ANNUAL MEETING.

The Seventeenth Annual Meeting of the Society met in St. Andrew's Church, London, on Tuesday afternoon, April 18th, and remained in Session three days. About four hundred delegates were present, and during their stay were most hospitably entertained by friends in London, who spared no pains for the comfort of their guests. The President, Mrs. Ewart, presided at all the business meetings. The Session on Tuesday afternoon was devotional, and the President was assisted by Mrs. Somerville, Owen Sound ; Mrs. Gray, Brampton ; Mrs. Talling, London, and others. A Devotional Meeting was also held on Thursday morning, conducted by Mrs. Ball, Vanneck.

During the Sessions the Society enjoyed the pleasure of listening to an address on "Native Christian Life in India," from Mrs. Wilson, of Neemuch. Also a few words of earnest greeting from Miss Adam, Edinburgh, Scotland. Miss Drummond, Newcastle, contributed a thoughtful and comprehensive paper on "The Duties of Officers of Auxiliaries and Mission Bands;" and Mrs. Colin Fletcher, Thames Road, gave a most beautiful address on "The Poetry and Common-place Things of Life in our Work." At the close of the meeting on Thursday afternoon, Mrs. MacLaren spoke a few earnest and impressive words, concluding with an appeal to the younger members to give themselves early to the work of Missions.

Conference.

In the evening the Board met with Presbyterial Presidents and Secretaries, and the Presidents of Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, for conference on several important matters connected with the working of the Society—the Annual Report, and suggested alterations in compiling it; the changing of Article III. in the Constitution. The memorial from Barrie Presbyterial in reference to the records, and the supplies for the North-West, with other matters, were considered and discussed.

The reports of Auxiliaries and Bands not in Presbyterial order, were given by the Home Secretary, also a letter of greeting from Brandon.

Greetings.

A telegram of greeting (Psalm lxxii., 16-19), from Mrs. Dodge, on behalf of the Eastern Division of the W.F.M.S., was presented by the Recording Secretary, who also read greetings from the Montreal Woman's Missionary Society; from the Woman's Auxiliary Missionary Association of the Diocese of Huron; from the Woman's Presbyterian Board of Missions of the South-West; from the Northern New York Board; Presbyterian Woman's Board of 5th Avenue, New York; the Philadelphia Woman's Board; from the Woman's Board of the North-West, Chicago; and from the Occidental Woman's Board, Pacific Coast.

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Conference with Mission Band Presidents.

An interesting and helpful Conference was held by members of the Board with Mission Band Presidents, Mrs. Shortreed presiding. Methods of raising money and conducting meetings were discussed and suggestions exchanged.

Reception and Tea.

The delegates and other members of the Society, with their hostesses and the Presbyterian ministers of London and vicinity were pleasantly entertained at tea in St. Andrew's Church schoolroom. The hour of social intercourse was much enjoyed by all present.

Public Meeting.

The Public Meeting in the evening was largely attended, the spacious church being well filled. Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Convener of the General Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee, presiding. The Rev. J. A. Murray, pastor of the church, warmly welcomed the delegates in the name of the Presbyterian Churches of the city. The Rev. R. P. Mackay gave a summary of the work accomplished by the Society during the year; and very interesting addresses were delivered by the Rev. W. Wilson, of Neemuch, India, and the Rev. J. Macdougall, late of Honan, China. The devotional exercises were conducted by several clergymen.

Training Home.

Explanation was made with regard to the Training Home that it had been decided, with the approval of the Foreign Mission Committee, to take no further steps at present, but wait to see the matured plans of the proposed Deaconess' Home to be established on evangelical lines next Autumn by Miss Wilson. It was unanimously agreed that the decision of the Board be accepted.

Question.

"Should Presbyterial Presidents visit every Auxiliary and Mission Band during the year?"

In the early years of our organization it was found necessary for the Presbyterial President to visit all the Societies in her charge for the purpose of giving information regarding the work. Now the work may be very successfully carried on, and the expense lessened by dividing the Presbytery into sections, and putting them in the care of the Vice-Presidents most convenient to them. It was also suggested that where an Auxiliary or Mission Band desired a visit from the President, they should write inviting her, and arrange for a convenient day.

The Annual Report.

The recommendation of the Conference as to condensing the matter of the Annual Report was not entertained, and it was agreed to make no change either in the matter or the number issued; the meeting being largely in favour of retaining the Report in its present form.

Article III. of the Constitution.

It was explained that in anticipation of a motion of which notice had been given last year, looking to the annulling of the Dollar fee, the Board had carefully considered the matter, and had agreed that no change was advisable in Article III. of the Constitution. Reasons for this finding were submitted and will be found in the May Letter Leaflet.

After long and earnest discussion it was moved, seconded and carried : "That the recommendation of the Board be accepted," that Article III. remain unchanged.

Memorial re Records.

The memorial from Barrie Presbyterial, asking for certain changes in the Records for Anxiliaries and Mission Bands, was supported by Mrs. Needham, Orillia. The changes proposed were adopted in part.

International Secretary.

Miss J. Caven, Toronto, was appointed Secretary of the International Association of Women in connection with the Council of the Alliance.

Allocation of the Money.

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(3) Moved by Mrs. Ball, Vanneck, seconded by Mrs. Cooper, Chatham, and agreed to : "That the further sum of \$600 be also t ansmitted through Dr. Reid to the Foreign Mission Committee (Eastern Division) to be applied as follows: \$100 each to Mrs. Annand, Mrs. Robertson and Mrs. McKenzie, for school work in the New Hebrides, and \$300 for mission work in the New Hebrides, at the discretion of the Committee."

These appropriations were passed without discussion.

Notice of Motion.

By Mrs. Fisher: To reduce the number of delegates to the Annual Meeting, the two reasons being: (1) The great and increas-ing difficulty of billetting so large a number as now attend; and (2) The difficulty of arriving at an intelligent decision without loss of valuable time when so many have the right to speak.

Next Place of Meeting.

Cordial invitations to hold the next Annual Meeting, were presented both from Ottawa and Chatham. A vote being taken, it was decided to hold the next meeting in Ottawa.

Votes of Thanks.

On motion, a standing vote of thanks was passed to the ladies of the Auxiliaries and Bands, and to all friends in London for their kind and generous hospitality. Votes of thanks were also passed to the Trustees and Managers of St. Andrew's Church, to the organist and choir for their excellent music, and also to the Rev. Dr. Reid, for auditing the books of the Society.

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President's Address.

DEAR FRIENDS AND CO-WORKERS, —The Psalmist says, "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." And do not we, members of the W. F M. S., feel to-day more strongly than ever the full force of these words. Oh, it surely is very good and very pleasant to work together in unity, to know and realize in our inmost souls that there is a real bond of union permeating this Society, through its length and breadth, and extending to sister Societies which is drawing us closer and closer to each other in Christian fellowship, and ever nearer to our loving Saviour whose gracious promise, "Lo, I am with you alway," infuses into this department of work for Him, and left for us to continue, and as one has said "comes to each of us, looks at us and gently asks, "Do you really love Me? Then help to give Me the heathen for My inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for My possession."

Seven years have passed since this Society held its annual meeting here. Then the income was over \$13,000; to-day over \$41,000, with proportional increase in Presbyterial Societies, Auxiliaries, Mission Bands and Members. How full of gratitude should our hearts be to our Gracious Heavenly Father for all His wonderful forbearance and loving kindness towards us, in permitting us year after year to carry on this work, always giving us increase in every department of it, and at the same time bringing rich spiritual blessing to our souls. Surely we may well say, "Goodness and mercy have followed us" all these years.

I well remember the very hearty welcome you gave us then, not only as the speaker said, because of the pleasure it afforded you, "but of the one heart, one mind, one purpose inspired by the one spirit, which binds us together as one soul before God the Father." And though for several reasons it has been decided since then, to dispense with a spoken address of welcome, we are none the less assured of the same kind and bountiful hospitality being extended to us. But allow me to say in the name of the Board that we are truly delighted to see so many friends present to hear the account we can give of our stewardship during the past year. The reports are in your hands and will speak for themselves.

To-day I am anxious to draw your attention to the very encouraging and yet most difficult state of Mission work in India, and to the feeling with regard to the Person, Life and Character of our Lord Jesus Christ existing there at present. These extracts and items I have culled principally from the printed report of the third *Decennial Missionary Conference* held lately in Bombay, where, at least, 500 missionaries from all parts of India and Ceylon met and for ten days considered and discussed the many questions relating to mission work which were pressing most seriously on their attention. I can only allude to two of these.

Speaking of the work among the educated classes, this was said : "It was in the midst of the tumult of the mutiny that the three uniwhom w

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versities of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay were founded," and when the government system of education was organized there were 51,000 schools and about 900,000 pupils. Now there are 138,064 public and private schools and 3,604,707 pupils. There are 105 arts colleges pre-paring students for the universities. In Madras 12 out of the 35 arts colleges are maintained by Protestants, while over one-third of the students are from missionary institutions. Between 800 and 900 arts students graduate each year from the four universities, and yet only a fifth of the male population of school age are under instruction, and the proportion of girls is much less. One of the highest government officials has said : "That in a generation, owing to the rapid progress of the Christian community, it will have secured a preponderating position in all professions and possibly also in the industrial enterprise of the country." Much was said about the "Hindu Revival" and the anxiety on the part of the educated natives for a purified Hinduism as being best suited to the genius and instincts of the people. "The final struggle will not be between Christianity and a purified Hinduism, but between Christ and unbelief." "The prospect before us is sufficiently perplexing and disheartening, but, nevertheless, is bright with hope." "We are in a time of transition. The way is clearing. Bigoted hostility, though still deep, is nothing to what it was." The best thought of India is not towards Hinduism, but toward Christ. He who used to be blasphemed is now revered. There is a general admiration of His life and ministry and His moral greatness, -an acknowledgment that He is the Crown of character, though they still hold back from Him the Empire of Divine authority."

