THAT the Fair Vale roadway under-pass at the C. N. R. trackage has long since been a bone of contention between residents and the Government engineering department was pointed out today by prominent citizens having their homes in the village. As far back as 1923, when Fair Vale began its greater growth, a definite agitation was carried on to have the masonry abutment either so changed as to straighten the roadway or divert the roadway itself to escape the dangerous bridgeway abutments. "The road is the King's highway," said a Fair Vale resident today. "It has been there for generations. Along come the Government railway staff and lay out trackage to span the present dangerous angle. Undoubtedly no serious thought could have been given the ugly conditions they created here by hiding the turning roadway with the bridge masonry as high as a house. The point is that the highway is an established right and all the trouble has been caused by those who built afterwards." AT THE time of the first strong appeal for a safer turn at

Fair Vale Hazard Grows

THAT the Fair Vale roadway under-pass at the C. N. R.

Fair Vale several years ago, government engineers, federal and local, were called into consultation. They acknowledged the difficulty, but could promise nothing. It was a matter of expense, they said.

"I suppose," said a Fair Vale man prominent in politics, "that it will remain a matter of dollars and cents until some-one is killed because of it."

A government engineer shook his head despairingly and nodded assent. In groping for a way out of the difficulty, local government engineers considered a plan for diverting the main roadway northward just after leaving Rothesay village, near the former Robert Thomson property. This would then bring the traffic about 50 to 75 feet from the present thoroughfare, and enter Fair Vale on the shore side of the railway bridge abutment, thus doing away with the dangerous blind turn altogether. This plan was also abandoned—too costly.

W. E. ANDERSON, Secretary of the N. B. Tourist Association, expresses his view of the Fair Vale roadway difficulty as appended:

culty as appended:

"In my opinion, there is only one practical way of effectively eliminating the traffic danger at Fair Vale under-pass, and that is to reconstruct the under-pass, changing the angles of the masonry abutments in such a way that the opening will conform to the general road directions, at the same time widening the opening to allow cars to pass each other under the under-pass in safety.

"This would not be a very difficult thing to do, as it would simply mean the tearing down of the lower abutment, setting it back some feet, reconstructing it at an angle to conform

it back some feet, reconstructing it at an angle to conform with the general direction of the road. This would give the traffic a clear view through the under-pass, when approaching it from either direction."

AN AGREEMENT has been entered into with the Minister of Public Works and the N. B. Electric Power Commission whereby the under-pass at Fair Vale is to be well lighted —another emergency safeguard until permanent safety changes are made.





Small Thefts and Misdemeanors Were Punished Severely

CASES RECALLED IN ARCHIVES STORY

Branding Also Was Practised in Saint John in Early Years

A brief sketch of the modes of pun ishment for small thefts and misdemeanors in vogue in the early years of the 18th century in Saint John, written by the late Clarence Ward, is taken from records in the Saint John Archives as follows:

Archives as follows:

"In addition to imprisonment for theft, it was generally the rule to add to many lashes with the cat-o-nine lails, as the whip used in the punishment was usually termed. A common mode of dealing with minor offenders, and also often an accompaniment of more serious cases was 'standing in the pillory,' in some cases mutilation, such as branding, and cutting of the ears was added. The whippings generally took place in the vicinity of the jail, and the law to inflict them must have continued down to quite modern times.

THE PILLORY

"The pillory was composed of two upright posts, with a cross piece attached, about the height of a man's shoulders. This crosspice was divided into two parts, upper and lower, in each of which were three semi-circular indentations—the centre one received the head of the culprit and the two side ones his bands. "There are many more instances of the severity of the punishment for minor offences against the law in old times, but it is evident from the foregoing that 'the way of the transgressor was hard.' Another noticeable thing about the trials or correction—no delay or appeal, but sentence and speedy execution. On March 28, 1826, Thomas Freeborn, a constable, had a warrent for a man named Dan Cunningham at Westfield. Cunningham resisted arrest and shot Freeborn dead. He was captured in bed at Carrick's tavern on the Fredericton road. On May 5 he was tried at Westfield before Judge Chipman, found guilty and sentenced to be hanged on the 8th, and on Monday, May 8 he was hanged at Westfield.

BRANDING ON THUMB

"Still another form generally used in cases of manslaughter, was branding the left thumb with the letter M. An interesting instance was that of Harry Grant, a black, drummer of the 104th regiment. A number of soldiers had been drinking at Mr. Merrit's tavern at Indiantown on October 15, 1812, and got into a row with the citizens. The drummer was singled out for the most violent attack and in defending himself stabbed Charles Henry Dalton in the arm. Dalton died of his wound and Grant was tried for murder. It appeared on his trial that he acted mainly in self defence and was convicted of manslaughter only. He was sentenced to imprisonment for 12 months and to be branded on the left thumb with the letter M.

"I will conclude with an instance of the loyalty of our patriotic forefathers, showing that annexation ideas would have found little encouragement from them. On September 9, 1820, Berlan Wait, master of an American vesser in the harbor, was corrected at the sessions of the peace of using seditious and contemptuous words in 'damning the King' and fined \$25."

There are men to whom nothing appeals so much as just knowing that their wives adore them, that their wives never think of any other man, and that they could not lose their wives if they tried to.

There are other men whose wives can only hold them by keeping them guessing, by making their husbands uncertain of them, by making them believe that other men admire them.

There are men whose wives' greatest hold on them is that they have just become habits with them. These men like their wives to stay put, never to leave them, always to go about with them. These men seldom manifest much affection for their wives while they are alive, but when their wives die they are completely broken up because all of their habits are broken up.

There are other men who get tired of their wives if they see too much of them. They get fed up on their wives as a steady diet. This type of husband is very common. He is the kind of married man who makes love to his stenographer, and imagines he has ceased to love his wife just because he has gotten bored with her.

The oven door SHOULD NOT BE OPENED during the SECOND and THIRD QUARTRS of

the baking period, for the cells at that time are not firm and a slight jar may cause them to settle. The

warm expended air which makes the cake light has already been evolved, and there is nothing present to lighten it again.

3—Angel-food cakes may be put into a cold oven and the heat allowed to come on very gradually, or should be put into a very slow oven that has not been pre-heated more than three or four

4—Quick breads should go to the top-most part of the oven, and a hot oven should be ready for them. Muffins, which require from twenty to thirty minutes for baking, should be placed in the top of the oven. Biscuits should not be in the oven more than twelve to fifteen minutes at the most, and should be baken with a very hot oven, at the top-most part

5—Broiled meats must be handled very carefully. The oven should be pre-heated at least ten minutes before the meat is put in, but the broiling pan should be removed from the oven before the heat

A hot porcelain broiling pan draws the juices from the under side of the meat, and prevents it from browning nicely when turned.




