geological department Ottawa.

There was a delay of three hours and thirty-eight minutes to the Empress caused by the I. C. R. train with the mails being overdue. She lost the time at Moncton and Truro.

The stones should be selected with reference to color, hardness and shape. They should be laid well, in good rich cement mortar, with a gradual taper toward the top, and if the joints are well pointed with a light-colored mortar they will give a very artistic appearance to the front. The peculiar timber treatment of the railings also carries out the general effect. All of this exterior timber work, brackets, railings, etc., should be from carefully selected, sound seasoned timber and left rough from the saw and stained with a good creosote weather stain. A dark color is preferable, but a light tint of yellow would not look bad. Houses of this high pitched type of roof are very common in some parts of Germany and Holland. The exterior will look best shingled; the shingle type of roof is in a different color from that on the side walls. A green roof always looks well or a light shade of brown that will blend well with the color of the wall shingles. In keeping with the general style, the floor of the piazza should be concrete and cemented or laid with tile."



A WOMAN IS NOMINATED

Canada's First Woman Lawyer Begins Fight for a Seat in the Legislature.

Toronto, Ont., May 18.—The Woman in Politics has come to stand Presbyterian Toronto.

Miss Clara Brett Martin, who has already achieved the distinction of being the first woman admitted to the Canadian bar, is now desirous of becoming Canada's first female member of parliament.

But Miss Martin was undaunted. She appealed to the International Council of Women, comprising the leading women's clubs of the English-speaking world. The president at that time was Lady Aberdeen, wife of the governor-general of Canada. Her ladyship took an active interest in the case, and as a result a series of resolutions were sent in to the Benchers themselves. This latter probability had more effect upon that body than the former, and their decision was reversed.

Miss Martin has not overturned the practice of law in Canada, as the Benchers feared she would, and her successes have justified the confidence her friends had in her abilities.

BUSINESS SITUATION CONTINUES UNSATISFACTORY, BUT THE STOCK MARKET OUTLOOK IS NOT SO BAD

New York, May 15.—The business situation continues very unsatisfactory. Every complaint is heard of the shrinkage in volume of trade, and facts are multiplying which prove the cause for complaint. It is all very well and even very proper to cultivate a cheerful spirit in the face of adversity.

But facts cannot be ignored; business is exceedingly dull, and anywhere from 20 to 30 per cent. less than a year ago. Buyers cannot be induced to purchase merchandise, because they feel that consumption is shrinking and prices falling. Under such circumstances they feel that carrying a larger stock than absolutely necessary. When prices come down to a more reasonable level, it is demonstrated that production is being curtailed more than consumption, and when demand begins to revive and confidence recovers, then we may find solid reason, and not mere imagination, on which to fix renewed faith in the future.