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Speaking of the work among the depressed classes (low castes), it was said it was difficult, but yet most encouraging, "And the fact that mission work in India has had its greatest success among these is a proof that it is of God and gave great encouragement for the future." It seemed to be generally conceded "that a successful work among the ignorant classes made the work easier among the intelligent. practical exemplification of the power of Christianity to elevate the low and degraded will be its best recommendation to others." The work in one district had been so successful that one of the strongest opponents to Christianity had at last been brought to say, "You need not tell us what Christianity has done in other villages, we have seen what it has done among our own Mahar classes,-they have given up cattle stealing and the worst forms of vice." Another spoke of two classes all of whom were devil worshippers, "Now they had native Christians whose light was shining among these devil worshippers, little Christian families, and little churches built and good work being done." These classes, when educated, made most valuable workers among the higher castes. So great had been the effect in one village that a Hindu priest belonging to the temple asked, "What it was in Christianity that had such an influence on the lives of the people?" and confessed that there was no more respectable class than these converts. From these classes in Surat Bachelors of Arts and Masters of Arts had gone out from Wil. son College. Then you must have noticed the interesting account of the present attitude of the Mangs in Indore, who are attending the Sabbath and other religious services by the hundreds, and asking for baptism.

From that Conference the missionaries feeling, as they said, "overwhelmed by the vastness of the work, contrasted with the utterly inadequate supply of workers" sent out a strong appeal for large additions

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of men, women and means if these "depressed classes" numbering 50,-000,000 were to be told the good news and drawn by thousands to the Saviour. Surely, dear friends, that appeal which you will find in the *Leaflet* will not be made in vain? "Nothing," one has said, "tests our love to Christ like an interest in Missions, for as we love Him will we long to bring to Him the souls for whom He died." Our success as a Society has been great, to our Lord and Saviour be all the praise; but each step in advance makes another step imperative, because of the ever widening opportunities, and thus the great need there is for faithfulness to the objects for which this W. F. M. S. was organized, and especially is this necessary when we are being addressed by returned missionaries from all parts of the world. who are anxious to secure our sympathy and help and thus we are apt sometimes to be drawn aside to the serious injury of our cause. The following extract from the action of the Board of Foreign Missions in the United States, touches directly on the relation of our Society to its missionaries and to the special objects for which they are sent out.

they are sent out. "The Board has been constituted by the General Assembly as the authorized medium for bringing the benevolence of the Church to bear upon the wants of the heathen world. By means of the information they receive, they are supposed to occupy such a position with reference to the Missions abroad and the churches at home, that they can decide best as to the relative wants of each particular field, and the proportionate share of the beneficence of the church to which it is entitled. The securing of funds by individual missionaries for their work from churches, Sabbath-schools, and societies outside of the regular channels, ignores the Board in one of the principal objects of its establishment. Its tendency is disorganizing. If one missionary may make this appeal in behalf of special work, all may with equal propriety, and the result be as unfavorable for missions as if an army ignored its commissariat and dispersed to cater for its own supplies."

I have quoted this extract because of its applicability to ourselves, and would also draw your attention to the Manual issued with the approbation of the F. M. Committee and which is in accord with their Rules and Regulations sent out for the same purpose, viz. for the guidance of all applicants for Foreign Mission appointments and also for all missionaries after appointment. These Rules and Regulations are very explicit. Each missionary is required to prepare an estimate of what is required for his or her work to make "that estimate so complete as to preclude the necessity of special appeals either to Congregation Sabbath schools or individuals for matters not specified in their estimate (unless in the case of any special object estimates are to be approved by the Council or Presbytery on the field and after revision by the F. M. Committee at home, govern the expenditure for the year.

From these estimates, all for which the W.F.M.S. is responsible, is extracted and sent to the Board, and covers the expenses of the medical and educational work among women and children, the outfit and travelling expenses of the lady missionaries and their salaries, the building of hospitals, "boarding-school, dispensaries and schools; also the salaries of all Bible-women and teachers employed in them. The sum necessary to meet these expenses is provided by the W.F.M.S., and therefore the Society asks that all contributions for any or all of these purposes be sent to the Treasurer; for unless this is done they cannot be acknowledged in the Annual Report. We ask your attention to this, because we think this matter is misunderstood, some friends having the impression that if they send a special sum to the Treasurer or to Dr. Reid for, say, a Bible- woman or a catechist, they are adding at once to the number employed' orgetting that the estimate for this work as a whole must be met before any extra assistance can be employed.

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Do not misunderstand me, as if we wished you to turn a cold shoulder to the appeals for help coming to you from many quarters. No, each one is quite justified in doing as her sense of duty, guided by the Holy Spirit, leads her. But having taken up these Mission fields, viz., India, China, (including Formosa) and the North-West (the New Hebridies and Trinidad belonging more particularly to the Eastern Division), let us see to it that they do not suffer for what is absolutely necessary for the proper prosecution of the work, and especially that our missionaries are not over-burdened or broken down in health because additional assistance is not sent them. In a word, let us be faithful. Just here I feel as if I was doing an injustice to the branches of the W.F.M.S. by urging them to be faithful; for there never was a year in our history when, as a Board, we have been more cheered and gladdened by the reports and letters sent us than in the one just closed. The Secretary's and Treasurer's reports will testify to that in the strongest way possible. But we are anxious to remove any misconception there may be, and to draw your attention to the Manual and the Rules and Regulations laid down by the Foreign Mission Committee for the guidance of all missionaries, which provides a method of carrying on our Mission work that secures that every department of it will receive its due share of the funds supplied. But we must never forget that the larger the contributions the more extended and efficient will be the work done.

One other striking but hopeful sign from India before I close, is to be gathered from resolutions issued by the Sixth National Social Conference, composed of prominent native gentlemen, and from which Europeans are excluded. This Society meets annually and deliberates on all public questions, political, social and religious. The 1st resolution deals with the extravagant ceremonials and expenses at marriages, the 2nd with regard to caste, the 3rd the necessity for female education, 4th, the marriageable age of boys to be raised to twenty-one, and if girls to fourteen, 5th, to promote union among sub-divisions of castes by marriage, 6th, against polygamy, 7th, against the disfigurement of widows, and the 11th regarding the re-marriage of child widows.

With all these encouragements to stimulate us, and the urgent appeal from those labouring in the foreign field, can we possibly hold back our means, our influence, our earnest prayers, or even those dear to us? I close with the Hindu woman's appeal :

> Hark ! the wail of heathen nations, List ! the cry comes back again, With its solemn, sad reproaching, With its piteous refrain.

"We are dying fast of hunger, Starving for the Bread of Life; Hasten Christians ! ere we perish, Send the Messengers of Life. Send the Gospel faster, swifter, Ye who dwell in Christian lands; Reck ye not we're dying, dying, More in number than the sands.

Heed ye not His words, your Master, 'Go ye forth to all the world?' Let its banners be unfurled." Send the Gospel faster, faster, Let its banners be unfurled."

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Annual Report of the Board of Management.

In reviewing the work of this seventeenth year of our Woman's Society, through which our Lord has so graciously led us, we can report a very faithful attendance of the members of the Board at the thirtyeight regular meetings held. The average of the whole Board being twenty-nine, and of the Managers twenty-five. In addition to this, sixteen Executive meetings have been necessary, at which an average of thirteen have been present—thus showing a deep interest in the work, and an earnest effort to fulfil the responsibility assumed. Owing their places were filled by Miss Patterson, of Cook's Church, and Mrs.

In accordance with the notice presented at the annual meeting, the By-laws were revised by a Committee and passed by the Board, and as amended were published in the August Letter Leaflet.

Your Board appointed a Committee to take into consideration the petition from the Methodist ladies, that we should join them in memorializing the Government in regard to the opium traffic and Chinese questions. Meetings have been held, and a communication prepared to be submitted to the Minister of Customs. The resolutions of our own Committee, with the Memorial, were forwarded to the Foreign Mission Committee, who have the matter under consideration, to report at next Assembly. The Special Committee on Missionary Outfits, after carefully weigh-

ing the whole question, recommended that the sum for personal outfit and house furnishings for women going to China or India, be \$250. This recommendation was transmitted to the Foreign Mission Committee, and met with their approval. The Manual has been printed and is now ready for intending applicants.

The Memorial from St. Andrew's Auxiliary, Kingston, presented at the annual meeting, setting forth the danger of overwork to our missionaries, was sent on to the Foreign Mission Committee. Also a letter from Mr. Wilkie, bearing on the same subject, and the resolution passed by the Board earnestly requesting the Committee to prepare and adopt some specific rules relating to the appointment of missionaries to stations, overwork, and kindred matters, for the guidance of the Mission Council in Central India.

The Committee appointed to consider the proposed Training Home, met in November, and in the course of their deliberations received the information that there is a prospect of a Deaconess' Home for training young women for both Home and Foreign work being established in Toronto in ' course of a year, under the auspices of the evangelical party in the Episcopal Church. That it is proposed to be undenominational as to the students to be trained, and that Miss Wilson, who has given up her own home for the purpose, will be Superintendent. The Committee, after much careful consideration of the whole matter, came unanimously to the following conclusion, viz., to recommend "That for the present, the Board of the W. F. M. S. take no further steps to 'collect information in detail pertaining to such institutions, or to mature plans to be laid before the Society for its disposal at the next Annual Meeting,' but wait to see the matured plans of the proposed Deaconess' Home to be superintended by Miss Wilson." The Committee think there would be no difficulty in arranging that the theological training of any of our intending missionaries could be taken at Knox College.

During the meeting of the Council of the Alliance in September, a Woman's Missionary Conference was held, at which there was a very large attendance at each of the three sessions. It was a most memorable gathering, and was composed of representatives of Woman's Missionary Societies from Britain and the United States, returned missionaries from India, Africa, China, Syria and the New Hebrides, and members of cur own Society from many places. A proposal was submitted and unanimously adopted that an International Conference of Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies be formed, and that a meeting of this Union be held whenever the Council of the Alliance meets. You will be asked to appoint a Secretary to conduct correspondence on behalf of our Society.

The Board has had the privilege during this year of a visit from Mrs. Wilson, of Neemuch, at present home on furlough; from Mr. Nichol, late of Mistawasis Reserve, and from several of those who have either gone or are preparing to go out to the Foreign field. Also in September, Mrs. Mathews, who, in presenting greetings from the Woman's Board of the English Presbyterian Church, spoke of the warm personal interest felt by herself and Dr. Mathews in our missionaries with whom they had become acquainted as they passed through London on their way to India.

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In accordance with the resolution of the Society, the special meeting for prayer was held early in February, under the auspices of the Board, from which we feel an interest will go out, and interest in Mission work will be quickened in many hearts.

And now in closing the record of another year we feel that "The hand of the Lord has been good upon us," and we humbly rejoice in the growth of our Society, knowing that it is all due to the abundant blessing of our Heavenly Father. Let each member resolve as a thankoffering to God for the mercies of the past, to give henceforth more freely of her time, talents, influence, money, and, above all, her prayers to this Woman's work for Women. Let us strive to live in the spirit of obedience to our Lord's command, "Go ye and teach all nations."

