PEACE IMMINENT IS BELIEF NOW IN ATHENS

New Proposals Expected From Germany During Coming Week Is Report There

Athens, Saturday, Oct. 13.—(Montreal Gazette cable.)—In well-informed diplomatic circles here it is considered that peace is imminent.

Despite the extreme secrecy observed in Germany regarding the subjects iscussed at the council held in Berlin immediately before the German emperor's departure for Bulgaria, and those discussed in Sofia and Constantinople between the allied monarchs, authentic information has been received here to the effect that new and less irreconcilable peace proposals are to be expected from Germany during the coming week.



USE CONCRETE FOR NEW MAIN

Substitution For Cast Iron Pipe at Lake Fitzgerald Will Effect Saving of \$10,000

The common council, yesterday afternoon, voted to proceed with the work of repairing the wharf and erecting a warehouse at Reed's Point for the convenience of the Eastern Steamship Corporation, if the corporation is willing to pay twelve per cent of the estimated cost, \$20,000. There had been a willngness expressed to pay ten per cent, out the council decided it was too small. The execution of an agreement and the starting of the work hinges now on the acceptance of the offer by the steamship

At the council there was a heated iscussion over the recommendation to orward to Kane and Ring \$7,000 or their progress estimate, Commissioner McLellan taking the stand that a sufficient amount of work had not been done to werrant the estimate to date of \$17,-

000 or thereabouts.

The contract for earth and rock excavation and concrete at the Lake Fitz-gerald work was let to the lowest tenderer, Moses & Tobias. On the recom-mendation of Commissioner Wigmore the item for laying cast iron pipe was cut out and allowed to stand, as it was

cut out and allowed to stand, as it was considered laying concrete 42-inch, instead of cast iron 23-inch., to make a saving of about \$10,000.

On recommendation of Commissioner Russell a bill of \$442 for pilling was ordered paid to J. S. Eagles.

Commissioner Russell also submitted a bill of \$1,208 submitted by H. E. Brown for planking No. 1 shed, West St. John, and he recommended that it be paid.

Commissioner McLellan took objection that the expenditure had not been authorized, but the mover replied that the work was absolutely necessary and could ot be delayed. Other commissioners desired to study

Other commissioners desired to study the matter before expressing themselves and this, too, was left over.

The council accepted an invitation sent by Rev. R. A. Armstrong to attend a midday service at Trinity church on Thursday next, Trafalgar Day.