MISSION TO CENTRAL INDIA.

In view of the great missionary enterprises of recent years, this has been appropriately termed the century of missions. We say appropriately, because truly, in comparison with the workers a hundred years ago, "the company," who now tell the Gospel story in heathen lands is great; though in relation to the magnitude of the work, the plentiousness of the harvest, the "labourers are few." The appeal from the Decennial Conference recently held in India, to Missionary Societies in Christian lands contains strong utterances bearing upon this very point:—"The women of India, this appeal says, must be evangelized ber of such workers c uld not overtake the task." Again this solemn question is asked: "Face to face with India's two hundred and eightyfour millions, for whom in this generation you, (that is Home workers), as well as we, are responsible, we ask, will you not speedily double the and importunately pray the Lord of the Harvest to send forth labourers

In the year 1876 the Canadian Presbyterian Church established a Mission at Indore, in that great district in Central India, called by the natives Malwa. The staff at the beginning included two ordained missionaries, and two Christian women who were employed in Zenana vi-itation and school work, among women and children.

The staff now embraces six ordained missionaries, and eleven women, who are engaged in medical, Zenana and educational work.

During these seventeen years *five* Mission Stations, all in important cities or towns, have been planted, namely :--

1. Indore, in the State of Indore, an important city containing 83,091 (these figures are taken from the Council Report of 1885), inhab-

2. Mhow, also in the State of Indore, 14 miles from the City of Indore, with a population of 27,227.

3. Neemuch, State of Gwalior, 150 miles from Indore, with a population of 18,230.

4. Ujjain, also in Gwalior, 30 miles from Indore, with 32,932 inhabit-

5. Rutlam, in the State of Rutlam, distant 70 miles from Indore, population numbering 31,066. All departments of Mission work among women and children, at these various stations are supported by our Society.

MEDICAL WORK.

Our Medical Mission work in Central India was inaugurated by Dr. Elizabeth R. Beatty, who arrived in India in December, 1884. For the space of two years Dr. Beatty laboured single-handed in her department, and for seven years she continued at her post, though suffering, during the latter part of her sojourn in the field, from continued attacks of malarial fever. In 1891 Dr. Beatty returned home (on furlough), with

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of Gil ant the hope that her health would speedily be restored by the change to her native air. This has not been the case, and after patient waiting, many anxious fears and prayerful expectations, the Foreign Mission Committee, at her own repeated and urgent request, felt compelled, with very deep regret, to accept, in the meantime, Dr. Beatty's resignation.

This is a severe trial not only to the Society but to the missionaries, as Dr. Beatty was recognized by all as an invaluable worker; but we do not abandon the hope that in the future the way may be opened for her to return to the work for which she was so ably qualified, and which she so much enjoyed and loved.

In 1986, Dr. Marion Oliver arrived in India, and at once associated herself with Dr. Beatty in the medical work. Since the return of the latter to Canada, Dr. Oliver has very successfully filled the responsible position of senior (by appointment) medical missionary. Dr. Oliver retu ns this year on furlough, for rest, as her health has failed greatly on account of overwork. In her absence the work will be supervised by Dr. Margaret O'Hara, assisted by Dr. Agnes Turnbull, who arrived in the field a few months ago.

Dr. O'Hara, though not yet two years in the Mission, has, from the beginning, entered with unusual vigour and energy into the work, and strong in the Lord and in the power of His might, she will doubtless not fail to carry the grave responsibilities which, in Dr. Oliver's absence, will fall upon her.

Dr. Agnes Turnbull has commenced, with earnestness and assiduity, the study of the language, and will be able materially to assist Dr. O'Hara in a short time.

It is very sad and discouraging to be continually recording facts like the above, namely, the return of missionaries, broken down and worn out on account of overwork, and the crowding of new workers into active and onerous service, before they have even acquired the language, or become accustomed to their new surroundings. What is the difficulty? The need of workers. Surely there are many young, strong, educated women in the land who ought to consider it a privilege to respond to this call for service in foreign lands.

THE REPORT OF DR. OLIVER AND DR. O'HARA.

This is divided into the following departments:-Village Work, Dispensing Work, House Visiting, The Hospital, Improvements to Hospital Building and Grounds, Helpers, Statistics.

Village Work. -Except when sent for to see patients too ill to be removed to hospital or dispensary, our medical missionaries have been unable to visit surrounding villages. They propose making a trip to each one of these in the near future.

Dispensary Work.—The attendance at the dispensary has been somewhat better than in former years. The morning Gospel service for out-patients has been conducted by one of the native Christian women whose husband is connected with the Mission College. This same Christian woman has assisted Dr. O'Hara in carrying on a Sunday school in one of the mohullas of the city.

The Pipiti Bazar Dispensary was closed a part of the year on account of sickness and the want of a suitable assistant. In July it was re-opened. The daily attendance here is about twenty-five, but the women are specially attentive, and the mornings have been profitably durin langu out-p quali

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but rofitably spent. As Dr. O'Hara has been much occupied with her studies during the past three months preparatory to her examination in the language, only a weekly visit has been made to this dispensary. The out-patients, however, have not been neglected, as the assistant is well qualified, but for her poor health for her during.

qualified, but for her poor health, for her duties. House Visiting.—The visiting of patients in their homes has fallen off during the past two years. One of the causes of this is the fact that all castes are willing to come into the hospital. These visits are now chiefly confined to important surgical cases, and to those who are able and willing to pay a fee for the services rendered.

The Hospital.-Our missionaries believe that their best opportunity for teaching the way of life to their Indian sisters is in the Canadian Woman's Hospital. They therefore make the in-patients in this institution their first care. Many have been perfectly restored to health under the treatment given, and one or two have died rejoicing in the Christ as their Saviour. The average length of time each patient remains is from two to three weeks, though some cases are retained for months. One, a girl of thirteen, has been in since September last. Janebai is teaching her to read, and she has learned to repeat the Lord's Prayer. Another girl, who had travelled more than three hundred miles to the hospital for surgical treatment, has, after three months, cast in her lot with the native Christian people of Indore, and is earning her living grinding grain in the Girls' Boarding School. She is being instructed in Christianity. Every afternoon there is a short service on the verandah in front of the wards, and even if patients are unable to leave their wards they can hear the service distinctly. On Sunday there is a special service in the waiting-room, to which old patients are welcome, and at which the truth taught during the week is

Great care is taken not to interfere in the matter of food. Only those patients who are unable to provide for themselves are boarded in the hospital. Patients may provide their own food and have the attendance of one of their friends to cook it. Injurious articles alone are prohibited. Each patient, if she so wishes it, may have a friend to stay with her, which makes the real number in the hospital double the number of patients.

Improvements.—A beautiful flower garden has been laid out in front of the building, which is a delight to all. Some time ago a court yard was built at the end of the Hospital, the cost of which has been met entirely by Indore people. This court yard is divided into sheds, where the friends of the patients do their cooking, washing, etc. In the centre of the court, a bathing place is built, and now the women think that nothing necessary to their comfort has been left undone.

Deep gratitude is expressed for the gift of Mrs. Hurdon in the name of her sainted mother, the interest of which will support three beds.

The staff of workers consists of four Christian women. Hettibai, Janebai, Rebecca, and Raobai; besides these there are: a Brahmin woman, who acts as cook, a dispensary servant, a waterman, a sweeper and a watchman.

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Of the 211 in-patients in Hospital, 177 were medical and thirty-four surgical cases, twelve were Christians two Eurasians, two Roman Catholics, sixty Mohammedan, twenty-nine Brahmins, 105 other Hindoo castes and one Parsee. There were four births and three deaths.

EDUCATIONAL AND ZENANA WORK.

MISS SINCLAIR'S AND MISS M'WILLIAM'S REPORTS.

The Girls' Boarding School.-Miss Sinclair writes, that at first she felt the work heavy and trying, but comparing the present with a year ago, there is room in her heart for nothing but thankfulness. The numbers have not grown very much; five have left during the year, and there are now nineteen in attendance, including two little English girls, whose fees are paid in full. In the educational part of the work the curriculum for government vernacular schools is followed. Good progress is being made, though in arithmetic some of the classes are not quite up to the standard. The studies of the week are reviewed on Friday. The teacher in the third and fourth classes is a Christian young man. In giving secular instruction our missionary has ever endeavoured to remember that it is not the chief aim to give the girls a good education cnly, but that they should be "so taught the Word of God, and so surrounded by Christian influences, that they will not grow up mere Christians in name, but earnest living witnesses and workers for Christ." Throughout the year there has been a daily Bible class held from 8 to 9 a.m. at which the Epistles have been studied. and the girls have been delighted with the letters of St. Paul. The larger girls have also had old Testament history, and the smaller ones "Peep of Day." At evening prayers the Commandments, or a chapter is repeated in unison. The girls sew very well. "To the smallest one, the words, 'backstitch,' 'top seam,' and 'feather stitch,' are familiar words." Miss Snellksz, the assistant, who is a trusty and faithful helper, takes entire charge of this department of work, as well as the supervision of the cleanliness of the building, the work being done by the girls. Dr. Oliver takes charge of the Sunday school which is held in the school-room. Grateful thanks are sent to friends who have encouraged our missionary with letters, many of which are still unacknowledged. Miss Sinclair has received Rs. 482, a12, p6, in fees from the pupils. Marathi Girls' School.—The Scriptures have been thoroughly and

Marathi Girls' School.—The Scriptures have been thoroughly and systematically taught in this school, and not a few of the little ones have said "I love Jesus and want to serve Him." Miss Sinclair deplores the fact. that, when the mothers of the school children invite her very earnestl she is of turn a c expresse selected kie visit and afte One of t Sinclair tice and been car *Mie

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and ones ores very earnestly to their homes, saying: "Come to our Zenana, and teach us," she is obliged, for want of properly trained helpers to say "No," and turn a deaf ear to further appeals. The Rajah and Rani of Dhar having expressed a wish to hear the children sing, twelve of the best singers were selected, and in company with Miss Sinclair, Dr. Oliver and Mrs. Wilkie visited the Rajah's residence. Their Highnesses were greatly pleased, and after the visit sent a writing-table and two arm chairs to the school. One of the larger girls has recently married and gone to Bombay. Miss Sinclair speaks of her knowledge of the Scriptures, both as regards practice and doctrine as truly wonderful. The Sunday school this year has been carried on with a larger attendance than usual.

*Miss McWilliams, states that her chief object, during the year, has been to secure a knowledge of the language for future work. Besides her studies, in the first five months of her residence in India she took charge of a school in Mhow for a few weeks. Since June, she has had on the roll is 70, but only about 30 attend regularly. The work is often very discouraging on account of the irregular attendance in connection with this school. There is a Sunday school, with a good attendance, not

In November, with the assistance of a native woman, a second Sunday school was started, and then a third in parts of the city where no day schools are held. These schools partake of the nature of short services, the audience being made up of girls, women and small boys.

Miss McWilliams greatly regrets the fact that so many of the larger girls, through the evil system of child marriage are taken from the school just when they are beginning to take an interest in their studies, and says that she intends to follow them in the way of Zenana visitation, as soon as her first year's examination in the language is over.

MEDICAL WORK AND EDUCATIONAL WORK

DR. M. GRANT FRASER'S REPORT.

There has been much to encourage in the Medical work, the attendance at the dispensary has been large, and Dr. Fraser was invited during the year to many of the homes of the patients.

On October 1st a house adjoining the dispensary was rented, and arranged as a hospital, where five or six in-patients can be comfortably accommodated. This is a great boon to those who otherwise would suffer from want and neglect during sickness, moreover, our missionary has an opportunity of speaking daily, as long as the patients remain in-

mates of the hospital, the words of life to those poor sufferers. In order that an opportunity might be afforded for the overtaking of even a little of the Zenana visitation mainting the second

of even a little of the Zenana visitation waiting to be done, it was arranged that Dr. Fraser should take charge of the junior English school division, as well as the Senior, which had been under her care since her appointment to Mhow. About two hours are spent daily in these schools, the remainder of the work being efficiently done by assistants. The Bible is carefully taught, and as a rule the children are cheerful and interested students. Some of them are in the Fourth Standard reader. The attendance, in spite of the opposition of priests, grows steadily.

*Since writing the above, intelligence has been received of the failure of Miss Mc Williams' health. She goes to the Hills for a protracted stay, hoping for recovery Medical work is being opened up in Berwai, a large village or town, reached by train from Mhow. Two Bible women are at work there, reporting weekly the number of visits, the subjects taught, etc., and once a week a helper is sent with medicine. A branch dispensary will be opened here immediately.

The Bazar practice has made it almost impossible for Dr. Fraser to overtake much village work.

The woman's meeting held on Thursday is well attended, the usual number present being from forty to fifty.

In the midst of her earnest service for the Master in this her new field of work, Dr. Fraser contracted smallpox from a patient, and was set aside for six weeks. We are thankful to state that she is now fully recovered and able to resume her work.

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EDUCATIONAL AND ZENANA WORK.

MISS ROSS' REPORT.

The attendance at the school in Mhow has been greatly increased during the year. In June it was about 60, and mainly through the efforts of the "calling women," who were each promised a reward if they succeeded in increasing the number of pupils, the attendance went up to 76 in July, in October 104, in December 120, and in February 130. Irregular attendance is the principal discouragement, the children being frequently kept at home on account of the most useless rites and ceremonies.

The Pension Poora, and the Kishna Poora schools, have both suffered from the want of efficient teachers. The average attendance at Pension Poora is 26, though since Christmas a larger number have enrolled their names. In Kishna Poora the school is somewhat smaller. In both these villages meetings are held for the women, and Zenana visitation in the homes of the children, in these villages and in Mhow is regular, and in many instances very encouraging. The Sabbath school work in Mhow is very prosperous, as there is in the various schools an attendance of about 500 pupils.

The new school building is a great assistance to our missionaries in their work, as it affords facilities for the instruction of these children that were unknown previously.

Miss Catharine Calder, who arrived in India in December last, in company with Dr. Agnes Turnbull, Miss J. Duncan, and Miss Hodgins (now Mrs. Russell), has been added to the staff at Mhow, and is already hard at work at the language. Miss Ross says that she will soon be able to be of real service in the mission, and also speaks of Mrs. Russell as being busy *preparing* to tell the Gospel story to the daughters of India.

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MEDICAL WORK.

DR. MAGGIE MCKELLAR'S REPORT.

While the reports of 1892 were being prepared, Dr. McKellar writes that she was fulfilling her sad mission to London, England. On her return to Central India, she journeyed to the hills to regain failing strength, so that it was not until the month of August that her medical work was opened up at Neemuch, and therefore the report covers but five months. During these months confidence in Western modes of treatment is on the increase. At the beginning the medicines must be placed on the floor before the native women would touch them, and the water used in the dispensary was brought by cart a considerable distance. These prejudices have been entirely overcome. Formerly at the mention of surgical treatment the patient would fly terror-stricken. At date of report about fifteen had submitted to operations of various kinds. There are, on an average, ten present at the Gospel service before the dispensary is opened, and those who come late must wait their turn, so that they too hear the good news of salvation.

Dr. McKellar has no trained helper, and in consequence the work is greatly crippled. The Bible-woman is an earnest Christian woman, but is too young to undertake the visitation of Zenanas, and the dispenser is a girl of only fourteen years of age.

Not only are trained workers wanted, but a hospital, ere permanent results can be obtained. Dr. McKellar is enjoying good health, though she speaks of the severe strain to both body and mind in carrying on, as she is doing, medical mission work, without an associate.

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EDUCATIONAL AND ZENANA WORK.

MISS JAMIESON'S REPORT.

Our missionary has been able to give her uninterrupted time this year to the work of teaching in the three schools under her charge. These schools are located one in Neemuch City, one in the Camp Bazar, and one in the outskirts of the same place for Chamars. The parents are beginning to appreciate education for their daughters, and successful and encouraging work has been accomplished in all the schools, except in the last-named. In some instances parents have purchased school books for their children, which is a striking evidence of their interest. The lamentable custom of removing the elder girls from

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school for early marriages is a very great hindrance to the good work which might be done by the missionary teacher. The great need is competent teachers to give instruction under supervision, and in this connection many prayerful hopes for the future gather round the Boarding school for the training of native girls at Indore.

There is much encouragement in the work of Zenana visitation. Over forty houses are visited regularly. In these twenty-three pupils are reading, and eight learning fancy work. These homes are never entered by our missionary without the Bible. A weekly meeting for women is held, attended by about twenty, the singing of hymns being the principal attraction.

The Lord has promised that His word shall not return unto Him void, and no doubt there will be fruit from these fields at the great ingathering of the Harvest.

Miss Jessie Duncan is located at Neemuch, and has entered with zest into the preparation for her chosen life work. Our missionaries at Neemuch greatly miss Mr. and Mrs. Wilson, who are in Canada this year (on furlough), and are both doing noble service in the Church, and in the interests of our Society for Missions.

At Rutlam and Ujjain there are at present no lady missionaries, though the ordained missionaries at both these stations have established and carry on very successfully medical, educational, and Zenana work among women and children. Mrs. Buchanin mourns the loss of a beloved

ttle daughter, and our sympathy is extended to her in this affliction. When workers, Zenana visitors, teachers and medical women are so sorely needed in our Mission in India, when in almost every letter to the home land there is a strong appeal for helpers to enter the open doors, it is gratifying to know that there are several applications for service in this field from educated young women, some of whom have had experience in teaching, at present under consideration by the Foreign Mission Committee.

We have not, this year, alluded to the great work accomplished at the various stations by the ordained missionaries; this will be given in full in the report of the General Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee. The reason of the omission is the extension of Woman's work, and the necessity for condensation.

Verily Christian Missions have done much for the women of India. One hundred years ago, "the education of women in India was looked upon as 'a wall 500 feet high,' to be surmounted, now, women with University degrees and Christian women, are in advance of all other women, in position, attainment and emolument."

CHINA.

1. FORMOSA.

In accordance with the estimates sent us by the Foreign Mission Committee, the Society has this year (as is usual now for some years past), paid the sum of \$750 towards the running expenses of the Girls' School at Tamsui, which is under the supervision of Rev. Dr. McKay. We have also assisted in the support of native Bible-women, who labour among the women and children.

2. HONAN.

At the writing of our Report last year, "a foothold had been gained in the Province of Honan." With gratitude we now record the fact that tr Chen, Th station Di made b

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ained e fact that two Mission Stations have been planted in this field, one in Hsin Chen, the other in Chu Wang.

The location of the ordained missionaries in connection with these stations may be found in the Missionary Chart (page 3).

Difficulties have recently arisen at Hsin Chen owing to attempts made by our missionaries to secure additional property, which the natives strongly opposed.

We regret to say that Mrs. McVicar has been far from strong. Lately she has been suffering from insomnia.^{*} Earnest prayer is offered for her recovery, also sympathy is expressed for those who have suffered bereavement.

Very little in the way of organized women's work has been done in Honan, though large numbers of native women have visited the homes of our missionaries from curiosity; and others have sought medical relief. Prejudice and opposition, however, are gradually being over-

relief. Prejudice and opposition, however, are gradually being overcome, and our workers are patiently waiting for "open doors." Miss McIntosh and Mrs. MacVicar, have sometime ago, passed very creditable examinations in the language, and are now equipped for service. These examinations were conducted by Rev. Dr. Corbitt, of Chefoo.

Dr. Lucinda Graham arrived in the field in the early autumn, and has commenced the arduous work of preparation for mission work in China.

3. MISSION TO THE NORTH-WEST AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

These Missions occupy a large share of the attention of our Society, and our yearly estimates call for a considerable portion of our financial resources for their support. Not only are we practically interested in the maintenance of the work, but in the matter of provision of suitable buildings, we have ever been ready to assist when called upon by the Foreign Mission Committee. This year, in addition to the amount contributed for the purchase of mission property at Alberni, B.C., the Board has agreed to furnish in the neighbourhood of \$6,000 for the erection of a new building for the Industrial school at Birtle. This building is now underway, the plans having been accepted, and the foundation commenced.

The school at Alberni has developed from a day school into a fairly well equipped boarding school, and gives good promise for the future. The number of schools is the same as last year, with the difference that the Alberni school is included in the boarding schools, instead of the day schools. The numbers are, therefore, Industrial schools, nine, day

The policy of the North-West Missionary Committee has been to encourage attendance at the large institution at Regina, and this, in some instances, has diminished the number of names on the roll at some of the other schools. The Indian department is agitating the passage of a compulsory education bill, and this, if it becomes law, will doubtless cause some of our schools to have a school to h

less cause some of our schools to have a larger attendance than at present. The school at Regina is maintained by the Government, under the supervision of our Church, consequently the tuition is as distinctly Christian as that given in any one of our mission schools.

*Mr. and Mrs. MacVicar are now on their way to Canada.

In the Indian Industrial and Boarding schools the children receive a good English education, besides being instructed in handicraft of all kinds. The boys do the farm and garden work, learn trades, etc., and the girls are trained to proficiency in house work of all kinds, knitting and needlework, the object being to fit them for domestic service.

In the day schools there is opportunity for the girls to acquire a knowledge of needlework with that of the simple branches of learning as taught in our public schools, but there is not much scope for the boys in the direction of handicraft or manual labour of any kind.

From the nature of the work, and other circumstances, the *personnel* of the staff of teachers in the North-West is subject to changes more frequently than in foreign lands. These changes have been noted this year in the Missionary Chart, which is correct at date of printing.

BOARDING AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Stoney Plain Reserve.—Number of pupils on the roll, seven, average attendance, six. The missionary teacher has many obstacles with which to contend in this field, but his influence is telling, and the prospects are more encouraging. Not much industrial work can be undertaken on account of the need of appliances. The conduct of the children in the school is good. Wednesday evening and Sunday meetings are continued regularly. Rev. D. McQueen holds a service once a month. At one of the Communion services held during the year, seven Indian communicants were present The adult Indians study the English language on Friday evenings.

File Hills Reserve.—Number of pupils on the roll, twelve, average attendance twelve. These children are happy, well behaved, and are making good progress in their studies; they love Bible stories, and sing with spirit and heartiness the Gospel hymns. An outside building has been fitted up as a schoolroom, and this adds considerably to the comfort and convenience of the household. The building is being gradually improved, and the outlook for the school is promising, but little impression, however, has as yet been made upon the adult Indians of this Reserve.

Round Lake.—Number of pupils on the roll, twenty-seven, average attendance eighteen. Many of the children have been very regular and their conduct is all that could desired. There is a considerable amount of work for the boys at this school, and several of them have earned not a little for themselves during the holidays. The Sabbath appointments on the Reserve have been kept up. The withdrawal of Mr. Morrison has been a loss to the school, as he was an efficient and valued teacher. Mr. Wm. McKenzie has been appointed to the vacancy.

Regina. -Number of scholars on the roll, ninety-eight, average attendance, eighty-eight. For such a large school the children are orderly and well behaved, though there is trouble to some extent with "runaways." Good work is done by the boys who are learning trades.

Miss Bessie Walker, who for some years now has been associated with the Indian work in the North-West, first as principal of the Portage la Prairie school, latterly as matron at Regina, has during the year withdrawn from the work, and is now enjoying a few months of well earned rest from her arduous and successful labours. Mrs. Leckie, formerly assistant matron at Birtle, has been appointed to the matronship at Regina, where she will have a wider sphere of usefulness. Her sister Miss Lily Russell, assists in the work of teaching.

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Lakesend, (formerly called Muscowpetungs).—This school is small, as alarge number of the children in Pasquahs and Muscowpetungs Reserves attend the Regina school. A good work has been done among the adults in these reserves. During the autumn Mr. and Mrs. Moore enjoyed a delightful holiday, which took the form of a trip across the Atlantic to his old home in Ireland.

Crowstand.—The average attendance at this school is about thirty, though thirty-six have been sent from this reserve to Regina. The health of the children has been excellent during most of the year, and they are receiving a good training in industrial work. Even the boys are taught knitting, and a beginning has been made in the direction of having them to sew on buttons and patch their own clothes. The mission and school houses, and especially the outbuildings, have been improved or repaired during the year, and a kitchen, laundry and bakethouse erected.

There have been several changes in the teaching staff. Miss Martha Armstrong withdrew for a few months in December, but expects to return again in a short time. Miss E. M. Armstrong also has been obliged to resign her position on account of ill health. The Committeis very hopeful that after a period of rest Miss Armstrong may be able to resume her loved work. In speaking of her retirement Rev. C. W. Whyte says : "The Crowstand will hardly be itself without Miss Armstrong." Miss M. S. McIntosh has been appointed to the vacancy. Mr. and Mrs. Whyte live with the children, and the mission house is a home-like place.

Birtle.—The new building, though for a time delayed, is now advancing. The most conveniently located and picturesque site in Birtle was selected. The plans call for a frame building on a stone foundation, 72 feet long, two stories high, besides basement and attic. One wing will be devoted to the boys, the other to the girls, and between will be the officers' quarters. Our Board has offered to pay the difference between the cost of a frame and a stone building, for the sake of durability. Some of the children have been sent to the school at Regina.

Portage la Prairie.—Number of children on the roll, sixteen, average attendance fifteen. The children attend very regularly, some of them will not even miss a day in the quarter. Their behaviour is very good, and marked progress is made. The Sabbath services are well attended, and several of the Indians take an active part in the meetings. Miss Huston, who so kindly offered her valuable services to fill the vacancy caused by Miss Walker's appointment to Regina, withdrew from the work about the New Year, the position being filled by Miss E. Clow. Miss Clow was obliged to retire in a few weeks on account of ill health. Miss S. Laidlaw, of Toronto, has recently been appointed to the vacancy. Our missionary teachers are the main-spring of the Mission work among the adult Indians near the Portage.

Alberni, B.C.—The day school, which was commenced here more than a year ago, has passed through the usual stages of progression, and in December last was opened as a Boarding or Industrial school, with Miss Elizabeth Lister, of Perth, as matron. Ten children were in attendance. Miss Lister entered upon her chosen work with great earnest-

*Since the issue of the report, Miss Florence McLean, after four years' service, has resigned her position. She was very much attached to the young people, and her labour was one of love. ness and energy, evincing in a marked degree the true missionary spirit; but a few days after the school was opened on January 3rd, she was called to higher service in the better land. Miss Minnes has accepted the position of teacher, and recently Miss Johnston has been appointed matron.

DAY SCHOOLS.

Mistawasis.—Mr. D. H. MacVicar, B.A., has charge of the school in this reserve, and has proved himself an efficient teacher. Number of pupils on the roll, seventeen in October last, the average attendance then, eleven. This small attendance can be accounted for by the fact, that during the previous quarter occurred the hay-making, harvest and berry-picking. These children are quiet and orderly and are steadily improving. There is a Bible class and Sunday school every Sunday in connection with the school. Mission work in this reserve received a severe blow through the unexpected death of Mrs. Nichol, and the subsequent removal of Rev. F. O. Nichol, missionary-in-charge. The mis-sionary career of our sister was short, but it was "full of good works and alms deeds which she did," and she was greatly beloved by the women and children. Rev. A. W. Lewis has been appointed missionary. During the interim the mission services were conducted by Mr. MacVicar. The Indians here are encouraged in the work of self-help.

Prince Albert. -- Number of pupils on roll twenty-two, average attendance eleven. The children come more regularly than in the past, and seem quite interested in their lessons. They are gradually becoming more orderly. Several young men attend the school and are making satisfactory progress. School is opened with prayer, the children repeating the Lord's Prayer, and singing a hymn. The girls are much interested in sewing and knitting. One of the lads goes over to Prince Albert on Sunday, and attends Church and Sunday school. The work here is difficult on account of the distance of Miss Baker's residence and other circumstances, but it is hoped that in the near future arrangements will be made whereby more can be accomplished with less expenditure of strength.

Okanase.—Miss M. S. Cameron, now Mrs. Forsythe, who is spoken of as a model teacher, is retiring from the school within the next few weeks. It is satisfactory to know that Mrs Forsythe will still reside in the vicinity, and will continue her interest in the school, which has been greatly benefitted by her self-denying labours and practical methods. Specimens of the sewing and knitting of the girls in this school were exhibited at one of the meetings of the Board. Rev. Geo. Flett, the veteran missionary to the Indians in the North-West, is in charge of the work at Okanase. We are grateful to Rev. John McArthur, Beulah, for interesting correspondence.

The New Hebrides, Santo. - We have this year contributed, as in previous years, the sum of \$600 for the educational work in these islands. Mrs. Annand is our only correspondent in this field, and we greatly appreciate her kindness in thus linking us by correspondence with the great work done in these islands. We have learned with much satisfaction that the Sabbath services in Santo are well attended, some fifty or sixty turning out. This, out of a population of seventy in the village, is noticeable. The women, we are told, attend better than the men. The school at Santo, Mrs. Annand says, is not yet very popular. Mr. Annand has prepared a Catechism and Hymn book combined, for the use of t the Gos expecti Tr

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use of the young people in the school, and they read the translation of the Gospel of Matthew. When last we heard of Mrs. Annand she was expecting to take a few months' rest at Sidney, N.S.W.

Trinidad. - Our interest in educational work in this field has not flagged, and we are grateful for letters from Mr. and Mrs. Morton, Mr. and Mrs. Grant, Miss Blackadder and others. We are thus kept in touch with the woman's and school work at Tuna Puna, San Fernando and Tacarigua. The Red Hill school in the Tuna Puna district is still maintained by means of our contribution, and others have been opened. The Boarding School established by Mrs. Morton is a work of deep interest to us, it so very closely resembles our Boarding School work at

Our work as in past years has been greatly facilitated by the kindness of the members of the Foreign Mission Committee, our special thanks being due to the Convener, Mr. Hamilton Cassels, and Secretary, Rev. R. P. McKay, for their patient and prompt attention to the numerous questions referred to them for advice and settlement.

In entering upon a new year of work as labourers in either the Home or Foreign field, we are incited to continued service by encouraging admonitions from the Word of God. "Be not weary in well doing, for in due season ye shall reap if ye faint not." "Sow beside all waters, for thou knowest not which shall prosper, this or that, or whether both shall be alike good."

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Home Secretary's Report.

In reviewing the work of the past year we find much that is similar to that reported in previous years. Difficulties, trial and loss have still a place in the reports, but in fewer instances do the workers seen to have been overcome or discouraged. Through all we find the stamp of faithful, persistent, self-denying effort, marked more plainly, perhaps, than in any former year. Auxiliaries and Bands have bravely borne the responsibilities they had assumed. In not a few cases obstacles and discouragements combined to weaken them, but like God's servant of old, they withstood all temptation, realizing that they were engaged in a "great work," and that it would be perilous to the work and to themselves to cease from The past severe winter has in many localities made it difficult it. for the workers to hold their regular meetings, and most interesting are the accounts received, of the few faithful, energetic ones, here and there, who refused to allow weather, bad roads or long distances, to keep them from meeting at the time appointed. One Secretary writes, that "we who belong to large congregations in commercial centres have very little idea of the sacrifice practised by our sisters who compose the little Auxiliary in the scattered district; out on the prairie, where the crops have failed and the money is scarce; surely ten dollars contributed by such a society represents far more than one hundred dollars from our more favoured Auxiliaries. In many of these scattered districts they are without stated ministry during the winter months. Under such circumstances it is not to be wondered at that they sometimes grow discouraged." The marvellous and gladsome thing is that in so many instances they overcome all their discouragements.

GROWTH.

We hoped to have been able to report additions to our Presbyterial Societies this year, but advance in that direction has for the present been found impossible.

We are glad, however, to report three new Auxiliaries in Presbyteries, not yet connected with our Society—one in Rock Lake, one in Quebec, and one in Regina Presbytery. Brockville Society reports five new Auxiliaries and three Mission Banls, and the reorganization of some that for a time had been inactive With one exception, all the Presbyterial Societies have added new Auxiliaries or Mission Bands. The growth of the Society in this direction has not been so large as in former years, and some of the Secretaries have stated that their energies in the future will have to be directed, mainly, to the strengthening of the societies already organized, as our work is now represented in nearly all of the congregations in their Presbytery. and in contrast of this with the reliance of the contrast of t

All this visible, material growth is most encouraging and gratifying, and the reports have brought us evidence of a deep, strong development in the direction of spiritual and intellectual power that greatly encourages our hope for still better results in the future.

PRESBYTERIAL SOCIETIES.

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The glowing accounts received of the several annual meetings give us an earnest of good work for the coming year.

The spirit of Christian love and of earnest devotion in the Master's service seems to prevail amongst the members in each Society. Most excellent programmes have been prepared and ably carried out showing marked advance in method and general management, while above all the deep, spiritual tone pervading the exercises is convincing proof that the givers, in giving, have been doubly blest not the least blessing being that which has come to themselves in the enlarging and uplifting of their own lives. The Presbyterial officers have been most faithful in the discharge of their heavy duties, the reports from Auxiliaries and Mission Bands testify to their wise, conscientious oversight, and to their fostering care. Their visits to the Societies have been much appreciated and very helpful.

Many of our Presbyterial Societies and very helpful. have received a further stimulus in hearing Mrs. Wilson, of Neemuch, speak to them of Mission work in India.

AUXILIARIES,

On the whole, report most favourably. While a very few are discouraged and do not at present see their way clear to continue their meetings, nearly all have sent in something to aid the work. Several of those that in last year's report seemed lost to us have revived, and give promise of continued activity. Muscowpetung Auxiliary has been broken up, all the members, with the exception of two, having removed to other places. This Auxiliary did good work in the past and it is with much regret that we note its disbandment. One Auxiliary, evidently unconscious of obligation to work already assumed, has undertaken to support a new interest unconnected with our Society or Church. This point has been emphasized in former reports, but it may be well to repeat, that the work of our Society being authorized work of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, has a claim upon the women of that church that cannot be ignored. It should have a just share of their time, energies, and means, and this more especially in the case of women banded together for the express purpose of aiding the work. They have assumed responsibilities in regard to it that they are in honour bound to sustain before undertaking to advance any outside interest however legitimate or worthy. If this were not a recognized law of

duty neither Church nor Society would have any guarantee for the carrying out of their several schemes or plans of work.

We are pleased to notice the continued improvement in the methods of collecting funds. Concerts, fairs, garden parties, etc., for the purpose of raising money, are now very largely features o the past. "Funds raised by voluntary contribution" are words that appear again and again in the reports.

Bible Study is becoming a more prominent feature in the monthly meetings. Methodical and intelligent preparation of programmes, and thoughtful search after, and judicious adoption of methods likely to advance the general interest of the work, go to show the true progress that is being made. Nor are the officers of our Auxiliaries and Bands alone in the progressive movement, most ably have they been sustained by the hearty co-operation of the members, who by their ready help, selfdenial and prayers, have added power and growing influence to the work. We are told of one good woman devoting her spare evenings to the remodelling and preparing of suitable garments for the little Indian children, and as she worked, praying that God would receive and bless the child who should wear the garment. Another sewed all winter at pinafores, undergarments, and old people's caps, the thought of our Saviour's words ever present with her "Inasmuch as ye did it unto the least of these, my children, ye did it unto Me." These out of many similar cases, serve to illustrate the spirit in which the work is being carried on.

A most pleasing incident is reported of a woman converted from Roman Catholicism, rejoicing in the glorious light and peace that had entered her own soul, determined to devote to the Lord for the furtherance of his work, one dollar of her earnings each month so long as strength was given her to work. A dollar of it was sent to make her a member of our General Society that she might in that way be kept in touch with Foreign Mission work. The incident teaches its own lesson, it remains for each one of us to apply it.

MISSION BANDS.

Excellent work has been done by our young people. Bright, fresh, methods have been adopted, and "talents' improved; Bands reporting regular Mission Study almost invariably report interest in the work. The missionary work of the children must necessarily be largely that of learners. They cannot be expected to be interested in what they know nothing about, therefore the necessity for well regulated study of the heathen lands and peoples, in order that their sympathies may be enlisted, then very naturally will follow the eager desire to help. Some Bands report that the members take part readily in the varied exercises. Bible Study is also taking a larger place in the meetings of the young folk. Leaders of Bands report that the little ones take great interest in searching for Scripture texts bearing upon a chosen subject, and come to the meetings well prepared,

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to take each her part, when called upon. Others report intelligent interest shown by young delegates to Presbyterial meetings, and refer with pleasure to the bright and full reports given to their Bands. Has the time not come when many of our Presbyterial Societies might profitably devote an hour of their annual meeting to the young folk's department? And in our larger Societies might it not be well to consider the advisability of appointing a Secretary to have special oversight of the Mission Bands?

We have been greatly pleased to note the interest in our work that appears to be developing in several of our C. E. Societies. Donations have been received from some of them, and one Auxiliary reports that they were greatly encouraged and assisted by the Missionary Committee of the C. E. S.

The Auxiliary and Mission Band *Record* does not seem to have proved wholly satisfactory. Some of the Presbyterial Secretaries report it to have been no improvement on the old method, others that it has in it possibilities of usefulness which, as yet, have not been utilized, two only have found it "very helpful in making out their reports." The Secretaries have been urged to give it a fair trial for another year, and it is hoped that it will yet fulfil the purpose for which it was intended.

The Scattered Helpers' Scheme has been very imperfectly reported. In some instances the number of Helpers was given, in others the amount contributed by them, but very few reported both number and amount, consequently we have but an indefinite idea of what has really been done by them.

We have noticed with much pleasure the place the Thank-offering meeting continues to gain and hold in the estimation of our workers, but regret that the meeting in February, for special prayer, was not more generally taken advantage of by our Auxiliaries and Bands, only a very few report having met as recommended by the Board. It is God "who giveth strength and power unto His people." It is for us to come to Him in earnest importunate prayer that we may have the power we need to carry on His work, and for His blessing, without which our labours will be fruitless. Rich have been the blessings granted us in the work, and especially in the past year have our efforts been crowned with a measure of success such as we had scarcely dared to hope for.

Ever mindful of His benefits, may we go forward to the work of another year in humble reliance upon the strong arm of our Lord, with full purpose to attempt greater things for Him and with the firm conviction that our labour will not be in vain in the Lord.

About 280 Scattered Helpers—contribution over \$200. Four Auxiliaries reported reorganized, and a few others not on last year's list appear again as working. Six Auxiliaries have given up the work, and one has not yet been heard from. Nine Mission Bands have not contributed. In some of these there appear signs of life that give promise of work in the coming year. A few others have contributed, but for various reasons are unable to continue the work. Auxiliary and Mission Band membership increased in nineteen Presbyterial Societies. In two Presbyterial Societies there is a decrease in both Auxiliary and Mission Band membership. General Society membership has increased 405 over previous years. Nineteen Presbyterial Societies show an increase in contributions.

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Report of Supplies to Missions.

The clothing sent to the North-West during the past year exceeds both in quantity and quality that of any previous year, and must have been very helpful to our missionaries in their work, as well as a great boon to the poor Indians during the unusually severe weather of the past winter. It must be a source of unmixed satisfaction to those who have given so much time and labour to this work, when they think of the comfort contained in those bales, and the suffering prevented by their self-denying labours; above all may they realize the blessing promised by Him who said: "I was naked and ye clothed me," and who counts work done for the least of His children, as done unto Himself. Over 25,000 lbs of clothing, blankets, quilts, etc., were shipped to the different reserves, and our missionaries have expressed their gratitude for the help given them by the W. F. M. S., and their earnest prayer that God would bless their efforts more and more. All our Societies have contributed liberally, and we have again to thank our kind friends in the East for their assistance. from Salt Springs, N. S., was sent to Mr. G. G. McLaren, Birtle; one from Scotch Ridge, N. B., to the Rev. C. W. White, on the Crowstand Reserve; one from the Ormstown Auxiliary, P.Q. to Rev. Hugh McKay. St. Andrew's Auxiliary, New Westminster, two boxes to Aberni, which were much appreciated by Mr. McDonald; and the Auxiliary of Chalmers Church, Quebec, remembered the pupils in Mrs. Morton's School, Trinidad, at Christmas.

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Hamilton Presbyterial Society sent a valuable case to Central India, containing gifts and prizes for the children in our schools; also some supplies for the Hospital at Indore, which was lost in the wreck of the *Roumania*. While sympathizing with those who had given much labour to this work, and with our teachers who were disappointed in receiving their supplies, we feel that the loss to the Mission was a very trifling one, compared with what it might have been, had not our missionaries been prevented by a kind Providence from taking passage by that ill-fated steamer.

Toronto, Ottawa and Hamilton Presbyterial Societies (with parcels from Brockville and Port Perry), united in sending a second case, which we trust has reached its destination ere this. Vittoria Auxiliary, in the Hamilton Presbyterial Society, sent a bale of clothing to Indian Head; and some of the Societies in Toronto sent some gifts for a Christmas tree to the Industrial School at Regina.

In the early part of the year the Indian Department at Ottawa formulated new regulations regarding the refunding of money paid for freight on clothing sent to our North-West Indians, with which your Board felt they could not comply, as it would add very materially to the work of our missionaries, and tend to lessen their influence with the Indians.

Over \$500 has been expended in the payment of freight during the past year. This is a large sum, and our Societies should exercise great care in sending only such articles as are suitable for that climate, and of sufficient value to warrant such expenditure.

In the new year on which we are entering, may we be stimulated to greater diligence and liberality, and may we not "give to the Lord of that which costs us nothing," but remember how it is written: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

At the beginning of last year considerable improvement was made on the Leaflet, larger type being used, which necessitated its being made 24 pages. Owing to the advisibility of the letters from our missionaries reaching the Auxiliaries as soon as possible after they have been received, five of this year's issue has been made 28 pages, and one 32. It is the intention of the Board fully to consider the interest of the subscribers,

We have received in payment of the Letter Leaflet \$1,261 06, and after all expenses have been met we have a surplus of \$381 61.

Our issue has now reached 11,205, an increase over last year of 2,140 per month! Shall we not hope the coming year will still show an advance? Financially it has proved a success, not only being self-sustaining, but being now a source of income to the Society.

The interest in the Letter Leaflet has not diminished but increased, almost all the Presbyterial Reports speak of its usefulness and of the pleasure received from its perusal. Begun in 1884, in a very small and unassuming style, it has from the first been self-sustaining. We now enter on our tenth year, and those who remember the first modest little

We have in our Society-on a small scale-most of the plans so highly recommended, and we trust they have been in some degree

The Editor of the Missionary Review makes the following remarks regarding Woman's work : "Perhaps the most noteworthy feature of their work is to be found in the surprising variety and abundance of their literature furnished to diffuse information and kindle interest in their work. They have their monthly magazines bearing often names so happily chosen, and edited with much ability and tact. studies running through all the months, Prayer cards and Calenders to give definiteness and point to their petitions at the Throne of Grace, and, he adds "it would be well if the brethren would watch and wisely

The growth of the Woman's F.M.S. has been one marked by progress. Each year our Home Secretary has had to report more Auxiliaries and Mission Bands; our Foreign Secretary more missionaries in the Field ; our Supply Secretary increased interest, and work done for our North-West Indians; our Treasurer more money with which to carry on the work. The Publication Department has steadily progressed, but in no year has it been so marked, as the report of the past year's

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near prospect of large ingathering to the fold of the blessed Master, cheer those already interested, and lay it upon the hearts of our most talented and noblest, to give themselves to this highest of all work, the service of the blessed Redeemer. To all those who have been helpful to the Secretary we record our gratitude. To the Presbyterial Secretaries who spend so much time in gathering in the annual subscriptions; to the young ladies for their willing work in sending out the *Leaflet*; to Miss Ferrier for her interesting papers; to the very many who by their kind words, show that they have our work deeply at heart, we would say to one and all, our work is done for One who will not let a kind word or deed, go unrewarded if done from love to Him.

LITERATURE REPORT.

We have to report a large increase in this part of our work. 19,488 have been sent out in excess of last year. May we not trust that this means more appreciation of our leaflets, and a deeper interest in our work, as well as a desire on the part of Societies, to increase the interests of their members, and awaken those who have as yet stood aloof.

We have printed during the year 46,000 Leaflets, and sent out 34,955 along with mite boxes, envelopes, etc. The total issue has been 62,796. Our thank-offering leaflets were more in demand than formerly, 10,560 having been sold, also our thank-offering envelopes, 13,237 being used in our Auxilaries and Mission Bands. It is a pleasing thought, that so many women brought a willing offering to the Lord. Such an offering not only means enrichment to the treasury, but a rich reflex blessing to the soul of every one whose heart the Lord opened. How small our largest gifts appear, when we place them along side the gift He bestowed on us, "The gift of His Son."

Our mite boxes have fallen off in number, but this may be accounted for as they do not need to be replaced each year. There has been a slight increase in our envelopes. But we fear they are not in general use in our Societies, for out of 689 Auxiliaries and Mission Bands reported last year, only 136 use the envelopes. We would make a strong appeal for their more general use. The use of them by the members means systematic giving, and that is the aim of our Society. The mite box means what its name implies. But we think the mite is not all the Master needs, but that our givings should be in proportion to the means He has bestowed upon us. A missionary of the Presbyterian Church, of Scotland, in Jamaica, in his last month's letter, tells the following incident, from which we may all draw a lesson : A native woman in his station had an envelope sent to her for Church contributions, she writes him saying: "She did not use the envelope when sent because she had no love to Christ in her heart. It was mislaid and lost. But when Christ opened her heart to love Him, He opened her eyes to find her envelope, and she could now send it to him for what it contained, came from a loving heart."

We report ten new Leaflets printed for the annual meeting. The Executive of the Board gives a large amount of thought and care in selecting suitable literature, such as they think will be helpful in the work to both young and old. Our Publication Department has grown to be a heavy part of the Societies work, and we think it due to those who spend so much time in studying the interests of the Auxiliaries and Bands. That these should do their part in upholding the work. It March

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has been the means, under God, in largely helping to build up the work

All our leaflets are on the publication table. The interests of the Mission Bands in the selecting of these leaflets have been wisely considered. We have placed them so low in price (4c. per dozen), that they may be within the means of every Mission Band. "Practical Work," a leaflet appealing to every one, will, we trust, bear fruit in the coming year. We have received \$318.93 from sales and outstanding accounts, and after meeting all expenses, have a balance of \$28.39. This, along with the surplus from the Letter Leaflet of \$381.61, making in all \$410,

has been handed over to the General Treasurer. We close our year with grateful hearts for past favours, and with trustful confidence that God will bless us still, and own our work as part of His means for hastening on the day when all shall know and serve him from the "rising to the setting sun."

The eighth annual meeting of this Society was held in Iroquois March 13th and 14th. Over sixty delegates attended the business meeting on Monday evening and the interest shown was most encouraging. At the request of the President for more help in organizing and visiting, seventeen women rose and expressed their willingness to assist. The afternoon and evening meetings on Tuesday were largely attended and the utmost harmony and good will characterized all the sessions. The past year has been the most prosperous in the history of our Society. Five Auxiliaries and three Mission Bands were organized and one Auxiliary re-organized, giving us now a total of twenty-nine Auxiliaries and twelve Mission Bands with a membership of seven hundred and ninety-one. Over five hundred copies of the Letter Leaflet are circulated and the demand for it is ever on the increase. The call for North-West suppli Societ clothin

Victoria Auxiliary preferred working for the North-West, and sent a parcel of goods there through a neighbouring Presbytery.

The Thanks-giving meeting has become quite a feature of our work, and in almost every report it is spoken of with pleasure and satisfaction.

One Mission Band, through the want of a suitable place of meeting, raised no money, but our contributions exceed last year's by about \$100

Owing to the dropping out of three Societies, and the formation of only two new ones, our membership has not greatly increased, but we are thankful for the measure of success attained, and pray that the Lord will abundantly bless our efforts this year.

Many Societies express hearty appreciation of the visits of our worthy President, whose wise counsels and earnest words are most helpful. Much of our success is due to her untiring efforts.

The eighth annual meeting of this Society was held in Knox Church, Goderich, on the 17th of January, and was one of the most successful and profitable meetings we have ever had.

Mrs. Fair, who has been our esteemed President since the organization of this Society, presided, and much regret was expressed that she felt obliged to retire from the Presidency.

The Auxiliaries and Mission Bands were fairly well represented, notwithstanding the very severe state of the weather at that time.

The work is gradually extending. This Society comprises forty-seven Auxiliaries and twenty-eight Mission Bands, in all seventy five societies. During the year three Auxiliaries and three Mission Bands have been organized and one Band reorganized. Owing to the closing of the church at York Townline the flourishing Auxiliary there had to disband, but was shortly afterwards reorganized in connection with the East Toronto congregation.

Apparently we have a large increase in contributions, but our ordinary giving, we regret to say, has slightly decreased. A special contribution of \$1,030 from Mrs. Hurdon, of Burns' Auxiliary, for the endowment of beds in the Indore Hospital and paid through her Auxiliary, accounts for the apparent advance in giving. In several cases, especially in some of our larger Auxiliaries, the contribution has fallen a good deal short of last year, while some of the smaller Auxiliaries and a number of the Bands have done remarkably well. Nearly all report much interest in the work ; several of their meetings were rendered enjoyable and profitable by addresses from missionaries, especially from Mrs. Wilson, of Neemuch, who kindly visited a large number of our societies.

In Auxiliary membership there is an increase of nearly two hundred, and in that of the General Society a slight falling off. Seventy-one "Scattered Helpers" are credited with contributions amounting to \$30.63, but, as some Secretaries gave only the number of "Helpers," this amount does not show their total contribution.

The clothing sent to the North-West by our Auxiliaries and Bands was valued by them at \$1,131.03; it was of very good quality. Two hundred and thirty-two dollars in cash, received by the Supply Committee, was expended in buying new material, paying freight charges, which are no longer paid by the Government, and the balance was handed over to the Secretary of Supplies to purchase goods for India to replace those lost at sea.

The total contribution, including Mrs. Hurdon's donation is \$7,070.72.

The Society deeply regret that, owing to ill-health, their esteemed President, Mrs. McMurrich, had to resign her office. During the four years that she held the office of President she had very much endeared herself to all the members, through the loving, faithful way in which she discharged her duties.

ARTICLE 1.—This Society shall be called "THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY OF THE PREBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA" (Western Division), and its central point of operation shall be in the City of Toronto.

ARTICLE 2. — Its object shall be to aid the Foreign Mission Committee and Board of Missions, by promoting its work among the women and children of heathen lands, and for this purpose it shall receive and disburse all money which shall be contributed to the Society, subject to the action of that Committee or Board, in the appointment of Missionaries supported by the Society, and fixing their salaries and locations. For the furtherance of this end it shall endeavour to organize similar Associations throughout [the Church, and these Associations shall bear the name of "Auxiliary Societies to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada," and shall report their work to this Society at such times as the By-laws may direct.

ARTICLE 3. - Each woman paying one dollar annually, through an Auxiliary or direct to the Treasury, shall become a member of this Society. The payment of twenty-five dollars by one per-on, at one time, shall constitute a Life Membership.

ARTICLE 4.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of thirty-six Managers, including the President, four Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretaries and a Society annually, by the members who are present at the Annual Meeting. These members shall also have power to elect representative Vice-Presidents. The Board shall have power to elect the officers and to appoint corresponding members when the objects of the Society shall be promoted thereby; they shall also have authority to fill vacancies occurring in their body during the year.

ARTICLE 5.—There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the officers and four other Managers, to be elected annually. This Committee shall have power to transact such business as may require attention in the intervals between the stated meetings of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum. ARTICLE 7.—A Special Meeting of the Society may be called at any time by the President, upon the request of three Managers.

ARTICLE 8.—In addition to the thirty-six elected Managers who are entitled to entertainment during the Annual Meeting, each Presbyterial Society shall be entitled to send one delegate besides its President and Secretary. Each Auxiliary shall be entitled to one delegate besides its President or her substitute. Each Mission Band shall be represented by its'President or her substitute. These delegates must be members of the General Society (thus entitled to vote), and shall be provided with entertainment during the Annual Meeting. All other members of the Society shall be welcome to attend the Annual Meeting and to vote, but the Hospitality Committee shall not be responsible for their entertainment.

ARTICLE 9.—The Constitution may be altered at any regular meeting of the Society, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present; notice in writing of the intended alteration having been g ven at a previous meeting.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE 1.--The Board of Managers shall hold its stated meetings on the first Tuesday of every month, at 3 o'clock p.m., and on the remaining Tuesdays of each month, at 10 o'clock a.m., in the Board Room of the Bible and Tract Societies, or at such time and place as it shall appoint. Five members shall constitute a guorum.

ARTICLE 2.—The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and perform such other duties as are incident to the office. She shall call special meetings upon the request of three members, and shall be *ex officio* a member of all standing committees. She shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid.

ARTICLE 3.—The 1st Vice-President shall in the absence of the President perform all the duties of her office.

ARTICLE 4.—The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair record of the proceedings of the Board, give proper notice of special and stated meetings, and prepare the Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

ARTICLE 5.—The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct all correspondence addressed to the Board and not included in that of the other Secretaries or Treasurer.

ARTICLE 6.—The Home Secretary shall correspond with branches, churches and individuals, and extend information in all proper directions, in order to awaken an interest in the branch of the missionary work for which this Society was formed. CONSTITUTION.

FOR AN AUXILIARY TO THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

ARTICLE 1.—This Society shall be called the —————of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division).

ARTICLE 2.—Its object shall be to aid the General Society in sending to foreign fields and sustaining female missionaries, Bible readers and teachers, who shall labour among heathen women and children, and so far as possible to promote an interest in the work of Foreign Missions among the children of the congregation.

ARTICLE 3.—Any woman may become a member of this Society by the payment of \$_____ annually.

ARTICLE 4.—The officers of this Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer.

ARTICLE 5.—The President shall preside at all meetings, and have a general oversight of the work.

ARTICLE 6.—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Society, give notice of meetings, conduct necessary correspondence and prepare the Annual Report, which must be submitted to the Annual Meeting for approval, after which she shall forward it and the names of the newly elected officers, together with the report of the Juvenile Mission Band (and the report of the Young Woman's Band, if auxiliary to this Society) to the Secretary of the Presbyterian Society, if none exist, she shall then forward them to the Home Secretary of the General Society.

ARTICLE 7.—The Treasurer's duty shall be to report the state of the treasury at every meeting, and remit the funds of the Society and Juvenile Mission Band (also the funds of the Young Woman's Band, if auxiliaty to this Society), yearly or quarterly to the Treasurer of the Presbyterial Society, when one exists; if not, to the Treasurer of the General Society. All money must be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Presbyterial Society before the middle of February, and to the General Treasurer on or before the first Tuesday in March.

ARTICLE 8.—The Society shall hold regular stated meetings, when all suitable measures shall be adopted to promote interest in this branch of missionary work; also an Annual Meeting to elect officers and hear the Annual Report.

ARTICLE 9.—The Juvenile Mission Band (if one exists) shall be auxiliary to the Society, and shall be required to report to it annually, and to pay to the Treasurer all moneys in hand at the close of the year.

The Juvenile Mission Band shall be represented at the Annual Meeting of this Society by its officers, or their substitutes, and two delegates. Only members of auxiliary are entitled to vote at this meeting.

If the Young Woman's Band be auxiliary to this Society, they shall report to it annually and pay to the Treasurer all moneys in hands at the close of the year YO

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CONSTITUTION.

YOUNG WOMAN'S BAND OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association composed of Young Women, shall be called——Young Woman's Band of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division), and shall be auxiliary, either to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the congregation in which the Band is formed, or to the Presbyterial Society in which it is situated.

ABTICLE 2.—Its object shall be to arouse a greater interest and activity in the cause of Foreign Missions among the young women of the Church, and to aid the General Society in its work among heathen women and children.

ARTICLE 3. —Any young woman may become a member of this Band by the payment of ——annually to the Treasurer.

ARTICLE 4.—All money raised by this Band (after deducting necessary expenses), shall be given to the General Society to assist in its work among heathen women and children.

ABTICLE 6.—The officers of this Young Woman's Band shall be a President (who must be a member of the General Society), two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer, all to be elected annually.

ABTICLE 7.—The President, or, in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings and have general oversight of the work.

ARTICLE 8.—It shall be duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Band, give notice of meetings, conduct necessary correspondence and prepare the Annual Report, which must be submitted to the Annual Meeting of the Band for approval, after which she shall forward it, together with the names of the newly elected officers, either to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the congregation in which is formed, or to the Presbyterial Secretary.

ARTICLE 9.—The Treasurer shall receive and keep an accurate account of all funds and report the same each month to the Band. She shall also prepare a complete statement at the close of the year to be submitted for approval at the Annual Meeting, after which she shall forward it, together with all moneys in her hands, either to the Treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the congregation in which it is formed, or to the Presbyterial Treasurer. The Treasurer shall also keep a roll containing the names of the members of the Band.

ABTICLE 10.—An Auditor shall be appointed by the Band to examine and verify the Treasurer's accounts before they are submitted to the Annual Meeting.

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DIRECTIONS

FOR FORMING JUVENILE MISSION BANDS.

A Juvenile Mission Band may be formed in, or in connection with, any congregation. It may be composed of girls, or of girls and boys, who may meet together to select a name and adopt the following Constitution :—

CONSTITUTION

FOR JUVENILE MISSION BANDS.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association, composed of girls (or of girls and boys) shall be called the —— Mission Band of —— Presbyterian Church in ——, and shall be auxiliary to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in said church (if none exist, the Band shall then be auxiliary to the Presbyterial Society of the Presbytery in which it is situated).

ARTICLE 2.—The object of this Band shall be to interest children in the work of Foreign Missions, and to educate them in the grace of giving.

ARTICLE 3.—The Band shall meet at stated times to read the Scriptures, for prayer and praise, to receive missionary intelligence and instruction, and to contribute to the funds of the Band according to their ability. The Band shall also hold an Annual Meeting to receive and adopt the Annual Reports and to elect officers.

ARTICLE 4.—Any girl or boy may become a member of the Band by payment of an annual fee of <u>to the Treasurer</u>.

ARTICLE 5.—The officers of the Band shall be a President (who must be an adult and a member of the General Society), two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall all be elected annually.

ARTICLE 6.—The President, or in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings and have a general oversight of the work.

ARTICLE 7.—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Band, give notice of meetings, conduct necessary correspondence and prepare the Annual Report. This report must be submitted at the Annual Meeting of the Band for approval, after which the Secretary shall forward it, and the names of the newly elected officers, to the Secretary of the Society to which the Band is auxiliary.

ARTICLE 8.—The Treasurer shall receive and keep an accurate account of all funds, and report the same each month to the Band. She shall also prepare a complete statement at the end of the year, to be submitted at the Annual Meeting of the Band, after which she shall forward it, together with all moneys in her hands, to the Treasurer of the Society to which the Band is auxiliary. The Treasurer shall also keep a roll containing the names of the members of the Band.

ARTICLE 9.—An Auditor shall be appointed by the Band to examine and verify the Treasurer's accounts before they are submitted to the Annual Meeting. Mi

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CONSTITUTION.

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OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONABY PRESBYTERIAL SOCIEFY.

ARTICLE 1.—This Society shall be called "The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbytery of _____."

ARTICLE 2.—The officers shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer—all to be elected annually, and to hold office until their successors are appointed.

ARTICLE 3.—The affairs of this Society shall be conducted by a body of Managers, viz.: The officers of the Presbyterial Society ; the President, two Vice-Presidents, the Secretary, the Treasurer, or their substitutes, and two delegates from each Auxiliary ; the President, or her substitute, and two delegates from each Young Woman's Band ; and the President, or her substitute, from each Juvenile Mission Band.

ARTICLE 4.—The object of this Society shall be to promote the formation of Auxiliaries to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in all the congregations of the Presbytery, to diffuse intelligence and excite missionary interest among the women and children of the Church.

ARTICLE 5.—This Society shall be Auxiliary to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division).

ARTICLE 6.—The Presbyterial Society shall hold its Annual Meeting at _____ meeting of the Presbytery, and the Presbyterial officers shall for the ensuing year, and the transaction of all business connected with the Society. Five members constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE 7.—The President and Secretary of the Presbyterial Society, with the President of the Local Society where the meeting is held, shall be a Committee of Arrangements, selecting topics for discussion, and devising means to make the meeting interesting and profitable.

ARTICLE 8.—Reports shall be sent to this meeting from the Secretary of each Local Society.

ARTICLE 9.—A short abstract of these reports shall be sent to the Presbytery in Session, to be read, if approved, at their public meeting, to be followed, it is hoped, by at least one address upon this branch of work.

ARTICLE 10.—This Constitution may be altered at any regular meetng by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, notice in writing of he intended alteration having been given at a previous meeting.

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BY-LAWS.

ABTICLE 1.—The meeting of this Society shall always be opened with the reading of the Scriptures and prayer.

ARTICLE 2.—The President (or one of the Vice-Presidents) shall preside at all meetings; call extra meetings when requested by three Auxiliary Societies, and shall aid in forming congregational Auxiliaries when desired. She shall also take the general supervision of the work in the Presbytery, visiting every Auxiliary Society in the course of the year, and holding meetings with the ladies of as many of the unorganized churches as possible.

ABTICLE 3.—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Society, give notice of meetings, and prepare the Annual Report. She must keep the Home Secretary of the General Society informed of the condition of the Presbyterial Society, and shall forward to her annually a list of officers, together with the Annual Report of the Secretary and Treasurer, and shall attend generally to the correspondence of the Society.

ARTICLE 4.—The Treasurer shall receive the contributions of the congregational Auxiliaries in the Presbytery, and shall forward them to the Treasurer of the General Society before the first Tuesday in March.

MEMORANDA.

Any rules relating to the local affairs of the Society may be adopted, provided they do not conflict with the Constitution and By-laws of the General Society.

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Do not interfere with other organizations. Make no appeal that shall conflict with duties of Church members to any other benevolent work.

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
